

proving home and community life is eligible for membership, according to Mrs. Powell.

"A home demonstration Club is a group of homemakers who learn together," Mrs. Powell said. "Members help determine and developideas for programs."

Members take part in discussions, participate in club-sponsored community projects and eventeach lessons at meetings. The club meets monthly. Elected officers conduct a short business session.

The agent pointed out that it's not necessary to join a club to learn about homemaking: "You can participate in short courses, workshops, special meetings and tours sponsored by the Texas Agiricultural Extension Service," she said.

"There are no required dues for membership," Mrs. Powell explained. "Your major investment is your time to learn and share new information.
