Summer Classes To Be Offered At Valley

Superintendent Wilburn Leeper announced Monday Valley School will offer summer classes for students who have been enrolled in any of the special programs this past school year. Programs for which summer classes will be conducted include Special Education, English-as-a-second-language, Migrant Education, Chapter I Remedial Reading, and for certain four or five year old children who will enroll in Kindergarten next year. Also, Kindergarten children going into the first grade next year and who may need additional help may attend the summer classes.

The classes will be available to children who are now completing sixth grades or below. Neither progress reports nor report cards will be issued, but parents will be encouraged to visit with teachers concerning student progress.

Summer classes for Special Education students will begin on July 2nd and will continue through August 10, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon daily. The other classes will be held beginning on July 27 and will end on August 10 from 9-12 daily. All classes will be conducted for the purpose of remediation or to assist

in giving the students a good start for the new school year-not because the students failed to be promoted.

Parents of students who are eligible for the summer program have been informed of the program availability and have been asked to return an enrollment form. It is essential for the enrollment forms to be returned to the school business office as soon as possible in order that further plans can be made. The summer program will exist only if the interest is sufficient to justify planning, development and cost.

Twisting Winds Hit Quitaque And Turkey

High winds, preceded by blinding, blowing dust, and accompanied brief heavy rains, raked across the Quitaque and Turkey area last Tuesday evening. The unconfirmed twisting winds lifted and destroyed a garage from the Yeary residence in Quitaque, leaving the entire contents untouched.

Other reports of damages to storage buildings being blown over or destroyed were widespread in Quitaque, as well as some roofs being loosened.

Trees and branches littered the streets and yards in the aftermath of the yet unconfirmed tornado. In some cases entire trees were twisted and uprooted in both communities.

Hotel Turkey suffered extensive damage when a small portion of the roof was lifted and ripped away. The ceiling collapsed a short time later in two rooms of the top story area causing an unestimated amount of damage, with water damage to a large area of the structure and contents.

"Water blew in here like a river, we built dikes out of linens, bedspreads, and anything else we could find," stated owner Jane Johnson, referring to the rear entrance of the historical

hotel. "I think it must have been a twister, it just didn't have enough force to come on down, thank goodness."

Although wind damages were high, rainfall amounts varied from a trace to one-half inch in Turkey to one and one-half inches in Quitaque.

There were no injuries reported from the storm, or from flying debris.

A called was placed to Memphis by the National Weather Station to clear the baseball fields, due to the severe lightning in the storm, according to Manuel Cruz of Quitaque. The Valley teams were in Memphis for scheduled baseball games. There were no injuries at the field reported.

Hiker Dies In 100+ Heat

A 36 year old mother of two, Johnnie Lee Ward of Lubbock, died, apparently from the extreme heat, at Caprock Canyons State Park Sunday, while hiking with her husband and children Sunday afternoon.

The emergency call came in at 3:35 p.m., when the husband of the victim was picked up by Johnnie Pointer as he was walking back to retrieve his car to go pick up his wife (who had already taken ill) and children. When EMS arrived at the scene, they administered life support procedures and transported her to Plainview. She was pronounced dead on arrival.

"The family had begun their hike on the west side of the park on the designated hiking trails, and apparently got turned around and possibly lost their way," said Justice of the Peace David Brunson. "From my information, she (Mrs. Ward) became ill, possibly from the heat, and her husband set her and the children under a tree while he went to get the car."

Red River Valley Museum To Open New Room To The Public

The Russell on exhibit at the Red River Valley Museum shows three horsemen and a packhorse in the foreground with three more in the background. When Fredrick G. Renner, noted Russell authority, was working on his book of Russell paintings, drawings and sculpture in the Amon G. Carter Museum, he was very interested to see and appraise the Beam's painting. It is considered a pristine piece as postcards and prints have never been made of it. Mr. Renner visited Mrs. Koch at her home and entitled the work, "Looking for New Range."

