Patriots were slow to execute their game plan and the Lady Roos again took the victory 39-31. Leading scorers for the Patriots were Gina Conner with seven and Dana Jackson, six.

The Patriots, also looking

for their first victory over the Kress Kangaroos, came out strong in the first half against the Roos with a halftime score of 28-30. Continuing to fight valiantly, the Patriots came up against full court press. Patriot turnovers again gave way to another Kangaroo victory of 69-49.

Clutter or Treasures?

My daughter likes to keep things. Broken crayons. Bits of cloth. Happy Meal boxes. In this she is like her father, whose possessions will one day require us to rent a warehouse. I, on the other hand, am decidedly anti-clutter. Time and space prevent me from revealing the entire contents of my 8-year-old's closet that I uncovered during a recent cleanup. I stopped counting at 35 stuffed animals. There were hundreds of little plastic people, at least 50 members of her "forest creature" collection, a rock collection consisting of a box of gravel, and a zillion tiny beads and other small objects waiting to be swallowed by her baby sister. Enough, I said. Something had to go. Julie willingly agreed to tackle the job herself, no doubt grateful for the chance to protect her most treasured possessions. Actually I am not nearly as rampant as my mother on a cleaning binge, when nothing, but nothing, is sacred. I made that painful discovery on a recent trip home when I decided to dig out my Nancy Drew books for Julie. "Charity," Mother admitted when I couldn't find the relics from my past. "So some poor child could enjoy them as much as you did," she added with a straight face. Ha! I knew better. She probably wanted that shelf for something else, probably her much-ballyhooed "open space." Having given Julie her assignment, I reluctantly approached mine for the day, the closet in the baby's room. It was one of those closets that you had to open slowly, toss in the item to be stored and slam the door before everything else fell out. I had put off cleaning it for two reasons. One, I believe it's OK for every house to have a closet like that, a temporary shelter for things that have not yet found a permanent home. And two, I knew what was in there. Under the plastic bags full of old drapes and bedspreads, behind the pillows, blankets and boxes of photographs, were The Baby Clothes. We're talking here about the little sleepers, the tiny dresses, the itty bitty socks worn by both my daughters, clothes that were outgrown long before I grew tired of washing them. Cleaning out that closet meant having to decide what to do with the baby clothes. When Julie outgrew the clothes, I packed them away with the expectation that they would be needed again. But now our family is complete. Having no reason to keep them, it seemed I should send the baby clothes the way of my Nancy Drew books. I couldn't do it. Sorting through those little bonnets and booties, I knew I was about to become a pack rat too. Now, tucked away in the attic, are two large boxes that I may not open until I become a grandmother. But I feel happy when I think of them up there. And it was with new understanding that I told Julie she could keep her rock collection. **ll**

First 18-Year Old To Register Now Too Old For Draft

Joseph Frank, a resident and city employee of Lafayette, La., will celebrate his birthday today, January 6. By turning 26, Frank unknowingly establishes a milestone for an agency of the U.S. Government and earns himself a minor place in history.
 Eight years ago, Frank was the first 18-year-old man to sign up and be processed by the Selective Service System under the continuous draft registration program. From today on, however if Congress and the president order a return to military conscription under present law, Frank is too old to be drafted. He becomes the first man since Vietnam to pass through the full, eight-year-long period of draft eligibility without being drafted.

Names and addresses of men ages 18-25 are kept on file by Selective Services for use in a national emergency. If Congress reinstates the draft, men most likely to be called into military service would be those who turn 20 during that calendar year. Selective Service would first conduct a birthday lottery to determine the order of call within that age group and then, depending upon manpower requirements of the crisis, those men whose birthdays draw low lottery numbers would be more likely to be called.

There has not been a draft since 1973 when the U.S. switched to an all-volunteer military force. In 1975, the Selective Service System was placed in "Deep Standby" status and the requirement for men to register was suspended. But it wasn't long before several studies and commission reports noted that a draft would be needed again if the country ever became in a major conflict. They predicted it would take too long to get men registered, classified, inducted and trained.

In 1980, after the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, President Carter revitalized the Selective Service System and reinstated the registration requirement for men. On January 5, 1981, registration of 18-year-old men began again and has continued. Today, using computer technology, the System can begin issuing thousands of induction orders via Western Union "Mailgrams" in three days or less, once Congress and the president give the go-ahead.

With few exceptions, federal law requires every man to register with Selective Service within 30 days of his 18th birthday. (Men have a 60-day window in which to comply with the law: from 30 days before to 30 days after turning 18). The process is simple. Men furnish their names, addresses, and telephone and Social Security numbers by completing and signing a short form at any post office. A man who is out of the country around the time of his 18th birthday can register at any embassy or consular office.

Social Security News

Briscoe County Extension News

Many young workers are still wondering if Social Security will be around when they retire. and their concern is understandable because 7 or 10 years ago, all we heard and read about in the media was the imminent bankruptcy of the Social Security program. For various reasons, the trust funds were in danger of being exhausted.

To solve the funding problem, a bipartisan commission was formed to recommend solutions. It came out with some measures to raise the trust fund reserves. These measures included a delay in the cost of living adjustments; moving up the tax increases already scheduled for the coming years; and extension of coverage to Federal employees and nonprofit organizations.

