

ESSEX BREAKS TIME RECORD

STOCK ESSEX MAKES ROUND TRIP TO RISING STAR FROM CISCO IN 72 MINUTES FLAT.

Seventy-two minutes actual running time over rough roads from Cisco to Rising Star, a total distance of 44 miles. This is the record made Thursday by an Essex stock car, driven by Byron Brown of this city. In the car with Brown were two passengers who were witnesses to the city-to-city test, both of whom had watches, and both of whom kept accurate time on the run. The car left Cisco city limits at 5:08 and arrived in Rising Star in front of the Rising Star X-Ray printing office at 5:50, five minutes being deducted from this when a screw worked loose from the brake and a stop had to be made to replace it. On the return trip the Essex crossed the Katy tracks at Rising Star at 5:45 promptly and arrived at the city limits of Cisco at 6:20, the return trip being made in exactly 35 minutes, and the trip to Rising Star being made in 37 minutes, making the actual running time for the entire trip 72 minutes. This stock Essex took every rough spot, every sandy stretch and every hill without losing speed. Thrown into second in the heavy sandy places, this light car pulled ahead without losing any of the speed. This test was made here as a part of the general tests which are being made throughout the United States this week. Many records have been broken like this trip from Cisco to Rising Star. An average of fifty miles an hour was made from San Antonio to Medina over very bad roads. In a reliability run over the Sierra Mountains in Sacramento, an average of 24.4 miles was made to a gallon of gasoline. The Essex in a time trial made 80 miles in 85 minutes from Buffalo to Rochester, N. Y., the fastest train time being 84 minutes, and the train route is 11 miles shorter. This popular car also broke all records in rim of world hill climbing, making 8.8-10 miles in 17 minutes, 23 seconds.

420,000 Texas School Children Enrolled in Modern Health Crusade

AUSTIN, Tex., July 2.—More than 420,000 Texas school children are included in the total of 6,000,000 children of the United States enrolled in the modern health crusade movement, which began in 1913, according to a statement of the Texas Public Health Association. In 1919 more than \$125,000 worth of supplies were sent out from the office of the National Tuberculosis Association, which, the report stated, is the national headquarters for the wide-spread health movement among children. "The modern health crusade was developed," said Miss Winnie I. Bracy of the Texas Public Health Association, "to make the tasks of cleanliness and hygiene into romance and play. By making the children pages, quizzes and knights, they forget that they are doing health tasks and perform them willingly as a part of the game of 'health knighthood.' "We hope to make the modern health crusade a part of the curriculum in every school in Texas. In two states and a number of counties the crusade has been officially recognized as a part of the course of study for public schools."

OIL ACTIVITY IN AND AROUND CRYSTAL FALLS SPREADING

CRYSTAL FALLS, Tex., July 2.—This city does not believe that Italy's offer to take all available American coal at \$50 a ton will cause it to go coalless this winter, even if natural gas in unmeasurable quantities could not be secured, for the entire Crystal Falls country is underlaid with a deep strata of coal, pronounced as good as any that comes from the Thurber mines. There is such an abundance of coal in this region that in many places it crops out of the hills, in the small branches and even in the bottom of Clear Fork river. Many years ago the Jack Wiser mine east of town was worked for fuel, which was used in gins, mills and burned in homes throughout Stephens county. The Sloan mines were also worked. Nearly all the fuel used by the county at the court house and in its other branches came from the improvisedly worked mines in the Crystal Falls territory. However, the mines were abandoned several years ago because of the roughness of roads and the facility with which coal could be obtained from Thurber by rail. It was stated to a representative of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that seventeen feet strata of coal were found at a depth of 399 to 315 feet in all of the more than 50 wells which are being drilled or have been drilled in this territory, thereby indicating the richness and extent of this great coal field, from which no coal is now being taken, except by a few local families to keep them comfortable during the winter days. The coal fields of this section in time will become one of the greatest assets of this section. Development will come with the railroads which are now projected toward this region. The coal mines will probably be more extensive than any others in the Southwest. In fact, it is believed this entire country is one vast coal reserve.

