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## TIMMY POWELL DIES OF INJURIES SUFFERED FIVE WEEKS AGO

Death claimed the fourth victim of a July 28th auto accident at Alamosa, Colo., when Timmy Powell, 7, passed away at 1:00 a. m. Tuesday at the hospital where he was carried following the three-car accident in which Timmy's mother, sister and grandmother were killed instantly.

Funeral services for Timmy were held at 2:30 p. m. Thursday at the Church of Christ in Turkey with Jack D. Hutton, minister, and the Rev. Freddie Martin, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Quitaque, officiating. Burial was in Dreamland Cemetery at Turkey by Seigler Funeral Home.

The accident occurred during the family vacation. Timmy's mother, Mrs. Ann Powell, 32, his sister Tina, and his grandmother, Mrs. Leo Mullin, 54, of Turkey, were all killed. Timmy's death came five weeks

to the day following the accident. He suffered a fractured skull and never regained consciousness.

Timothy Edward Powell was born July 2, 1963, at Lockney and had lived all his life at Quitaque. He would have been in the Second Grade at Quitaque Elementary school this year.

Survivors include his father, Johnny Powell of Quitaque; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Denver Powell, and Leo Mullin of Turkey, and his great-grandmother, Mrs. Mary Ferryman of Haskell.

## It Rained!

The rains came to Quitaque Tuesday afternoon, dumping from a near 3 inches in town and up to a reported five inches in spots north and west of town. Some hail fell north of town on a narrow strip causing an undetermined amount of damage to cotton.

The weather became very blustery during the rainstorm, with high winds blowing the hard rain which lasted only about an hour.

The heavy rain did not cover a wide area. The heavier downpour occurred from the north of Quitaque and west to the Caprock. Meanwhile, northeast of town and around to the south the fall was light. About four inches fell at the Bud Bailey farm while E. J. Hamilton caught only .85. The fall at Gasoline and Flomot was light and south of town at the Joe Edd Smith place, only about .2 was recorded. West and southwest of town the rain was heavy. Turkey recorded only about half an inch.

Rain had been falling in spots for the past week, however, and spots that were missed this time had gotten showers earlier, so all in all, cotton prospects look pretty good in most areas here in the valley. Part of the area east of Flomot is still needing rain according to reports.

Mr. James reported that \$668,350.00 was channeled into the counties through 85 loans for better town and country housing during the fiscal year ended June 30. Loans the previous year totaled 43 for \$308,340.00.

Farmers Home, a Department of Agriculture agency, supplements all other housing credit available in towns of up to 5,500 population and the rural countryside. Its services in Briscoe County the past year include 10 loans totaling \$77,900 for purchase or improvement of individual family homes. The loans provided better housing for an estimated 60 people in the county.

"The record for fiscal 1970 means that our housing services was fifty percent greater the past year," Mr. James said. "This uptrend was directly opposite to the general national, downturn in housing activity."

# Shirttail Sermon

In the story of God's call to Moses in Exodus 4:1-17 there are two principles which we all need to learn. They could make a great difference in our lives and in our churches.

First, through the question that God put to Moses: "What is that in your hand?" we learn that God does not expect us to use what we do not have. He expects us to use the resources that are ours, whether it be a million dollars, a silver tongue, or the intellect of a genius. Every pastor is well acquainted with such remarks as, "If I could only sing, I'd be glad to..." "If I only knew something about teaching, I would..." "If I were established in business, I would devote more time to personal witness." If, if, if!

Against that kind of talk, God asks: "What is that in your hand?" In other words, what do you possess that God can use? God needs a part of what you have, a part of what you are. He asks you not for what is in the hand of a neighbor, but for what is in your hand. Second, we learn that Moses would make a very fine member of one of today's churches. This is revealed in his prayer, "Oh, my Lord, send some other person."

If God had wanted some other person, He would not have called Moses. God knew Moses' weaknesses. He also knew the strength that others possessed. But He wanted Moses! Moses never seemed to realize that God's call cannot be avoided except at the peril of one's own spirit.

"No" then God would have found some other person. God could get along without Moses, but Moses could not get along without God. No more dangerous words were ever spoken than these: "Find someone else to do it."

Then and now God does not violate the freedom of any person. He gives us the opportunity. He might possibly insist that we do it. But we cannot count on it.

Every pastor has been told time and time again, "Send someone else." "I am too busy." "I have so many other things to do." "I am so tired." "You cannot expect me to do something for which I am not prepared." But God keeps right on knocking.

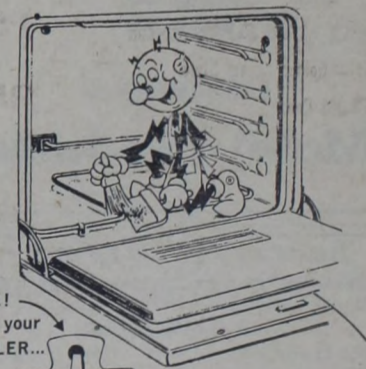

**WELFARE CASEWORKER TO CERTIFY FOR FOOD STAMP PROGRAM**

Briscoe County low-income families interested in the Food Stamp Program should contact Mrs. Helen Phelps, local caseworker with the Texas Department of Public Welfare. She is at the county courthouse in Silverton on Friday of each week, according to Lester Woods, welfare unit supervisor, Pampa. The program opened in Briscoe County on August 21.

Issuance of food stamps will be made on Friday of the first full week of each month and again during the third week.

In general, families eligible for the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Food Stamp Program include those who work for low wages, or receive public assistance or a small pension check, and who cook food at home. Food stamps cannot be used to pay for meals at restaurants, and are not used for imported foods or non-food items, such as soap, paper goods and liquor.

Food stamps give low-income families more food-buying power. For

example, a family of four with an income of \$155 a month will pay \$42 each month and receive food coupons worth \$106. The difference is made up by "bonus" coupons paid for by Federal funds.

Food stamps are used just like money at local grocery stores authorized by USDA's Food and Nutrition Service to accept them, and are redeemed at cooperating banks through the Federal Reserve System.
