DeLeon recovered a Cisco fumble late in the first quarter to set up their second scoring drive of the night. Three plays later, DeLeon's Brent Hooker took the ball in from two yards out. Again the PAT kick by Williams was good, making the score 14-to-0 with 11:23 remaining in the second

quarter. With 2:26 left in the second quarter, DeLeon's Hooker scored on a 59-yard run but a clipping penalty against the Bearcats called the touchdown back. The Loboes then managed to keep the Bearcats from making very much yardage and took over possession of the ball.

Seeds Planted In Minds And Soil Of Ethiopians

"I am 35 years old, but my life has been like one year. I now have a wonderful new beginning," said a participant in a training seminar held in Ethiopa on how to grow food-producing family

The Seminar, part of "Operation Seed For Life", was sponsored by Washington-based ADRA International (Adventist Development and Relief Agency), and made it possible for 39 Ethiopans to learn how to train others to grow gardens to feed their families.

ADRA International, a non-profit humanitarian agency of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, has widespread work throughout the world. It operates with the philosophy that the best way to assist other people is to help them develop their own potential as far as possible. It also responds with immediate aid to disasters in the U.S. and overseas.

Although organized after World War II, ADRA is among the eight largest private volunteer organizations in this country. Much of the money for its support comes from the contributions of Church members, but there is a growing public response to what the organization is trying to do.

ADRA's special training in food growing in Ethiopa began recently, when 6,000 lbs. of vegetable seeds were shipped to that country. Vegetables, which form a part of the Ethiopian diet, were shipped because they can produce a harvest within 6 wks. - two months of planting instead of the four months needed for grain to

Once the seeds arrived, the ADRA staff traveled to Addis Ababa to conduct the two week Seminar. Ken Flemmer, ADRA's agriculture specialist, and Jim Rankin, who is in charge of ADRA's highly successful Scientific Gardening Project in Zimbabwe, gave practical instructions in gardening methods that would increase yield and minimize the effects of drought. They explained how to prepare the soil, make rows that would retain water, make compost

and how to irrigate. Each newly-trained agricultural instruction was given a supply of seeds for gardens in his own village. Plans were for this trainee to travel from village to village, giving additional instructions.

Ken Flemmer expresses an optomistic attitude. "You may say 39 Ethiopians is not very many people to teach in a land of 30 million. But it's a start - and a good one. By the end of May we heard that just one of our graduates had mobilized 3,000 people to plant gardens. As of today, over 21,000 gardens have been planted as a result of

the 6,000 lbs. of grain provided by ADRA.

"We feel sure that by the time 'Operation Seed For Life' has had a chance to prove itself it will be a great success. We just sent \$60,000 to Ethiopa to buy 100 tons of wheat and teft (a local grain) and shipped another 10 tons of vegetables seeds.

According to Jim Blackwood, Director of ADRA Ethiopia, "This enables us to plant an additional 49,000 vegetable gardens, making a total of 70,000. By the end of the Ethiopian rainy season, we anticipate a total of 100,000 gardens which will feed 400,000 people for up to six months.

"The 100 tons of wheat and teft provided by ADRA will produce enough food to feed 150,000 Ethiopians for 30 days. In addition, ADRA is feeding 45,000 Ethiopians daily as part of its immediate relief effort."

"We learned in Zimbabwe that if a trainee doesn't use his knowledge within three months to train others, he probably never will," reported Tina Hudgins, an ADRA staffer, "so we helped them develp specific plans to use the things they were





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28 Prison Parolees Now In Eastland County Area

As of now, there isn't a large influx of prison parolees into Eastland County - but there's no telling what the future holds.

The August 1985 issue of "Fiscal Notes" from the office of Bob Bullock, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, warns:

"Running the state's prison system during the next two years is expected to cost more than \$953.5 million, or 53.9 percent above the \$619.8 million appropriated for this bien-

"This increase is laid at the feet of a federal court decision ordering Texas to improve conditions in state prisons," the publication states further.

There have been some recent changes in the prison system due to new laws, says Marsha McLane, Supervisor of the State Parole office located in Abilene. As yet, however, they have caused no large influx of parolees into the Eastland County area, she adds.

