Basketball In Full Swing At Valley

If the Valley Patriot fans were looking for action Friday night, the gym was the place. The Lady Patriots eeked out a one point victory in overtime and the Valley boys were edged out by one point in this home opener.

The Lady Patriots were led in scoring by Paula Scoggins with 21 points, but it was Amy Maupin's crucial free throws

with two seconds left that proved the difference in victory. Couch Rapp commented that their man to man defense improved greatly over last weeks game with Motley County.

Valley boys were led in scoring by John Pigg with 16 points. The game was tight throughout with the lead seesawing back and forth throughout the game. Free

throws proved to be the difference at the end of the game as the Patriots sank only 13 out of 38 free throws. The Patriots fought hard and gave a fine effort throughout.

The girls record improved to 1-1 while the boys fell to 0-2 with both teams traveling to Clarendon for a November 22 game.

The J.V. boys and girls split a pair of games with the girls winning by a score of 32-26. The Lady J.V. Patriots were led in scoring by April Brittain with 11 points. The J.V. Patriots lost a close one in the waning seconds by a score of 23-24. The boys were led in scoring by Jason Little with 12 points. The J.V. girls record stands at 1-1 while the boys stand at 0-2. Both J.V. teams resumed action at Clarendon, November 22.

State Representative Will Be In Silverton

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that a representative from his agency will be in Silverton on Tuesday, December 13, 1988 to answer questions about Texas taxes and assist taxpayers with paperwork and problems.

"I don't want to see state taxes turn into a burden for folks who can't get to a field office. Our visits are a service we're happy to provide to Texas taxpayers," Bullock said.

"I'm sending my employees out to help with questions, filling out forms, and working out problems on a local, one-to-one basis. There's some things you just can't do as well over the phone or through the mail," Bullock said.

Silverton and Quitaque area taxpayers who can't attend the courthouse seminar can still get individual tax assistance by calling the Comptroller's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-252-5555, from anywhere in Texas.

The Amarillo office, headed by Mort Watson, serves Briscoe County.

Ulrey, pastor of the First United Methodist Church. An offering will be received for the community Thanks-

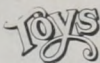
giving Fund. "This fund is used to meet the needs of travelers who develop special needs while passing through our community," said Rev. Steve Ulrey.

DPS releases Report And Encourages Safety

Captain Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the month of October, our troopers investigated 8 fatal accidents, 76 personal injury accidents, and 114 property damage accidents. There were 9 persons killed and 114 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Mike Thomson of Clarendon stated, "In Briscoe County, our troopers investigated no fatal accidents, no personal injury accidents, and only one property damage accident in the month of October."

Major V.J. Cawthon, regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safet, urges Texas motorists to use extra caution in driving this Thanksgiving holiday season. He says, "Because there is more traffic during holiday weekends, there is more exposure to accidents. Therefore, be alert and drive defensively. Stay alert and have something to be thankful for."

To help avoid speeding and stress, plan ahead, leave early, and allow ample time for arriving at your destination. Remember if you leave late, you will arrive late.

According to Major Cawthon more alcoholic beverages are consumed during holiday periods. A drinking driver is less skilled and more dangerous than a sober driver. Remember that approximately 50% of all traffic fatalities involve a drinking driver. So, please do not drink and drive!

It has been proven in recent years that wearing seat belts saves lives. Develop this habit of "buckling up." It may be the best habit you can have.

Take it upon yourself this holiday season to observe traffic laws and regulations and help the law enforcement agencies make this a safe, happy holiday for everyone.

FmHA Sends Out Delinquent Notices

This month the Farmers Home Administration will send notices to 6,521 farmers-borrowers across Texas who are at least 180 days delinquent on their FmHA loans.

Farmers receiving the "Notice of Availability of Loan Service Programs for Delinquent Farm Borrowers" will have 45 days to respond to FmHA of lose their rights to restructure their loans under provisions of the Agriculture Credit Act of 1987.

Texas Farmers Union President Joe Rankin says farmers can seek help from credit counselors or mediation services when filling out the forms, but that they must be completed by the 45 day deadline. "If the forms aren't

Valley Releases Annual Performance Report

The Turkey-Quitaque Board of Trustees last week reviewed and approved, in regular session, the Annual Improvement Report supplied by Superintendent Wilburn Leeper. In keeping with the guidelines, this information has been given to the Valley Tribune for publication. Due to the length of the report, it will be presented in a series.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Trends in Student Performance GOAL ONE: All students will be expected to meet or exceed educational performance standards.

The school district administered the SRA Achievement Test in both reading and mathematics. Results indicate that scores were comparable to the previous year in both areas tested, but the school district desires greater growth.

TEAMS tests were administered to students enrolled in odd numbered grades, beginning with the first. TEAMS summary data for the third and fifth grades suggest below state average

returned, then the farmers will lose all of their rights to restructuring and appeal," says Rankin. "Then FmHA can go right to acceleration and foreclosure."

Farmers are being encouraged to apply for all Primary and Preservation loan options when completing the paperwork. The Primary Loan Servicing Options include: loan consolidation; loan rescheduling; loan reamortization, interest rate reductions; deferrals; or debt write-downs.

If a borrower does not qualify for any of the Primary Loan Servicing Options, he may still be eligible for Preservation Loan Options, which include home-stead protection and farm-land leaseback/buyback.

Finally, if a farmer is denied restructuring, he has the right to appeal the decision through a new FmHA National Appeals System.

Texas Farmers Union President Joe Rankin says the Ag. Credit Act can give farmers a chance to survive when they otherwise couldn't. "However, with new rights come new responsibilities," says Rankin. "It's up to all of us to make this Act work."

performance when tested for writing mastery. Data shows that the third grade exhibited a 38% mastery, compared with the state average of 76% and the fifth grade showed 55% mastery compared with the state average of 79% mastery. All other grades tested for writing mastery compared favorably with state averages.

TEAMS scores for math and reading in all grade levels was at or above the state average and analysis suggest that the school district is providing adequate instruction. For the third year in succession, the 11th grade has successfully performed mastery on the TEAMS Exit Level Test. The seventh grade class performed a 100% mastery for math, reading, and writing.

The school district is considering providing remedial instruction to all eligible Chapter I students through the implementation of Prescription Learning Program. If adopted, students needing remedial instruction in reading will be instructed at a level in which they can perform successfully.

Efforts to improve writing skills will be teacher delivered strategies including; increasing the volume of creative writing, improving teaching strategies for motivating creative writing, and securing resources and materials for the teaching of writing skills.

Failure rate for grades 6-12 remained consistent with previous year experiences. A high failure rate for grades 6-8 resulted in student ineligibility for extra-curricular participation following the first six weeks grading period. High school students suffered very little throughout the school year due to failures. No pass/no play has a positive impact upon the academic performance of all students.
