Williams Announces Candidacy For Sheriff

J. L. Williams has authorized the local newspaper to announce that he is a candidate for Sheriff of Briscoe County subject to the action of the Democratic Primary in May.

Williams made the following statement in regard to his candidacy:

"I served six years as an Army Military Policeman, and have made my home in Silvertown for the past 3½ years. I came to this area to work on the Mackenzie Dam building project, decided to make Silvertown my home and have been employed by Ray Thompson Implement Company, Inc. since the completion of my work at the dam-site.

"I am married to the former Betty Ruth Arnold, a Silvertown native who is the daughter of Mrs. Stella Arnold and the late Rusty Arnold.

"One of the activities I have enjoyed while living in Silvertown is my work with the young people in the summer baseball program.

"I want to be elected to serve as your Sheriff, and I promise that if elected I will fulfill the duties of the office to the best of my ability. I plan to try to visit with each of you in regard to my candidacy between now and the date of the Democratic Primary, and in the meantime I would like for you to give my candidacy your consideration.

"I would also like to take this opportunity to urge all citizens to remember that in order to be able to cast your vote in the primaries this year you must re-register at the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office before the first of March. This is under a new law passed by the State Legislature," Williams said.

Included with the new certificates will be a request for information to update current roles, to comply with the new voter registration law. Mrs. Carmen stated, "No one will be removed or purged from the registration roles for failure to return the information form, but I strongly urge you to assist our office by returning the request with all information blanks completed."

After March 1, 1976, only the New Blue Certificates will be valid for voting.

Mrs. Carmen also urged all persons not currently registered to vote, or having moved since they last voted, to re-register.

THE END OF AN ERA

The year of 1975 saw many happenings and changes in our community; they all contribute to the heritage and history of our local area. The New Year of 1976 is adding another change in a

business in Turkey with the end of almost a quarter of a century of a partnership in the City Drug business.

Floyd Gilmore, a son of an early day pioneer family, Dr. and Mrs. H. Gilmore, came to Turkey in 1909 and is retiring effective January 10, bringing to a close almost a half century of Mr. Gilmore's work and management in drug store ownership.

The remaining partner, Reddell Irby, has purchased Mr. Gilmore's interest in the business taking over full ownership of the business. Mr. Irby is also from an early pioneer family, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Irby. Howard Irby came to this area in 1908 and returned to Robinson County to bring his bride, the former Miss Emma Gilmore, to Hall County in 1911.

Reddell Irby received his degree in Pharmacy from the University of Texas in 1939. He worked in pharmacy work a short time in Vernon and Quanah, then returned to Turkey and started working for Floyd Gilmore in the City Drug in the spring of 1940 and continued working there un-

til Pearl Harbor. He served eight years in the Air Force and received an honorable discharge as Captain. During his tenure in the service, he married Miss Dollie Mae Farley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Farley of the Weatherly Community on June 23, 1942.

Mr. and Mrs. Reddell Irby have two sons, Richard Irby, who is also a registered pharmacist, and who, with his wife and children make their home in Tulsa; Dennis Irby lives at Mesquite and is attending college at Eastfield.

In April of 1951 Reddell Irby purchased the City Drug Store from R. A. Smith and went in partnership with Floyd Gilmore in the summer of 1952.

Mr. Gilmore's first drug store venture was in January 1927 when he purchased a partnership into the drug business with J. R. Miller. This firm was established in 1925 when J. R. Miller came to Turkey from Stephenville and established the drug business with Roy Cooper and the two operated the firm until 1927 when Floyd Gilmore purchased Mr. Cooper's interest. Their drug store was located in a building about where Tom Salem's Dry Goods store is located now.

Prior to Mr. Gilmore's venture in the drug business, he had married Miss Teila Lacy, daughter of another pioneer family, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Lacy. They have a family of three children. Their son, Roy Gene Gilmore and family make their home at Clovis, New Mexico. A daughter, Majorie and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Preston Mosley, makes their home in Amarillo and Judy, another daughter and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Cleo Jordan, make their home in Dallas.

In March of 1928 the Miller-Gilmore Drug moved to a new location in a new building located on North Main just west of the theater building known as the Palace Theatre then. At that time Turkey had two drug stores, the other being located in one of the buildings presently used by the City Drug. It was known as Payne & Russell Drug and was owned by Charlie Payne and Roy Russell.

In May of 1928, the Miller-Gilmore Drug secured the Rexall Franchise.

The Valley boys, after winning their first two district games, drove over to Quail Tuesday night of this week and were upset by the Quail Quails 61-58 and have dropped into a tie with Hedley in the standings. Meanwhile the Valley girls easily won their third straight in district by rolling past the Quails 58-32.

Last Friday night the local teams won a pair of district games over Sannorwood. The Eagles of Sannorwood came into that game sporting an 18-2 record and figured to be the stiffest competition for the Patriots in the district but the Valley girls took a 57-40 win with all of the squad members seeing action in the game. It is beginning to appear that the Valley girls are now a solid choice to win their fourth consecutive district championship, the first two in Class A and the next two as Class B teams.

The Valley boys took an easy 75-44 win over the Norwood Eagles.

Over at Quail Tuesday night the Valley girls jumped off to a flying start and led 16-4 at the end of the first period. At half-time Valley owned a 28-14 margin. The Patriots cooled somewhat in the third quarter but still maintained a comfortable 38-25 point lead as the third quarter was over. Mitchie Lipscomb, who had suffered through a very cold spell, shoot-

ing again and Coach Sanders cleared the bench, giving all hands the experience. The girls are coming along now, gaining experience and getting better with every game. The improvement is more noticeable on the guard end, of course, where the team had the least experience, beginning the season with only one starter, Connie Ferguson, back this year. Coach Sanders told this reporter this week that he felt that the girls were going to peak at just the right time. Sherice Price hit for 22 points to lead the offense for the Patriots. Mitchie Lipscomb, despite a long cold spell, wound up with 17 points, Janna Turner scored 12 points, Jena Mullin hit for 5 and Joanie Turner scored 2 points. Seeing action at guard were Connie Ferguson, Darlene Hendrix, Martha Reed, Dodi Lane, Shonda Smith, Debra Parsley, Marlene Cawley and Donna Brown.

The boys game was one of those barn burners that leave the fans limp and exhausted when it is over; the winners exhausted and happy and the losers exhausted and unhappy and looking back to a hundred "ifs" that would have changed the outcome of the game.

Then in August of 1928, Roy Cooper purchased J. R. Miller's interest in the drug business and the store changed to a new name at this time, the City Drug Store.

Mr. Gilmore decided in 1943 to leave the community and venture into the drug business in another town, so he sold his interest to J. E. Barnhill and Mr. and Mrs. Gilmore and made a move to Childress where he was in the drug business for three years. They returned to Turkey where he purchased the Turkey Pharmacy from Jess Browning in 1946.

In the summer of 1952 the City Drug and Turkey Pharmacy became one business in its present location.

Joey Barefield led the Patriots in scoring with 19 points, Ron Eudy canned 16, Ernie Lucero 16, Scotty Setliff 5 and Pepper Jones 2.

Valley fans believe that the Patriots will take the Quails next outing, which will be here at Valley on Friday, January 20.

Friday night of this week the varsity teams will go to Lakeview for a pair of district games and Tuesday night of next week they will host the Estelline teams for two games.


