FORT WORTH, July 29.—In the grip of probably the worst drouth in the history of the state, conditions in a vast area extending from central Texas to a point near the gulf, are rapidly reaching a crisis, it was learned through a survey by the International News service today. With feed crops practically lost, and range grass killed by the scorching winds, starving herds are being driven to more fertile pastures, as lawmakers of the state and national assemblies join in a fight for lower rail rates on incoming feedstuffs for cattle. The surplus unemployed is adding to the worries of officials, and attempts are being made to place them in highway building crews.

BRECKENRIDGE OIL COMPANIES FORM MERGER

BRECKENRIDGE, July 29.—Amalgamation and reorganization of five different companies under the name of the Robert Oil corporation has just been completed. The new company is a closed corporation with \$150,000 capital stock, none of which will be offered for sale. It consists of the assets of the Rosell company, the Welch & Harvey company, the Rosell Production company, the Welch & Thomas Trustee company, and Jack Robert's personal oil interests. At a meeting of the stockholders of the company, J. E. Hickman and G. O. Bateman were elected as a board of directors, and Jack Robert was elected president. J. E. Hickman vice president and John L. Kelly, secretary and treasurer.

The company will start business with a settled production of approximately 500 barrels per day, and proven acreage in the Olden shallow field an din the Brown Bend field. A development program including the drilling of from 10 to 30 wells has been planned to be carried out within the next 30 days. J. F. Collier of the accounting firm of Bell & Collier of Dallas, is in Breckenridge helping with the reorganization of the firm.

RUM SHIP CAPTURED AFTER LOSING CARGO

NEW YORK, July 29.—The 2,000 ton steamship Augusta was captured by custom officers in the Hudson river off Dyckman street today after the rum blockade and her crew under the ship had run the gauntlet or loaded and disposed of a cargo of liquor worth \$250,000, leaving only 15 bottles aboard. The crew of 24 men was arrested and the captain admitted having turned the liquor cargo over to "retailers" for distribution.

Disch, Baseball Coach, Is Released By Southern Methodist University in a Letter Enclosing Uncashed U. Check

ONE YEAR RULE WILL NOT BREAK 1925 LOBO LINE

Coach Chapman, Lobo coach, will take special training at Knute Rockne's coaching school at Austin during August to get the new methods in handling the Lobos during the coming football season. Chapman studied under Rockne last year at Notre Dame, and put into play the Rockne methods in handling the Lobos, carrying his team into the state semi-finals undisputed.

Commenting on the Lobo prospects for the coming season, Chapman stated that his problem will be to develop a back field. His entire back field was lost by graduation. Wilson, Chigger Browne, Fields, Morse and McCrea were all lost. He has a nucleus in Petty, reserve quarterback, and Huestis, Lobo Pup half, who showed promise. He is also considering shifting Alsabrook and Couch, linemen of last year, into the back field positions, with Honk Irving to be called back for punting and line plays.

The Lobo line prospects, he said, were good, with Grist, Irving and Fielder to build around in case Couch and Alsabrook are shifted back. Howard Brown, reserve tackle of last year, and Purvis, a new man, are counted on to strengthen the line, and McCord, left tackle of 1924 is expected to return. The one-year rule if passed will have little effect on the Loboes this year, he stated, and might prove a benefit, in as much as one star player of Cisco will be forced to return to Cisco from another city where his parents have moved.

DALLAS, July 29.—William J. Disch, baseball coach at the Texas university, was officially released from his five year contract with the Southern Methodist university here today in a letter from the president of that institution. This is the final episode in the dispute between Disch and Theo. Bellmont, athletic director at the Texas university, which caused the veteran coach to resign and sign later with S. M. U. Differences between the two have been patched up. The university is said to have sent a blank check to the S. M. U. asking that it be filled out for any amount necessary to obtain Disch's release. The check was returned.

