Beat The Mustangs, Patriots

Valley Wins District With Victory Over Lazbuddie

Valley won the toss to receive the game opening kickoff at Bulldog Stadium in Plainview last Thursday night, and the Patriots were able to pick up one first down, then had to kick to the Longhorns, who set up in business about the 22 yard line.

From that point, the Longhorns marched 78 yards for a touchdown, then kicked the extra point. Then for the first time since the opening game of the season, the Patriots found themselves behind in a ballgame.

Valley took the ensuing kickoff and moved it to the 33 yard line, then on the first play from scrimmage, Ray Williams broke through the line and rambled 67 yards for a touchdown. Quarterback Rodney Carpenter then hit Dane Cheatham in the end zone for a two-point conversion, and Valley was ahead to stay. It took the Patriots only 17 seconds to get back in front.

The quick touchdown fired up the Valley Killer Bees and they stopped the Longhorns on their next possession, and the first quarter ended with the score 8-7.

In the second quarter, Rod Carpenter hit Dane Cheatham with a 27 yard pass for a first down at the Lazbuddie 21 yard line. From that point, Carpenter called Mike Dowd's number and he responded with a 21 yard touchdown run. Mike then got set to kick the PAT and the pass from center was dropped. Mike picked it up and ran it in for two points. This put the Patriots ahead 16-7 at half-time.

In the third quarter, the Patriots recovered a Lazbuddie fumble on the Valley 30 yard line. James McNary picked up 16 yards, then Juice Williams broke another one 54 yards for a touchdown. Dowd kicked the extra point to put the Patriots ahead 23-7.

During the third period the Patriots had been playing without committing very many errors, but then started collecting penalties again. Williams had a touchdown run of 69 yards called back because of a penalty, and during this series, Valley gained almost 100 yards but could not pick up a first down because of penalties. At the end of the third period, Valley was ahead 23-7.

In the fourth quarter, Carpenter hit Bruce Setliff for a 40 yard pass play to the Lazbuddie eight yard line. On the next play, Williams got four yards, then McNary carried it in for a touchdown. The try for extra point was missed, and Valley led 29-7.

On the next possession Lazbuddie could not move the ball. Valley took possession and they could not move and kicked it back to Lazbuddie. Lazbuddie took possession on their own 35 and picked up a first down at the Valley 46. At this point, the Patriots really started getting penalties, receiving two 15 yarders and a five yarder, giving the Longhorns a first down inside the ten yard line. Another off-side penalty gave the Longhorns another first at the four yard line and the Longhorns took it in from there. Then they ran in a two point conversion, making the score 29-15.

Valley returned the kick-off to

the 30 yard line. Williams broke another long run of about 60 yards which was called back because of a clip. Time ran out before the Patriots could make another touchdown. It was a very good night for the Patriots.

Valley had been picked by some so-called experts to finish about third in the district, but surprised them all by taking another district championship.

For the year, Valley has won eight games and lost one. They have scored 263 points and have given up only 38 points. They have shut out five opponents for one of the better records in all classes in the area.

Friday night at 7:30, the Patriots will meet Wheeler in a bi-district game at Memphis. Wheeler has scored 417 points in ten games and has given up 62 points. The Mustangs are rated No. 1 in the state.

In last Thursday night's game, the Longhorns concentrated on James McNary and contained him fairly well. In doing so, they sort of let the gate down for Juice Williams. Juice has had his big moments all season, but Thursday night was his finest. He ran for 231 yards on 14 carries, and scored twice. In addition, Juice had a 69 yard touchdown run called back. He also had other runs of 31, 25 and 40 yards called back, which would have given him almost 400 yards. It was an almost unbelievable night for the big Junior. It was a big night for all the Patriots, for they ALL played very well. This is certainly one of the most exciting football games to watch local fans can remember.

To Coaches Giddens, Adams, Slover and Phelps and all the Patriots, the Tribune offers sincere congratulations. We think you have done a great job and we are real proud of the Patriots. We will be rooting for you at Memphis Friday night.

The final bid of \$535 made Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Smith the proud owners of the "Heirloom Quilt" Saturday at the closing hours of the "We the Women" Fall Bazaar. In receiving the quilt, Mrs. Smith stated that it had special meaning to them because her husband had grown up around this community, their three children had been born here and Mrs. Dora Hawkins had taught both her husband and her son in the Quitaque School. She said that they are very proud to see what Quitaque is constantly doing to improve the community.

Mrs. Smith formerly worked at the Quitaque Clinic (which is now the Quitaque Community Center) and it makes her happy to see that the building still remains so important to Quitaque. She also remarked that "Grandma" Smith had lived with them for the last thirteen years of her life and pieced quilts and did the quilting until the time

of her death at the age of 98, so she knew and appreciated how many hours of time, effort and love went into the making of the "Heirloom Quilt."

The "Heirloom Quilt" was indeed a labor of love with many of the Quitaque women embroidering the 694 names appearing on the spokes of the wagon wheel design, hand quilting and finishing the lovely king size quilt. Johnnie Morrison was responsible for putting the quilt all together and was a constant encouragement to others with her untiring efforts throughout the project.

