

became shrill and blood

pressures peaked. The Texas Longhorns were hustling to protect their unbeaten record from the Oklahoma Sooners; SMU and Baylor drilled knowing only one of them would be leading the Southwest Conference come Sunday morn-

And, of course, the Cisco Wranglers feverishly, hoping for a fifth victory, which would keep them on track to a coveted birth in the Rodeo Bowl.

A crowd numbering in the dozens gathered at Amon Carter Stadium Friday afternoon when Cisco Junior College came to call on TCU's freshman team. The junior college players are caught in a time warp, between the demanding fans of their high school teams and the pleading alumni of the colleges they will attend next

FOR THE LIKES of Cisco split end Paul Chatmon, a Wyatt High ex, it is a relief. "It's not like I couldn't get into a senior college," Chatmon said. "I had pretty good

"It just sounded good to come out to a little town and get away for a while. Now I know I'm ready to go to college. But I am going to miss

this place." Chatmon left Fort Worth's Rolling Hills neighborhood a year ago for the rolling vacuum of West Texas. Cisco is 100 miles west of Fort Worth; another junior college, Ranger, is just up the interstate. Their football programs are overshadowed by the local high school teams, but they fare well against a schedule of out-ofstate junior colleges and col-

lege freshman teams. "I suppose we have foot-

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The ball just because the administration believes a college should have football," assistant coach Bob Keyes said. "It keeps spirit on campus up and gives our drill team and our band a chance

"AND ALL that attracts students. It's not so important here, because we have a larger enrollment (about 1,000). But at Ranger they have 450 students and almost all of the boys are athletes. It helps get some boys into

school.' Chatmon didn't need to be helped into school. "If I hadn't been on a football scholarship, I think my mother and father would have put together enough money for me to go somewhere," he said. "But if I'd started out at a major college in a big town, I don't think I'd have stayed on the

"Out here, you learn to hit the books. It's a small town, and there's nothing else to do. You think in a big town athletes would be going to the library? Here, you do it to have something to do."

It's not the library is the only building in town: "They have a Sonic and a Dairy Queen," Chatmon said. "That's about it, though. There's no clubs and no

"AT FIRST, when I came out here, I'd lay around at night. I was lonesome and bored. But the people in town are friendlier than anywhere I've ever been. They come out and talk to you, take you to church, want to get ac-

quainted. "Fort Worth is such a big town you never get to know half the people. Here, you know everybody, and everybody seems interested in you. You might think out here this would be a redneck town. But it's not."

"At a major college, the freshman get lost," Chatmon said. "Here, the coaches work with you more, because you're more important-you have to play.

They treat you like a senior. "I've learned a lot here about techniques of running pass patterns and reading pass coverage, and I'm not sure the coaches at a senior college could have worked with me that closely. It's worked out well."



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

Larry Spears, Director of CCCO's Youth and Conscientious Objection Campaign, says, "This past summer's draft registration of men born in 1960 and 1961 was just the first step toward returning to the draft. This coming January, Selective Service plans to register those men born in 1962. After January 5, men (perhaps women) born in 1963 will be required to register as they turn 18. It should be noted that the U.S. has never had a registration without a draft, and rarely a draft without a war."

"The need for young people to be informed and to consider going on record as a conscientous objector to war has never been greater than it is this fall," says Spears.

"The Supreme Court's decision on Goldberg vs. Tarr, a sex-discrimination case involving the draft and registration, will be final this winter," comments Spears.

"It is especially important for women to realize that they could be ordered to register for the draft, and perhaps be drafted. They too must consider their position on war."

CCCO has sued Selective Service for their draft plans and learned that they plan to allow registrants to claim hardship, medical, and conscientious objector status only at the last possible moment after induction orders are issued.

"Unless students begin to think about, and collect evidence for, conscientous objection claims and other options, they are certain to be caught unprepared," says Spears. "There is also growing

sentiment within Congress to begin debate early next year on whether a peace-time draft should be started," he says. "It is important for young people to realize that under the current draft law, all men between the ages of 18 and 26 are eligible to be drafted. Also, students should know that there is no longer a college student

#### deferment under the new draft laws."



CATFISH PLATTER All You Can Eat

#### omemaking **L**ints By Janet Thomas

With winter fast approaching, now is a good time to survey your home for ways to provide energy savings on home heating bills. Since the largest part of your utility bill goes toward heating and cooling, it makes good economic sense to undertake any steps that will prevent unnecessary heat losses and thereby reduce the cost of heating your home.

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1. Check for air leaks. Windows and doors are the obvious place to begin, but obscure places such as wall outlets, switch plates and attic doors can also admit unwanted cold air.