This office oversees 14 counties of West Central Texas, reaching across from Scurry and Mitchell over to Callahan and Eastland County.

Sandra Pickrell, head of the District Parole office. visits Eastland County and deals directly with the parolees here. Marsha McLane was in charge of the Eastland County work before taking over her present position.

It should be noted that "parole" and "probation" are very different terms. A person is on probation when he was convicted of an offense, but was given a term of supervision rather than being sent to prison. Locally this case will be handled by the Eastland County Dept. of Probation.

A person on parole has been convicted, sent to prison, and has served part of his term. Due to good behavior, overcrowding or other legal reasons he has been freed and returned to a term of supervision. This is handled by the State Probation Department for this

At the present time there are 28 persons on parole in Eastland County, according to Miss McLane. Only two of them are women. Most of them were originally sentenced here, and they are scattered rather evenly across the County. Some of their transfers here were stepped up because of the

new laws, such as the Prison Management Act and the Ruiz settlement.

Under current laws, when a prison raches 94 percent capacity prisoners have to be moved out. Miss McLane mentions that Federal Judged William Wayne Justice has been "a major rule maker" in such decisions.

"Eastland County has always been tops in the way it works with us," McLane reports. "I first went there in 1981, and always had excellent cooperation from the District Attorney and Law Enforcement Officers.

"Some counties simply won't work with us - they don't want to have anything to do with this program."

She says that most of the parolees now back in Eastland County were convicted for burglary of habitation, DWI, or writing bad checks - with only a few on drug violations. Persons who have committed violent crimes must serve "One-third of their time flat" before being eligible for parole. There have been no major problems with any of the parolees here, she

The amount of parolees in a County, McLane indicated, does reflect the overall volume of crime there. Eastland County, population around 20,000, has remained about the same over the years, with around 20 parolees the norm.

"No, Eastland County hasn't had any more problems with crime than any other," she said. "I would say it's about average."

She mentions that Scurry, population 18,193 is "one of the more active counties" in her area, with 70 persons currently paroled there.

Nolan County, population 17,359, is also somewhat above Eastland, with 30 people on parole.

The release of an inmate from prison on parole, she explains, is somewhat com-

It depends on his sentence, type of crime, and special requests from the County where he was sentenced. The inmate is asked where he wants to go, and if there are no reasons why he should not return to his home county he is permitted to do so.

A complete record is kept of each parolee in Eastland County, and Sandra Pickrell has personal contact with each individual three to four times each month. A special reporting is done once each month, and there are home visits and other types of

communication. At times there is psychological counseling and other kinds of help for the released prisoner. If any severe problems arise, such as those with drug abuse, the

State Parole Office attempts to handle them.

"There has been a change in this type of work dueing the past few years," Miss McLane says, "And in many ways it is more hopeful. The cooperation of the local Law Enforcement Community is all-important in this.

"It may take a long time to really turn this thing around," she said, "to work through some of the problems. But at least some progress has been made."

Old Meets New At County Fair

DUE AT COUNTY FAIR
A RESTORATION PROJECT

This 1939 ford Pickup was acquired in 1978 from some kids in Las Cruces, New Mexico. It had a 4-cylinder Pontiac engine in it, and they drove it daily to New Mexico State University. It looked terrible, but I could see beneath the rust, grease and dirt, and visualized how it might appear after a total restoration. After some gentle persuasion I bought it for \$800.00. (The truck sold new in '39 for about \$900.00.) How do I know? I was with my dad when he purchased one like it at that price in 1939 from Curly Maynard at King-Ball Motor Company in Eastland.

I began the restoration March 1st, 1980, and set myself a goal of five years to complete it. The first step was to completely dismantle the vehicle, down to the last nut and bolt; tag each part that was not easily recognizable, and place them in boxes or on shelves designed for that purpose. Starting wit the frame and chasis, it was sandblased to remove all rust. Upon replacing all parts with new ones in the running gear and renweing the brakes, all parts were painted and reassembled. After hassling through four engine blocks, the 5th one was a winner; no cracks, so it was prepared for a complete rebuilding by a retired old-timer mechanic in Tuscon, Arizona. When the original 85 HP flat-head V-8 was returned to me, the transmission was attached and then installed. The partially built truck was drive around or neighborhood for about two years with just a seat bolted to the frame. Another milestone.

