Valley Finishes Season Tames The Panthers

The Valley Patriots used an explosive offensive attack to overcome the Follett Panthers 75-54 Friday night at McLean. The win record was Valley's 7 against 3 losses.

Valley stamped the game out by driving 55 yards down to the Follett 25 where Chad Isbell was able to kick his second field goal of the season to make the score 4-0. Follett drove the length of the field to take the lead with a 21 yard run. The kick was good and Follett had the lead 8-4.

Bubba Clardy raced 32 yards on the next drive to give the lead back to Valley. Isbell's kick was good making the score 12-8, Valley. Clardy scored again on the next possession, but this time on a 25 yard pass from Clay Edwards. After Isbell's kick, the lead increased to 20-8.

Follett would not let up as they punched it over from the 3 yard line to end the scoring at the half, 20-16 Valley.

Valley held Follett on their possession in the second half. When Valley did get the ball, Clay Edwards hit Isbell on a

16 yard TD pass. Isbell also kicked the extra point to give Valley a 28-16 lead. Valley's Bubba Clardy came right back with a 42 yard TD. Isbell's kick again in as good and Valley had a 36-16 lead.

Follett would not give up as they drove down the field and scored on a 21 yard TD run. The kick was blocked by Jason Little and Jon Pigg to make the score 36-24, Valley. Edwards started his scoring spree as he punched it in from 2 yards out. Isbell hit Jon Pigg for the extra point to make the score 43-24.

Again, Follett then scored on a pass to close the gap to 32-43, but Edwards ran 58 yards to increase the lead. Isbell's kick was good. Follett's passing was working as they hit on another TD.

Edwards scored twice more and Clardy once more with Isbell hitting on all the extra points to close out the season with a win.

"It was a great game to watch the Panthers would not give in. They kept coming. But our boys knew what they had to do. The line did a great job opening hole for our backs

(Little, Pigg, Isbell, Kendrick.) This enabled our backs to rush for 497 yards. Edwards rushed for 21-307 yards and 4 TD's. Clardy rushed 11-174 yards and 4 TD's. Good defensive performances were turned in by Little, Cory Pointer, Bengie Hughes, Pigg, and Isbell. The Patriots ended the season with a 7-3 record.

Daniel Boone: Legend, Hero

November 2 marks the birthday of one of America's legendary frontiersmen and explorers, Daniel Boone.

Born in 1734, in Berks County, Pa., Boone emerged as a national frontiersman after he and 28 others blazed a trail through the Cumberland Gap from western Virginia to the interior of Kentucky in 1775. Named the Wilderness Road, it eventually became the first major thoroughfare to the West.

Boone was a courageous man and an adventurous leader. He survived many ambushes during his travels, but was captured by the Shawnee in 1778. He spent five months as the adopted son of Chief Blackfish before he escaped.

Boone died Sept. 26, 1820, in St. Charles, Mo. **tl**

BRISCOE CO. SHERIFF'S REPORT

Officers in Briscoe County have made only two arrests for the month of October, both involving alcoholic beverage problems. There have been nine domestic disturbance calls and seven motorist assists. Three thefts of property were reported and three motor vehicle accidents.

The Sheriff's Department has served three sets of papers in criminal cases and assisted probation officers in one revocation hearing, resulting in one person being sentenced to Texas Department of Corrections.

Childress Lands Prison

"It was a people deal from the beginning — people from all over the Panhandle — Paducah, Wellington, Memphis, Quanah, Crowell, Clarendon, Shamrock, Guthrie, etc. ..."

It's the most beautiful thing that has happened around here in a long time ...it will turn this whole area around."

"People in Childress were the best organized, the hardest working and they didn't give up!"

"It shows what we can do when we pull together..."
"We didn't have one hero...we had thousands!"

These are the comments as Childress basks in its new found victory... a prison at last!

It's the culmination of 10 years planning.

When the Texas Board of Criminal Justice voted 6-of-8 Monday to place a 1,000 bed minimum security prison facility in Childress, the estimated 150-member delegation wept tears of joy.

Robert Mann, Waco banking executive, made the motion to place a prison in Childress. Jerry Hodge, former Amarillo mayor, voiced a second. Six of eight voted in favor. "Tears still flow," commented James Driver, chairman, Century Prison Committee, as he emphasized the bright future ahead.

"I don't think it could have worked out better. We have a future laid out with a good solid industry."

He credited Childress' success to some hard working people.

"It was a people deal from the beginning."

When the vote was taken and Childress was in, Driver said it was

impossible to describe the euphoria among delegates as they leaped to their feet.

It's realityChildress will have a prison.

Construction will begin next year with opening date possibly in late 1990 or mid-1991.

The facility will employ about 300 and add an estimated \$7 million annually to this sagging economy.

Former State Representative Foster Whaley of Pampa, who has diligently supported Childress from the beginning, said this city left no stone unturned.

"It all goes to show if at first you don't succeed, try, try, try again....Childress is a great town — one of the finest in the Panhandle!" Whaley said this morning.

He remained with the Childress delegation and rode back on the delegation bus. Within nine miles of the city limits, Whaley spotted two

police cars with red lights flashing.

"In my mind I questioned what they were doing out trying to stop this bus at 2:00 a.m. I was going to get out and talk with them when I learned they were there to escort us in grand style."

Mayor Pat Steed expressed appreciation for support from surrounding communities and to Amarillo Mayor Keith Adams and City Councilman John McKissack who sat with the Childress group.

"There are so many who did so much," the mayor emphasized. "I hope I can personally thank each."

Childress' \$6.5 million proposal was unveiled and presented by Mayor Steed and Driver.

"It was a magnificent presentation ... beautiful," Whaley said. His comments were echoed by Morris Higley, publisher, The Childress Index, and other delegation members.
