"Cisco Boosters" Is A New Civic Body Born Last Monday Evening

The Cisco Federal Loan and Savings Ass'n. was organized last Saturday evening after its charter had reached here. C. Gordon Jones, representative of the Federal Home Loan bank, instituted the Cisco association, and put it on its feet as a going concern. Organization was perfected by the election of the following board of directors and officers.

Several projects for the betterment of the city were discussed and committees named to work out the details for their consummation. The "Boosters" pledge their complete cooperation with the city commission and chamber of commerce in furthering any and all meritorious projects for the betterment of Cisco. The meetings will be held monthly and each member will be assessed a membership fee of \$1, and monthly dues of 50 cents.

Association Has Ample Capital. The association starts out under the most favorable auspices, being offered by sound, conservative business men, and with ample capital, as Secretary Foley stated that plenty of money will be available for all sound loans to accommodate all distressed homes in this section of Texas, and to furnish funds for those who may wish to build new homes. The plan is to offer the people during the present administration, as under its terms salaried men can own homes which they can pay for like rent.

STATE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

Section 1. That Section 1 of article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 1. TAXATION TO BE EQUAL AND UNIFORM AS TO REAL ESTATE AND TO BE EQUAL AND UNIFORM AS TO ALL REASONABLE CLASSIFICATIONS OF PROPERTY; AND OCCUPATION AND INCOME TAXES; EXEMPTIONS; LIMITATIONS UPON COUNTIES, CITIES, ETC.

"Taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform. All property in this state, whether owned by natural persons or corporations, other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as may be provided by law. The Legislature may by general laws make reasonable classifications of all property other than real property for the purpose of taxation, and may impose different rates thereon; provided that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform. The Legislature may impose a poll tax. It may also impose occupation taxes, both upon natural persons and upon corporations, other than municipal, doing business in this State. It may also tax incomes of both natural persons and corporations other than municipal, except that persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits shall never be required to pay an occupation tax; provided that Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture, belonging to each family in the State, shall be exempt from taxation, and provided further that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town for any year on persons or corporations pursuing any profession or business, shall not exceed one-half of the tax levied by the State for the same period of such profession or business."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election, all voters favoring said amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this state, other than that owned by municipal corporations, shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose poll tax and occupation tax income tax and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits; and exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family; and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform in this State, other than that owned by municipal corporations shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation; and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose poll tax and occupation tax and income tax, and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits; exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family, and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

Section 1. That Section 16, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 15 of Article VII

of the Constitution of the State of Texas, now belonging to the University of Texas shall be subject to the taxation for county and school district purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned; provided they shall be rendered for taxation upon the values fixed by the State Tax Board and that the values fixed for school district purposes shall not exceed the values fixed for county purposes on the same land; and provided that the University of Texas from the University Available Fund, shall remit annually to each of the counties and school districts in which said lands are located an amount equal to the tax imposed upon said land for county and school district purposes."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State at the next general election, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school district purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located."

NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 42

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

Section 1. That Section 30, Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 30. The duration of all offices not fixed by this Constitution shall never exceed two (2) years, except that the elected officials of a city that has adopted and amended its charter as provided in Section 5, Article XI of the Constitution of Texas may, by amendment to such city's charter, hold office not to exceed four (4) years; provided, that when a Railroad Commission is created by law it shall be composed of three (3) Commissioners who shall be elected by the people at a general election for State officers, and their term of office shall be six (6) years; provided, Railroad Commissioners first elected after this Amendment goes into effect shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two (2) years, and one four (4) years and one six (6) years; their terms to be decided by lot immediately after they shall have qualified. And one Railroad Commissioner shall be elected every two (2) years thereafter. In case of vacancy in said office the Governor of the State shall fill said vacancy by appointment until the next general election."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words, "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to so amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years," and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to so amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years."

NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 41

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

Section 1. That Section 5, of Article XI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. Cities having more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their chart-

ers; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent (2½) of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for at least two per cent (2%) thereon; provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every twelve (12) months."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934; at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months;" and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months."