Navy Has Temporary Recruiting Office in the City Hall Here

The navy has opened a recruiting office, to continue for a period of about two weeks, at Cisco, located in the City Hall. Chief Gunner's Mate H. Hillyard is in charge of the recruiting work here. Ambitious young men of good character and who can pass the required physical examination are now desired for service in the United States navy, ages 17 to 35. The navy now offers many inducements in the way of excellent training and an opportunity to learn or finish any one of 55 trades. Also the recent increase in pay is stimulating recruiting, and is worthy of much consideration by any one contemplating enlisting in this branch of the government's service. The present pay in the navy compares favorably with wages being paid in civilian employment. The local recruiting officers inform us that they will gladly furnish upon application any other information desired by prospective applicants.

Convicts of Kansas Make Enough Twine for Wheat Harvest

TOPEKA, Kans., July 2.—The bindery twine plant at the Kansas state penitentiary at Lansing has manufactured 2,000,000 pounds of twine for the current harvest, the entire amount having been distributed to farmers and farmers' organizations. It is estimated that Kansas farmers will use this year 25,000,000 pounds of bindery twine, principally on the wheat crop. It will cost the farmers much less to bind their wheat this year than last. As compared with price, around 21 cents last year, the convict-made twine, which is sold for less than the current market price, this year brought 14.5 cents a pound, net, in small lots, and 14.25 cents in carlots.

WILL BUILD INTERURBAN FROM HOUSTON TO SHORE

HOUSTON, Tex., July 2.—Articles of incorporation of a company which proposes to build an interurban line from Houston to the bay shore were recently filed at Austin with the secretary of state. The company, which is capitalized for \$300,000, proposes to extend its line along the ship channel and estimates that it will be able to relieve the railroads between Galveston and Houston of considerable freight.

CHINESE BANDITS SCATTER MAIL TO WINDS IN ROBBERY

CHENG TU, China, July 2.—Depredations of robber bands along trade routes in Szechuen province have become so flagrant and widespread that urgent appeals for the use of troops to combat the menace have been sent to the Chinese provincial authorities by foreign firms operating in Szechuen. The bands of robbers are said to be made up to a large extent of groups of deserters from troops that have been stationed in Szechuen. The outlaws have become so bold that mail consignments, hitherto immune from them, have been seized.

One recent report that was brought to Chengtu was of the robbery of a pack train on the "big road," which is the main highway between Chungking and Chengtu. In this 40 bags of mail were opened and rifled by the outlaws and "the whole hillside was covered with stolen mail."

In another case a caravan had been held up and robbed by a band of bandits when a second stronger band of brigands appeared and compelled the return of the stolen goods. The leader of the smaller band was then shot. The shieftain who did this declared that he had guaranteed the safe passage of this particular caravan, having received a substantial consideration.

The activities of the bandits are felt as much by the individual as by the large commercial interests, in the opinion of one Chengtu mission worker, who said:

"It is a grievous hardship to send to America for a suit of clothes, pay for it at the present ruinous prices, wait patiently six months for its arrival, and finally hear that it has been appropriated by robbers within a few days of its destination."

Indian Witnesses Say They Were Coerced In Jenkins Controversy

MEXICO CITY, July 2.—Several Indians who are being examined with regard to their previous testimony in the case of William O. Jenkins, former American consular agent at Puebla, testified today that they were suspended in the air and threatened with death by shooting until they agreed to testify against Jenkins, according to a Puebla dispatch to El Universal.

Jenkins, it will be recalled, was kidnaped later and charged with complicity in his own capture.

LEERAY PLANNING TO SECURE ELECTRIC LIGHTING PLANT

LEERAY, Tex., July 2.—The Leeray Chamber of Commerce is considering the establishment of an electric lighting plant, to furnish the people of this place with adequate lighting facilities. This matter was the subject of discussion at the meeting held Wednesday night. Decision still pending.

The chamber adopted a budget system for the financing of the organization, instead of flat membership rates. The present revenue is nearing \$1000 a month, under a joint system of membership fees and voluntary contributions in the list of which the largest subscribers is the Leeray Townsite Company.

Messrs. Robert Q. Lee, Walter Ray and Judge J. J. Butts, founders of Leeray, presented lot 5, block 30 of Leeray townsite, to Miss Norma Leeray Gunter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. Gunter, Tuesday. The recipient is only two weeks old, having been the first child to be born here. A nice letter accompanied the deed, transferring the lot to the healthy little mis who was named for the town.