FUNERAL TRAIN BEARING BRYAN LEAVES DAYTON

DAYTON, Tenn., July 29.—William Jennings Bryan, the commoner, probably the most loved man who ever sojourned in this little town, left this morning just three weeks from the day he arrived, healthy and vigorous, to prosecute John Thomas Scopes for teaching evolution. His body was carried out of the now famous Dayton, the local train to Chattanooga pulled out soon after breakfast. Hundreds stood on the platform to see the casket lifted into the coach. Two special coaches were attached to the train, one bearing the flag draped casket and sorrowing relatives, while the other carrying newspaper men with whom the commoner had bandied words so often during the Scopes trial.

TUESDAY RAIN WAS GENERAL IN CISCO COUNTRY

The rain Tuesday afternoon was greatly appreciated, and unlike showers that have fallen this summer, was more general in its distribution. The precipitation, perhaps heaviest to the southwest and east, though most of the county surrounding Cisco was benefited. Parties coming in from the west stated that there was a good rain from three miles east of Putnam to Cisco. John Livingston, who lives six miles out on the Scranton road, reports one and one-half inches of rainfall at his place. Link Huntington stated that this was the heaviest rain he has had since spring. A rain fell at his place about five miles north of Cisco, but he stated that the rain was heavier around Moran. Joe Allen of the Nimrod community where they had a nice shower, while reports from the south and east are that the rain was somewhat partial, though most of the country was benefited.

The Lake Bernie watershed secured a heavier rain than did Cisco, proper, and Superintendent Scott of the water department says that the gauge today shows six inches of additional water in that lake.

PEONAGE IN PHILIPPINES CHARGE MADE

MANILA, P. I., July 29.—The Filipino labor party today appealed to Governor General Leonard Wood against the "existing semi-feudalistic system of labor in the Philippines which keeps Filipino laborers in a state of slavery." The labor bureau officials denied there was any slavery in the islands.

and south of Cisco of which these two wells are but the initial development. It is predicted by some of the best oil men that the east and south Cisco fields respond handsomely when that terrain is developed.

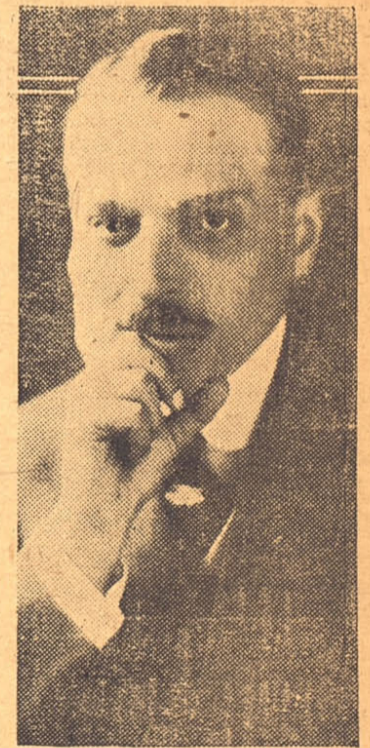

Another deep test in the Cisco field that has encountered rough seas in its development is the Leveridge, six miles southwest of Cisco. After a siege of forty days fishing job at 1200 feet, the rig has been skidded and a new well just spudded in.

of baby; running around; roller skating; marking pavement with chalk; pavement checkers; gathering wood; playing with doll; building fire; playing with old tire; sweeping street; stoop ball; selling papers; buying candy at stand; newspaper fight; playing cards; playing on cellar door; bootblack; watching motorcycle; hop scotch; playing with dog; hitching on to autos; basketball; pass ball; hoop rolling; fencing with sticks; tip cat; riding hobby horse; climbing fence.

All of this was going on in the streets because this particular neighborhood was inadequately supplied with suitable play places. Three children had been killed within that area in the preceding year and 75 had been injured to such an extent as to bring them into police records.

Play is necessary to normal childhood, and playgrounds are consequently necessary to growing cities. Smaller, younger, growing communities should plan in time and save the area their children need for play before densely built-up districts and high real estate values complicate the problem.

