TB Clinic Scheduled For Quitaque Wed.

A TB Clinic will be held at the Quitaque Schools next Wednesday, September 4, beginning at 10 a. m. and it will be held in the middle building.

Purpose of the clinic is to test students and adults for TB. There will be no charge for the tests and Supt. Moseley urges everyone in the community to take the tests.

There will be one registered TB nurse present, along with three other registered nurses to assist with the testing. A permanent record of each child will be kept.

Approximately 1000 tests per hour can be given, Mr. Moseley said, so it will not take a lot of time to test the entire population.

Former Turkey Boy Qualified As Specialist In Introductory Science

Two young junior high teachers from Hereford have completed summer training to qualify as specialists in the introductory science — the only ones north of Midland or west of Dallas.

Roger Huber, 24, and Johnny Fuston, 24, teachers at La Plata and Stanton Junior High respectively, attended the Introductory Physical Science Leadership Conference June 17 — July 2 at the Colorado School of Mines, Golden, Colo.

The IPS program has been termed a tool for carrying out the inductive, or logical reasoning, method of teaching. As such, it corresponds very closely with the aerospace course planned for high school this year.

The three-week conference was supported by the National Science Foundation and organized by Education Development Center from 8 a. m. — 4 p. m.

Classes were held six days a week with nine from Texas attending the Colorado workshop. Eighty from 38 states journeyed to the 3-week workshop, including college professors as well as junior and high school teachers.

The next gathering for part of the group will be regional meetings November and February in Dallas. Teachers from Florida, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas will be present.

Huber and Fuston will conduct their own workshop before school begins to teach area teachers techniques they learned this summer. Their four-day workshop starts Aug. 26. Ten Saturday workshops follow, four in September and seven spaced from November to March. Teachers from the northern part of Texas are expected to attend.

Education Development Center in Massachusetts plans to issue certificates to teachers attending local workshops and teaching the course concurrently. The workshop is equivalent to six semester hours of college credit.

A letter to Robert Holman, assistant superintendent, from the director of the IPS program outlined plans for the local workshop. Financial assistance up to \$450 will be provided by Education Development Center to local

Grazing Associations Help Farmers Develop Income

Farmers and cattlemen are acquiring needed land resources by forming grazing associations and obtaining financial assistance from the Farmers Home Administration, the agency's Swisher & Briscoe County Supervisor, Donald Cruce, said this week.

A grazing association is composed of a group of family farmers and ranchers who join together to acquire and develop land to provide grazing for livestock belonging to its members. The non-profit association is owned, operated, and managed by its members.

"Small farmers," Cruce said, can increase their incomes, make better use of land and water resources, and develop larger equity in land through use of a grazing association. This program of ten provides small farmers with their only opportunity to remain in farming on a profitable basis."

Other advantages of an association include providing opportunities to improve livestock quality, gain bargaining power in the market place, build more stable operations and strengthen the rural community.

"Results benefit the entire community," Cruce said, because associations accomplish better use of land and water resources and provide expanded tax bases and the grazing association now on more local buying power."

Jerry Wayne Martin, 15, son of Mrs. Patsy Rucker and the late Wayne Martin, was killed about 11 o'clock Saturday night in a motor scooter-automobile collision in the east part of Quitaque on State Highway 86.

According to Highway Patrol reports, Jerry, who was traveling east on his motor scooter, made a U-turn into the path of an automobile driven by Roger Brunson. Jerry was rushed to Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulla where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Funeral services for Jerry were held Tuesday, August 27 at 4:00 p. m. in the First Methodist Church at Quitaque. The Rev. Al Jennings of Vega, former pastor of the Quitaque, and the Rev. Jim Williams, pastor, officiated at the memorial service. Burial was in Rest Haven Cemetery with Quitaque Funeral Home in charge.

Flomot Church Begin 76th Year

This is to certify that the Rev. W. A. Rodgers, on the 3rd Sunday in August 1893, after receiving application from five members and five members by profession of faith in Christ, organized a church at Quitaque after which Eros, W. M. The name of the above organization was unanimously adopted as Quitaque.

I further certify that on October 2, 1893, there being no ordained Cumberland Presbyterian minister present, Bro. Bauchman, Methodist minister, received Bro. E. S. Martin and Sister E. S. Martin on relation of their experiences and Bro. H. M. Martin by Baptism. Bro. Bauchman, Moderator.

