## CATTLE ALMOST STAMPEDED WHEN FIRST DRIVEN TO RIM OF PALO DURO CANYON

When famed cattle baron Charles Goodnight brought his herd over a little rise in the Texas Panhandle in the 1870's, he almost had a stampede on his hands. The cattle were suddenly confronted by Palo Duro Canyon, and they panicked. In fact, the mules pulling the chuck wagon were so frightened that they nearly dumped the entire wagon, cook and all, into the 1,000-foot canyon.

Palo Duro Canyon, located 12 miles east of the City of Canyon, is indeed a spectacular site to behold after crossing mile after mile of the monotonous rolling plains of the Texas Panhandle.

The canyon is 120 miles long and is 40 miles wide at its mouth. Because of the canyon's breathtaking scenery and its colorful history, more than 15,000 acres of it have been made into a state park.

The canyon has been in the making for 90 million years through the action of wind and water on rock. At least four geologic ages or eras are exposed by the canyon's eroded formations.

Palo Duro, a Spanish term meaning "hard wood," refers to the canyon's supply of strong cedar (juniper) brush from which the Indians made their arrows.

Probably the first European to visit Palo Duro Canyon was Francisco Vasques de Coronado, who is generally believed to have been in the canyon in 1541.

The canyon was one of the last strongholds of the warlike Great Plains Indians until after 1874 when General Ranald Mackenzie defeated a large force of marauding Comanche Indians in the canyon, making it safe for permanent Anglo-American settlement.

The first rancher in Palo Duro Canyon was Goodnight, who, in partnership with John Adair of England, started the first cattle ranch in the canyon as well as the first ranch in the Texas Panhandle, the famous JA Ranch which is still in operation in part of the canyon.

The extraordinary terrain of the canyon is reason enough to visit Palo Duro Canyon State Park. It is, after all, a geological wonder.

But there is also a man-made attraction which has drawn visitors from all over the world. It is the outdoor stage production, "TEXAS," a musical drama depicting the early settlement of the canyon area.

"TEXAS" is held in an outdoor amphitheatre of natural stone. It is a drama of man's struggle with the elements while trying to settle the untamed portions of central and northern Texas. Since its beginning in 1961, success of the drama has been as spectacular as the country and history on which the story is based.

Pulitzer Prize winner Paul Green wrote the script, and the music was scored by Hollywood composer Isaac Van Grove. Some of the cast are students, some are housewives and many of the featured performers have professional backgrounds.

Lights playing against rugged canyon walls and special sound effects are used to heighten the drama's excitement. On stage a panorama of Panhandle history unfolds as settlers, cowboys and Indians play out the day-to-day conflicts of that colorful era.

A prairie fire rages and the settlers struggle against searing winds, dust storms and blizzards. Simple pleasures, such as hock-downs and "plum pickens," brighten the hard existence.

"TEXAS" is beginning its 12th year at the amphitheatre. Performances this year begin June 22 and run every day except Sunday through August 26.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN

that an election will be held in and throughout the City of Quitaque, Texas on the 17th day of June, 1972 on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said City, in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the City Council of said City, as follows, to-wit:

**AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF QUITAQUE, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.**

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore,

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF QUITAQUE:**

Section 1: That a special election shall be held in and throughout the city of Quitaque, Texas on the 17th day of June, 1972, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

CITY HALL  
Leon McCracken  
Presiding Judge  
Josie Johnston  
Alternate Presiding Judge

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two (2) clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Quitaque, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

That the election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said city, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the city not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the VALLEY TRIBUNE is a newspaper published within the City of Quitaque, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said city.





**\* HOME NOTES**

The "milk way" is the right way to good eating this June, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Milk and dairy products top the list of foods reported in especially good supply. Other plentiful foods on the June list of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service are broilers, eggs and split peas.

Milk shakes and other refreshing milk desserts and snack items are especially appealing during the warm-weather months. Vary your milk drinks by adding some favorite seasonal fruits in the mixing. Strawberries and peaches blend deliciously in shakes and other drinks.

★  
You may want to try "Rice Cream with Strawberries" for a special dessert idea. This recipe is especially good since the supplies of milk and dairy products are plentiful.

**RICE CREAM WITH STRAWBERRIES**  
2 cups whole milk  
1/4 cup uncooked rice  
2 teaspoons unflavored gelatin  
3 tablespoons sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 cup whipping cream  
1 cup fresh strawberries, sliced  
3 tablespoons sugar

1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
Heat milk in the top of a double boiler. Add rice and cover. Cook over boiling water, stirring occasionally, until rice is tender, about one hour. Mix gelatin, 3 tablespoons of the sugar and salt. Add to the rice mixture, mix thoroughly and cool.

Whip cream until stiff. Combine strawberries and 3 tablespoons of sugar. Fold strawberries, vanilla and whipped cream into rice mixture. Chill 1 1/2 to 2 hours, then serve. Makes six servings of about 3/4 cup each.

If you prefer, use 1 cup of sliced fresh peaches instead of strawberries and add 1/4 teaspoon almond extract.

I think all of us enjoy having sandwiches for our summer meals. You may want to fix this version of an egg sandwich for your family.

**CREAMY EGG SANDWICH FILLING**

3 hard-cooked eggs, finely chopped  
6 oz. chive-flavored cream cheese  
2 tablespoons mayonnaise  
1 teaspoon prepared mustard  
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
Combine all ingredients. Blend well and chill. Use 1/4 cup for each sandwich. Makes 1 1/2 cups of sandwich filling. (You can make your own chive-flavored cream cheese by adding fresh or freeze-dried chives.)

Those hot summer days are fast approaching and it's time to get air conditioning installed if you haven't already done so. The big question is determining what size cooling unit is needed.

W. S. Allen, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers a "rule of thumb" on selecting air conditioning.

"A common guide is to figure one ton of air conditioning for each 500 to 600 square feet of floor area in the home. And, depending on local electric rates, a one-ton unit will cost about two or three cents per hour to operate."

With this in mind, persons with an average size home of 1,250 square feet of floor space will need about two-and-a-half tons of air conditioning. Cost of operation will be about seven cents per hour.

"Do not use the rule of thumb as a firm guide in figuring sizes and costs," cautions the engineer. "The kind of home construction and location can cause requirements and costs to vary widely."

Allen suggests that homeowners carefully consider both the room unit and control-system unit when shopping for air conditioning. The cooling operation of both types is the same but conditions may make one a better selection than the other. Since several room units may be required to do an adequate job, the total cost should be studied carefully to insure the best possible equipment at the lowest cost.


