The Arrest, Search and Seizure class is scheduled 5-9 p.m. August 23-25 and August 29-31 in the SPC Petroleum Technology-Law En-forcement Building, room 115. Registration deadline is noon August 22. There will be a small fee charged.

The course will cover the exceptions to search warrant require ments, warrantless searches of vehicles, habitations and persons and will present developmental ideas on probable cause to search seize and arrest. Students will learn when to arrrest and when a search can be conducted in relationship to

Instructors are law enforcement personnel. The course is required for intermediate certification and meets Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and

Education standards for credit.
The ASP Baton Training and
Chemical Disbursements class will meet 5-11 p.m. August 29-31 and Sept. 1 in the same location. Signup deadline is noon August 28. A small fee will be charged.

FmHA County Supervisor, Ross W. James, outlines the availability of RH program funds in Swisher

and Briscoe Counties.
"The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has numerous rural housing programs" according to James. FmHA has programs for new construction, purchase of existing dwelling and/or home repair and improvement assistance. "The agency's main concern," according to James, "is to meet the housing needs of the moderate to low income people. While FmHA can make loans for new construction, the majority of the Tulia Office Loans have been for existing houses." Mr James stressed that his office would be available to discuss new construction also, with anyone interested.

502 Program most commolnly

used. FmHA has two home ownership programs under which an individual may apply. The 502 housing program has been FmHA's most commonly used program. "Under this program, you can do anything from replacing storm doors to fi nancing new construction," according to the county supervisor. "This program is geared to the low and very low income individual. Normally, loans are scheduled for repayment over a period of 33 years with an appraisal and title work

required."

The program's present rate of interest is eight percent (8%) fixed rate with an interest subsidy available for those that qualify. Interest may be subsidized down to as low as one percent (1%) based on the familv's annual income. "This means. in many cases, that one's house payment with taxes and insurance would be less than what they are presently paying for rent," James said. "This provides a way for low and very low income people to be able to have a home and enjoy home ownership.





Texas State law requires drivers on the same roadway as a school bus that is stopped to load or unload students, to also stop until the school bus driver has turned off the flashing red lights. This law applies unless the vehicle is separated from the bus by a divided highway with a median strip.

Just because most of the children will be in school, we must not forget the preschoolers who will still be playing in the residential area. Remember, drive as if you had a child in and around school areas--because someone has!

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
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
