



a renaissance in the graceful and ancient art of kite-flying, in these noise-pollution times it seems entirely desirable that the peaceful, quiet pastime of kite-flying should be gaining widespread popularity. The kite, however, wasn't always on innocent. For the first half of its 2,500 year history it was chiefly used as an instrument of war with occasional side careers in crime, magic and medical quackery.

The first reported use of a kite was around 200 B.C. when Chinese General Han Hsin flew one over the walls of a fort he was attacking to calculate the length of a tunnel he planned to dig under them. Gistory is unclear as to the success of this maneuver but if Han's first attempt at kite-lying was typical, he may have so amused and distracted the defenders as he roared up and down the battlefield trying to get his kite airborne his samy was able to clamber over the walls undetected.

Unfortunately for Ishikawa (who may have coined the plaintiff phrase "That's the way the wind blows") he succeeded only in grabbing a dolphin's fin and was subsequently hauled down and boiled in oil.

A Rev. J. Doolittle of London reported on the medical benefits of kites, especially for children. "It (kite flyling) makes them throw their heads back and open their mouth, thus getting rid of internal heat," he observed.
