Safety For Our School Children

The Texas Department of Public Safety State Troopers are asking all drivers to begin thinking about the safety of our school children as the beginning of a new school year commences.

"The first few weeks of school are the most dangerous," said Trooper L. B. Snider of the Texas Department of Public Safety. "Many youngsters are attending school for the first time and others might be going to a different school where they are unfamiliar with local traffic conditions."

Another problem is that during the summer vacation some drivers have gotten out of the habit of being alert for both school zones and school buses. "Every year there appears to be an unnecessary rash of accidents caused by drivers who fail to follow safe driving habits for a stopped school bus," Snider stated.

Texas State law requires drivers on the same roadway as a school bus that is stopped to load or unload students, to also stop until the school bus driver has turned off the flashing red lights. This law applies unless the vehicle is separated from the bus by a divided highway with a median strip.

Just because most of the children will be in school, we must not forget the preschoolers who will still be playing in the residential area. Remember, drive as if you had a child in and around school areas--because someone has!

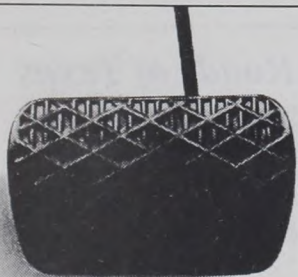

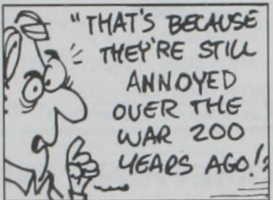
