12:30 p.m.

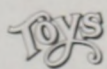

### Tips For Mothers Re-entering The Workforce

Last year, 20 million American mothers re-entered the workforce. In fact, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, two-thirds of all working mothers have children under the age of 18.

But if you're like many workers-to-be, you may have developed "back-to-work phobia." Barbara Ambrosio, vice president of human resources at Adia Personnel Services, a leading temporary and permanent placement firm, suggests some steps for a smooth transition, whether you've been out of the workforce for one year or ten:

- Take an honest look at your personal skills bank. Is it adequate for today's job requirements? Are you computer savvy? Glancing through classified advertisements will give you a rough idea of what skills are in demand and where you stand.
- Consider taking an adult education course to learn a new skill or brush up on an old one. Many high schools offer introductory evening classes in a broad range of fields.
- Locate the career development centers at area colleges, where advisors can suggest possible career directions. They may also refer you to vocational tests that help identify appropriate avenues based on your strengths.
- Talk with employment services—ideally, those that place applicants in both temporary and per-

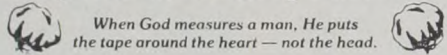
manent jobs. They'll help steer you in the right direction and you'll start re-developing your interviewing skills. Also consider temporary work as a means to ease back into your career, improve on old skills, or even investigate a new industry.

# Improvement Report Approved By Turkey-Quitaque ISD Board

The Turkey-Quitaque Board of Trustees on November 14, 1988, reviewed and approved, in regular session, the Annual Improvement Report supplied by Superintendent Wilburn Leeper. In keeping with the guidelines, this information has been given to the Valley Tribune for publication. Due to the length of the report, it will be presented in a series.

### TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

**CURRICULUM:** Program offerings and the impact of curriculum requirements.

**GOAL TWO:** A well balanced curriculum will be taught so that all students may realize their learning potential and prepare for productive lives.

The school district continues to make necessary revisions in the curriculum to comply with provisions of Chapter 75. The school board purchased equipment and entered into a contract with TI-IN Network to provide services for a more complete curriculum, especially in the foreign language area. Students and parents have shown an interest in courses not currently offered, such as French and Latin. With TI-IN availability, the district will experience flexibility in teacher assignments. Adjustment in scheduling for students and time will become a consideration.

The school district reviewed a

basic reading skills program offered by Prescription Learning for grades 1-6. If federal funding becomes available, the program will be used during the 1988-89 school year to improve reading skills. The program will utilize computers to assist in testing, leveling, and instruction for students needing remedial instruction.

Local businesses and business personnel were utilized by the school district. Visits to businesses to provide practical experiences in the use of computers were

undertaken. One exercise to practice job interviews was conducted by a banking executive. The kindergarten class regularly visited businesses to provide life experiences.

**STAFF:** Quality and trends in employment and turnover.

**GOAL THREE:** Qualified and effective teachers will be attracted and retained.

The turnover of teaching personnel in the school district is usually low and the effort to attract new teachers is effectively met. One problem does exist when classes need to be split to meet the 22-1 ratio regulations. Classes in the lower grades (K-1) consistently range near the 22-26
