Rural Housing Program Available

| FmHA County Supervisor, Ross W. James, outlines the availability of RH program funds in Swisher and Briscoe Counties. <br> "The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has numerous rural James. FmHA has programs for new construction, purchase of existing dwelling and/or home repair and improvement assistance. "The agency's main concern," according to James, "is to meet the housing needs of the moderate to low i come people. While FmHA canmake loans for new construction, the majority of the rulia Office Loans Jamesstressed that his office would be available to discuss new construction also, with anyone interested. <br> 502 Program most commolnly <br> $\frac{\text { used. }}{\text { Fm }}$ <br> FmHA has two home ownership ual may apply. The 502 housing program has been FmHA's most commonly used program. "Under this program, you can do anything from replacing storm doors to fi- nancing new construction," according to the county supervisor. "This program is geared to the low and very low income individual. Normally, loans are scheduled for re- payment over a period of 33 years with an appraisal and title work required." <br> The program s present rate of interest is eight percent ( $8 \%$ ) fixed rate with an interest subsidy available for those that qualify. Interest may be subsidized down to as one percent ( $1 \%$ ) based on the family's annual income. "This means, in many cases, that one's house would be less than what insurance presently paying for rent," James said. "This provides a way for low and very low income people to be able to have a home and enjoy home <br> The maximum income guidelines for the 502 program are: <br> 1 person household $\$ 16,050.00$ <br> 2 person household $\$ 18,350.00$ <br> 3 person household $\$ 20,650.00$ 4 person hourenold $\$ 22,950.00$ <br> 5 person household $\$ 24,000.00$ <br> 6 person hoasehold $\$ 26,650.00$ | Also under this program, a re- pair loan is available. Interest for the repair loan is $1 \%$ for adjusted income of less than $\$ 5,000.00 ; 2 \%$ for income from $\$ 5,000.00$ to $\$ 7,500.00$ to $\$ 10,000.00$. <br> Guaranteed Rural Housing Loan <br> Program <br> The second program, which is comparatively new, is the Guaranteed Rural Housing Loan Program. moderate income households. The current maximum income guide lines for this program are as follows: <br> 1 person household $\$ 23,100.00$ <br> 2 person household $\$ 26,400.00$ <br> 3 person household $\$ 29,700.00$ <br> 4 person household $\$ 33,000.00$ <br> 5 person household $\$ 29,700.00$ <br> 6 person household $\$ 38,250.00$. <br> "There are adjusted income lev- <br> els" James says. "To determine your adjusted annual income, count your gross income, less $\$ 480.00$ per child necessary for employment and/or $\$ 400.00$ if one or more of the household is 62 years of age or older There are often minor decuctions which are allowable in some cases." <br> The loan can be possibly made on any size or type of dwelling. However, it must be modest in size, cost and design and in good repair, or be brought to good repair with loan funds. The loan is a thirty ( 30 ) year fixed rate with the loan based on Fannie Mae, ninety day rate. <br> All the banks in Swisher and Briscoe Counties have shown interest in participating in the program, according to James. "The main benefit of this program over conventional and FmHA mortage loans is a lower down payment.
