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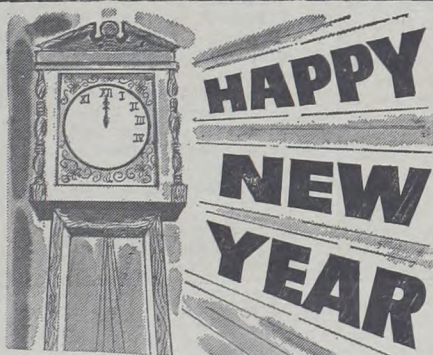

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Truck Mishap Kills Panhandle Farmer

A 69-year-old Carson County farmer was killed about 9 p.m. Saturday when the pickup truck he was cranking started and pinned him against a garage.

John J. Slater was pronounced dead at his residence a dozen miles southwest of Panhandle by C. H. Bell, Carson County justice of the peace.

Investigating officers said the old model pickup truck Slater was cranking by hand started and pinned him against his garage.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church in Panhandle with the Rev. Don L. Holmes, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Panhandle Cemetery by Smith Funeral Home.

Mr. Slater was a native of Ohio and moved with his family to Panhandle in 1907. He married Bernice Griffin September 8, 1945 in Amarillo.

He was a farmer, land owner and worked part-time for Carson County's Precinct 2. A member of the First Baptist Church, he also was an active Mason and a member of Carson Lodge 1161.

Survivors include his wife; one

daughter, Mrs. Trulla Sutton of Gallup, New Mexico; one stepson, Ralph Hunn of Concorde, California; two sisters, Mrs. B. K. Bentley of Panhandle and Mrs. Mary Mann of Clarendon, who taught first grade in Quitaque several years ago; 11 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Two Accidents Investigated Here

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of November, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eleven months of 1971 shows a total of 34 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 22 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety for November 1971, shows a total of 576 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 292 persons injured. This was 19 less accidents, one more fatality and two less injured than during October.

The 20 traffic deaths for the month of November 1971 occurred in the following counties: Hockley, four; Lubbock, Palo Pinto, Hansford and Oldham, two each; Bailey, Carson, Childress, Lipscomb, Moore, Terry, Wheeler and Wilbarger, one each.

News From The Extension Service

The 1972 issue of the Farmer's Tax Guide. Internal Revenue Service Publication 225, is now available at the County Extension Office.

The new tax guide includes information on income and self-employment tax, required tax reporting dates, and an illustrated sample income tax return. Included are 17 major chapters ranging from record keeping requirements to fuel tax credit.

Sections of major importance to farmers and ranchers include farm business expenses, depreciation, capital gains, casualty and theft losses, involuntary conversions, and soil and water conservation expenses.

The new tax guide was printed by the I.R.S. before the 1971 tax changes were known and these changes will be available at a later date.

It's time again to treat horses for botflies.

Two new chemicals, dichlorvos and trichlorfon, are available alone or in combination with other worming chemicals to broaden their spectrums of internal parasite control. They are both available as powders or granules that can be added to the horse's favorite food.

Many horse wormers or equine anthelmintics are on the market, but only those containing dichlorvos or trichlorfon will effectively get rid of bots.

Most horses will take the feed additive with no problems. However, withholding feed for 12 to 18 hours before giving the medicine with feed is suggested. If palatability is a problem, a package of strawberry Jello, some honey or molasses will often help.

Bots are the larvae or maggots of three flies that lay their eggs

American Farmers Getting Promises

U. S. Representative Graham Purcell (D-Tex.) told the annual state convention of the Texas Farmers Union recently that "American farmers are being promised one thing and given another" by the Republican farm policy officials.

Purcell, chairman of the subcommittee on livestock and grains of the House Agriculture Committee, told a crowded auditorium that the Department of Agriculture has allowed some 60 million "new acres" to be brought into production "just by shifting from the annual base acreage and diversion programs of the Johnson Administration to the set-aside programs of the Nixon Administration."

The veteran farm-belt Congressman promised hope for farmers through Congressional action and discussed two bills of crucial importance to farmers which could receive House action this week. He characterized them as bills "designed to salvage some of the income lost by American farmers as a result of parity now being at a forty-year low." Purcell explained the legislation which would establish a strategic grain reserve and which would require a mandatory increase of 25% in the loan rate presently available for producers of feed grains and wheat.

Referring to the upcoming votes, Purcell said, "The final tally will certainly reflect the Administration's position on the legisla-

tion, but I am hopeful that the majority of the House will finally come to its senses and realize that

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
