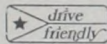

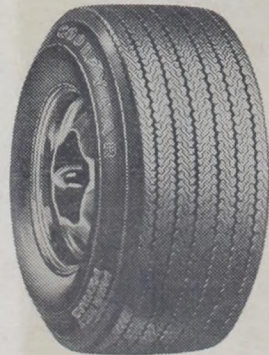

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION TO THE DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF QUITAQUE, TEXAS AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PERSONS:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in and throughout the City of Quitaque, Texas on the 17th day of June, 1972 on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said City, in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the

City Council of said City, as follows, to-wit:
NO. 39
 AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF QUITAQUE, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT;

PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Article 1006c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore,
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF QUITAQUE:

Section 1: That a special election shall be held in and throughout the city of Quitaque, Texas on the 17th day of June, 1972, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

CITY HALL, Leon McCracken Presiding Judge
 Jodie Johnston Alternate Presiding Judge

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two (2) clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Quitaque, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1006c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
 INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That the election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as am-

ended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. News From The Extension Service

Of interest to Briscoe County Wheat Producers will be the "Wheat Field Day" to be held at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland on the afternoon of May 25. Tours of the 1600-acre facility will begin at 1:30 p.m. and run until about 4:30 p.m. The tours will include discussions on wheat improvement plots, Triticale and male-sterile wheat-rye crosses, small grains for forage, new varieties of wheat, wheat irrigation studies, limited tillage, Tansy Mustard control and rainfall conserving cultural practices.

Wheat production is of major interest in the High Plains area for its grazing and grain value. Improvements in production practices and yield potential will greatly influence the economy of the area.

Something new has been added to the 1972 West Texas Fair to be held in Lubbock this September which will interest 4-H and FFA members in this area. A barrow

and carcass show has been added with some good prize money having been put up for the winners.

Each exhibitor is limited to three barrows in the show. They may be in the same or different classes. The barrows must weigh between 200 and 240 pounds by show time. Exhibitors must own the barrows by July 1. The top three barrows in each class will be slaughtered for the carcass contest. The other barrows may be sent to market or brought home. Classes will be divided into light (200 - 220) and heavy (220 - 240) weights in four categories—Hampshire, Duroc, Crosses and all other pure breeds. Prize money ranges from \$50 for first place to \$5 for tenth place in a class plus \$50 and \$25 for champion and reserve of each of the four categories. The grand champion carcass will receive \$500 and the reserve champion \$250. This will bring the exhibitor of the grand champion animal somewhere in the neighborhood of \$650.00 in prize money.

I have additional information on the barrow show for anyone who is interested. A maximum of 400 barrows will be allowed to enter the show, so if anyone wants to enter we need to do so as early as possible.

During the last half of May, some 22,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from the Agricultural Statistician of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the State and for the County. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry—agriculture. Everyone receiving these questionnaires is urged to fill them out and return them.

Screwworm outbreaks are popping out all over Texas again this spring and everyone should be on the lookout for this problem. The largest number of cases in years has been reported in South and

Central Texas.

Producers are urged to send suspicious cases to the Mission Screwworm Laboratory for identification. In selecting samples from suspicious cases remember that they look like maggots to the naked eye, but screwworms eat live flesh and maggots eat dead flesh, so samples should be taken from the deepest part of a wound. I have some sample bottles with mailing cartons for anyone who wants to send off a sample.

A possible improvement in the successful High Plains boll weevil control program will be tested in four area counties this year. Strips of early-maturing cotton varieties will be planted in a few fields in each county next to prime overwintering sites such as shinnery and mesquite to literally lure the emerging weevils into traps. Pheromone traps, as well as the strips of early cotton, will attract the overwintering weevils into limited areas. The testing will be done in Briscoe, Dickens, Hale and Motley counties.

In addition, when the early cotton is planted, Temik will be incorporated into the furrow, to destroy the weevils as they are drawn to the cotton and pheromone traps.

The program will be carried out by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station of Texas A&M University and the Plant Protection Division of the USDA. Scientists from these two organizations will be studying the technique as to its usefulness on a large scale.

The program will measure the effectiveness of each of the control factors. Some fields will receive only the Temik treatment or the sex pheromone traps, while others will be planted only with the early-maturing variety.

Producers having just the early-maturing cotton planted on their farms may be concerned that large numbers of weevils will be attracted to their fields; but, the fields will be monitored closely and any damaging boll weevil levels will be promptly controlled. The scientists believe this approach of attracting weevils can be an important boost to the current suppression program, which presently consists of spraying each fall to control diapausing weevils.

Producers are encouraged to cooperate fully because we must have complete cooperation for the suppression program to continue its success.

The testing of the method is the result of research conducted by Dr. Dale Bottrell of the Agricultural Experiment Station in 1971.

Plans have been announced for the 1972 Texas Five Acre Soybean Yield Recognition Program. The program is sponsored by the Texas Soybean Association, Elanco Products Company and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Awards for the contest include: a trip to Denmark, Russia and France for the State winner and his wife, \$100 cash and a plaque for the second highest yield and \$75 cash and a plaque for the third highest yield plus area awards of \$5 - \$50 for the top five in the three areas of the High Plains, Northwest Texas and Coast Prairie. John Francis of Silvertown was the second place winner in the High Plains area in 1971 with a yield of 47 bushels per acre.

Each entrant must grow at least 10 acres of soybeans and the area chosen to be harvested for the contest must be at least five acres in size. Only one entry per producer is allowed. Entries must be sent to the State Office in early August. The plot to be entered must

CHILD SAFETY AT HOME

Ninety-five per cent of accidental poisonings occur while children are supposedly under adult supervision. More than half a million different kinds of medicines, cleaning aids and other household substances tempt children's curiosities and often cause poisoning.

The key to halting these poisonings is a continuing plan of prevention in the home. First, don't store bleach, detergent, drain cleaner or other hazardous substances under the kitchen sink or any other place accessible to small children. Don't keep bug killers, medicines or other dangerous items next to food. Paint, insecticide, turpentine, alcohol or other such substances may be mistaken for something to drink when poured into bottles or similar type containers. A child's sense of smell and taste aren't as developed as an adult's. He can't read or recognize the signs of poison and just one taste can kill him.

Remember, it's up to you to keep your child safe from poisons.

Cheddar cheese will stay in good condition for several weeks if you refrigerate it and keep it in the original wrapper until you are ready to use it, says the Agricultural Marketing Service. After opening the package, wrap the cut cheese in foil, waxed paper or plastic to prevent drying.

Potatoes are almost as delicate as apples, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. They can get bruised all the way from the digging machine in the field to your home storage bin. So handle the potatoes you buy with care.

In buying fresh greens, look for leaves that are fresh, young, tender, free from blemishes and which have a good healthy green color, says the Agricultural Marketing Service. Avoid leaves with coarse, fibrous stems, yellowish-green color, softness or a wilted condition.
