## Commissioners Set County Tax Rate

The Eastland county commissioners court, in session this week, set the county tax rate at \$1.86 on the \$100 valuation for the next twelve months. This total is the same as for last year and only one or two slight differences were made in the items making up the total.

The rate is based upon an approximate valuation of \$30,000,000, which is about \$7,000,000 less than last year. The court felt, however, that the rate set would be sufficient and did not feel disposed to raise it if it were not absolutely necessary. It was pointed out that the fullest co-operation of the tax payers would be expected in the payment and collection of delinquent as well as current taxes due the county.

County Judge C. L. Garrett, the members of the commissioners court, Tax Assessor George Bryant and County Auditor W. S. Michael went to Austin last week where they had a conference with Governor Sterling in which they sought to have him permit the introduction at the called session of the legislature of a bill designed to permit Eastland county to withhold the payment of the state ad valorem tax until such time as other and more pressing debts could be paid. Had the bill been introduced and passed by the legislature it would have meant that the county could have deferred until some future date the payment of around \$100,000. Governor Sterling gave the delegation an attentive hearing, but stated that he could not permit the introduction of the bill.

The county rate of \$1.86 is made up as follows: Jury fund, 8 cents; road and bridge fund, 15 cents; general fund, 25 cents, courthouse and jail fund, 10 cents; hospital fund, 2 cents (this is an increase of 1 cent over last year); courthouse interest and sinking fund, 6 cents, road and bridge interest and sinking fund, \$1.20.

Last year there was a levy of 1 cent for the court house and jail interest and sinking fund. No levy was made for this fund this year, however, and 1 cent was added to the hospital maintenance fund, which made the total levy the same this year as last.

## Regular Meeting of City Commission

The City Commission met in regular session Monday afternoon. Among other things discussed was the lowering of gas rates for Cisco. The body voted that J. W. Moore of Lubbock be invited to appear before the Commission to discuss the matter. Mr. Moore has just been given a franchise by the city of Eastland for furnishing gas to that city at the rate of 50 cents per thousand cubic feet for domestic use. A \$25,000 bond to guarantee the carrying out of his agreement is to be made by Mr. Moort when there have been as much as 85 per cent of the gas users of that city signed up to use his gas.

Mr. Moore proposes to have a minimum charge of \$1.25 and a \$3.00 tapping charge. Service charge of \$1.00. It is expected that Mr. Moore, as well as several others who are interested in the matter of furnishing a gas supply to the city of Cisco will meet with the commission at a very early date and go into detail as to the definite propositions which they all have to offer. The commission, backed up by the strong sentiment of the people of Cisco, are determined to bring about measures in some manner which will secure cheaper gas rates. This is a matter which demands close and careful study as to the best step to be taken by the commission; but certainly much cheaper rates we are entitled to and can easily get, and cheaper rates we are going to have.

The commission was given the information that the auditors, Ernst & Ernst, who have been busy here for some time in making a complete audit of the city books, had completed the work and that their report was now being prepared in type-written form in their offices at Fort Worth and Dallas, and would be in shape to present to the commission about the last of this week. The report will cover approximately 50 type-written sheets, and is said to be a very thorough one in every detail.

Some discussion was had concerning the proposed new contract for the Cisco Amusement Co., but action on this was deferred to a later date.

Final passage was made on the ordinance relative to the traffic signs recently placed at various points in the business district, also on the ordinance in regard to requiring sanitary pit toilets to take the place of all surface toilets now inside the city limits.

F. E. Harrell appeared before the meeting asking for payment of \$348.62, covering a bill of material purchased from Rockwell Bros. lumber yard by A. B. O'Flaherty to be used in the improvement work done at the cemetery when the archway entrance was constructed. It was moved by Donovan and seconded by Fee that the account be paid. The motion carried.

Some tax matters were adjusted and other bills allowed.

The five-room dwelling of V. L. McCluskey at 504 East 13th street was destroyed by fire at about 2 o'clock Thursday morning. The cause is not known, but is thought probably due to wiring. The family was away, and did not learn of the fire till next morning. Insurance of \$2,500 was carried on the house and furnishings, it was stated.

