

City Manager Moore reported to the council that the city now has general and automobile liability insurance, as well as physical damage coverage and police professional. However, the city will be paying over \$40,000 a year for the \$1/2 million coverage.

Mr. Moore said this makes for a very difficult situation, and he will be continued to have it monitored. He said he had budgeted an amount for insurance this year which was double the past amount, but, the actual cost to the city is twice the amount budgeted. That is a 400 percent increase in insurance cost to the city.

Mr. Moore stressed the insurance problems are not unique to Cisco since new rulings have caused a number of insurance carriers to drop municiapal coverage.

Council members instructed Mr. Moore to prepare a resolution dedicating "Fiesta Park", located at the corner of Avenue F and West 15th Street, to the veterans of Cisco. He said he believes the park will honor the Cisco veterans of the Vietnam era, and a group of veterans has

PANDORA'S BOX

Jealousy and Envy generally are credited with being a couple of the bugs that felw out of Pandora's Box when she opened it. I would have expected Curiosity to have been inside that box, too. How did Pandora fall victim to it?

Of the two, I opt for envy to be worse than Jealousy. I do feel the difference is debatable. I understand about jealousy. But I may be identifying them wrongly, too.

Lately, I read an editorial column that had as its theme an ideas that suggested problems with the minorities of the world are based in envy and/or jealousy.

We could name names, point fingers, voice prejudices, color and wire for sound. We can also get along with only a couple of divisions: The Haves and the Have-Nots.

Read your history books. The dust-ups in the world have usually come from the Have-Nots. They decide that several Somebodies, usually the Haves, but it may be other Have-Nots, are in possession of something they want. The Somebodies don't necessarily want to hand over what they have,

whether they earned it or inherited it.

Conflict-lots of conflict. Well, that's the nature of the beast, isn't it? If I want to give you the shirt off my back, that's one thing. If you want to take my shirt, willynilly, that's another thing. Of course, much depends

on why you want my shirt. If the only reason you yearn for it is because I have it, that sounds like envy to me. If you start grumbling and grousing and putting me and my shirt down, isn't that jealousy?

How many times can you find historical instances where the Have-Nots became Haves? How much gracious recognition have they received for their efforts, either as groups or as individuals?

Think of the people in your own orbit. There are certain to be some who were originally Have-Nots. Are they fully accepted by the somewhat smug Haves? Surface level, maybe.

Are the Have-Nots proud of them for making it up into a more comfortable world? Or is an unenthusiastic, "Yeah, but ... " about the extent of appreciation from their recent Have-Not peers? What makes "the crowd"

jeer at a group or individual trying and succeeding at a

difficult objective? The crowd doesn't really mind failure of another's efforts makes the detractor more worthwhile-in his own eyes, anyway.

Does success shame and Have-Not-ters? It may. Why doesn't it always serve as an affirmative inspiration of only occasionally? Progress can be so slow. Destruction can be so swift.

But jealousy and envy are negative qualities, and this is one instance where two negatives a positive do not

> make! Even if there were no concrete negatives, neither quality is constructive. It takes time and effort to concentrate on jealousy or envy. While busy about either, or both, it's a cinch no building up of any positive charge about anything in the life of an individual or of a nation can take place.

There probably is a social significance about jealousy and/or envy that escapes me. Maybe. Maybe they have their places as do gnats, and flies and rattlesnakes. Maybe.

I really do wish Pandora had baked a batch of cookies instead of opening that box.



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

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

Guest Slot

Everyone likes to read about their special interest, group or team in the community newspaper. You may be planning a benefit or other social event that needs the support of your local newspaper. Perhaps you would like to express your views or response to the views of others.

This guide will give you the basics of dealing with your local editor, so that you can "get your story out" in the fastest, simplest way. It is a guide that will answer your basic questions about how news makes it to print, how to contact your newspaper and how to present your story. We offer this guide in the interest of working together to keep the community informed.

PUBLICITY BASICS Only one person from your organization should be in touch with the newspaper.

It is often said there are three rules of journalism: accuracy, accuracy and accuracy. Write everything down, check the spelling of names and never trust your memory.

Get your story to the newspaper as soon as possible. Know the newspaper's deadlines. Whenever possible, let the newspaper know

letters to the editor or opinion columns. Give more description in feature stories. Keep your newswriting to the point, with the most interest and important information first.

DEADLINES Pre-planned events should always reach the editor's desk well before the lastminute rush.

Learn your newspaper's deadlines, and keep as far ahead of them as possible. It is always best to stop by or call the newspaper office after the last issue has been published, rather than just before the presses roll. Remember that there will be times when an editor or reporter is simply too close to deadline to talk to you.

