Valley scored quick and often against the Rangers, as Bubba

Clardy (3 carries, 3 touchdowns), Kirk Garner (3 carries, 2 touchdowns), Clay Edwards (3 carries, 2 touchdowns) moved the ball at will against the Rangers. Paul Brittan also got on the scoring end for the Patriots as he scored on an 11-yard run.

Rollie Castillo sacked a Ranger quarterback to end the game at half with a safety. Ron Brittan was 3-8 in the extra

point department to round out the scoring.

On defense, Jason Smith, Chad Powell, Clardy, Garner, Brittan, Anthony Zamora and Chad Calvert came together to hold the Rangers to 104 yards total offense, and 6 points.

Good Voter Turnout In Briscoe Election

In last Tuesday's general election, 883 Briscoe County voters cast their votes for the ones they felt most qualified to run our local, state and national governments. Two hundred and twenty of these were absentee votes.

County-wide, Phil Gramm, Republican, received 403 votes to Hugh Parmer's 401. However, Quitaque Precinct 2 voted 117 Parmer to 91 for Gramm as United States Senator.

Sarpalius carried Precinct 2 with 155 votes while Dick Waterfield received only 57 for United States Senator.

In the hotly contested Governor's race Richards received 133 votes, Williams 75, and Daiell 4, with 1 write in.

Bob Bullock, running for Lt. Governor, was a heavy winner with 154 votes to Mosbacher's 51 and Tom Owens' 6.

District Judge Randy Hol-lums received 160 to 1 for write in for David Cave; Jimmy Bur-son, County Judge 178, District and County Clerk, Bess McWil-liams 182; Betty Stephens, Tax Assessor-Collector 173; Janice Hill, County Treasurer 178; Beverly Bowman, County Sur-veyor 170; County Commis-sioner Precinct 2, Jack Chan- dler 159, Precinct 2, Justice of the Peace, David Brunson 177. Nonsmokers can participate, too, by providing support to those trying to quit on Smokeout Day. The American Cancer Society has special Adopt-a-smoker papers for this purpose.

"No one should have to go it alone when quitting smoking," says Tyler. "The Smokeout lets quitters know that the public is behind them, and family and friends can offer the specific support a quitter needs."

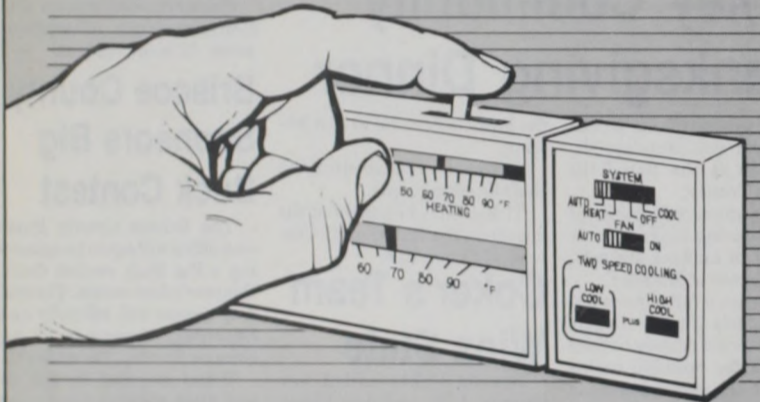

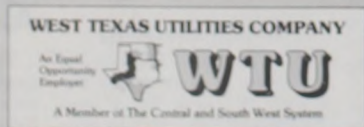

65-year-olds May Pay Tax By Installment

Homeowners 65 or older may now pay the taxes on their current homesteads in four installments. Most elderly homeowners received their home tax bills this month.

To set up installment payments, 65-or-older homeowners must pay at least one-fourth of their 1990 residence homestead taxes before the February 1 delinquency date. Then, three equal installments are due before April 1, June 1, and August 1.

If all installments are paid on time, homeowners will not be charged penalty or interest for late payment. However, those who fail to pay an installment on time must pay penalty and interest on that installment.

Homeowners 65 or over who are interested in arranging installments need to contact the tax collection office for each taxing unit -- county, city, school, or special district -- at the address on their tax bills.

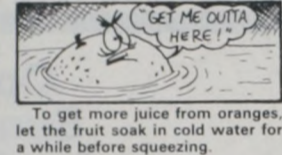

Social Security News

If you have Medicare medical insurance, you should know about an important change in the way your claims will be handled. Starting September 1, 1990, your medical insurance claim must be prepared and submitted by the service provider--the doctor, laboratory, medical supply company, or other party providing the service. In the past, you had to submit a Form 1490S (Patient's Request for Medicare) unless your doctor or service provider accepted "assignment". (Assignment means that the doctor or other service provider accepts the Medicare-approved charge as the total charge.) But now, the doctor or other service provider must send in your claim even if they don't accept assignment. The service provider can't charge you for preparing and submitting the Medicare claim. If a service provider refuses to prepare and submit your Medicare claim or charges you a fee for doing it, you should contact your Medicare carrier. The carrier's address and phone number are listed in your copy of the Medicare Handbook.

Friday is Deadline For Parcels Destined for Mid-East Mailing

Friday is the deadline set by postal authorities for packages to reach military personnel in the Middle East by Dec. 25. Still, the postal authorities will be making every effort to extend that for those who miss the deadline, said Al DeSarro, media relations representative for the U. S. Postal Service.

The deadline for holiday cards and letters is Nov. 26. Some recommended gifts are audiocassettes, board games, paperback books, footballs, horsehoes, other sports equipment, with newspapers for packing material.

Also recommended are gifts to help troops deal with the Saudi sun: sunscreen, lip balm, sunglasses, visors and hats.

Saudi customs ban alcohol, pornography, (including Playboy and similar magazines), sexual material, weapons or explosives, pork and pork by-products, Community literature, and non-Islamic religious items.

A single Bible or cards with Bible verses are acceptable, according to a spokesman with the Military Postal Service, but large numbers of Bibles, or other non-Islamic religious material intended for distribution would be questioned by Saudi customs agents.

Packages cannot weigh more than 70 pounds or exceed 108 inches in length or girth, Mr. DeSarro said. They must have customs forms attached. The forms are available at local post offices.

To speed deliveries, postal authorities suggest first-class postage.

It has been taking five to ten days for first-class mail to reach Saudi Arabia.

Correct addresses are essential, and should include complete names and APO or FPO numbers. APO numbers are for Army, Air Force and Marine troops on the ground in Saudi Arabia, and FPO numbers are for Navy and Marine troops on

ships. The APO and FPO numbers act like a ZIP code for military mail. Wrong APO and FPO numbers could route the mail to a different country or cause other delays, he said. The U.S. base where troops were stationed before being deployed in the Middle East will have the correct numbers. Packages also can be sent to the address of the soldier on the U.S. base for forwarding to the

Middle East. For Army, Air Force, and Marine personnel on the ground in Saudi Arabia, it is: Any Service Member Operation Desert Shield APO New York 09848-0006 and for Navy and Marine personnel on ships, it is: Any Service Member, Operation Desert Shield FPO New York 09866-0006.
