A revenue sharing fund program, calling for expenditures of \$93,500, was approved and inserted into the City of Cisco's operating budget for fiscal 1980-81 at the regular monthly meeting of the City Council Tuesday night.

The revenue sharing matter was the subject of a special hearing held during the council meeting. A previous hearing was held last month.

The revenue sharing fund, which represents money from the federal government, shows the sum of \$38,547 on hand and anticipates \$54,952 during the period from Oct. 1, 1980, to Sept. 30, 1981. City Accountant Jean Gray reported to the Council that a check for \$11,000 has been received on the projected 1980-81 grant. The fund anticipates \$2,000 in interest on invested surplus funds.

Expenditures provide for \$26,500 in capital outlay, including assorted equipment, vehicles, buildings and so forth; \$29,750 for labor; and \$35,000 for maintenance and supplies for work in maintaining buildings, the sewer

The council approved payment of the first installment of \$581 of the \$2,327 that the City of Cisco will contribute during the year to the Eastland County Tax Apprasial District. This is manditory under a new state law, it was pointed out.

A motion by Councilman Bill Eudy that the council operate under the Handbook of Mayor and Councilmen of Home Rule Cities, Robert's Rules of Order, as well as the rules and regulations of the city charter was approved.

The council approved posted speed limits in highways running through the corporate limits. These limits vary from 30 to 45 miles per hour and were worked out and posted by the State Highway Department.

The city manager was asked to check into the matter of a building at 1000 West 10th Street being four feet on the street right-of-way. Contractor Archie Chamness had brought the matter to the council.

The agenda item regarding the city manager living in Cisco was discussed. Mr. Turpin said he had not been able to find suitable housing to rent and that he was reluctant to buy a home "under present conditions."

Councilman Eudy suggested the council study the fesasibility of buying a residence for use of the city manager on a rental basis. Councilman Harold Pippen added that "I couldn't advise the city manager to buy a home here under present circumstances."

Although the matter was not on the agenda, the council decided to vote on the matter of checking into buying a house. Casting "no" votes were Mayor Cartee and Councilwoman Louise Allison. All other council members present voted 'yes."

Nolan Lacy of Arlington appeared before the council to ask that the 150-acre Lake Bernie property be advertised for bids for an oil and gas lease. City Attorney Bill Wright was requested to advertise this property along with a tract on Lake Cisco.

The council approved payment of \$75 for the month of Decmeber, 1979, to the city library and a budget giving the library \$1,000 during the current year has been approved, Mrs. Harry Donica of the library board was in-

formed. Mayor Cartee presided and all council members excpet Raymond Whitley were present.

Under terms of the new contract, the city agreed to maintain all roads within the

cemetery, maintain the main water line to the cemetery, and pay the Association the sum of \$600 per month.

In addition to the monthly check, the Association will receive the proceeds from the sale of cemetery lots, usually between three and four each month, at a price to be agreed on by the association and the city. In the past, lots have been selling for \$100 each.

The contract provides that the Association will be reponsible for all water lines in the cemetery with the exception of the main line. The agreement stipulated that all existing water lines, except the main line, will be replaced at Association expense during the five-year period.

The city reserved the right to cancel the contract in the event the Association "fails to provide for the maintenance, control or upkeep of the cemetery as specified."

The contract was discussed at the Nov. 25th meeting and the Association was asked to submit the document. It was brought out that the city had paid out an average of \$1,300 per month for cemetery upkeep prior to the Association taking over Jan. 1, 1978. The \$600 monthly payment had been going to the Association since that

date. The contract was signed . by Mayor Roy Cartee and City Secretary Marilyn S. McLain for the city and by President Anton White and Vice President S.G. Clary

for the Association. The Association was organized in April, 1976, as a perpetual care cemetery organization. Donations from those with loved ones buried in the cemetery have amounted to \$73,000, during the nearly five years. This money has been invested in Certificates of Deposit with the proceeds going into the operating fund.

The Association owns three riding grass mowers, seven walking mowers, several weed eaters, an electric generator and assorted tools. The use of a tractor and pickups is being donated without charges by Mr. White and Mr. Clary. There are four part-time employees during seven months of the year.

The organization has 15,000 feet of plastic pipe on hand for use in a new water system. Plans call for any fallen or leaning tombstones to be restored, for the removal of some 300 cedar trees and some 50 dead trees. An office and shop building has been built, street signs put up, and roster of all grave owners is near completion.

Last summer when the weather got very hot many of the garden vegetables died even though they were watered. When you examined the roots you found damaged, decaying roots and they usually had large knots on the root system. This is typical of nematode damage. Nematodes cause a lot of problems to Eastland

County crops. Nematodes are microscopic, worm-like animals that feed on plant roots. Damaged plants have decayed spots and stubby roots or enlarged root tips.

nematodes can infest a garden, the root knot nematode is the most damaging. Plants infested

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Cisco

with root knot nematodes will have galls or swellings on their roots, are usually stunted and yellow in color, and may die prematurely.

Gardeners can use several methods of control to get rid of or at least lessen the number of nematodes. Using nematode-resistant varieties of plants helps as does rotating crops of corn, onions and garlic.

Also, using a cover crop such as cereal rye, not common ryegrass, during the winter months, helps trap nematodes. Nematodes will enter rye roots, but because While several types of of the physiology of the roots, the nematodes cannot undergo further development and will die. Working the cover crop into the garden area a month before planting increases, organic matter and at the same time causes an organic acid to develop which is toxic to nematodes.