HUNTER'S BAND WAGON

The way the big ones are rushing to get on the Hunter Band Wagon it seems this will be the most popular vehicle of transportation over the state from now until August 25. The Abilene Reporter-News was the first to announce that those newspapers will support Tom F. Hunter. Following the lead of the Abilene newspapers comes Clint Small, fourth in the race for governor in the July primaries, who announces that Hunter will get his support, but disclaiming any intent to carry his following with him onto the Hunter band wagon. Next to follow Small's lead is C. C. McDonald, who had submitted his future policy to a referendum of his followers, with result that 1,016 favored placing the McDonald votes for Hunter, 31 favored Allred and five were neutral. Announcing his purpose to keep his organization intact, and while not attempting to dictate or influence his followers, McDonald says the decision of his followers are in line with his own sentiments, as it is and has been all the time for himself and those who followed his banner as the runner-up candidate in the July primaries, to present a solid front in fighting the battles of the people. This he has done in his race for the governorship, and though he fell outside the breastworks of the political reservation, his campaign was clean-cut and in the interest of the common man. Therefore, the determination of the McDonald clan to remain a concrete body to vote and work for the weal of the masses is not more than was expected of them. Hence, the decision to throw the McDonald strength to Tom F. Hunter is what the people naturally expected, and is as salutary as it is commendable.

Another newspaper of prominence and influence to announce for Hunter is the Waco Record. But the Waco Record is a weekly newspaper, and an original Hunter paper. Most of the Texts weeklies are expected to support Hunter.

Other than the Abilene Reporter-News we know of few dailies who are espousing the cause of either Allred or Hunter, but most, if not all of the larger dailies, both individually owned and those controlled by the combinations, take their editorial policies from the business office, therefore are leaning toward the candidate supported by the special interests, Jimmie V. Allred, rather than Tom Hunter, the candidate of the people.

In the Allred rally at Dallas last week the retainers and boot-lickers of the special interests were on hand to serve their masters. All supporting for the governor the choice of the monopolies by whom they are employed, Jimmie V. Allred. One puny little clown, to amuse his masters, even went so far as to attempt to impersonate the physique of Hunter (who is slightly stooped shouldered) by haunching up his shoulders and drawing his pee-wee head down into his neck, as he said "to imitate the pigmy as much as he could."

This attempt at clowning was superfluous, as this shrivel abortion could easily have been the part without any pretention of acting—only been himself. The difference between this clown and Hunter is his emaciation and under-development begins with his brain, while Hunter, with an undersized body has a giant's brain, though slightly diminutive in body; while the critic, probably an overgrown nonentity, has the brain of a chimpanzee, whom he imitated in antics to amuse his masters while he was performing in the political arena at Dallas.

BANK DIRECTORS LIABLE

If the decision of Federal Judge A. J. Tuttle is followed fewer bank failures will be reported in the future. In the failure of the National Bank of Kentucky Judge Tuttle has decreed that the directors of the bank must pay to the receiver sums aggregating \$10,000,000 for the benefit of the depositors of the bank prior to its failure in 1930. Had this rule been followed in the past the Citizen is of the opinion that fewer failures would have been reported, and there would have been little need of a bank guaranty law.

We Favor Tom Hunter.

Friends of Tom Hunter are losing no time getting the runoff campaign under way. They met with the candidate in Marlin Friday to map out battle plans. And few doubt that the runoff will be a battle from start to finish, with two good campaigners "pouring it on."

Friday night Mr. Hunter made his opening speech at Hillsboro.

This newspaper, which supported Clint Small in the first primary, favors Tom Hunter in preference to Jimmie Allred. It believes Hunter comes nearer to expressing the hopes and aspirations of the great common people than his young rival. He is not identified with any political faction. He is a successful business man and old enough to keep his head amid the strife and stress of the times. We do not undertake to tell any individual how he shall vote, but we feel that we owe it to our readers to express this newspaper's own choice.

Both sides will be given the same unbiased news statement, but editorially this newspaper's support will go to Tom Hunter. —Abilene News

County Democrats Name Delegates To State Convention

Unlike most Democratic conventions, state, district or county, which are more or less turbulent, the county convention held at Eastland Saturday was a very tame affair, as Democratic conventions go. In years ago the writer remembers hearing one of the old Democrats remark: "I like to hear Democrats orate and scrap, for I know when Democrats wage these wordy fights they are making more Democrats."

Saturday's convention was without oratory, or a fight on the floor, save and except a little contest over the endorsement of the legislative record of the Hon. Cecil A. Lotief. The committee on resolutions reported two resolutions only, one endorsing President Roosevelt, and the other endorsing the record on Hon. Cecil A. Lotief while a member of the last legislature. Attorney Bob Grisham and Bill Dill opposed the Lotief resolution; W. O. Russell and R. W. H. Kennon defended the resolution, as did most of the members of the convention, if the applause could be taken as endorsement. But for the sake of having one harmonious convention the author of the Lotief resolution withdrew it, saying: "It was of little consequence whether this convention endorsed the flatorial representative or not, as the voters of Eastland county had already placed their stamp of approval on his record made at Austin."

