Mrs. W. T. Hittson Laid To Rest Sunday

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock for Mrs. W. T. Hittson who was found dead at her home early Friday morning. Services were conducted at the First Baptist Church by the pastor, Rev. E. S. James, and Rev. James L. Smart, pastor of the East Side Baptist Church, where Mrs. Hittson had her membership.

Mrs. Hittson was born in Red River County, Texas, May 10, 1864 her maiden name being Miss Eddie A. Wagley. She was married to W. T. Hittson in 1877 and in that same year they came to Cisco to make their home. She placed her membership with the Baptist Church in Gunsight in 1880. Mr. Hittson died here in 1928.

Of seven children five survive, these being: Mrs. G. M. Stephenson and S. E. Hittson of Cisco, W. C. Hittson of Des Moines, N. M., W. T. Hittson of Hamilton and R. A. Hittson of Austin, Texas. Three sisters and two brothers also survive: Mrs. E. M. Newman, Mrs. F. M. Metcalf, and C. N. Wagley of Cisco; Mrs. J. C. Smoot of Tulsa and A. L. Wagley of Wayland, Stephens County.

Active pall bearers were: J. D. Lauderdale, Tom Stark, F. E. Shepard, H. S. Drumwright, B. W. Patterson, J. L. Thornton, O. L. Mason and J. D. Hall.

A large concourse of sorrowing friends attended the services, and a heavy profusion of flowers attested the love and high regard in which this good woman was held in this community.

Buer Dawson Phipps Asphyxiated Victim

Buer Dawson Phipps, 11-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Phipps of the Deep Cream Dairy, was asphyxiated in the bath room at his home Sunday night. Some time while taking a bath the boy was overcome by the fumes from the water heater, and was not found until some time later, when his elder brother, Troy, on returning from town, saw that the boy was not in bed, and noticing a light in the bath room, looked in to find the boy stretched on the floor, with his head near the heater which was still burning. Physicians were summoned immediately but all efforts to revive him were of no avail.

Mr. and Mrs. Phipps were both out of town at the time of the accident, Mrs. Phipps being in Littlefield, Texas, while Mr. Phipps was in Dallas on business. They were notified and rushed home.

Funeral services were conducted from the First Baptist church at 3:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon by the pastor, Rev. E. S. James. Interment was made in Oakwood cemetery.

Cluck gave a very interesting talk, taking for his subject, "Trend of Modern Education," and stressing particularly the point that educators were leaving the old ideas and getting out of the ruts, and that teachers' problems and parents' problems went hand in hand to be worked out together. A round table discussion followed and many new ideas were presented.

Miss Lurline Poe gave two readings which gave much amusement to the occasion.

Dr. F. E. Clark read a paper, "Safe-guarding Health of Adolescent Girl." This paper was so beneficial and instructive, and proved of such great interest to the mothers present that after the round table discussion on motion of Mrs. J. D. Barker, it was decided that printed copies should be made so that all mothers might learn the proper care that their daughters should be given.

Mrs. P. L. Ullom sang. The program in its entirety was thoroughly enjoyed and the Federation is indebted to the First Industrial Arts Club for its arrangement.

The Twentieth Century Club will be in charge of the program the second Monday in May, and will have for its subject, "Americanization and Good Citizenship."

Chaman Will Coach For Lubbock High

After nine years of outstanding service as coach in the Cisco high school, W. B. Chapman leaves the sport circles of this in another field. He announced some time ago that he would go elsewhere at the end of this season, and it was announced Thursday that he would become head coach for the Lubbock high school the coming year.

Upon the resignation of Henry Frank as coach of that school Chapman entered his application, and Wednesday he was called to Lubbock for an interview. Accompanied by Supt. R. N. Cluck, he drove through to the Plains city, and after a very brief conference with the school officials there, signed a contract as head coach being chosen from among 25 applicants for the place.

Lubbock now has a \$750,000 high school building, with an enrollment several times that of Cisco, and the retiring Lobo coach will have a wide range of material from which to build up a good team at Lubbock the coming year.

Chapman came to Cisco as coach in 1922, and his faithful services in training and directing the boys in many hard-fought battles in the fields of sport here has endeared him to the hearts of all. It is with reluctance that the Lobos give up their coach of these nine years, and their heartiest good wishes go with him to his new field.

Three Arrested In Connection With Death of Jack King

Paul Sheenan, Harry Sheenan and Ralph Pancake of Pioneer were arrested by Sheriff Virge Foster of Eastland and Deputy R. L. Wilson of Cisco Wednesday morning in connection with the death of Jack King of Rising Star who died suddenly at that place on March 25. The sudden illness upon King's returning home, followed closely by death, was reported to the authorities by the attending physician and members of Mr. King's family, and an investigation was started. County Attorney Joe H. Jones and Sheriff Foster went to Rising Star and had the body exhumed and the viscera sent to the state chemist at Austin for examination. The three men arrested in connection with the affair are being held in the county jail at Eastland.

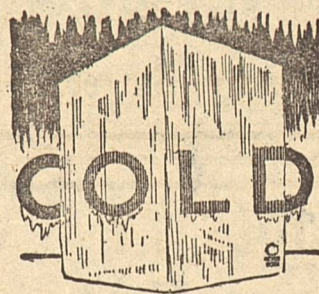