But, the important news is that the most recent report of the Trustees of the Social Security trust funds shows that the changes in the law in 1983 worked, and the program is solidly financed. The reserves will continue to grow well into the next century.

We have emphasized the fact that the program will pay retirement benefits to the young workers of today, because this has been a cause of concern to them. However, it is important for them to be aware of the Social Security protection they can have today.

This protection is based on disability that nobody knows when it can happen. It is reassuring to know that Social Security will be there to help.

A young worker may get Social Security benefits if a severe mental or physical impairment prevents him or her from working for one year or more or is expected to result in death. If disabled before

age 24, a worker needs only six quarters of work out of the preceding 12 to qualify for benefits. If the disability happens between 24 and 31, the number of quarters required increases gradually. After 31, a disabled worker needs at least 20 quarters of work, out of the preceding 40 quarters for benefits. In addition to disability benefits paid to workers, members of their families may also receive benefits.

After receiving disability benefits for 24 months, a worker can count on Medicare to help with hospital and doctors' bills. People with permanent kidney failure who need dialysis or kidney transplant can have Medicare with no waiting period.

Young workers can be assured that in case of disability, they and their families will get Social Security, and in the event of their death, their families will also be eligible.

S.S. Update On Address Changes

The most common reason for failure to receive a Social Security check is not reporting a change of address. A change of address may be reported to any Social Security office by phone or mail.

Some people apparently think that's all they have to do to report a change of address to the post office. However, the post office will forward mail to the new address for only 1 year, after which any mail that does not contain the new address is returned to the sender.

People who have their checks sent directly to their bank and fail to report a change of address, also risk having their checks interrupted. Social Security periodically checks to see if the proper person is receiving the checks and if there is no response to the mailed inquiry, the checks may be stopped.

In addition, direct depositors who fail to report a change of address may miss receiving important information mailed to beneficiaries that may affect their checks.

Briscoe County producers can get maximum benefit from their irrigation systems, including use of the systems to apply herbicides and pesticides, will be explained during the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference January 10 in Amarillo.

"Each year, this is one of the most beneficial programs irrigators in Briscoe County can attend," said Curtis Preston, county extension agent. "It is planned by area producers who irrigate and staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to address local needs."

The conference will be held at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 5600 Amarillo Boulevard West in Amarillo. An exhibit of equipment and irrigation supplies will begin at 8:30 a.m., with presentations starting at 9:25 a.m.

Information about insectigation and herbigation will be presented by Carl Patrick, extension entomologist, and Brent Bean, extension agronomist. George Ratledge, assistant manager of Inject-O-Meter Co., Clovis, N.M., will discuss chemigation equipment, laws and safety.

Fred Pringle, soil chemist with the Soil Conservation Service, USDA, Amarillo, will explain how soil properties affect water intake. Robert Bruno, P & R Surge Systems, Lubbock, will discuss successful surge use.

Effects of pump and power unit efficiency on irrigation costs will be shown by Leon New, Extension irrigation specialist and conference coordinator. Steve Amosson, extension economist at Amarillo, will discuss the optimal mix of farm program crops where water is limited.

The growers' panel will feature Dale Coleman of Dumas and Glen Hart of Stratford. They will relate their experience and suggestions on management and operation of irrigation management and maintenance of center pivots.

Additional information about the conference is available at the county extension office.

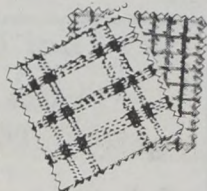

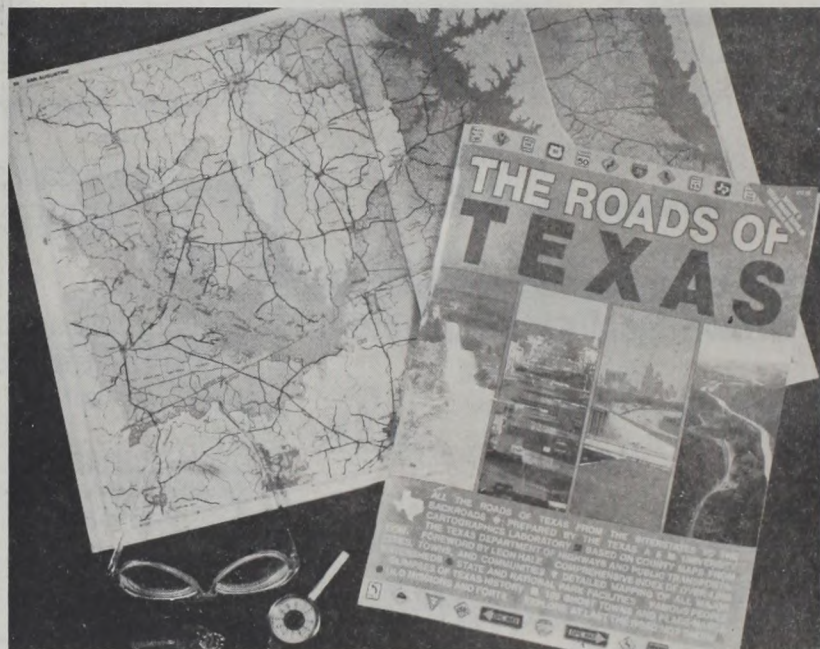