HUCKLEBERRY PIE

A New York paper recently turned its guns upon a neglected public issue and eloquently lamented the "deterioration of huckleberry pie." There was no such huckleberry pie as there used to be, the editor averred, and he wanted to know why.

"The crust," he lamented, "is no longer thin, but thick, the berries have cornstarch added to them, so the juice curdles into a pasty jelly. No longer is service in soup plates, and no longer do we add cream. The dark purple blobs on the crust are a thing of the past. How long shall we stand this outrage?"

Against this accusation has arisen no less personage than Oscar, chef of the Waldorf-Astoria, who brought to an inquiring reporter a huge, thick segment of huckleberry pie and all purple with juice, saying:

"Look at it! Behold one of man's greatest handi-works. Can anyone say man has descended from a lower order of animals when he makes a pie like that? Is this pie guilty of deterioration? I ask you. A thousand years it takes to make such a masterpiece—a thousand years of culinary evolution. Look at the thin, flaky, purple-blobbed crust! Behold the cream so thick that the pie floats in it! It is as good as it ever was."

At least, this is what the reporter said that Oscar said, after the reporter had eaten the evidence. And very likely it is even so. In the interest of the noble science of American pie-making—or is it a religion?—the press and public would like to hear more on this matter.

RADIO PLAYS

The writing of plays for radio broadcasting is different from ordinary dramatic composition. A British authority on the subject asserts that a short play lasting not more than 20 minutes makes the greatest appeal to the public. That is as long a time as the audience cares to follow a play the action of which it cannot see. Plays may be longer if they are broken by musical effects consistent with the plot.

Voice and delivery are of great importance in presenting a radio play. Many successful stage actors find it difficult to put across a radio performance in which voice inflection alone must carry all the acting while gestures, movement and facial expression are entirely lost to the audience.

Because the radio drama calls for a rather special technique and a suitable "radio voice," a group of actors has been formed in London, known as the Radio Repertory Players. They have gone on tour with great success.

The movie scenario deals primarily with action which can be told in pictures without the voice. The radio scenario must embody a plot which can be made interesting and dramatic through the voice and words. The legitimate stage remains greater than both.

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FRANCE QUITTING THE RUHR

France is keeping her promise to evacuate the Ruhr. This, in turn, comes from the fulfillment of German pledges.

The Allies agreed to withdraw from the Ruhr by August 16, provided Germany faithfully lived up to the requirements of the Dawes plan and the London agreement of 1924. Germany so far has carried out her obligations according to program, so France and Belgium are withdrawing already from city after city, leaving only a few "political police" behind them, at a rate which will mean the restoration of the whole district to Germany by the appointed date.

The Belgian troops are returning home, most of them to resume private life and industrial work. The French troops are going to Africa to help subdue Abd-el Krim and his doughty Riffs. Both countries are almost as glad to get their troops out of Germany as Germany is to get rid of them. But let that fact not obscure the significant fact that for the first time since the war, Germany and France have really agreed upon something and carried it out. This fact marks a good beginning of a new epoch in Europe.

ROOM TO PLAY

On a Saturday afternoon last March a survey was made of all the streets on a certain East Side district of New York for the purpose of finding out something about child life on the streets of a great city. There were enough canvassers so that all streets were observed simultaneously. Of 3,078 children found on the streets, 2,178 appeared to be between the ages of five and fifteen years. The list of miscellaneous activities that occupied them suggests an interesting picture.

Three Things Parents Can Do

3. Enlist the interest of other parents. Whenever practical band together, so as to work unitedly for clean and wholesome influence in the community.

