

Born in 1734, in Berks County, Pa., Boone emerged as a national 1-22-90 frontiersman after he and 28 others 1-29-90 blazed a trail through the Cumberland Gap from western Virginia to the 2-3-90 interior of Kentucky in 1775. Named 2-5-90 the Wilderness Road, it eventually became the first major thoroughfare

to the West. Boone was a courageous man and an adventurous leader. He survived many ambushes during his travels, but was captured by the Shawnee in 1778. He spent five months as the adopted son of Chief Blackfish before
