FIVE ACCIDENTS REPORTED IN BRISCOE COUNTY

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Rex Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and 11 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1972 shows a total of ten accidents resulting in one person killed and 13 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1972 shows a total of 420 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 218 persons injured as compared to March 1971, with 521 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 251 persons injured.
