2003 Loan Premium \& Discount Table Released; Should Provide Boost For 2003 Following USDA's April 17 release of the 2003 Upland Cotton
Loan Premium and Discount tables, High Plains' cotton growers should find a lot to be happy about as they prepare for the 2003 growing season.
The 2003 P\&D table provides a second year of positive changes in the form of lower discounts and higher premiums.
Another boon for producers is the smaller discounts carries over to the Micronaire discount table, which has lower discounts throughout.
The discount table for Uniformity remained the same as 2002 while the table for Bark has lower discounts that were in place for
2002. Strength discounts, however, did increase slightly for readings $25.4 \mathrm{~g} /$ tex and lower. Premiums for Strength readings above $25.4 \mathrm{~g} / \mathrm{tex}$ remained unchanged.
The Premium and Discount tables provide the applicable pre-
mium and discount figures used to determine marketing loan values for cotton produced in the United States and supplied as collateral to the Commodity Credit Corporation. USDA indicated that the 2003 table was developed using an
evenly weighted mix of the 2002 crop evenly weighted mix of the 2002 crop Premium and
table and reported 2002 crop spot market quotations.