The convention was called to order by Earl Conner, Jr., county chairman of the Democratic executive committee. Judge Eugene Lankford was elected temporary chairman and Miss Pearl Dunaway temporary secretary. Upon motion the temporary organization was made permanent.

Only two committees were appointed, a committee to name delegates to the state convention, composed of O. J. Russell, J. M. Flournoy and Homer Brelford. The committee on resolutions was composed of Bob Grisham, J. M. Parker and R. W. H. Kennon. This committee reported the Roosevelt and Lotief resolutions.

tomers. In the circular letter and personal representatives they tell Cisco people that their signing up with the new company does not bind them to keep their contract. This is an effort to induce the people to repudiate their own contract. The Hijackers know that it would be a dishonorable act for any man who has signed to take gas from the Cisco Gas Corporation not to keep his word. But whether you are honest or not is of little concern to them. All they want is to keep you on the books as patrons, and if by chance enough of our people repudiate their written contracts, and they are enabled to freeze out the new company, then they will sing you another song, one that will be to the tune of \$1.60 per 1,000 if they can legally put it over.

While they were writing the letter telling you how good they were to Cisco people, they are now defending a law suit, if they win, that will enable them to defeat the decree of the railroad commission by maintaining their 45 cent gate rate.

Talk Of The Taxes They Pay

They talk very glibly about the money they pay in taxes, and their men earning good wages, which are spent in Cisco. As a matter of fact every dollar they pay in taxes in Eastland county, and the wages paid their employes, comes out of the pockets of Cisco and Eastland county people. The monopoly does not pay this money until it is extracted from the pockets of Eastland county people, so forget that plea. You are paying the taxes. Not the trust.

But it seems they have seduced the people of Eastland by reducing the gas rate to 50 cents, after extorting on those people by charging a rate of \$1.50 for the past two years. Had they desired to do the right thing they would have refunded Eastland gas consumers that extra six bits they had extorted from them for the past two years.

Evidently Eastland folk have short memories, for they are being lulled to sleep by the 50 cent lullaby, as they have not yet demanded that its city commission give the Hickok corporation a franchise.

The Lone Star Gas Grabbers may prevent the Hickok corporation going into that field, but if they do Eastland will not enjoy her present rate very long. That 50 cent rate given that city is just an anaesthetic to put them to sleep while the gas monopoly kills off its competitor. That accomplished Eastland will wake up one of these mornings looking into a new rate promulgation spelling one dollar and fifty cents. Buts that's their funeral. The Citizen can only warn them, and if they fail to protect themselves none other than they are to blame.

As for Cisco and her people we are weary of the "Greeks bearing gifts."

Settlement Thought Probable of Cisco's Bonded Indebtedness

As the Citizen is being printed (this Thursday evening) the city commission is in conference with representatives of the holders of Cisco's bonds. The result of this conference will be published in next week's Citizen, as nothing for publication was given out in time for this week's issue.

According to Commissioner Bible the Commission had been presented a proposition from A. E. Nelson, of St. Paul, Minn., who represents a large percent of the bondholders, that was the best yet made. He said the proposition called for a refunding bond issue of 35 cents on the dollar, which two-thirds of the outstanding bonds would mean the cancellation of about and interest.

Bible stated it was proposed to issue bonds to the amount of \$1,694,700, plus \$60,000, the amount of the sinking fund now on hand, less the cost of printing the bonds.

The bond representative was here last Monday, when he made the proposition, which the commission took under advisement till his return here Thursday.

Eastland, Aug. 7.—June Timmons, negro, was held hero for safe-keeping today after he shot a truck driver in an attempted holdup near Cisco.

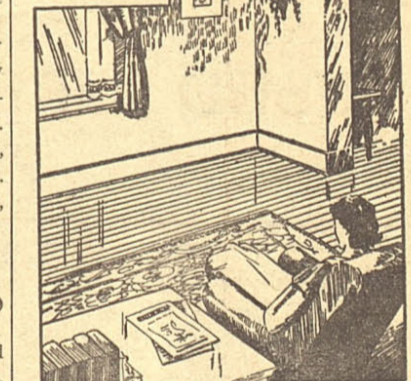
The victim, Louis Maddox, was in a Cisco hospital with a pistol wound in his right foot.
