"The other route, and one that Erlinger seemed to prefer, is to leave the Eastiand highway at the foot of the hill at the J. T. Stamps place east East 16th street, as at present, the routing would be to the right of hill and to the T. \& P. tracks east the C. \& N. E. shops; thence west on
East Eightth street to the Katy tracks: East Eightth street to the Katy tracks thence west on West Eighth street to
Front street or Legget avenue; thence in a northwest direction to the flat east of the Harrell farm would intersect the highway.
"If this route is chosen the plans are o build a new viaduct over the Katy road on East Eighth street, which alone will be a big asset for Cisco. Mr. Erlinger said he would recommend the highway through Cisco," Mr. Spencer said.