This is to certify that at a regular meeting of the church on the 15th day of December 1895 that Bro. J. S. Daugherty and Sister Mertie Daugherty were received into the Cumberland Presbyterian Church on relation of their experiences.

Wilburn Martin, of Flomot, a grandson of W. A. and Mollie M. Martin, two of the original members.

According to stories handed down in the Martin family the church was organized under the branches of a huge Cottonwood tree along the banks of the Quitaque River, north of present day Flomot. At the time the entire area was called Quitaque for there was not a post office nearby.

It was many years later that the present town of Quitaque was organized. All the members lived south of the Quitaque River and in Motley County.

The church met outside in pretty weather, but used homes or the schoolhouse in bad or inclement weather. In about 1903 the church voted to join the Northwest Texas Conference of the Methodist church. The first building was located inside the Flomot Cemetery and services for all faiths were held there.

The church moved to its present site in the south part of Flomot in 1914. The present church sanctuary was built in 1937 and remodeled to its present appearance in 1960.

The Church reached its greatest membership during the late 1930's and early 1940's when some 150 members were in the roll. Today the church has 40 members, some of which are children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren of the original founders. For many years the Church shared a pastor with the Whiteflat Methodist Church. Since 1965 the Flomot Church has shared the Quitaque Methodist Church pastor, the Rev. Jim Williams, a former Whiteflat - Flomot pastor is the present pastor.

HIGHWAY PATROL REPORT

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of July according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

The crashes resulted in one person killed, one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$4,925.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this country during the first six months of 1968 shows a total of 18 accidents resulting in one person killed, seven persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$13,650.00.

"School bells" are ringing again. The familiar yellow school buses will soon be back on the highways. The Sergeant reminds all drivers of the state law regulating traffic in regard to school buses. "The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

The Sergeant also stated that a training school for 120 new patrolmen with the Texas Department of Public Safety will start August 27 and a later training school during the month of October.

To qualify for employment in the uniformed services of the DPS, a man must be between the ages of 20 and 35, not less than 5 feet 8 inches tall, have a high school education or its equivalent, be in sound physical condition and be a citizen of the United States.

All interested young men who can meet these qualifications are urged to contact the nearest DPS patrolman or DPS office for complete details concerning the position of a patrolman, training and benefits.

Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains
Research Foundation

In preparation for the Semi-annual meeting of the Board of Trustees and the 12th Annual Field Day of the High Plains Research Foundation on September 12, the Wheat and Small Grains Commodity Committee recently had its initial meeting at Halfway.

The committee will be hosts at an exhibit during the open house and Field Day showing samples of various types of wheat and small grains, along with information about the crops. Also, the products of these grains will be on display.

A discussion of the 1968 research program was held and recommendations were prepared for the 1969 farm program. These included (1) wheat and barley variety performance studies, (2) a combination fertilizer - irrigation test, with the addition of a simulated grazing study which was instigated by the doubtful economics of wheat for grain alone; (3) wheat stubble burning followed by soy beans and grain sorghum, tilling the stubble followed by both crops, and leaving the stubble with no follow crops for comparative effects on soil composition and structure; (4) a study on young cotton using dead wheat stubble as a protective measure, with the wheat stubble and weeds being controlled by herbicides; and (5) fall planting of some new varieties of barley.

The Internal Revenue Agent is a well-trained, professional employee. A part of his training is to be fair. He has the same responsibility for seeing that you get extra deductions that you missed as he does for seeing that the government gets all the tax due from you. A large part of the tax audits result in the taxpayer verifying his questioned items and receiving no change in his tax liability. About 7 per cent of those audited receive a refund, due to the Internal Revenue Agent finding additional tax credits or deductions.

So — gather your records, review your return with the Agent in a business-like manner. If you don't agree with his findings, exercise your appeal rights.

Any home and its surroundings harbor some form of insect life. Some insects feed on fabrics, contaminate food and attack dwellings, while others annoy humans by "biting." Insects carry diseases and cause possible secondary infections and are general nuisances.

A new leaflet published by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service entitled "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects (L - 311)" gives recommendations for controlling every kind of insect from moth to mosquito and

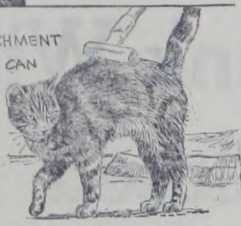

Gifts From The Seas

Searching Oceans Grows To Rival Space Effort

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Alcoa has taken three major steps to broaden its diversification into oceanography — the growing new field of scientific endeavor, the magnitude of which promises to rival the space effort within a decade.

