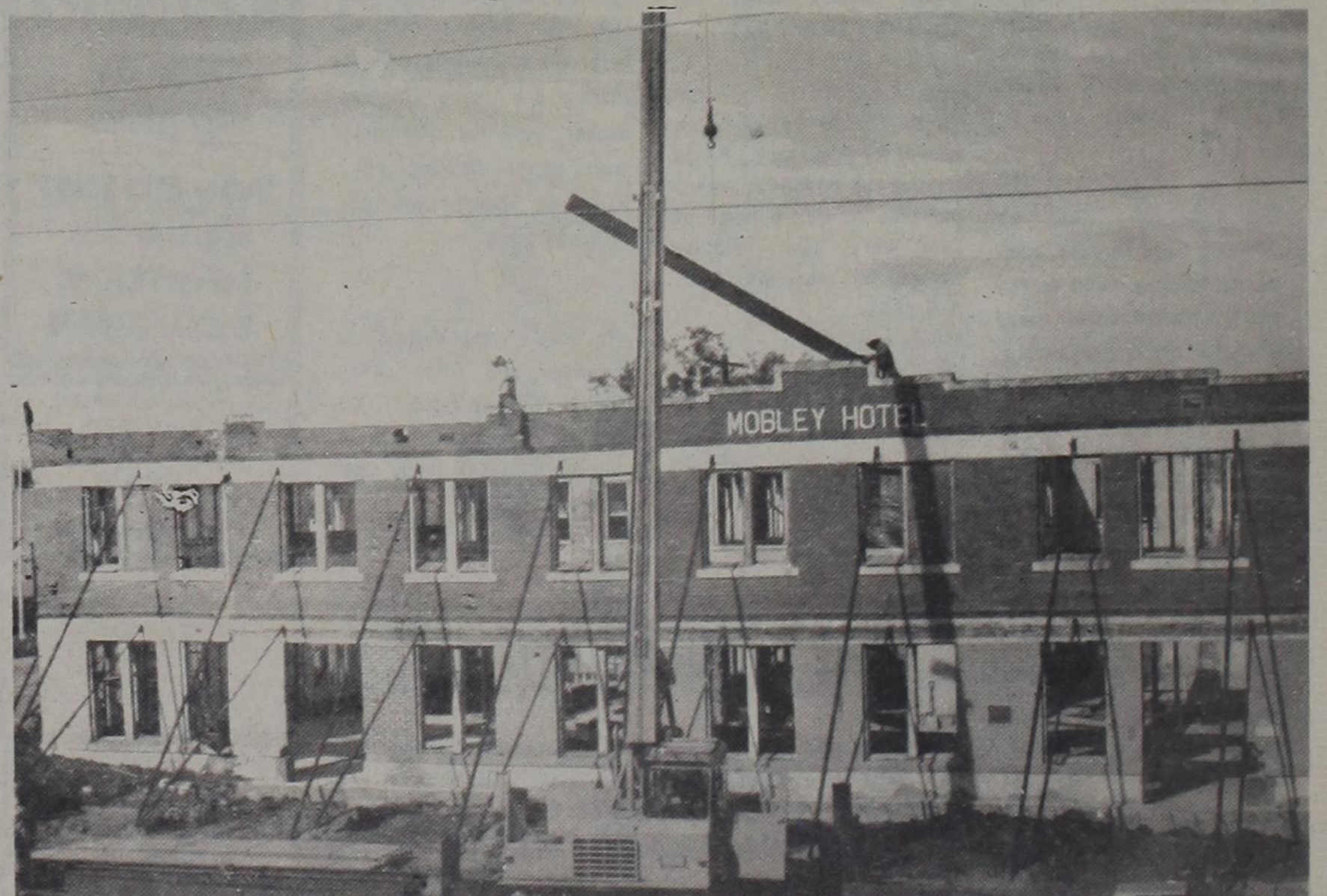

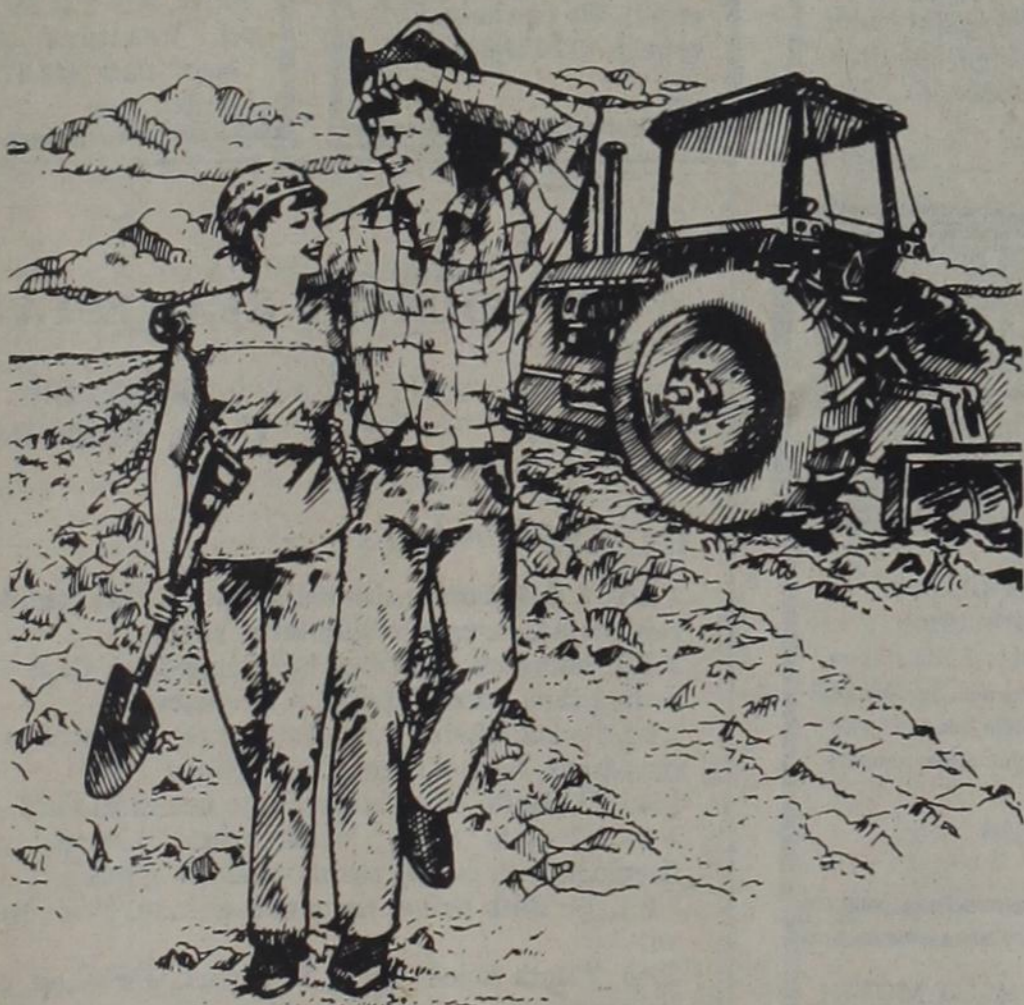

# Drilling Bits



## Ranger Oil Well Is Still Going Strong

The Richey Well of '85 could very well go down in Texas oil history right along side the McCleskey, and according to some reports, Spindletop. The violent well which blew in nearly two weeks ago just south of Ranger apparently is turning out to be a gigantic producer. Estimates of production, and that's all that is available right now, place it right up toward the top scale of gushers.

Unconfirmed reports of other wells to be spotted adjacent to this producer are already in the works, and it's a fact that tankers trucks are having trouble keeping up with the flow from the well into the catching pits.

It's been a spectacular event and has attracted viewers from far and wide as it spewed unchecked for days, and now that it's being controlled and flared, it's still a wonder — adding new chapters to Eastland County's Oil Boom history. At some \$27.00 a barrel, it's likely to be a most profitable venture. Some sources are even saying that it could be the "biggest in the state" if not "the nation."

Testing will tell the tale.

# Eastland County Sheriff's Employees Claim Wage-Labor Non-Compliance In Letter

What appears to be a letter of intent from an attorney for a number of employees of the County Sheriff's Department has been received by County Judge Scott Bailey, the County Commissioners, and other City Officials.