Clyde Smith is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Luther Smith and is the brother of the late Mrs. Bonnie Wagon. His brother, John, is still living in Quitaque and he is also a cousin to Earnestine Payne. Mr. and Mrs. Smith now live in Wichita Falls but have plans to move back to Quitaque in a few years when they retire.

FORMER TURKEY RESIDENT KILLED

A former Turkey resident and her daughter-in-law were killed in a head-on collision four miles south of Lamesa.

According to a report from the Midland office of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Bessie Rivers Gatlin, 68, and Karen Goodgion Gatlin, 34, both residents of Stanton, were killed at 9:15 a.m. Wednesday of last week when the car driven by the younger Mrs. Gatlin was struck in the northbound lane of Texas 137.

The report stated that a southbound car driven by Rudy Jimenez, 37, of Lamesa was attempting to pass a slow-moving vehicle and crossed over into the northbound lane. The Gatlin vehicle swerved to the right in an effort to avoid the Jimenez car, but the two vehicles collided head-on on the shoulder.

The Gatlin women were pronounced dead on arrival at Medical Arts Hospital in Lamesa. Jimenez was listed in fair condition at the same hospital.

No charges have been filed in connection with the accident.

Nuevo Study Club Celebrates Its Fiftieth Anniversary

The Nuevo Study Club met November 10 for a luncheon in the Fellowship Hall of the Church of Christ to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the organization of the club.

The members of the Nuevo Study Club wish to express their appreciation to the Church of Christ for allowing them to have their luncheon in their Fellowship Hall.

The Nuevo Study Club was organized in the home of Mrs. Jess Jenkins in August of 1929 and at that time the club was known as the 1929 Study Club. When organized, the membership of the 1929 Study Club consisted of Mmes. Adamson, Baber, Blume, Dot Christian, Iris Edgar, Nora Gilmore, Gaynelle Gilmore, Marion Hedrick, Sue Hedrick, Norma Mae Hedrick, I. C. Henson, Jess Jenkins, J. V. McCarley, Ollie Meacham, Louise Meacham, J. R. Miller, L. E. Nash, Leta Poss, Cecil Reavis, Letha Slawson, F. B. Todd, Willis Walker and J. W. McCarley.

The club changed its name from the 1929 Study Club to the Nuevo Study Club in 1947 and at that time it received its charter and became an affiliated organization. This organization has been very active through these many years with its projects for improving the community. One of its early projects in the 1930's was the Turkey Library, which was used so much by the youth of the community. At that time they had problems in getting enough books together in order to keep the youth supplied with reading material. This library is still open at the City Hall at the Bob Wills Community Center with Mrs. Denver Powell as librarian. The library is open two afternoons a week, on Tuesdays and Fridays.

Another of the club's worthwhile projects was the recent \$1,000 purchase of street signs which the club secured and had placed throughout the City of Turkey. The community is very proud of this project and everyone is urged to see that these signs are kept in place by reporting any knocked down signs to the City in order for them to be replaced. Among other projects has been the club's annual donation to Girlstown and the Vernon Volunteer Center, and recently a donation of \$100 has been made to the Firetruck Fund.

On the occasion of the club's fiftieth anniversary, the Peoples State Bank presented the club membership with Bank pens and pocket dairies. Curtis Tunnell, the local Justice of the Peace, presented the club with a golden carnation floral arrangement. The luncheon tables were covered with white linen cloths centered with gold candelabras which held gold tapers.

Mrs. Gordon Bain, vice president, was seated with the four charter members: Mmes. Mayme

Adamson, Mayme Blume, Louise Meacham and Lurline Walker. These four ladies each were presented with a gift from the club, a China Rose bowl.

The luncheon program was opened with Brent Parsley giving the invocation. Songs were presented by the Church of Christ Youth, with the entire club membership joining in the singing of "How Great Thou Art." A solo was presented by Mrs. Evelyn Hutton's granddaughter, Miss Laura Burch of Amarillo.

The luncheon menu consisted of ham, sweet potatoes, green beans, salad, hot rolls, German chocolate cake, coffee and iced tea.

Following the luncheon, Mrs. Mayme Adamson, the first president of the 1929 Study Club, opened the program by making comparison of the earlier programs to the programs that the club has today.

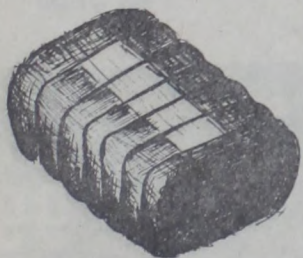

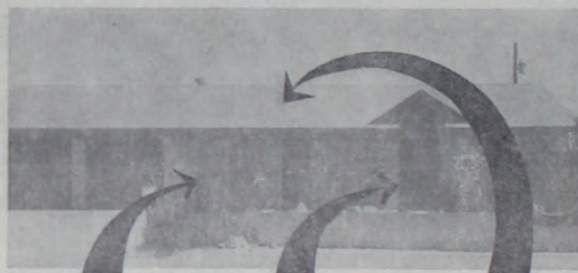

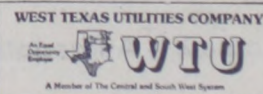