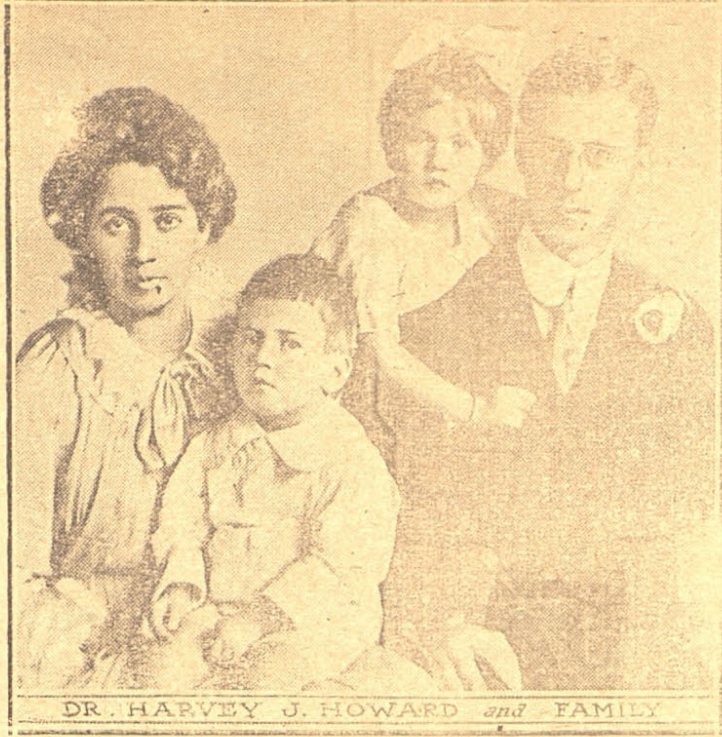
Three Things Pastors Can Do

1. Call attention to the Crusade in their public congregations, and ask prayer for it. Also at the church's midweek service. Tell how it is spreading throughout America. Explain its objects, and enlist (by a rising vote if this seems wise) the sympathy and co-operation of the entire church.
2. Speak to other pastors about the Crusade, and if the way seems open plan for some kind of a union movement—of prayer, or evangelism, or municipal uplift, or neighborhood visitation.
3. Watch carefully the columns of the Christian Herald, so as to be ready to fall in line and to lead others when great forward movements are suggested or announced. Some important matters are under consideration, which we trust will have a far-reaching influence.

Three Things Public Officials Can Do

the different districts with these cities as centers, will be made after which H. E. Bell, chief oil and gas supervisor, will return to Austin and work out the proper divisions, it was indicated.

A map will then be made showing the oil fields of Texas which will be divided into fourteen districts and placed in the charge of an equal number of supervisors.

Killough of the Eastland district, who are more recent appointees.

A NEW LEAGUE MAY BE FORMED BY TEXAS TECH

LUBBOCK, July 29.—Texas Tech officials are considering the organization of a new interscholastic league to be composed of West Texas high schools. Dr. P. W. Horn, president of the institution, in a statement today declared that Texas Tech planned to cooperate with and serve the interests of West Texas and that if the school men of West Texas desire Tech will form the new league. However, he stated he was going to leave the matter up to the high school men and would act only when requested by representative schools of the territory. Already a number of letters

have been received at Tech from West Texas high schools fearful of the passage of the proposed one year residence rule. Opposition to the rule first voiced at Lubbock has spread throughout West Texas and literally hundreds of letters have gone to the office of the interscholastic league from school men all over West Texas, who declare that passage of the rule will ruin West Texas athletics and discriminate against the rapid-growing towns of this section.

It is urged that the West Texas chamber of commerce aid in forming the new league if it is undertaken by Texas Tech and the W. T. C. heads stated when here on President Lee's good will tour that if desired by the West Texas high schools and requested by Dr. Horn their organization

would support the new league. School men of West Texas are following a policy of watchful waiting while the executive committee of the interscholastic league at Austin is canvassing the returns of the recent vote and reaching a decision on the proposed rule.

STATE LEGIONNAIRES RAISE \$3,000,000

DALOAS, July 29. — More than \$3,000,000 has been raised in the United States for the American Legion endowment fund for disabled veterans and orphans of the world war, G. L. Folbre, state adjutant of the legion, announced Monday at the state headquarters in Dallas. Texas has raised to date about \$139,000 in the campaign, Mr. Folbre said. The

state adjutant has just returned from a tour of the state, during which he has been working in behalf of the campaign. He said the drive will be continued in the state until Texas' quota of \$225,000 is raised.

