Valley Edges Nazareth 7-0; Season Ends Friday Night

The Valley Patriots, on the strength of a 70-yard touchdown run by soph Darrell Dowd in the first period, edged the Nazareth Swifts here 7-0 last Friday night on a cold, wet field to close out the home season. Valley plays the last game of the season at Lazbuddie Friday night. Last Friday night's win assured the Patriots of at least a break-even season and if they win at Lazbuddie and the Patriots should win, then Valley will chalk up its third consecutive winning season with a 6-4 record. A win Friday night would give the Patriots a 4-2 district slate and third place.

Valley rushed for 261 yards and moved the ball pretty well but couldn't get it into paydirt. Valley did score a TD in the third quarter but it was called back due to a penalty. However, the Patriots shut the gate on the Swifts and the seven points was enough to insure the win.

Friday night's game at Lazbuddie will wind up the football playing careers of five Patriots. They are Barry Wheeler, Ron Eudy, Rex Fuston, Jeff Tiffin and Doyle Proctor.

The candidates in political races running under the Democratic Party affiliation won handily in Hall and Briscoe Counties, according to reports received here.

The biggest race, of course, this year was that for President of the United States. The Carter-Mondale team were the winners in both local elections. In Briscoe County voters cast 823 ballots for Carter-Mondale to 285 for Ford-Dole. In Hall County, 1623 voters went for Carter-Mondale while 671 voted for Ford-Dole.

In the Congressman Jack Hightower-Bob Price race, in which Bob Price was attempting to win back his old spot, Congressman Hightower won by an ever wide margin than he did two years ago. In Briscoe County the voters went for Hightower 895 to 208. In Hall County, Hightower's birthplace the vote was 1773 for Hightower to 520 for Price.

In the race for U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen won by a wide margin in both Briscoe and Hall Counties.

There was only one local race for the voters to select a winner and that one was for Commissioner, Hall County Precinct 4, which is the Turkey Precinct where a write-in campaign was staged. The incumbent, Harold Lane, resigned several weeks ago to accept a full-time job with the Valley School System, leaving his spot vacant.

Three men, Charles Hamner, Leroy Stone and James Fuston, entered the race for that spot, and James Fuston won the race to fill the unexpired term.

Fuston received 219 votes, Stone tallied 137 votes and Hamner received 79 votes.

B. Martin will serve as Recorder of Crosses; Misses Maudie Coffee and Inez Mason will register guests and Miss Sharon Steelman will award prizes to the veterans. The secretary, Mrs. C. V. Johnson, and treasurer of the chapter, Miss Maynette Stiner, extend an invitation to all veterans to attend the program and to the general public. A special invitation is extended to American Legionnaires and Auxiliary members.

VETERANS REQUIRED TO REPORT ANNUAL INCOME

Some veterans, as well as widows and parents of deceased veterans, are required to report their income to the Veterans Administration each year in order to remain eligible to receive benefit payments. According to Billy Kesler, Service Officer for Briscoe and Swisher counties, persons who are required to report their income will receive a questionnaire

with their regular benefit check on November 1, 1976. The income report must be completed and returned to the VA by January 1, 1977, or payments will be terminated.

The annual income report will be sent to veterans and widows who are receiving nonservice-connected disability and death pension. Also required to report annual income are the dependant parents of veterans whose deaths were caused by service-connected disabilities. A veteran or widow with no dependants, or a single parent, is entitled to VA benefits if annual income does not exceed \$3,300. The income limit for a veteran or a widow with dependants is \$4,500. When there are two eligible parents, or a remarried parent living with his or her spouse, the annual limit is also \$4,500.

When completing the questionnaire, all income should be reported. Present laws authorize the VA to allow 10% deduction on the income received from retirement benefits, including Social Security. Thus, only 90% of such income is counted by the VA. Each claimant is allowed to also report any family medical expenses which were incurred during the year. Any such expenses which are in excess of 5% of the reported income of the claimant may be used by the VA to reduce the countable income, thereby establishing entitlement to a larger monthly payment.

Veterans, widows and parents should seek competent assistance to complete the income reports. Such help may be obtained by contacting your local Veterans Service Officer. If incorrect information is reported, the VA may be

required to suspend or terminate benefit payments.

PILOT PROGRAM TO TEST GASOLINE QUALITY

Comptroller Bob Bullock announced recently that his office is initiating a pilot project to test the quality of gasoline sold at service stations in Texas.

Bullock said the Comptroller's Office has received a number of consumer complaints in recent months indicating that some service stations are selling inferior gasoline.

"We've had calls from people whose engines totally burned out

a few miles down the road after filling their tanks," he said.

The Comptroller said that Articles 8601-8611, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, set out specific gasoline standards and empower his office to test to see that the standards are met.

Selling inferior gasoline to the public without clearly indicating its substandard quality is a misdemeanor, he added.

Bullock urged motorists who can document that their engines have been damaged by inferior gasoline to call his Motor Fuels Tax Division toll-free from anywhere in Texas at 1-800-252-5555.

The pilot project will be closely coordinated with efforts by Senator Lloyd Doggett of Austin to strengthen the State's power to test and enforce reasonable gasoline standards, he said.

"Statutes already on the books obviously contemplate that the quality of gasoline sold to Texas motorists be monitored," said Bullock. "Yet this has never been done. While our funds are limited at this time, we feel we can support this pilot project. Should it prove beneficial to the motoring public, we will seek additional funding from the Legislature."

CROP AND LIVESTOCK REPORTS NEEDED FROM FARMERS AND RANCHERS

Some 75,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire during the period from mid-November to early January.

This roundup survey of crop production and livestock numbers is made annually by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, work together to provide comprehensive information on Texas agriculture.

Producers from each of the 254 counties in Texas are selected proportional to size of operation. The small producer sampled represents many others of comparable size while the very largest producers will represent only themselves. It is equally important for all farmers and ranchers receiving a questionnaire to complete and return it promptly. The individual report is confidential—available to no other government agency or anyone except the few persons required to process the