When most of the mechanical work was completed, I began to prepare body parts by beating out giant dents and cutting out rusted area of sheet metal. As each piece was hammered out to perfection, it was primered, then assembled. All body parts have to fine and line up property, so when this was accomplished, you guessed it; it had to come apart again for painting. Each small (and large) piece was painted separately so the underside appears just as well as the upper side. They were then hung in our garage like beef; there they were kept until enough pieces were finished for final assembly to be started.

By March 1st, this year, I had almost met my deadline. The vehicle was road-worthy, but lacked numerous small details. (Since that time, I

have decided that it will never really be completed for I find little things to be done every time I look at it.) However, it is so complete that the average viewer would likely to fail to notice the small details that I do because of having handled each and every part several times over.

The vehicle is restored to original. However, I felt compelled to equip it with some extras that were not available to me back in those days. Among those are dual exhaust system; dual outside rearview mirrors; beauty rings; white wall tires; dual tail lamps; blue dotts; locking spare, etc. These were all available as accessories at that time, but I for one never saw one so equipped. Besides, who could afford such beauty as Beauty rings for \$1.50 each; Locking spare \$2.50; right-hand outside rearview mirrow--never heard of it; Whitewalls, at least \$2.00 each; dual exhaust systems were desirable, but who could afford an extra \$10.00? Do any of our readers recall that a factory-fresh engine exchange could

be had for about \$35.00? How about \$7.50 to install it?

I entered my cars in our Annual Antique and Classic Car Show recently, for the first time. With a speedometer reading of less than 200 miles, the '39 Ford pickup won First Place in the Commercial division. (My 1936 Ford, 4-door Convertible took a trophy for best in the entire show; in addition, it drew a blue ribbon for first place in pre-1940 models).

The complete and total restoration project by a rank amateur (who barely knew how to change spark plugs) was indeed a pleasure. However, it must be said that frustrations and dissappointments were many and varied. Even a few tears were shed when so much time was spent on a particular item, then found to be unusable, or worse, broken. I also found to my dismay that many parts dealers are not to be trusted and send correct parts. Worse still, some would not accept them back for credit. But, the bottom line is that my tenacious nature allowed me to com-

plete the job. I do not care to undertake another one, but am extremely proud that I finished this one, because it gives me great pleasure to share the nostalgia associated with old cars of that era. Many of you will recall some old ones of your own and rekindle some fond memories...perhaps, some not so fond.

Perhaps, some of you will identify with this particular vehicle for one reason or another, and there will be others who will remember the original pickup our dad owned, and I drove so much during 1939, 1940, and beyond.

I want to publicly thank my wife, Norma for per participation and patience in this undertaking. She was always there when something was too heavy to lift by myself; wrap the many cuts and bruises, and to lean on when the going was really rough. She never once mentioned divorce, but I'm really glad she didn't because this restoration project would have certainly never reached fruition—and you wouldn't be reading about it right now.

Twenty-Eight Prison Parolees Now In Eastland County

As of now, there isn't a large influx of prison parolees into Eastland County - but there's no telling

The August 1985 issue of 'Fiscal Notes" from the office of Bob Bullock, State Comptroller of Public Ac-

counts, warns: "Running the state's prison system during the next two years is expected to cost more than \$953.5 million, or 53.9 percent above the \$619.8 million appropriated for this biennium."

"This increase is laid at the feet of a federal court decision ordering Texas to improve conditions in state prisons," the publication states further.

There have been some recent changes in the prison system due to new laws, says Marsha McLane, Supervisor of the State Parole office located in Abilene. As yet, however, they have caused no large influx of parolees into the Eastland County area, she adds.

This office oversees 14 counties of West Central Texas, reaching across from Scurry and Mitchell over to Callahan and Eastland County.

Sandra Pickrell, head of the District Parole office, visits Eastland County and deals directly with the parolees here. Marsha McLane was in charge of the Eastland County work before taking over her present position.

