The Council approved a contract between the City of Cisco and Westbound Water Corporation Supply establishing an interim water rate. The contract was drawn up as a result of a recent meeting between members of both organizations.

City Manager Mike Moore said members of the Westbound Board had reviewed and approved the contract Tuesday morning. A contract was also ap-

proved between the city and the Cisco Cemetery Association for maintenance and operation of Oakwood Cemetery: The old contract between the two parties expires in December of this year.

The new contract will renew the agreement betwithin blocks 9 and 10, O.T.

The city manager gave a report to the council which told the city has paved or seal coated 48 blocks this fiscal year and plans to do at least 11 more. He said in the last three years the city has done 175 blocks. He said city crews will continue with the seal coating and paving until the weather becomes too cold.

West Texas Utilities changed out 215 old street lights in residential parts of the city, according to Mr. Moore. He said if anyone still has an old street light near their home, or one that does not work, get in touch with the City Hall and they will see they are fixed.

The council gave its approval to an oil and gas lease on 100.8 acres of land near Lake Cisco with Ray Richey & Company, Inc. They also approved a gas pipe line right-of-way easement through Lake Cisco Park for the company.

A request for the vacating of several streets and alley right-of-ways from Mr. Ronnie Ledbetter was tabled, since City Manager Moore said one or two of the landowners near the area had not been contacted. The council indicated it would rather wait until all had been contacted so the matter could be considered as a complete package.

The streets and alleys in question are as follows: 1) East 5th Street from west line of Avenue C to railroad right-of-way; 2) Avenue C from north line of East 6th to Railroad right-of-way; 3) Avenue B from north line of East 6th to railroad right-of-

surance Agency for a cost of \$30,000, as compared to a quote from the Texas Municipal League for \$75,000.

Mr. Moore said new state voting laws will go into effect January 1, 1986 which will require 1) Voting areas to be accessible to the handicapped; 2) Voting booths are required; and 3) A separate absentee ballot board be appointed.

He said the county is looking into purchasing a number of voting booths which the city will be able to use in elections.

In the Citizen-Council Discussion, Bobby Ingram said he is planning to start a Veterans organization for Cisco people who served in the armed forces. They are interested in taking over the maintenance of the small park area on West 5th Street behind the American Legion Hall if it is available.

He said they would like to see the area turned into a Veterans' Park with monuments to those from Cisco who have fought and died in wars.

City Manager Moore said he would investigate the situation and see if there is any possibility in letting the park become so designated.

Lions Club Hears Of Progress In Watch Making and Diamonds

Progress in watch making and in the manufacture of artificial diamonds to the point of near perfection was reported by Al Anderson, local jewelry store proprietor, in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club.

Initially, time was measured by dripping water and sand in hour glasses, Mr. Anderson reported. Next, clocks began ticking as pendulums swung back and forth. To achieve greater accuracy, watch paratively little to manufacture and Bulova can no longer sell Actatrons and has stopped their manufacture. A quartz watch can be so accurate that it will vary no more than one to three minutes per year. Mr.

County To Lose Ballard

The Eastland County Extension staff and the Eastland County Commissioners Court have been notified that one Extension Agent position has been eliminated in Eastland County. The position of county extension agent-home economics now staff by Faith Ballard will not be refilled. Ballard will be transferred to another position with the Extension Service before August 31, 1986.

The Extension Agent position being cut was established on April 1, 1936. Twenty nine women have served in this position during the 50 years working with 4-H youth and adults. Many of them have gone on to serve as County Home Economic program leaders and administrators in the Extension Service.

Faced with a \$4.5 million budget shortfall for the next two years, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is reducing its statewide staff while continuing to pursue top quality programming.

The shortfall resulted from a \$3.2 million reduction in general revenue appropriations coupled with unfunded salary increases and estimated increases in such operating expesses as utilities and postage.

"With a budget shortfall of this magnitude, we basically had two choices," said Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the state educational agency that is responsible for agriculture, home economics, community development and 4-H programs.

"We could maintain our present level of staffing and drastically reduce program-

ming, or we could reduce our staff and direct funds from these positions into high quality educational programs for clientele.

"We chose the latter because we felt the citizens of Texas should not be deprived of quality educational programs," Carpenter emphasized. "Our goal, as always, will continue to be to address the needs of the state's citizenry within the resources allocated."

To continue top quality programs within the constraints of a drastically reduced budget, the Extension Service initiated a Reduction in Force effort on Sept. 1. .

"A substantial number of specialist and county agent positions will be eliminated in the near term, with some additional positions to be eliminated by Sept. 1, 1986," Carpenter said. "Additionally, a number of adminstrative and support positions will be eliminated over the next two years from our staff, about a 10 percent reduction. "To accomplish this ob-

viously painful task of staff reduction, we began with a careful study of state,

regional and county situations," Carpenter noted. "We looked at a number of factors, such as number of farms, cash receipts, complexity of program needs in various counties and regions, plus special

clientele needs." Regarding clientele needs, Carpenter pointed out that a number of regional conferences had been completed N 2x6 that involved some 250 key leaders over the state. These conferences were aimed at identifying critical issues facing Texans-issues which are within the scope of the Extension Service's mission: Based on findings from these conferences and the detailed studies noted above, a statewide staffing plan was

developed, Carpenter said. "Be assured that it is the goal of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to provide high quality educational programs to address the needs of the state's citizens," Carpenter said. "Furthermore, it is our intent to meet this goal within the framework of prudent and wise management of resources made available by

federal, state and local governments."



Eastland City Commissioners have approved a resolution supporting the adoption of the new Texas Water Plan. The Plan is included in Amendments 1 and 2 on the Nov. 5 ballot, which will consist of 14 proposed Amendments. If approved, Amendments 1 will authorize the establishment of a local loan guarantee program and the issuance of state bonds to help fund reservoirs and other facilities. Amendment 2 will authorize the establishment of agricultural conservation programs.



Eventually some pay TV stations might scramble the signal of their stations. They will be available for a fee. But, not all will scramble, leaving you with far more to watch than the cable companies can offer you. The difference is you will own your own system, and not have high monthly charges forever.

Forget the money aspect - no cable company can deliver anywhere near the quality of channels presently on the satellites. Americans are changing their viewing habits. They are becoming more selective and will no longer settle for the "lowest common denominator" programming offered by the networks.

Here Are The Facts:

1. There are 114 channels available via satellite television 2. Of these 114 channels, only seven programmers have interest in scrambling 3. Of these seven programmers, only one actually has the equipment to scramble 4. One bill (H.R. 1769) has been introduced in Congress which would declare a two year moratorium on scrambling. 5. A second bill (H.R. 1849) has also been introduced which states that when a programmer does scramble he must make the programming available to home satellite system owners at a fair and reasonable rate If that doesn't allay your concern, please read the