"The land surrounding the figures is painted in the familiar Russell muted tones and evokes a feeling of distance. The vastness of the land seems to point us the companionship of the men and the horses," stated Huskinson. "This is a comfortable, commonplace scene. The men are relaxed and the horses seem to be following their own pace. There is no contrivance in the piece at all. You know it is a scene that Russell saw hundreds of times," she continued. "To have an original work

by an artist of this magnitude is so exciting. Vernon is indeed fortunate to be able to exhibit such a one-of-a-kind painting. We're so grateful that the Beams are willing to share this treasure with the museum," she added.

Charles M. Russell died at the age of 62 in 1926, already secure in his recognition as a fine artist. But as his friend Will Rogers said in the biography, Good Medicine, "Char-

lie wasn't just another artist. He wasn't just another anything. Why, he could think twice as straight as he could draw. He was a philosopher. He was a great humorist. He had a great underlying spiritual feeling. He left us not only great living pictures of what our West was, but he left us an example of how to live in friendship with all mankind. A real, downright, honest-to-God human being."

The Russell painting will be a part of the newly designed Waggoner Room, A History of Ranching North Texas which opens to the public Sunday, June 17. The museum, located adjacent to the Vernon Regional Junior College at 4600 College Drive (Hwy 70), is open 6 days a week, (closed Monday) free of charge from 1-5 p.m. For further information please call 817-553-1848.

Unidentified Body Found In Childress April Fire Debris
Remains of an unidentified body were discovered Friday, June 15, as workers began cleaning up an April fire that totally destroyed the William Paul Tyndall home, 1303 A. J. NW in Childress.
Police are not sure if the deceased is a man or woman. The remains were shipped Saturday to a pathologist in Lubbock. Findings will be announced as soon as they are processed, officers said.
"It's weird," commented Act Childress Police Chief Billy Hinton.
No one was home at the time of the fire. No injuries were reported in the 6 a.m. Sunday morning blaze. All Tyndall family members were accounted for.
Police and firemen are investigating every angle in an effort to solve the mystery.
"We haven't ruled out anything," Hinton added.
Officers are puzzled since many have been in and out looking through the debris since the fire. "We just don't know," said a department spokesman. "It's weird."
"Spooky!" remarked an onlooker. As to how long the body was in the rubble, no one knows. However, the odor was strong indicating that it happened rather recently, not years ago.
The skull, rib cage, etc. were covered by Randy Jones and McInturf, who had contracted to remove the debris.
"Astonished, surprised, you can imagine how they must have felt," Hinton concluded.
A security fence, marked "line-do not cross" now surrounds the lot. The debris, about 60 feet in diameter is mainly charred remains but a few items may be salvaged.
In the meantime, the neighborhood is quiet even though people drive by just to look.
"It's gruesome..."
"I can't believe it happened in Childress..."
"Could someone have accidentally left the body in hot ash cover up for a crime?"
Answers are not available until investigating officers are hopeful a pathologist report will shed light.

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Police and firemen are investigating every angle in an effort to solve the mystery.

"We haven't ruled out anything," Hinton added.

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"We just don't know," said a fire department spokesman. "It's sorta weird."

"Spooky!" remarked an onlooker. As to how long the body was in the rubble, no one knows. However, the odor was strong indicating that it happened rather recently—not years ago.

The skull, rib cage, etc. was discovered by Randy Jones and Paul McInturf, who had contracted to remove the debris.

"Astonished, surprised, you can't imagine how they must have felt," Hinton concluded.

A security fence, marked "police line-do not cross" now surrounds the lot. The debris, about 60 feet in diameter is mainly charred remains, but a few items may be salvaged.

In the meantime, the neighborhood is quiet even though townspeople drive by just to look.

"It's gruesome..." "I can't believe it happened in Childress..."

"Could someone have deliberately left the body in hot ashes as a cover up for a crime?"

Answers are not available. Investigating officers are hopeful the pathologist report will shed some light.
