## The Unexpected Guest

Now here's a challenge. It's 6:00 o'clock, the chops are cooking — then Dad calls and he's bringing a guest for dinner. Problem: how do you stretch one chop per person into a company-style dinner? Solution: you bake a batch of beautiful biscuits and take the emphasis off the meat shortage. Or serve pretty Parker House Rolls, piping-hot with lots of butter, and let them steal the show. Or when the menu's based on spaghetti, salad or soup, do as the Romans do and serve buttery bread sticks. It's a foolproof strategy. Tempting hot breads make even a budget meal look like a banquet — and you, a homey hostess. Here's your double-quick formula.

### ROLLED BISCUITS

$\frac{3}{4}$  cup milk  
2 cups Bisquick  
Heat oven to 450°. Add milk to Bisquick all at once; stir with fork into a soft dough. Beat dough vigorously 20 strokes until stiff and slightly sticky. Roll dough around on cloth-covered board lightly dusted with flour to prevent sticking. Knead gently 8 to 10 times to smooth up dough. Roll  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch thick. Dip 2-inch cutter in flour; cut biscuits. Bake 10 to 12 minutes. Makes twelve 2-inch biscuits. Quick Parker House Rolls: Follow recipe for Rolled Biscuits (above) except — roll dough  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch thick. Cut with  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch cutter. Spread each round with soft butter; fold over as for Parker House Rolls. Place close together in ungreased 1 x 1 x 8 pan, 8 or 9x1 $\frac{1}{2}$  inches, or

square pan, 9x9x2 inches. Bake 8 to 10 minutes. Makes 12 to 16 rolls.

Butter Sticks: Heat oven to 450°. Melt  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup butter in oblong pan, 13x9x2 inches, in oven. Remove as soon as butter melts. Follow recipe for Rolled Biscuits except — roll dough into rectangle, 10x6 inches. Cut in half lengthwise. Cut each half into 12 strips, about  $3\frac{1}{4}$  inch. Dip each stick into butter; arrange in pan. Bake 10 to 15 minutes. Makes 24 Butter Sticks.

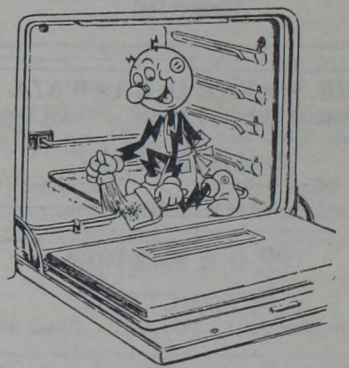

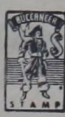