Mrs. Anna Miller of Ranger was a visitor here Wednesday. She and her associates are interested in establishing a business here. The number attracted to Leeray for similar purposes has become so great that the Cisco & Northeastern Railroad has added an extra passenger coach to the daily passenger service between Cisco and the new town. The railroad has also agreed to carry express matter to Leeray, on delivery of the same to that road at Cisco. Consignees are requested to advise the express agents at Cisco when they wish express packages so forwarded, to save delay.

Cement sidewalks are being laid in the block of which the premises of the F. & M. Bank is the corner, in Arizona Heights. This is the first permanent building item in the short history of Leeray. Extensive improvements of like character are being contracted for.

This new industry will be steamed up within a week.

PEOPLE STAND FOR DAYS IN GREAT MADRID BREAD LINE

MADRID, June 30.—The sun prevented what threatened to be a serious outbreak in Madrid during the recent bakers' strike. The first two days of the bread scarcity were dull and threatening and the hungry poor were so affected by the lowering skies and the lack of food that they paraded the streets in groups uttering shouts and menacing storekeepers who kept their establishments open.

On the third day the sun shone and although still hungry and compelled to wait indefinite hours for the loaves to be doled out, the people did so patiently and even cheerfully.

All kinds of laws and police regulations were broken by the men, women and children forming the almost endless bread lines, but the authorities took a lenient view of what occurred.

When an old man brought a camp bedstead, set it up on the sidewalk and stretched himself on it, a policeman arrested him and led him to the station house with his bed. The police captain first looked grave, then began to laugh when the offender explained he knew he might have to wait anything from 12 to 20 hours for his bread and had merely provided against fatigue. He was released and returned to his place in the line with his bed amid the applause of the crowd.

Another group hired a barrel organ whose owner played popular melodies while the people waiting with grating appetites and hollow stomachs danced merrily. On the Calle de la Magdalena a cobbler arrived carrying a stool, his tools and a pair of shoes, which he was able to sole and heel before his turn came to obtain a loaf.

Similar scenes were enacted day after day amid general hilarity until the municipal authorities decided to break up the big bread lines by distributing loaves from a larger number of centers. The danger was then over.

Chinese Competing With Japanese for Shantung Commerce

TSINAN, Shantung Province, China, June 30.—While the Shantung problem remains unsolved and the Japanese occupation of areas Germany formerly controlled continues, a means to oppose the Japanese has been worked out along economic lines by Ch'u Ying-kuang, civil governor of the province.
Ch'u Ying-kuang, who has come to be regarded by foreigners of the Far East as one of China's greatest administrative figures, has launched the daring project of building within Shantung a great system of highways to be used by an automobile truck service in connecting all important centers. As a corollary, he plans to deepen and improve waterways so that these roads and streams will afford to Chinese of the province a transportation system that will place them on an equal footing with the Japanese who now control channels of communication.

Under the direction of T'ang En-han, a graduate of Purdue University, who has been made director of the newly created bureau of roads and waterways in Shantung, active surveying work in connection with the project has been started out of Tsinan and present plans contemplate the building of 1600 miles of highways and the deepening of the Hsiao Ch'ing River. The purpose is to weave all important cities of the province into a unified transportation system.

Under existing conditions many of these cities, as for example the port of Chefoo, are hamstrung economically by the lack of adequate transportation facilities. The Chinese hope the plan will break the backbone of Japan's economic domination in Shantung.

Governor Ch'u's proposed motor road system touches the sea at three points, Lung K'ou, Chefoo and Hai Yang and connects with the Tienstin and Pukow railroads at a point not yet determined. The whole road system is made up of seven trunk highways connected by 10 branch highways.

A scheme of financing to carry out the big project by which funds to do the work will be supplied in part by merchants, land owners and others to be benefited and in part by the provincial government, according to official announcement, has received widespread endorsement throughout the province.

A tri-weekly aerial service for passengers and freight has been established between London and Amsterdam. The journey of 260 miles is made in two hours and three-quarters.