The secretary of one group writes: "Our object is to promote personal evangelism, and evangelism by gospel teams, the latter to visit churches or other organizations with the gospel. Our first visitation meeting was Sunday, June 28, in Bethany Presbyterian church, New York city."
2. Throw the commercial weight of the community back of every pastor and church enlisting in the Christian Conscience Crusade.
3. Organize to present a solid business front against every form of degrading influence, such as gambling, illicit liquor selling, newspaper and magazine filth, Sabbath desecration and rottenness of every kind in public places. Also pray for a systematic campaign of education for a higher moral order.

Some Things Every Christian Can Do

1. Pray daily for the crusade, and enlist the prayers of others.
2. Make it known as widely as possible.
3. Encourage your pastor and others in the community who are promoting the crusade, and are endeavoring to put its principles into execution.

The districts involved are the Electra, Graham, Wichita Falls, Cisco, Breckenridge and Eastland districts.

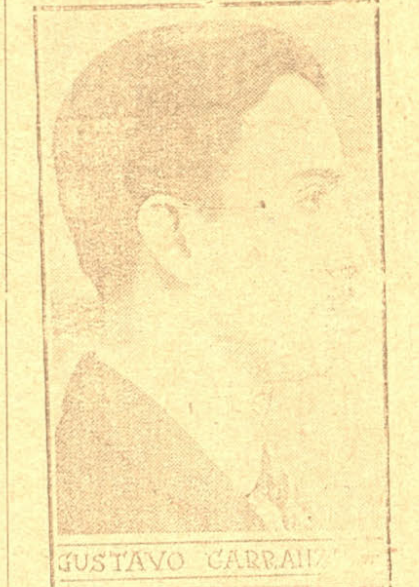

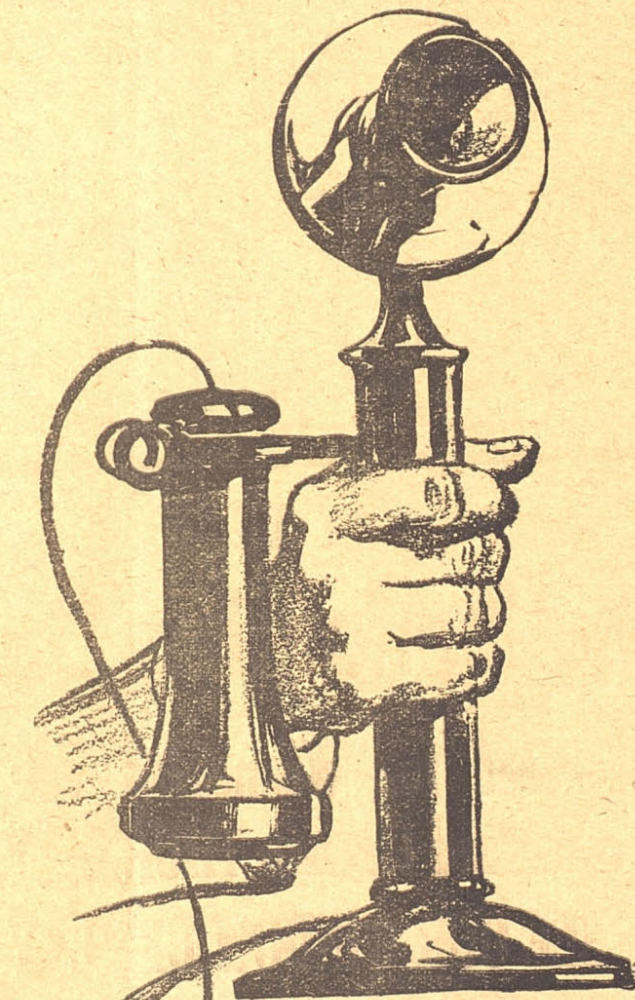


