State Board of Insurance Issues Warnings About Possible Fraud

The State Board of Insurance has received reports that some insurance agents are falsely portraying themselves as Medicare representatives to gain entry into the homes of older Texans.

According to members of the bard's newly appointed Citizens Working Group on Medicare Sup-plement Insurance, the practice may be on the increase in the sale of such coverage. It is a violation of federal law

for an agent to say that he or she is from Medicare or another Federal governmental program. The prac-tice is a felony, with penalties of up to five years in prison and a \$25,000 fine for suc! m srepresentation

In addition, such conduct, if proven, could lead to revocation of an agent's license to sell insurance in Texas.

If a surviving spouse is at least 55 years old at the time of death of the person receiving the exemption, ad valorem public school taxes could not be increased as long as the homestead remained the residence homestead of the sur-viving spouse.

Consumers are urged to report agents who try to sell them Medicare Supplement policies after saying they are from the government.
