
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Science Eliminates Most Bandage Allergies

"It's bad enough to cut yourself accidentally, but you are in even more trouble when the bandage you apply causes an allergic reaction," said William O. Elson, medical research director of the Curity Division of the Kendall Company.

Most people are not aware, according to Elson, of the reason why some bandages create skin problems for many.

"But - in protecting the

The customary adhesive used for many years in all small bandages, and still used by many makers, is a combination of rubber and various resins. The skin may well be allergic to any one of these components - and the result may be a painful collection of tiny blisters and cracks in the outer layer of skin.

"No statistics are available."

"No statistics are available as to the percentage of people who are allergic to one or more of the substances used in standard adhesives," said Elson. "But we do know the figure is needlessly high because science has now created a new 'hypo-allergenic' adhesive."

The new adhesive, made by Curity scientists and researchers, is made of a single substance, under carefullycontrolled conditions. Chances of allergic-reaction to it are extremely small.

"But - in protecting the site of the wound - it is equally important that we don't make new problems for ourselves. One of the dangers to avoid is applying a bandage which will result in an allergic reaction. Another is injury to the scab which nature forms over the wound."

over the wound."

Protection against the latter is also now possible, according to Elson, as a result of the Curity laboratory's development of a plastic material called "telfa." It is a highly-absorbent, gauzecovered sheet of soft, pliable plastic, punctured with dozens of tiny holes engineered to permit the escape of fluids from the wound. In ordinary bandages, this fluid sticks to both the bandage and the scab, and often results in painful re-opening of the wound when the bandage is removed.

The ideal all-purpose ban-dage, according to Elson, has taken generations to develop. Only the march of modern science, and the resulting crea-tion of new materials and concepts, has finally made the perfect bandage possible.

GUIDELINES AIRED FOR HIRING YOUTH FOR FARM JOBS

nany farmers and ranchers will be hiring boys and girls to fill in for the critical labor shortage during the summer months. But be-fore employing such youth, certain requirements must be met under the Fair Labor Standerd Act as amended in 1966.

Employers must abide by the Agriculture and Child Labor Re-quirements when hiring youth under 16 years of age other than the owner's or operator's own chil-

This law states briefly that

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Many counties and many county agricultural agents in the area hired to operate or ride on trac-tors (over 20 belt horsepower) or are conducting such training pro self - unloading wagons or hoist prepare youngsters between the ages of 14 and 16 for summer vagons; operate or unclog combines, field balers, hay conditioners, forage harvesters, corn pickemployment. This training mainly involve rs, roughage blowers or crop dryers; operate post hole diggers of

power driven saws; or work inside farm machinery. Identification a gas-tight forage or grain encards are issued after successful closure or in a yard, pen or stall completion of the training pro gram, and employers should make sure that youngsters have these occupied by a dairy bull, boar or cards before hiring them. An employer can be fined up to \$10,000 These standards do not apply when a youngster under 16 is employed by his parents on a farm or operated by such parent. Also, those youth under 16 who have for willful violation of the Labor