2. Check heating equipment. Arrange for a maintenance check of home heating equipment by a heating and coolinge contractor/repair service. In the case of a gas-burning furnace, the service person will check the equipment and light your pilot for a nominal fee.

Change filters. Once your furnace is operating, change the filters once a month to ensure the most efficient operation.

4. Provide proper attic ventilation. Proper attic ventilation allows for moisture control in the attic where it is important to keep insulation dry. Blocking or closing off turbine ventilators with plastic bags or other devices is not a good practice since it hinders attic ventilation and moisture control.

5. Lower thermostat set- 2 tablespoons of grated tings. Thermostat settings should be lowered to at least 68 degrees during the day and further lowered at night before going to bed for substantially lower heating bills.

FIREPLACES If you have a fireplace, you should also read the following maintenance and operational suggestions.

1. Clean fireplaces and chimneys. If you use a fireplace fairly frequently, the chimney will have to be cleaned from time to time because of the formation of creosote, a black tarry liquid that results from the condensation of wood gases not burned in the combustion process.

2. Lower the thermostat setting to between 50 and 55 degrees when the fireplace is in use. Heated air from the rest of the house will be lost, but the furnace won't use nearly as much fuel.

3. Close all doors and warm air supply ducts enterting the room with the fireplace, and open a window near the fireplace about 1/2 to 1 inch. Air for combustion will be drawn in through the partially opened window, not from the rest of the house.

4. Consider installing a

glass screen if you have an open masonry fireplace. Louvers at the bottom restrict the amount of air a fire consumers and can be closed when the fire burns down. This cuts substantially the loss of warmed air up the flue.

5. If your fireplace damper opening can be adjusted from outside the fireplace, close the damper part way. This reduces the draft and the amount of warmed air drawn in from other parts of the house.

6. Close the damper when the fire is out. If the damper is left open, your furnace may consume 10 to 30 percent more fuel than it does normally.

DELICIOUS ROLLUPS

Cut 12 slices baked ham very thin. Roll in each ham slice: 2 spears fresh or frozen asparagus or 1 spear fresh or frozen broccoli. Fasten with toothpick. Bake at 350 degree F. for 10-15 minutes in shallow baking dish. Top with Quick Topping Sauce.

½ cup shredded swiss cheese 1/3 cup milk

# JORDON

The nights continue to get cooler and we know a killing frost can't be too far away. Eastland County peanut growers are leaving the peanuts in the ground hoping they will mature a crop before that first frost. Some growers have reported that their peanuts are maturing better than expected while others have said maturity is coming slowly due to the cooler soil temperatures. Of course, some of the earlier peanuts have been harvested. Yields seem to

vary from poor to good. Pecans are hulling and falling now. Some of the early varieties were late hulling while the mid-season varieties are hulling on schedule. Because of the short crop of pecans the squirrles and birds are out getting their share. Growers are having to battle the wildlife for the few pecans that were produced this

Based on the current con-HAM ditions, Texas pecan growers are expected to harvest 25 million pounds of pecans in 1980. That sounds like a lot, but it is 73% below last years crop. A little more than one half of that total will be natives and almost one half will be improved or paper-shell pecans.

The large pecan crop last year and the drought conditions this year have contributed to a light pecan

The United States pecan crop is expected to be seven percent less than last years. While most states are expecting a smaller crop this year, Georgia and Alabama are expecting much larger crops than last year.

Frost will be hitting the country before long, and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forages.

# By DeMarquis Gordon

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazed after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks

following a rain. To be safe allow plant materials affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.

Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has passed.

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

### **Marie Boney Misses Homecoming To Study**

It is possible that many Ranger High School exes missed this year's homecoming because they were busy with college courses and tests, but probably most of them were recent graduates. One who missed for this reason finished RHS 33 years ago and plans to finish the University of Texas at Arlington next May.

Marie Harper Boney, wife of 1946 RHS graduate Gene Boney, is a senior at UTA where she holds a grade point average of 3.875 out of a possible 4.0. She was an honor graduate in the 1947 RHS class, but that "was easier", she says, adding that "at my age, good grades take a lot more work than they used to." Her degree will be in journalism with a secondary teaching certificate in journalism and English. "Actually, I'm doing everything in reverse order," she says. She was formerly Associate Editor of the Eastland Telegram and, as a freelance writer, has sold fiction, non-fiction and poetry to newspapers and magazines. The story she is currently working on is a "part fact, part fancy" account of buying and selling a house in Eastland, where the Boneys lived for 26 years before moving to Fort Worth in 1977.

The first semester of college for Marie was in 1947 and the next were in 1955-56, when she finished Ranger Junior College. This time, almost the whole family was involved. Gene was also a student at RJC and their daughters, Ann and Carla, were mascots for the college. Son Rex was only a few months old at the time.