The attorney, Bill Flanary of Paris, Texas, states that he is contacting them regarding overtime pay for the Sheriff's Department.

## Steps Being Explored For Man's Removal

A group of citizens from Precinct 2, Brad Stephenson, James Walsh, Willie Cantwell Sr., Corvis Beck and Kenneth Kirk met with District Attorney Emory Walton Tuesday morning, Nov. 26.

Their purpose was to explore the route they need to take and what steps will be necessary to have Commissioner Jack Blackwell removed from office and a successor appointed.

Several things were discussed, with Attorney Walton explaining what was needed to build a case. The group discussed circulation of a new Petition in Pct. 2 asking for Mr. Blackwell's resignation. They also learned what must be done to bring action against him.

For the next two weeks the group will be researching for filing necessary instruments to bring this action in District Court.

They made an appointment to meet again with Attorney Walton about Dec. 12. They have hopes of bringing this formal action around the middle of December.

The employees represented are Jerry Hefflin, Chief Deputy, Gene Russell, Deputy and Jail Administrator, H.T. Fillingim, Deputy, Albert E. White, Deputy and Jailer, and Jailers William Green and Raymond Lindsey.

The lawyer says, among other things, that Eastland County is not in compliance with the Fair Labor Standards Act, and that at least one Deputy is not being paid even minimum wage.

"Please consider this letter as demand upon Eastland County to correct this non-compliance and to properly reimburse the officers for all overtime work subsequent to April 15, 1985," he says.

## Search Of Suspect Finds Marijuana

A 28-year old Cisco man who was arrested last weekend on a disorderly conduct charge also faced a Class B misdemeanor count after a search of his pockets produced a marijuana cigarette, Police Chief Billy Rains reported Monday.

The man, W.D. Hotaling, was arrested in the 600 block of West 4th Street on the disorderly conduct count. At the county jail, officers had him empty his pockets and the marijuana cigarette surfaced.

Chief Rains said the man was fined \$69 in city court on the disorderly conduct charge and was placed under \$500 bond on the marijuana count. He was still in the county jail Monday afternoon.

He concludes the letter with: "I direct your attention to the fact that if litigation becomes necessary that you may be liable for double damages, court costs and attorney's fees."

Eastland County officials have referred the letter to their legal advisors, and have also contacted State Wage-and-Hour officials who have worked with them on the problems of overtime pay.

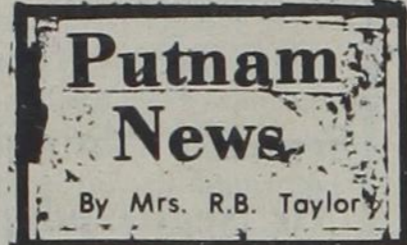

## Large Crowd Hears Buddy Sipe's Review Of Recent Holy Land Trip At AARP Meet

"There was never the slightest danger or threat of any kind while we toured the land where our Lord lived," said Rev. Buddy Sipe as he gave a combo-lecture-pictorial account of his trip to the Holy Land to Cisco's AARP on November 21 at Senior Center.

"I dream of going back this May and Caroline and I invite any of you to join us."

Almost all the slides that the lecturer showed were pictures that he made on the trip, not commercial ones. His parents and sister had been with them and many of the scenes had family pictures in "folksy" snaps. One of them showed the expression on his father's first plane ride as they took off from DFW.

The speaker dwelt at length on the Massada, a

sort of Alamo of the Holy Land. Like that citadel in San Antonio, none of the Jews inside the Massada escaped from their rock fortress atop a mountain facing the Dead Sea 2,000 years ago.

From the Dead Sea, the group traveled north to Jerusalem, the Sea of Galilee, the Jordan River, and the site of the Sermon on

the Mount.

"Perhaps the highlight of the entire trip was our visit to the Garden of Gethsemane and its 2,000-year old olive trees; communion in a garden surrounded by the hill of calvary and facing the tomb where Jesus was buried," the Rev. Sipe concluded, as he explained each pictorial presentation.