It should be noted that "parole" and "probation" are very different terms. A person is on probation when he was convicted of an offense, but was given a term of supervision rather than being sent to prison. Locally this case will be handled by the Eastland County Dept. of Probation.

A person on parole has been convicted, sent to prison, and has served part of his term. Due to good behavior, overcrowding or other legal reasons he has been freed and returned to a term of supervision. This is handled by the State Probation Department for this

At the present time there are 28 persons on parole in Eastland County, according to Miss McLane. Only two of them are women. Most of them were originally sentenced here, and they are scattered rather evenly across the County. Some of their transfers here were stepped up because of the new laws, such as the Prison Management Act and the

Enforcement Officers. 'Some counties simply won't work with us - they don't want to have anything to do with this program."

She says that most of the parolees now back in Eastland County were convicted for burglary of habitation, DWI, or writing bad

checks - with only a few on drug violations. Persons who have committed violent crimes must serve "One-third of their time flat" before being eligible for parole. There have been no major problems with any of the parolees here, she

reports. The amount of parolees in a County, McLane indicated, does reflect the overall volume of crime there. Eastland County, population around 20,000, has remained about the same over the years, with around 20 parolees the norm.

"No, Eastland County hasn't had any more problems with crime than any other," she said. "I would say it's about average."

She mentions that Scurry, population 18,193 is "one of the more active counties" in her area, with 70 persons currently paroled there. Nolan County, population 17,359, is also somewhat above Eastland, with 30 people on parole.

The release of an inmate from prison on parole, she explains, is somewhat complicated.

It depends on his sentence, type of crime, and special requests from the County where he was sentenced. The inmate is asked where he wants to go, and if there are no reasons why he should not return to his home county he is permitted to do so.

A complete record is kept of each parolee in Eastland County, and Sandra Pickrell has personal contact with each individual three to four times each month. A special

reporting is done once each month, and there are home visits and other types of communication.

At times there is psychological counseling and other kinds of help for the released prisoner. If any severe problems arise, such as those with drug abuse, the State Parole Office attempts

to handle them. "There has been a change in this type of work dueing the past few years," Miss McLane says, "And in many ways it is more hopeful. The cooperation of the local Law Enforcement Community is

all-important in this. "It may take a long time to really turn this thing around," she said, "to work through some of the problems. But at least some progress has been made.







Drilling Bits

At a location one-half mile northwest of Ranger, Ridge Oil Co. has finaled a new oil producer in Eastland County's Northwest Ranger Field.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 1 Gilbert, a developmental venture of T.L. Robertson Operating in Eastland County's Marsan Field. Spudded July 12, the well had reached a total depth of 3,321 feet. Drillsite was four miles south-southeast of Carbon.

Inland Land & Minerals of Plano has revealed plans to drill a 1,400-ft. developmen-Regular Field. The operator has 90 acres leased, with drillsite in the William Norman Survey, A-545, and has designated the venture as the No. 1-A E.A. Webb. Drillsite is six miles south of Ranger.

Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood con-

trol projects. The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the tal well in the Eastland creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conquality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anni-

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.



Reward Posted For Attacks

In an appearance before the Commissioners Court meeting Monday morning Sept. 9 Sheriff Don Underwood stated that he was deeply concerned about the drug situation in Eastland County.

He informed the Court, Judge Scott Bailey and spectators that some person or persons had threatened the wife of a law enforcement officer in Gorman in one recent incident and a Deputy Sheriff in another.

The attack in Gorman was reported around 1:30 a.m. Thursday, Sept. 5. A man entered the officers home while he was out working, went to a bedroom, and put a gun to the head of the officers wife. She was told to get on the police radio and tell her husband and Underwood to "back off" their drug investigations or she would be killed. The woman was then hit in the head with the gun.

In another incident, which the Sheriff believes related, a Deputy was shot at from a pickup truck at 12:15 a.m. Sunday on FM 2563 near Kokomo.

The vehicle pulled alongside the Deputy Sheriff's car, and a man raised up in back and fired a shot through the open window beside the officer. The shot went through it and broke out the window on the other side. Two more shots were fired at the police car as the pickup raced away. The Deputy fired two shots at his assailants.