Marie was a member of Phi Theta Kappa, national honor society, Journalism Club, Masquers, L'Allegro, and the annual staff. She was elected Freshman Favorite

After moving to Fort

Worth, Marie decided to get the degree she had always wanted and enrolled at UTA. "Most of the time I'm excited about school," she says but adds that sometimes there are doubts. She believes the majority of the young students are bright, hard-working, interesting people. Marie admits that the openness of discussion in all areas is sometimes a shock, especially when the topic is one which was only whispered in the forties and fifties. "But this is not just on the campus," she says, "this is true in the daily newspapers and on televi-

While she was in Eastland, Marie worked first with the newspaper and then as manager of Brittain's Discount Center. She was always active in school and civic organizations, serving four years as finance chairman of the PTA and as an officer of the Girl Scout Council. She was president of the

Eastland Civic League and Garden Club when she helped organize the Eastland Civic Theate. She was one of the guests of honor at the Theater's tenth anniversary celebration at Bellhurst Playhouse at the home of Mrs. Virginia Russell, ECT director.

"Yes, I helped start ECT," Marie says, "but its successful continuation is due to Mrs. Russell and her talents and to the cooperation of all the people in Eastland Coun-

The annual membership preview coffee was also started under Marie's leadership. "I attended this type meeting at the Women's Club in Carlsbad, New Mexico, in late summer that year," she remembers. "I was so anxious to get home and see if the League's executive committee would like to have one. We had to work very quickly, but the coffee was successful and it has been continued.'

But more important than civic and school activities have been church activities. "Gene and I were taught, and then taught our children, that working in the name of Christ comes first," Marie said. She was active in the First Baptist Church of Ranger and the Bethel Baptist Church of Eastland. Now she belongs to the Handley

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Paper 39°

Baptist Church of Fort Worth where she is a teacher in the adult Sunday School and leader for the church's Diet, Discipline and Discipleship groups.

Marie is often invited to speak at various functions and says, "I go if it is at all possible, but I make a special effort to go if a church group invites me."

The Boneys photographed all of the 254 county courthouses in Texas, so she is busy speaking about Texas during March, Texas Independence month.

Las Leales Club was her 'special love' and she served two years as president of the federated club and "oh, several years" on the program committee.

Marie was elected to serve

on the committee to rewrite the Eastland city charter and was serving in this position when the Boneys moved from Eastland. She was a Director of Eastland Chamber of Commerce for three years and a member of the Retail Trades Committee for eight years.

Members of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society since 1967, Gene and Marie have twice served as coleaders for the annual workshop reception. He is a member of the Sons of Confederate Veterans and she has transferred her membership in the United Daughters of the Confederacy from the Tom Green Chapter in Abilene to the Julia Jackson Chapter in Fort Worth, where she has

been treasurer for two

Why does Marie do all these things? "Being busy is the only way I know," she says. "There is just so much to do, to learn. Sometimes I'm prone to absorbing enthusiasms and get a little too busy. Right now I'm preparing for mid-terms, finishing a needlepoint dollhouse for a granddaughter, and trying to schedule time to see the Shakespearean exhibits in Dallas."

She says her husband makes it possible for her to be involved in various activities. "Gene has always been very supportive of my activities," she says, "but I have never undertaken any project without his prior approval. I really cannot relate to the "liberated female" concept or the the "Total

Woman" approach. I guess I fall somewhere in between: my family is - and always has been - more important than any outside activity, but I have never been house bound either. It is a way of life which has worked well for us."

Would she recommend returning to college to women in her age bracket? "Only if they want to go to college," Marie says. "It was a life long dream with me, but other women have other dreams. I would definitely recommend taking steps to fulfill whatever dream a woman has. And I would say that to women of any age."

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

- 1. Permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve public convenience.
- Granting the State the right of appeal in criminal cases from certain pretrial rulings of the trial court.
- 3. Requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes.
- 4. Permitting the legislature to authorize and regulate bingo games for charitable purposes on a local option basis.
- Authorizing the legislature to grant budget execution powers to the governor, subject to approval by a budget execution committee.
- 6. Authorizing the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate.
- Authorizing counties with a population of 5,000 or less to perform private road work if a reasonable charge is imposed.
- 8. Changing the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and prescribing the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts.
- Authorizing the conversion of certain marital community property into separate property by allowing spouses to agree that income from separate property is to be separate property.



WASHINGTON, D.C.-The National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB), the largest small business group in the nation, announced today that by voting in support of key small business issues 100 percent of the time during the 96th Congress, U.S. Rep. 