THE OPINION PAGE When you write letters to the editor, always include your name, address, affiliation (if any), and phone number. As a matter of accountability, and to protect the newspaper from irresponsible letter writers, newspapers rarely publish a letter without this information. If you have an opinion, remember that the opinion

or editorial page is considered the property of the

public; it's your page, so feel free to use it. Editors appreciate receiving your views for this page. PICTURES

Editors are always seeking good picture opportunities. If you think your story merits a photo, talk to the editor about it. If a newspaper photographer cannot make it to your event, take one yourself and include it with your story or release.

Always try for action, rather than posed, pictures. If little Jane Doe, for example, has been presented an award for volunteering at the local hospital, a picture of Jane at work is much better than one of the mayor presenting her with an award. Write the cutline, or description, of the photo on a separate piece of paper rather than the back of the photo, and list names left to right.

MAKING NEWS

Chances are, if you follow deadlines, concentrate and maintain a good relationship with your editor, your organization will make the news and your information will make it out to the community. This guide was developed

by the National Newspaper Association, representatives of more than 5,000 community newspapers, to assist newspaper publishers in their effort to better serve their communities.

Use creativity. If you have an idea for a feature story, suggest it. Newspaper editors appreciate fresh ideas.

WHAT'S NEWS? Editors choose their news according to the importance of an event to their communities. A fire, a crime, or an accident is important but so is the award your club gave last week. Club selections, new projects, unusual actions, social events, milestones, athletic events, benefits that need public support, and member participation in local, national or world events are all of interest to your community newspaper.

PACKAGING Your newspaper sees a constant barrage of paper. You're already one step ahead if your news release or story is obviously local.

However, remember that the typical editor must make quick decisions regarding newsworthiness. As a newspaper reader you know that your reading decisions are based first on the headline, and then on the first paragraph of the news item.

Give the most important information first. Be sure to give the "who, what, when, where and how" of the story right away. Background material should come last.

Include the name of the contact, the group, and a phone number at the top of the page for quick reference. When submitting a story to

your local newspaper, type it double-spaced on one side of 8^{1/2}-by-11 inch paper. Start about one-third of the way down on the paper on the first page and leave ample margins. Number your pages. When you're done,

WRITING Use your simplest English.

Never use fancy wording or terms that only a member of your club would understand. Watch the newspaper to learn its style. Most important, be honest, impartial, accurate and brief. Never use a quote unless it is direct and accurate, and always identify your sources.

Remember that there can be different writing styles for different parts of the newspaper. Use "I" only in

will produce for your pleasure. They are one of the mainstays of Grandmother's Garden, and this is one of the reasons why.



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



Tips For Mailing Gifts

This Christmas

With a little bit of care, holiday cards and packages can arrive on time and in good shape, says Postmaster Venita.

In addition to mailing early, postal customers are urged to properly address cards . and packages with the name, house number and street (or post office box) number, and the city, state and ZIP Code reserved for the last line. Use of apartment numbers is encouraged.

"It is also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels, and be sure the addressing on the outside of the parcel includes your return address and ZIP Code," Postmaster Roach says.

Customers are also reminded to check the size of their envelopes before mail-

- including all sides, top and bottom. Commercially available foam shells or airpocket padding also are good cushioning materials. Padded mailing bags are a good way to mail small items. DON'T OVERWRAP: Just

use vour carton. Brown paper and twine cords are not necessary. Paper can rip, and twine can become entangled in mail processing equipment.

SEAL PROPERLY: Close your parcel with one of the three recommended types of tape: pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper, or glass-reinforced pressure sensitive. Don't use cellophane tape or masking tape - they aren't sturdy enough. It's a good idea to put a slip with the address and return address inside the parcel.

AVOID SMUDGES: Use smudge-proof ink for your addressing.

POSITION ADDRESSES PROPERLY: Put the recipient's address in the lower right portion of the package. Put your return address in

the upper left corner only one side of the package. Remove all other labels. USE ZIP CODES: Be sure to include the Zip Code in both the recipient's address and your address. Remember, wrong ZIP Codes can delay the mail. APARTMENT

NUMBERS: Using apartment numbers or suite numbers, when you know them, helps the Postal Service deliver the mail in large buildings.

TIME IT RIGHT: Mail early in the month and early in the day

USE THE RIGHT SER-VICE: Irreplaceable items, such as cash and other

valuables, should be sent by **Registered Mail.**

IF YOU RUN OUT OF TIME: Priority Mail affords First-Class handling for packages weighing over 12 ounces and up to 70 pounds. Priority Mail can be sent from any post office, station or branch or through rural carriers to any address in the U.S. Delivery of Priority Mail is accomplished in two to three days anywhere in the country. Priority Mail can even be used for foreign mailings.

The service is available with insurance, return receipt, COD, certicates of mailing and Special Delivery.
