Look Out! The Caprock Is Rattlesnake Country

The Caprock makes a perfect place for the rattlesnake. In the winter time it can den up and hibernate under the rocks. Then in summer time it is out looking for small birds, rats and other small animals.

We lived in break county four miles west of Quitaque. In our backyard was an old cellar, the inside walls were lined with rocks. It was built in about 1900. The rattlesnakes could get through holes from the outside and den up behind the rocks, which was bad for we had to use the cellar during storms. Papa would light the lantern and take us all down in the cellar. He would tell us to stand out in the center so the snakes could not reach us. We would stand there until the storm was over. Our reach us. We would stand there until the storm was over. Our dog was bitten by a rattlesnake and lived over that but the next year he was bitten by another snake. That night about midnight I went outside and patted him and told him goodbye. The next morning he was dead. Cows would sometimes graze too close to a snake and get struck on the jaw. They would not die from the bite but would take them about a year to get over the bite bite

They say rattlesnake meat makes good sandwiches but I prefer the drum stick of a chicken.