Reflections In **Perspective** By I. Will Ussery

Los Teques, Venezuela has been described. Twelve kilometers from the city along a paved road leading into the mountains and valleys toward the Caribbean there is a tiny Roman Catholic chapel. There is a water well behind the chapel. Also, a narrow road which could be best described as a trail joins the road at the chapel. This trail ambles along the top of a narrow hog-back ridge which rises abruptly from the Rio Colorado, some 3,000 feet below. The trail extends to a huge mahogany tree just short of the tip of this spur-like ridge almost a mile from the chapel.

Some four hundred yards along the trail, constructed on ledges carved from the shoulder of the ridge there is a cluster of adobe cottages around which grow a variety of citrus trees, and back and below which the coffee trees grow in profusion in the shade of the mohagony. All so quiet and peaceful, and the views are spectacular.

There is a pump on the well at the chapel, and a 34-inch pipeline carries water along the trail...across from the cottages...to the summer home of a government official. Beautiful, modern house, built just beyond and across the ridge from the adobes.

A pipeline, designed by the engineering firm with which I was associated and under construction under our supervision crossed the paved road near the chapel and continued alng the back of the ridge-spur to its point, at which it literally dropped to the narrow valley of the Colorado 3,000 feet below.

I had gone to a point near the cottages to observe the preparations for construction and along the trail I met a group of women and children, obviously carrying water from the chapel well to the adobes. Reaching a point in front of the settlement, which was the most convenient place at which to turn around, I observed that only a short distance away a bulldozer had broken the water line. There was little more than a trickle of water coming from the broken line, but it was at least water. And only a very short distance from the cottages.

A man squatted, in characteristic Latin American pose, beside the broken pipe, apparently contemplating the stream of water...little else. I called to him, and suggested that he inform the women that they could obtain water there. "Of course, Senor. Immediately". With which he scampered away, the bearer of good tidings, indeed.

He returned in a few minutes, proudly leading a procession of perhaps six or eight women and as many girls ranging from very small to the mid-teens. They began collecting the water in their pots, pans and pails. One of them mustered the courage to thank me for the generous gift of the water.

A little girl somehow attracted my attention. She looked somehow so very typical of all the smallish children in all of Venezuela. Fetching my briefcase from my car, I took out my camera and asked the little girl if her mother would allow me to take her photograpah. It would make an outstanding photo, with the vivid green mountain side in the distant background, scattered clouds drifting lazily underneath the bluest sky in the world. Her mother identified herself by instructing the little girl to go immediately to the house and to change into another dress. She had replied to my request.

Simple people all over the world enjoy looking at photographs, especially photographs which they can associate with the person showing them. I passed around

snapshots of my wife and two daughters. Also, there was a photo of the Venezuelan girl who had accompanied my family on their return to the States the year before the purpose of attending school with our eldest daughter.

I explained that the girl was living with my family. "As a servant, of course". Commented one of the ladies. "Oh, no! She is as a sister to my eldest (la mayoria). she is living with them so that she may attend school". That statement was discussed at length by all the ladies.

The girl returned and I snapped her picture. I learned that her name was Martina. I presented Martina, who was nine years old, with some pencils and a calculation pad from by briefcase, and on the following day I brought a doll which I purchased in town. Her mother approved the gift. Without that prior approval the gift must be profferred, you know.

For more than a week I was out there almost daily. Martina would wave somewhat timidly from behind the yard fence. But her smile told that I had made a little friend. Finally, one day as I sat in my car observing the progress of the work, Martina's mother came from their cottage, leading Martina by the hand. Hesitantly, they approached the car. and apologetically the mother began:

"You have told us of the Venezolana who lives with your family in Norte America. In los Estados Unidos. That is a very generous and kind thing for you to do. The Venezolana should make a very good sister to your "mayoria". I should be grateful to you if you would take Martina to the United States as a sister to your least one (la chiquitita). Martina is nine years old, and there is no school for her. She loves you. She would make a good daughter for you and a good sister for your chiquitita. Martina would work for your wife and your daughters, if they wanted her to work. And Martina could go

With a catch in my throat, I explained to the mother the legal difficulties accompanying such a thing. Somehow I convinced her...and perhaps myself...that it would be next to impossible. She thanked me for having been so kind as to listen, and with a bow which was almost a curtsy she and Martina returned to the cottage. I drove away, tears in my eyes at the thought of the sacrifice the mother was prepared to make for the sake of her daughter.

That occurred in 1959. Martina is almost thirty years old, now. I often wonder what her life is like, compared to what it might have been. And I wonder if what I did was right, for Martina. And for me. I may have passed up the greatest opportunity of a lifetime to perform an act of generosity.


