Quitague To Begin Mosquito Spraying

The Quitaque City Council voted For Awhile ... Maybe Monday night to enter into a contract with Mosquito Control of the Southwest of Plainview for aerial spraying of Quitaque for the control of mosquitos during the summer months. Harboring and breeding areas of mosquitos adjacent to the city will also be sprayed each time the town is prayed.

"The only way we can get an op-inion from those concerned is to with this program the town can be sprayed at regular intervals, and residents should be able to enjoy outdoor activities during evening hours without bombarand modify it (the permit) acc-ordingly," McCleskey said. He also suggested that, since

last year's permit has expired on October 31, 1976, a new permit should be granted to that same nent from mosquitos. This will be a relatively expensive control program, but Coun-cil Members feel it is needed for should be granted to that same date this year, thus allowing am-ple time for election and re-appli-cation for another permit. Byth attorneys agreed on the election proposal as set forth in the bill pending with Goveptor Bricoe, and McCleskey commend-ed hem of their "desire to arrive at favorable decision" Quitaque. It will cost the city approximately \$350.00 each time the town and adjacent property is sprayed, and several sprayings will probably be necessary dur-

ing the summer months. In order the fund the program the Council proposes to add \$1.00 per month to each resident's wat-er bill. It is believed that the \$1.00 per month will adequately fund the program, and that it will be fair to everyone by funding the program in this man-ner mosquito control can be administered when it is needed, and more extensive coverage can be made throughout the summer. Comments on this proposal for mosquito control will be welcomed

by the Mayor, City Manager and Council Members, for contact with company representatives will be made in the next few days. It is anticipated that the first spra-ying could be made by the middle of next week. The spray is not harmful to humans, pets or plants. Application for a permit to sp-ray the city has already been made through the Federal Avia-

tion Agency, and approval is expected by this weekend.


