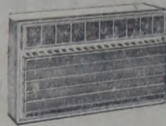

EFFORT BEING MADE TO INCREASE AGRICULTURAL INCOME IN TEXAS

An all-out effort to increase agricultural income in Texas by \$1 billion by the end of the 1976 crop year has been announced by Dr. John E. Hutchison, director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, reports County Agent Ken Cook. The program objective is to further develop the tremendous potential for agricultural income in Briscoe County and for all other counties of the state. The slogan for the program, "3.76 in '76," is significant for it marks the centennial year of Texas A&M University, the state's land grant university. Too, the agricultural income of Texas is now approximately \$2.76 billion

The program is specifically planned to close the gap between average and potential yields of all economically important agricultural commodities produced in Briscoe County and will utilize improved marketing practices, says Cook. Too, the program is designed to increase both the gross and net income of producers.

The County Program Building Committee will set long-range and annual goals based on the knowledge and experience of local farmers and ranchers. These will be attainable, he added, if producers will follow the coordinated application of improved practices already proved by research and Extension demonstrations. The practices have been outlined in production guides prepared by Extension specialists and other resource people for each economically important agricultural enterprise in the county. Improved emphases equal to production in marketing practices will receive the program effort.

QUESTIONNAIRES TO BE SENT FARMERS SOON

During the last half of May, some 40,000 farmers will receive at their mailboxes most important questionnaires from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin.

According to County Agent Ken Cook, it will be the annual acreage survey and that many farmers in Briscoe County will be included in the 40,000. The information derived from the replies will

be the basis for the official estimate of crop acreage for the State of Texas and for each county.

Cary D. Palmer, State Statistician for the Texas Reporting Service, emphasizes the importance of getting back just as many of the 40,000 questionnaires as possible so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Because Texas covers such a wide area, State totals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry; hence, the need for county information. The program is a cooperative effort of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

We urge all farmers in the county who receive the questionnaires to fill them out completely and accurately and return them as soon as possible to the Reporting Service.

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