During the business session, Sue Davis, community service chairman, thanked

the group for the food brought to feed the less fortunate that we. "Since I have been appointed your chairman, I have visited our Cisco nursing home and find them in need of bath powder and lap robes. I will furnish the material for making those robes if you will come by our shop and get it and make them," she challenged.


Pedicures might be more welcome than the manicures, but tread softly. Some people have ticklish feet.

## Former Cisco Woman Is Buried Here Sunday

Much Cisco history and many Cisco ties were recalled when the body of 90-year-old Mrs. Gorum Pollard Glasscock was returned here for final rites Sunday, November 24.

In Oakwood Cemetery beside her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Vanderford, and her brother, Earl Vanderford, she was buried. A stone's throw away is Chesley Field where her two

sons, Rex and Jimmy Pollard played football in the late 30's and early 40's. On that same Chesley Field, her second daughter, Grace Pollard Townley was a high school cheer leader. The oldest daughter, Fredricia Pollard Butts, finished high school at Holliday but the three youngest Pollards graduated from Cisco High School. The same system to which their mother started and from which she graduated in 1914. Later she returned to be a Cisco facul-

ty member for a quarter of a century.

In the mid 40's after both her daughters had married and both of them had made their mother a grandmother, Mrs. Pollard felt another call—the call to help her two marine sons and thousands of others help win World War II. Result: the grandmother in her late forties was sworn into the Air Force on December 7, 1943, and reported for basic training in January, 1944. Her fellow teacher and friend, Lela Latch, was inducted with her. They served together for the duration. Almost two years later, after the ending of World War II, they returned to their Cisco classrooms again.

Twice she was married. First to Cecil Pollard in Cisco in 1915. Second, to Jay Hardy Glasscock in 1953. Both of them and two grandsons, Ed Townley and David Pollard, preceded her in death.

Seven grandsons and one grand son-in-law were pall bearers. Serving were Dr. James Butts of Rolling Hills Estates, California; Dick Townley of Gorman; David Millican, Fort Worth; Gerry Pollard, Pleasanton, Ca.; Jeof Pollard, Post; and Greg Pollard, Laredo.

The four granddaughters came to honor their grandmother too. They are Mrs. Vicki Carmichael of Hutchinson, Kansas, daughter of Jesse and Freddie Butts, Wichita Falls; Joe Millican,

Fort Worth, daughter of Ben R. and Grace Townley, Gorman; and the two daughters of Rex and Polly Pollard of Grand Prairie. They are Lynn Manson of San Jose, California and Julie Armstrong, Long Beach.

The majority of the 20 great grandchildren were present and the two little great, great grandchildren of the Gorman Townleys were there too.

Advancing age and poor health forced Mrs. Glasscock to be less active than formerly but The Cisco Press of 1946 published a series of sketches titled "Meet the Teachers." Mrs. Pollard was listed as having two degrees from Hardin Simmons University, a bachelor's and a master's. She was a member of the Texas State Teachers Association, the Delta Kappa Gamma, Eastern Star, P.T.A., American Legion Auxiliary and the First Baptist Church. There she was a

life-long member and a Sunday School teacher.

After the death of Mr. Glasscock in 1964, Mrs. Glasscock made her home in Gorman with her daughter and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Ben R. Townley. A few days before her death, she fell and was carried to the De Leon Hospital. The wives and husbands of her four children kept day and night vigil at her bedside until death came on November 22.

Two ministers conducted final rites, Rev. Ron Carroll, pastor of Gorman Baptist Church and his assistant Rev. Richard Watson. Reverend Carroll said in part, "I think the writer of Proverbs pictured Mrs. Glasscock as the ideal wife and mother when he wrote, 'Her husband and children rejoice in her for she doeth good things.' His concluding tribute was from Shakespeare who penned, 'Her voice was ever gentle, kind, and low. An excellent thing in woman.'"

## CJC Student Presents Crow Indian Program

Children in the Cisco Intermediate School were given a program about the Crow Indians last Friday, from Tony Cox, a CJC student. The Crow tribe is from the upper Missouri River or the Snake River.

Mr. Cox, a member of the Texas Indian Hobbyist Association (TIHA), lives in Brownwood. He said he became interested in the Indian culture when he was in Junior High and in the Scouting program. He became more interested when he joined the TIHA.

