### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT GRANT HAS BEEN MADE

The Aspermont Small Business Development Center, Inc. (ASBDC) has received notice from the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity of approval of a grant in the amount of \$32,890 for Economic Development.

The ASBDC operates in 33 counties in the field of economic development, business loans, counseling and preparing applications and feasibility studies. Services are as follows:

1. Screening and processing applications to the Small Business Administration for loans to initiate or expand businesses. It also arranges other sources of credit for promising small businesses, either through the programs of SEA, through other Federal Agencies, or through the private credit sources, including banks.
2. Arranges for management training and counseling for loan recipients and for potential applicants.
3. Helps to identify new or unfilled opportunities for establishment or expansion of small businesses in the community.
4. Familiarize the small towns and communities with state and federal programs designed for improved local development.
5. To help in locating, technical, financial, educational and other services available to the small community.

All applications are presented to local banks and the Small Business Administration Office in Lubbock for funding.

The grant is for a period of one year beginning 10-1-71 and ending 9-30-72. This will mark the beginning of the seventh year for the ASBDC. Loans totalling three million dollars have been made during this period of time.

The ASBDC is a non-profit corporation with 17 board members. J. Q. Jackson of Quanah serves as its president; George Frazier, Aspermont, is vice-president; Robert Hall, Jayton, is secretary-treasurer. The board member for Briscoe County is O. R. Stark, Quitaque, who is vice president of the First National Bank in Quitaque.

### YOUNG FARMER WEEK IS OFFICIALLY PROCLAIMED

September 18-25 has been officially designated as Young Farmer Week in Texas by proclamation of Governor Preston Smith.

The proclamation, signed recently, gives additional recognition to this rapidly growing farm group. The Young Farmer Association is sponsored under the auspices of vocational agriculture departments in high schools across Texas and the Texas Education Agency.

Over 250 Young Farmer chapters have been organized on a local school district or county wide basis to carry out educational activities which will help the members keep abreast of the technological advancements in the field of agriculture and to develop a greater skill and efficiency in management, production and marketing. Governor Smith points out in the proclamation that, in addition to educational activities, the Young Farmers incorporate in their planned chapter programs civic and community service projects and leadership activities designed to improve their communities, state, and nation, and to promote the welfare of all citizens. He further points out that through these efforts they are helping to strengthen the economy of our country and are promoting good citizenship.

In closing the proclamation, the Governor predicted that as the organization continues to grow, it will play an increasingly important role in the life of rural America.

### State Capital News

Governor Preston Smith sprang one surprise after another in announcing appointments to key state positions.

One of the biggest was selection of his longtime aide and top political campaign worker Robert D. (Bob) Bullock, formerly of Hillsboro, as Secretary of State, succeeding Martin Dies, jr.

A few days earlier, he selected another staff assistant, V. Larry Teaver of Lubbock, to the State Board of Insurance. Surprise here was that Teaver did not replace Durwood Manford, veteran member of the board.

Manford got a new six-year term and Charles D. Mathews, a Dallas trucking executive and attorney until two years ago, was moved from the board to an Austin district judgeship.

Teaver replaced Mathews when the freshman board member became judge of the new 200th Travis County district court.

Smith stirred some controversy by naming a successor to Brig. Gen. James M. Rose as assistant adjutant general of Texas for air. On recommendation of Maj. Gen. Ross Ayers, the state adjutant general, he picked Lt. Col. Belisario D. J. Flores of San Antonio for the Air National Guard command.

Smith's other appointments included:

- \*T. E. (Gene) Mitchell of Plainview as chairman of the Governor's Committee on Human Relations. Dies previously doubled in that job before his appointment to the Ninth Court of Civil Appeals at Beaumont.
- \*Robert W. Kneebone of Houston for a new six-year term as a member of the Texas Youth Council.
