Funeral services for Paul Lynn Christian, 44, of 4907 Seventh Street in Lubbock, were held at 10 a.m. Monday, July 12, in the Turkey Church of Christ, with Herbert Gipson, Church of Christ minister, officiating. Burial was in the Turkey Cemetery, under the direction of Sanders Funeral Home of Lubbock.

Christian was killed Friday night, when the light airplane he was flying crashed into a tree shortly after takeoff from Stapleton International Airport in Aurora, Colorado.

Authorities there theorize that high winds whipped the light aircraft into the tree.

Survivors include his wife, Anita; two daughters, Mrs. Melissa Payton and Mrs. Lynette Stewart, both of Lubbock; his mother, Mrs. E. L. ## Contracts Being Let For Floodwater Control Structures

Contracts for the construction of five floodwater retarding structures in the Lakeview Watershed are to be let, according to Henry D. Gregory, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Memphis.

The five dams are to be let in two separate contracts with a completion time of five hundred working days. Lyles & Lyles Construction Company of Ballinger, Texas was the apparent low bidder according to John Jackson, Construction Engineer from Stephenville, Texas, who attended the bid openings at the First National Bank Building in Temple, Texas, July 12, 1976. Lyles & Lyles bid \$672,645.99 for the construction of site number 7 located on the Hagey ranch northeast of Lesley and site number 14 located on the Gilbert Young ranch north of Lakeview.

Lyles & Lyles was also the low bidder on site numbers 107, 6, and 8 with a bid of 713,968.40 dollars. Site number 107 is located on the L. D. Gardenhire farm two miles west of Lakeview. Site number 6 is located on the W. R. Scott farm two miles north of Lesley and site number 8 is located on the J. B. Byars farm two miles west and four miles north of Lakeview.

The contracts will be awarded on these five dams in the next week or so. Work should commence in approximately 20 days after the award is made.
