Greenbugs over much of the South Plains seem to be increasing. As of this date some fields have required treatment in the county. Producers are urged to in-spect their fields closely every few days in order to keep abreast of the greenbug infestation in their fields. The infestations could change from time to time due to greenbug numbers and damage. an increase in greenbug numbers or an increase in beneficial in-

Greenbugs Are On

Greenbugs can be found in modrate populations in older grain sorghum. The greenbugs need to oe closely observed as the plants continue to develop. Corn leaf aphids are present in most areas and spray applications have been applied in limited areas. However, corn leaf aphid damage is generally not severe and past research has shown that little gain in yield can be obtained except under extremely heavy popu-lations. Beneficial insects appear

Plants from emergence to inches high should be treated if damage is visible and greenbug colonies are present on the lower leaf surface. Research data from 1968 indicate that larger plants up to the preboot stage will tole

ontrolled before entire leaves are killed. Yield production during the pre boot, boot, blooming and grain development stage depend on greenbug numbers, length of time one years experience and research heavy populated areas can cause extreme damage to pre-boot and older plants. Indications are to control greenbugs when they cause death to more than two lower, nor-