While controlling nematodes by chemical means is not always effective. We do recommend one method. Apply Vapam with a hose-on sprayer at the rate of one quart per 100 square feet of ground area. Then immediately wash the chemical into the soil with a one-half application of water. Soak the treated area twice during the next 48 hours and then leave it alone

for seven days before tilling. Wait at least two weeks after applying Vapam before planting. Also, if the temperature is high, additional watering may be needed to keep the soil below 90 degree F. for the chemical to be effective. Check the price before you decide to use Vapam, because it is expen-

Of course, the best method of controlling nematodes in your garden is to never let them get started. Be careful adding topsoil or any organic matter such as peanut hulls which might be infested with nematodes.

Remember the difficulty you had deciding to purchase that \$10-25 garden sprayer? Well, suppose next spring you discovered this once good sprayer to be clogged, corroded and in need of repair. Not only would you be disappointed, but meanwhile those garden insect pests would be that much further ahead in doing their

You can avoid this careless and costly inconvenience by spending a little time now cleaning and inspecting your spray equipment before storing it this

Clean equipment in good repair is also safe equipment Clogged nozzle parts can result in uneven droplet sizes, causing poor coverage and possible plant damage. A damaged hose or other spray parts can also cause toxic chemicals to leak onto the operator's clothes and

Here are some suggestions for cleaning spray equip-

1. Drain all spray material from the sprayer tank and hose in a safe place where children, pets or livestock will not contact them. Dispose of pesticides according to the product label.

2. Fill the spray tank with clean water and add a liquid detergent soap. Flush this solution back through the pump, hose and nozzle in a safe place.

3. Fill the spray tank with a mixture of one-half cup of annomia to 3 gallons of water and let stand for 18-24 hours. Spray part of this mixture through the pump hose and nozzle at the beginning and end of the soaking period.

4. Disassemble the nozzle and dry all parts.

5. If the tank is susceptible to rust, coat the interior with a water soluble oil or other rust inhibitor.

6. As you clean your equipment, check for worn parts and leaks. Order any needed parts so that the sprayer will be ready to go as soon as you need it next spring.

Remember, a sprayer will have a much longer life if it is thoroughly cleaned and maintained after each use.

Reflections In Perspective By I. Will Ussery

Mention has been made of the lovely city of Liege, Belgium. Had a couple of most interesting experiences there on one of my many visits to the city.

I'd learned long since that the most reliable method of reaching Liege when travelling either via Frankfurt, Germany or out of New York was to fly into Brussels, then take the railway to Liege. There was a train every half hour.

Now on this particular occasion I was on my way back to the States, and was travelling with two bags, a briefcase...and a trenchcoat. And I have a bursitic knee which was acting up. Stepped off the train several hundred feet from the stairway which led downward to the station which was at street level.

Managed the walk to the stairway, and even negotiated the stairs...to the second step from the bottom. At that point, the knee just simply gave way and I tumbled into a part of a heap of bags, trenchcoat and briefcase on the title floor of the wide passageway which led to the street.

Collecting my wits, and to a degree regaining a semblance of composure, I arose and began sorting out my baggage. 'Almost before I'd begun, a little man in a loose-fitting blue jacket came scrambling up and with no ado began helping with the sorting. He even took the briefcase from my hand, and almost militarily ordered me to stand perfectly still while he fetched a cart. I didn't debate the issue.

He returned with the cart, and for reasons known only to him, and perhaps to Belgians in general, apologised profusely for whatever had caused my tumble. As though he, or Belgium were responsible. And only takes very little more time than the flight-rail trip via Brussels. I had acquired yet another package of considerable weight, and as I checked in at the ticket window I asked if a porter could be arranged. Of course, M'sieu. And it

Now, on boarding a train on an European railway, the platform and position number is indicated on the ticket. And as is usually my fate, the position at which I should board the Express seemed to be half a mile from the stairway. But the porter accompained me all the way.

omemaking By Janet Thomas

Holiday entertaining is a special time for all. Baking our favorite foods for holiday meals and parties brings joy to every home.

As we entertain, often we have to cope with fabric stains. In my column this week, I would like to mention some of the common types of stains that most often occur at the holiday season and some stain removal methods.

Most stains can be easily removed when they are fresh, but become difficult or impossible to remove later. Start to remove stains before washing, since hot water can set many stains permanently. Cool water pre-soaking is a safe and effective procedure.

Always identify the stain, if possible. If you can't determine what caused the stain, it will help if you can tell whether it is a greasy stain, a non-greasy stain, or a combination of the two.

Here are some simple stain removal methods for different types of holiday stains:

Candlewax, Paraffin: To remove as much as possible, lift wax off fabric with knife. Then place the stain between clean white blotters or several layers of facial. tissue and press with warm iron. To remove remaining

stain, sponge with a grease solvent. (Buy grease solvents that contain perchloroethylene trichloroethylene. NOTE: Never use carbon tetrachloride, gasoline, or lighter fluid due to the extreme dangers involved.)

Chocolate, gravy and sauces, Butter and Mayonaise Stains: Soak stain in cold water for 30 minutes. Work detergent into stain. Rinse and dry (do not dry in dryer for heat may set stain). If stain remains, sponge with a grease solvent and dry. Repeat if necessary.

Fruit and Berry Stains: Sponge immediately with cool water. If safe for fabric,

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stretch the stained portion of the fabric over a bowl and fasten with an elastic band or string. Pour boiling water through the stain, then launder in suds. For pear, peach, cherry and plum stains, sponge immediately with cool water and rub with glycerine. After two hours, apply a few drops of vinegar for a minute or two, then rinse and launder in warm

laundering.

Beverages (alcoholic and

Coffee and Tea (no cream:) Sponge stain with cold water. Then soak 30 minutes in water before

soft drinks): Sponge in cool water and glycerine. Soak for 30 miutes. Then sponge with alcohol if safe for fabric. (If your beverage stain is on an acetate fabric, dilute to two parts water for one part rubbing alcohol.)