**New Hitch Hiker Law**

The hitchhikers' law which was passed by the regular session of the Forty-Second Legislature, goes into effect August 27. After that date no free passengers of an automobile in Texas will have a cause of action against the owner of the automobile because of injuries which may be sustained by the free passenger. Exceptions are made only in cases where it can be shown that the injuries resulted from malice or recklessness on the part of the owner.

**Drunken Driver Menace**

In Ontario, where there is a mounting death toll from drunken drivers, the provincial government gives every motorist a pointed warning that many motor accidents are the results of liquor. This warning tells the motorist that it takes one-fifth of a second for a normal brain to send out the message which will enable the owner of that brain to put on the brakes in an emerg-

ency. The same process takes from two-fifths of a second to three-fifths of a second when a man has taken the average drink. A car going 35 miles an hour will travel 20 feet in two-fifths of a second and the government of Ontario warns drivers against liquor, specifically on that point.

**Power Commission Investigating Utilities**

According to a dispatch from Washington, the Power Commission has now gone in for an investigation of the entire electric power industry of the United States, going far beyond the companies which are under Federal regulation. It is said that questionnaires have been mailed to all licensees of the commission and to the holding companies with which they are related, to determine the management, control, and financing of the licensed concerns. It demands a full accounting of the securities of every electric utility concern, the terms of agreements for management, supervision or service between licensed and unlicensed companies, and the links each company has with other concerns through overlapping directorates and executives. The operating companies are asked to submit a list of all hydro or steam plants they operate which are non federally licensed, and must submit the names of the biggest commercial customers of their licensed plants, together with the gross revenue from these non-utility purchasers. Fifteen pages of questions are submitted and are so arranged as to trace inter-relationship even in cases where absolute control is not shown. The relationship of industrial rates to domestic, and

differences in classes of industrial consumers also may be disclosed.

Uncle Sam is an accomplished artist at investigating. It is his popular pastime. It is also very popular with our state governmental departments. Sometimes it is a step toward accomplishing better things. And sometimes it is just a side-step from securing any actual results. It is hoped in this instance it is the former.

**Yes, Times Have Changed In Fifty Years**

Yes, times do change! Fifty years ago women were wearing hoop skirts, bustles, petticoats, corsets, cotton stockings, high buttoned shoes, flannel night gowns, puffs in their hair—did their own cooking, baking, cleaning, washing, ironing, raising big families—went to church Sunday—were too busy to be sick.

Men wore whiskers, square hats, Ascot ties, red flannel underwear, big watches and chains, chopped wood for stoves, bathed once a week—drank ten cent whiskey and five cent beer, rode bicycles, buggies, sleighs—went in for politics—worked twelve hours a day—and lived to a ripe old age.

Stores burned coal oil lamps, carried everything from a needle to a plow, trusted everybody, never took an inventory, placed orders for goods a year in advance—most always made money.

But this is the good year 1931. Today women wear silk stockings, short skirts, low shoes, no corsets, something less than an ounce of underwear, have bobbed hair, smoke, paint, powder, drink cocktails, play bridge, drive cars, have pet dogs, hire some work done—let the other go, and go in for politics.

Men have high blood pressure, wear no hats and some no hair, shave their whiskers, shoot golf, bathe twice a day, ride in airplanes, play the stock market all day, drink poison all night, never go to bed the same day they get up, are misunderstood at home, work sometimes five hours a day, play ten, live too fast—and die young.

Stores have electric lights, elevators, cash registers, never have what the customer wants, trusts nobody, take inventory daily, never pay in advance, have overhead, mark up, mark down, quote, budget, advertising, stock control, annual and semi annual, end of month, dollar day, founders day, rummage, economy day sales, and a hundred other kinds of sales—and never make any money!

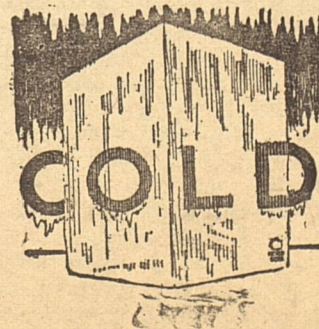