Mr. Cox's Indian name is Lame Eagle. When asked why he was given that name, he said that at one time when he was on the Gulf of Mexico beach, he cut his foot. The cut was a severe one and has now healed, but after he dances for awhile he begins to limp.

The program was about 30 minutes long and was held outside the school with the children in a circle around

him. He gave a talk and showed articles of the Crow Indians and showed the children the types of dances of that tribe. He wore the traditional Indian costume.

# County Commissioners

Eastland County Commissioners had a full agenda in the Courtroom on Monday, Nov. 25. Commissioners present were Richard Robinson, pct. 1, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. Commissioner Jack Blackwell, Pct. 2, was absent due to illness.

Mrs. Jack Blackwell attended as an observer during the morning meeting, but did not attend during the afternoon session. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

Among the important business matters during the morning was the acceptance of the resignation of Luther Maxwell, Ranger Justice of the Peace, the signing of Rural Firefighting contracts with the cities of Eastland and Cisco, discussion of the County Agent's office which may be eliminated, and the calling for a local liquor option election in Ranger.

The afternoon meeting mainly concerned problems with the County Commissioners office in Precinct 2. The first item of business was the Firefighting Contracts. Mike Moore, City Manager of Cisco, and Roy Underwood, City Manager of Eastland, accepted these agreements for their respective cities. Underwood said that Eastland had formally approved the contract; Moore stated that the Cisco City Council is expected to give final approval at the next Council meeting.

Nancy Trout, County Tax collector, stated that the collection of taxes for the current fiscal year is coming along quite well. She also reported that an outside audit of her office has begun, and that all employees are cooperating fully.

Judge Scott Bailey opened the discussion on the loss of a County Agent's position for the County by stating that he had received a letter from Dr. Wooley of the Extension Service in Stephenville, stating that Paul Brown, Eastland County Agent, had resigned effective Jan. 1.

It is not known whether this will have an effect on the 4-H office slated to be cut, which is now held by Faith Ballard.

Judge Bailey stated that 4-H Adult leaders, 4-H members and many other citizens had sent out a lot of mail to State Representatives, requesting that the Office be retained.

"The possibility is there that they might reconsider, especially if we keep on contacting them," the Judge said.

De Marquis Gordon had requested that the position of Secretary in the County Agent's office also be definitely retained, since this person has an important function.

The Judge announced that the antique light posts around the Courthouse Square were being re-done, but that the Electric Company people say they must officially own the lights in order to be responsible for restoring and maintenance. The Commissioners voted to give the Company a bill of sale, with the understanding that the lights will always remain in place at the Courthouse.

County Clerk Jo Anne Johnson brought a petition signed by 332 Ranger people calling for a local option election to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages in the incorporated city of Ranger. This concerns territory annexed since the last liquor election.

Seeing that the petition was in order, the Commissioners called for a local option election to be held Tuesday, Dec. 17.

Emma Morris, County Auditor, and two employees from her office had a number of interesting reports and comments from a day-long Seminar on Insurance they had recently attended.

Luther Maxwell, Justice of the Peace Precinct 2, offered his resignation by letter to the Commissioners. Personal reasons were given for his decision. He reported that his books had been turned in, but that he still had some paperwork to finish.

The Commissioners accepted his resignation. They decided to accept applications for the now-vacant position, and will consider naming a replacement at the next Commissioners meeting on Dec. 9.

The morning session adjourned shortly before noon, with an afternoon meeting scheduled for 1:15 p.m.

## Precinct 2 Citizens, D.A. Map Plans

### For Action

The afternoon session of Commissioners Court on Monday began with Brad Stephenson of Precinct 2 continuing a discussion began on Nov. 12 - how to implement a severance plan for Commissioner Jack Blackwell which would not require the "last resort" having him removed from office by Court Order.

A large number of other citizens from the Precinct also attended and commented on the matter.

Comm. Blackwell, who has been ill for a number of months, has attended only a few meetings in 1985. Unless he serves through 1986 he will lose county retirement

benefits it is understood.

Stephenson told the County Commissioners that he believed they had had time to consider the matter and come up with a solution.

Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, replied that they certainly had talked about possibilities and considered options. He had also discussed possibilities by phone with Mrs. Jack Blackwell, he said.

In some ways, Robinson said, she had seemed interested. But this morning she had told some of the Commissioners that Mr. Blackwell's health seemed to be improving, and she would just "ride it out" indicating that she did not plan to encourage him to resign.

"I don't believe she will accept it," Robinson said, apparently meaning resignation and the alternate plan of other county employment which would keep Blackwell on the payroll.

Stephenson asked that the record reflect that he and the

group with him had tried diligently to make the Blackwells a bona fide offer which would let him keep his benefits and entitled to a full pension. Failing that, they planned to seek Court removal.

If the matter of Blackwell's capability to perform his duties is decided in District Court and Blackwell loses, Stephenson said, he loses everything. But people of the Precinct do not wish to continue any longer with no representation, he added.

Stephenson stated that the group of Pct. 2 citizens had an appointment Tuesday at 9 a.m. in the office of the District Attorney. At that time their course of action will be outlined.

A group of Precinct Two citizens were in conference with District Attorney Emory Walton late Tuesday morning and details of their plans were not available at presstime

## Union Pacific And Missouri Pacific To Combine Operations

OMAHA—Union Pacific System, which includes Union Pacific and Missouri Pacific railroads, announced today that it is consolidating the operating departments of the two railroads.

Operating handles all train movements and related mechanical and engineering functions and includes about 34,000 of the 40,000 Union Pacific System employees in its 21-state service area. Other departments had been consolidated earlier following the December 1982 merger which created Union Pacific System.

On January 1, 1986, headquarters changes will become effective with the integration of the two departments occurring gradually over the next twelve months. The change affects only personnel in the St. Louis headquarters building. Actual moving of personnel will be kept to a minimum. Of the approximately 2,100 employees in St. Louis, only about 300 headquarters employees will be affected either by early retirement, relocation to Omaha or natural attrition. Actual numbers are yet to be determined. Union Pacific System Chairman John C. Kenefick said all other St. Louis employees will remain in the St. Louis area. He said this will continue a strong Union Pacific presence.

Heading the consolidated operations will be Jerry R. Davis with the new title executive vice president-operation. Davis will report directly to R.G. Flannery, president of Union Pacific System. Davis joined Union Pacific in 1957 and became vice president-operation in 1981. He is a native of Sylvan Grove, Kansas, and received a master's degree from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

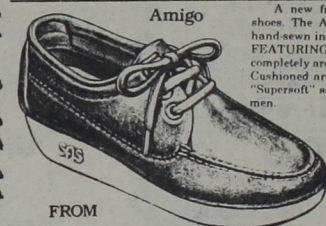

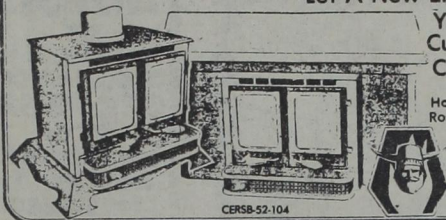

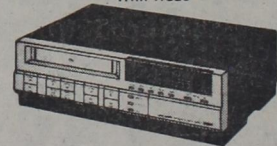

Philosopher Strawberry Sam on his Johnson grass farm on Sandy Creek proposes a partial solution to the national deficit.

I have stumbled on a way to end the government's \$200 billion deficit.

But back to my idea. I got it from thinking about the Chrysler Co. You'll recall that a few years ago Chrysler was about on the rocks, head over heels in debt to the government for a billion dollars.

Well, 80,000 Chrysler workers got together on the theory that they needed their jobs, and agreed to take a 10 percent cut in wages. Of course, the company also got that controversial series of loans and guarantees from the government - but before long the debt was paid off and Chrysler was back on its feet.

All right. The latest figures show that there are now 16,436,000 government workers - federal, state and local. Most of them are working for a government that's head over heels in debt.

Let's say that the average salary of these government workers, from top to bottom, is around \$20,000 a year. That means the annual payroll is \$328 billion, \$720 million.

Now you know these government workers above all others don't want to see the government go bankrupt