The moves involve: **FORMATION** of a new company, Ocean Search, Inc., to engage worldwide in a variety of exploratory projects related to ocean environment and its enormous potential for mankind's welfare. Ocean Search is a joint venture of Aluminum Company of America and Ocean Science and Engineering, Inc. of Washington, D. C., a pioneering global leader in oceanography in which Alcoa has had an equity interest for more than a year.

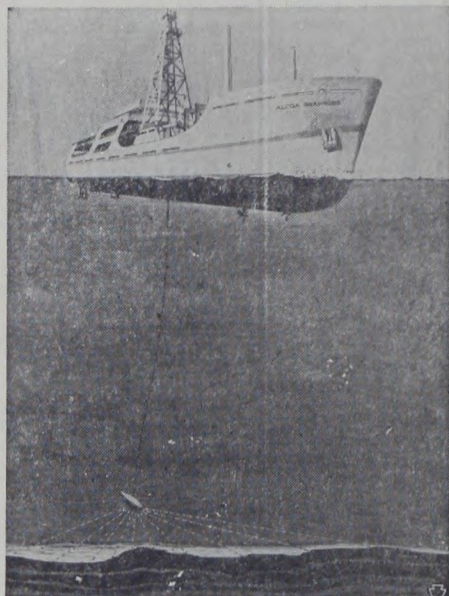
DESIGN and construction of the all-aluminum ALCOA SEAPROBE, largest and most advanced deep ocean search and recovery surface vessel ever planned, with capabilities of recovering 200-ton payloads from 6000-foot depths.

A PROGRAM of intensified research and development in the area of new aluminum marine alloys and products for a host of existing and potential on-surface and undersea applications.

Spearheading Alcoa's expanded involvement with oceanography will be the ALCOA SEAPROBE... its name symbolizing the ship's unique purpose and capabilities. Construction by a shipyard yet to be named is scheduled to begin in October, and the vessel is to be fitted out and ready for sea trials by May, 1970.

Hull and superstructure of the 244-foot vessel will be of Alcoa-developed aluminum marine alloys, making it the largest all-aluminum vessel yet to be launched. With its 50-foot beam, nine-foot draft, and 2000-ton displacement, it will constitute a trail-blazing "State of the Art" use of aluminum, much as the 30-story Alcoa Building in Pittsburgh achieved the technological breakthroughs which, since 1952, have inspired the construction of hundreds of aluminum-clad skyscrapers.

Utilizing patented OSE techniques and equipment, ALCOA

SEAPROBE will possess the ability to hold its position in rough seas; search, core, drill, and sample mineral deposits on the sea floor; locate and retrieve heavy objects more than a mile beneath the surface; and to perform other research and exploratory oceanographic functions. No existing or proposed ship has anything approaching these capabilities.

To accomplish its multiple tasks, the vessel will constitute a floating complex of sophisticated electrical and electronic gear manned by 40 scientists, technicians and crewmen.

Powered by diesel electric generators giving it a 10,000-mile 45-day cruising range, the ALCOA SEAPROBE will be equipped with radio telephones, radar, sonar of several

frequencies, undersea cameras and television, and a variety of special-purpose retrieving equipment.

While the ALCOA SEAPROBE's precise missions are yet to be determined, they are expected to involve priority undersea geological explorations in behalf of Alcoa's unceasing quest for new mineral resources. Ocean Search, Inc. also plans to operate the ship under charter on a variety of projects. These could include undersea drilling for oil, gas, and mineral deposits; the salvage of valuable weapons and objects lost beneath the sea on U.S. Navy and Atomic Energy Commission test ranges; and deep marine archaeology to recover historically valuable and other treasures.

- 2 cups cooked cut green beans
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- ¾ cup small bread cubes
- 2 tablespoons minced onion

Stir soup until smooth; add water, ½ teaspoon salt, and pepper. In shallow baking dish (8x8"), alternate layers of potatoes, beans, and soup mixture. Combine beef, egg, bread, onion, and 1 teaspoon salt; form into 4 patties ½-inch thick. Place on top of casserole. Bake at 350° F. for 20 minutes. Turn patties; bake 20 minutes more or until done. Makes 4 servings.
