HOUSTON, Sept. 12.—A tropical storm swirling about in the Gulf of Mexico today shifted its course and moved slowly toward the Louisiana coast, advices to the weather bureau here said.

Tomorrow it is planned to send eight Cisco cars out on as many different routes to visit towns and scatter advertising material. These groups will be organized this afternoon.

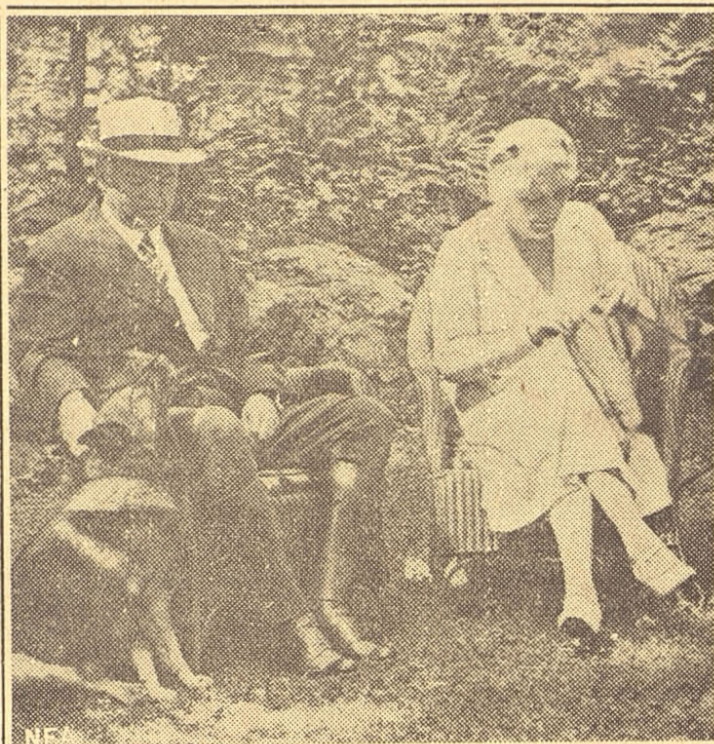
Floodwaters Near Tops of Levees

VERDICT IS AWAITED IN CISCO CASE

The jury in the Cisco football case in 91st district court was still out at 2:15 this afternoon. The case was given into the hands of the 12 men at 9:45 this morning. They retired into the jury dormitory to begin consideration of the 14 issues upon which Judge George L. Davenport charged them Saturday night.

Arguments in the case were concluded at 11 o'clock Saturday evening after taking testimony—the bulk of it introduced by the plaintiffs—had occupied three days. The hearing opened Wednesday morning but the entire day was occupied with hearing of exceptions argued by the defense in an effort to have the case dismissed on grounds of the court's lack of jurisdiction.

The defense placed only one witness upon the stand. The witness was Roy Henderson, secretary of the athletic division of the Interscholastic league. His testimony was heard Saturday afternoon, and interrogation was concluded at 5:30 p. m. Judge Davenport ordered a night session of his court to complete the arguments and then announced the jury would report again at 9 o'clock Monday morning to consider a verdict.

The jury was late in assembling, however, and 45 minutes after the time scheduled they retired to privacy and took up consideration of the case.

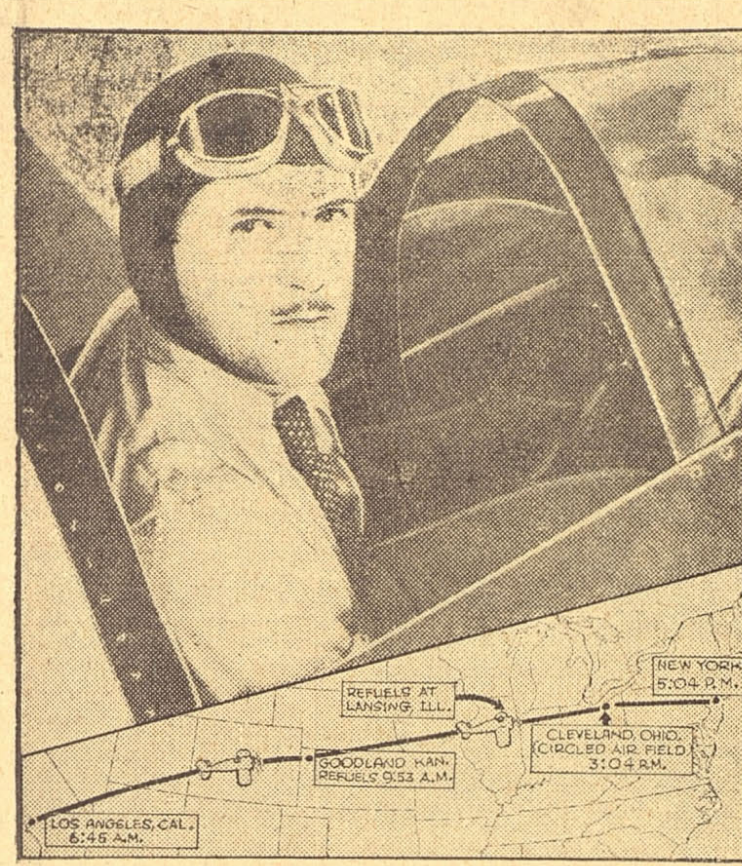
REICHSTAG DISSOLVED Amid Wild Scenes

MEXICANS PLAY BIG PART IN TEXAS VOTING

By GORON K. SHEARER United Press Staff Correspondent AUSTIN, Sept. 9. — Former Mexicans, new citizens of Texas, and the descendants of Mexicans play an important part in the Texas elections. Along the international border and in San Antonio, they frequently hold the balance of power.

Number Reduced. In 1922 the percentage of eligible Mexican voters was considerably reduced. Before that time the wife of a Mexican who had become naturalized in Texas was entitled to vote. Since that date she, too, must take out naturalization papers. Importance Emphasized. Importance of the so-called Mexican vote was emphasized in the recent State Democratic primary contest between Governor Ross S. Sterling and Former Governor Miriam A. Ferguson. Spanish circulars from both sides were widely distributed in San Antonio. The Ferguson circular recited the friendly

treatment accorded Mexicans by Ferguson during her administration, and by her husband when he was governor. Mrs. Ferguson's pardon granted to General J. M. Ratge' also was cited. General Rangel had been given a five to 99-year sentence on conviction of murder of Candelario Ortiz, deputy sheriff of Dimmitt county. Ortiz was killed after capture by a revolutionary expedition headed by General Rangel.

SAYS CHURCH SHOULD PREACH REDEMPTION

"Christians in this world for the purpose of proclaiming the message of Christ's redemption," said the Rev. A. Rathjen in his address yesterday afternoon. He was addressing the members and friends of Grace Lutheran church. The occasion was a mission rally, held at the city hall. The pastor reminded his hearers that they should be "mindful of their high calling, namely, as priests, to each, to bring spiritual sacrifices to their Lord, and to pray for the people." They should "show forth the praises of Him who hath called them out of darkness into his marvelous light," the pastor said. In appreciation of God's love toward a world lost in sin, the Christians who are no longer subject to the punishment of their sins should tell others of Christ, who came into this world in order to save sinners.

The different names which are ascribed to a Christian. "Ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people," should prompt him to action to be about the work which is so necessary in a sin-stained world. These names signify the high station of the Christian, and should prompt him to broadcast the love of God. "For God so loved the world that he gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life."