CHILE NOW ABLE TO MARKET NITRATE AND SODA EASILY

SANTIAGO, Chile, June 30.—The critical situation created to the main industry of Chile has been considerably bettered this year, and the Nitrate producers' association has exported already 95,000 tons of nitrate against a production of only 55,000 tons, which means that most of the surplus that could not be placed last year has found an easy market. The price of nitrate of soda has also increased considerably.

The prosperity of this industry means for Chile solid financial situation of the government, abundance of work for laborers and general welfare of the country. The reverse was experienced last year when there was no market for nitrate.

Completing Farwell Highway.

Tennis Is Great Game for Women and Girls

Court Contests Are Not for Soft-Handed, However, But Can Be Made as Exerting as Football or Boxing

TENNIS is one of the most beneficial games played by men and women. Its great virtue lies in the fact that it may be played in the back yard, on the lot next door, indoors, on the roof, anywhere you can find space 30 by 40 feet. Playing tennis is one of the best exercises known. It is the fashion to consider it a "girl's game." It is a great game for girls. Not in the sense that the term is used, that it is a "sissy" game. Far from it. No game calls for more enduring qualities and higher physical condition than tennis. A boxing match, a boat race, a wrestling match, a running match, is over in a few minutes. A player may obtain rests during a football game. At most these games last but an hour or so. A tennis match between evenly matched players may take five, six, seven or even eight hours to decide. It is usually played under a hot sun. You must respond when an opponent presses. He hits the ball. You have no recourse but to return, or miss, the stroke. I have seen tennis players endure more punishment through hard and exhausting play on a clay court, under a hot sun, than I have ever seen pugilists endure in the ring.

Exercise in Short Time.

Physical exercise is most desirable. You can get all the physical exercise you need for a day by playing tennis for twenty minutes. You do not have to take a long ride to the tennis court. It may be next door on your own lot. You can step out of your door onto your tennis court. You need no special clubhouses and bathrooms. The home and the home bathroom will do. You have all your change of clothes at hand. In all tennis affords the man or woman boy or girl who must have good exercise, the greatest facilities in the world for obtaining it.

Golf requires a big club, organization, time. Baseball requires a large lot, and the co-operation of at least twenty boys. Golf requires professional instruction and long study and incessant practice. Tennis requires less instruction, less money, less time than almost any other game. And it may be played by both men and women. Girls can not play baseball, football or most of the great competitive games of men. Not even basketball with the boys. But girls can hold their own at tennis with the boys. A good woman player can beat an average man at tennis. The women champions can beat men of more than average playing ability. Young boys and girls attain great skill at tennis. A boy or girl of 16 is capable of holding his own, or her own, with the very best of

the seniors. Men of sixty can play very good tennis when they keep in condition. Though tennis is a young man's or young woman's game, there have been champions at 40. William A. Larned, American champion for many years, held that honor after he had reached the 40-year mark. Norman Brookes, the great Australian player is one of the present doubles championship team at 43. Thus it will be seen that tennis is a game for both sexes and for all ages. Its equipment can be obtained for very little expenditure. A racquet, a ball and a net will start you playing tennis. That means an initial expenditure of little more than \$10. The net will endure for years. Balls endure for many games. As far as expense goes no game can approach tennis. A golf outfit will cost \$50. Membership in a club

will cost at least \$50 more. Golf requires much leisure time to play. As golf courses are usually out of town you must have an automobile to get to and from them. But if you have a tennis court in your neighborhood, you do not even have to pay car fare to play. All you need is a racquet, your share in the price of a ball, 20 cents, and you are ready to play. Play hard for twenty minutes and you have your quota of exercise for the day. Tennis was once regarded as the game of the aristocracy. It is really the most democratic of all games.

Need Personal Instruction. Tennis may be played by two, three or four persons. In "singles" one person opposes another. In "doubles" two persons oppose two others. In a trio one person plays against two persons. The great object of the game of tennis is, of course, to keep the ball in play until you can put it where your opponent can not return it. This, of course, means that to play good tennis and to get some personal satisfaction of doing a job well you must start right. If there is a good amateur or professional about take some lessons from them. A girl especially needs personal instruction. She is not so accustomed to playing ball games as her brothers, who, in some way or another have practiced some of the many ball games, such as baseball, football, billiards, pool, etc., all of which help the boys in other ball games. A girl must make more of an effort to understand a ball game than a boy.

claim that instruction tends to make a player all style and no play. There are players who are more stylish than great. Just the same it is not easy to become a good player in any game unless one has style, mis-called "form" among many Americans. Style means doing the right thing in the easiest and most effective way. The easiest way is also the most effective. Take two players: one does things easily, in style; the other does things, but does them with vast exertion. Clearly staying power and all other things being equal, the stylish, that is, the easiest player, will win. Style is important for it means grace, ease, effectiveness. Without a good fundamental style a player can not hope to become great. Few players start to play good without taking lessons. There is just as much reason why a player should take tennis lessons as there is that he or she should take golf lessons. There are just as many different strokes in tennis as in golf. A knowledge of style, of the fundamentals, will help a player greatly when he is out of form. A player who knows the proper strokes and how they should be made will know at once what is wrong when he plays badly. A girl who knows the game can put herself back on her best game, while a girl who does not know the fundamentals will have to stagger on without light until luck or some other thing puts her back on her game.

Requires Quick Action. Some players are, as the iconoclasts say, "all form and no play." That means that they studied form only and did not carry their game far enough to play it well. At worst such a player has one virtue, all other players will be glad to play with or against him, where they will avoid a formidable player who may be a fair executant. It is the custom to criticize and "knock" beginners for being all form and no play. They are just learning the game. So it is unfair to pick flaws in them. One thing is quite certain. The player who starts out to learn the fundamentals of the game, the proper strokes and the reason why they are the proper strokes has and will have a vast advantage over the player who, like the ignorant musician who plays by ear, "begins with tunes" instead of learning the scales. What musician who played only by ear has become great? So it is with tennis or any other game or business. To become proficient at it a player must understand the theory and style of the game. Fortified in this manner he or she can confidently proceed to learn to execute the strokes.

A thoroughly informed professional is the best teacher. A good amateur may make a good instructor. Any player who will serve certain balls to a beginner and repeat and repeat the service in the desired spot should be a welcome instructor. But most tennis players must learn for themselves. The game is played in small towns and villages, at country farmhouses where there are no professionals and very few amateurs. The self-taught player has one vast advantage. He must concentrate all his thought on the game and work out its problems alone. The boy or girl who works his or her way through school or college usually excels the boy or girl who has his or her way paid through college by an indulgent family. The self-taught must struggle hard to acquire knowledge must seek out, prepare, serve, masticate, swallow and digest every atom of it. The student who has tutors and coaches has his mental food predigested for him and fed him with a golden spoon. Such food does not nourish as well as the food that is savored by the hard work done to earn it.

Watch Good Players.

Ease of acquisition is the greatest enemy of success. The man who finds all things easy for him, who learns easily and performs with ease, rarely becomes champion at anything. His talent assures him a certain amount of success, quite as much success as that attained by the average man who must labor hard to attain his ends. Genius for hard labor rarely goes with capacity for easy performance. When you find capacity for performance coupled with industry and diligence you have a great success. So while a little professional or high-class amateur instruction is good a boy or girl can learn to play good tennis by reading the best books on the game. By reading good books on tennis and by, if possible, watching the great players make some strokes, play a match, or two, a beginner can learn to play very good tennis. Capacity for practice, patience and determination to learn at any cost are of the greatest importance. A third-rate player who has a genius for study and hard work will beat a first-rate player who depends upon natural ability and will not practice or train.

CROPS AND STOCK IN FOARD COUNTY ESTIMATED AS GREAT

CROWELL, Tex., July 2—The estimated production of farm crops for Foard county for 1919 and 1920, as furnished today to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is as follows:

Wheat 1,200,000 bushels and 1,000,000 bushels; oats 120,000 bushels and 180,000 bushels; corn 6000 bushels and 8000 bushels; maize 2500 tons and 2500 tons; cotton 2000 bales and 20,000 bales. The first of each series of figures is for 1919 and the second 1920.

There are 402,000 acres in Foard county with only 120,000 acres in cultivation. Over 120,000 acres in fallow this year due to lack of labor to work the land. All this land is susceptible to cultivation at small expense.

The raising of registered live stock in Foard county is one of the principal vocations. There are at least ten registered hog breeders in the county and as many registered cattle breeders.
