## Jurors give Reyes the death penalty

Jurors decided Wednesday that Gilberto "Tito" Reyes of Muleshoe should get the death penalty for what District Attorney Johnny Actkinson called "one of the most vicious crimes to happen in Bailey County."

The jury had deliberated about two hours Monday before convicting Reyes of killing his former girlfriend, Yvette Barraz. Jurors then heard further testimony be-

fore making their choice between the death penalty for Reyes or a minimum of 40 years in prison.

Witnesses told of a stormy relationship between Reyes and Barraz, with psychologist Walter Quijano calling Reyes' attachment obsessive.

Mike Ratke of Farwell testified Monday that he had been driving through Muleshoe when a man knelt in the middle of American Boulevard and fired an assault rifle at a car that had sped out of the

Allsup's parking lot. Ratke said he called police.

Muleshoe police Sgt. Joe Orozco said he followed the car and a pickup to the Barraz home on East Fifth Street and saw Reyes run from the pickup up to the house.

Defense attorney David Martínez of Lubbock said Reyes was not able to control his obsession because of his alcoholism.

Testimony in the guilt-or-innocence phase of the trial indicated that Barraz had been struck on the

head half a dozen times with a claw hammer, strangled and sexually assaulted at least twice.

Actkinson said there were no mitigating circumstances.

Reyes "not only wanted to kill her but to humiliate her to show he was in control by sexually assaulting her as she died," he said.

Barraz was last seen alive the night of March 11, 1998. Her father reported her missing the next morning and her body was found at the Mexican border March 13.

## Defendant left attorney little to work with

As outlined in court, Gilberto "Tito" Reyes' own actions around the time of the death of Yvette Barraz left his attorney little room to mount an effective defense.

Rather than being secretive about his trip to the Mexican border in Barraz's car, testimony indicated that Reyes stopped at a cousin's house in the middle of the night to ask directions to Ojinaga, across the international bridge from Presidio, Texas.

Natividad Ovalle of Pecos, Texas, who said he is married to Reyes' cousin Marta Rodríguez, testified that Reyes woke him around midnight the night Barraz disappeared and "told me he wanted to go to Mexico." Ovalle also testified that Reyes, "usually a calm person," seemed nervous and was wearing gloves.

Rather than disposing of Barraz's body at some point during his trip to the Mexican border, Reyes arrived in Presidio and parked the car behind a Dollar General store with the woman's body still in the car's hatchback.

Ramón Rodríguez III, a former Presidio County deputy sheriff, testified that when he found Barraz's car behind the Dollar General store, the vehicle was not locked.

Texas Ranger Dusty McCord testified that the car's hatchback, where Barraz's body lay, was locked and that the body was covered just enough so that anyone passing by might not realize a body was there.

Reyes left the car in Presidio and walked across the international bridge at about 4 a.m., a time when border officials were certain to notice him because pedestrians rarely cross the bridge at that hour.

Jerry Soard, a U.S. customs inspector who was on duty at the bridge the morning of March 12, 1998, said the graveyard shift might average five pedestrians a night "if you're lucky."

Soard testified that he and others on duty stopped Reyes and checked him out. They felt something was amiss, he said, because people from the Muleshoe area rarely cross the international bridge except on weekends and because Reyes was not dressed for the cold weather.

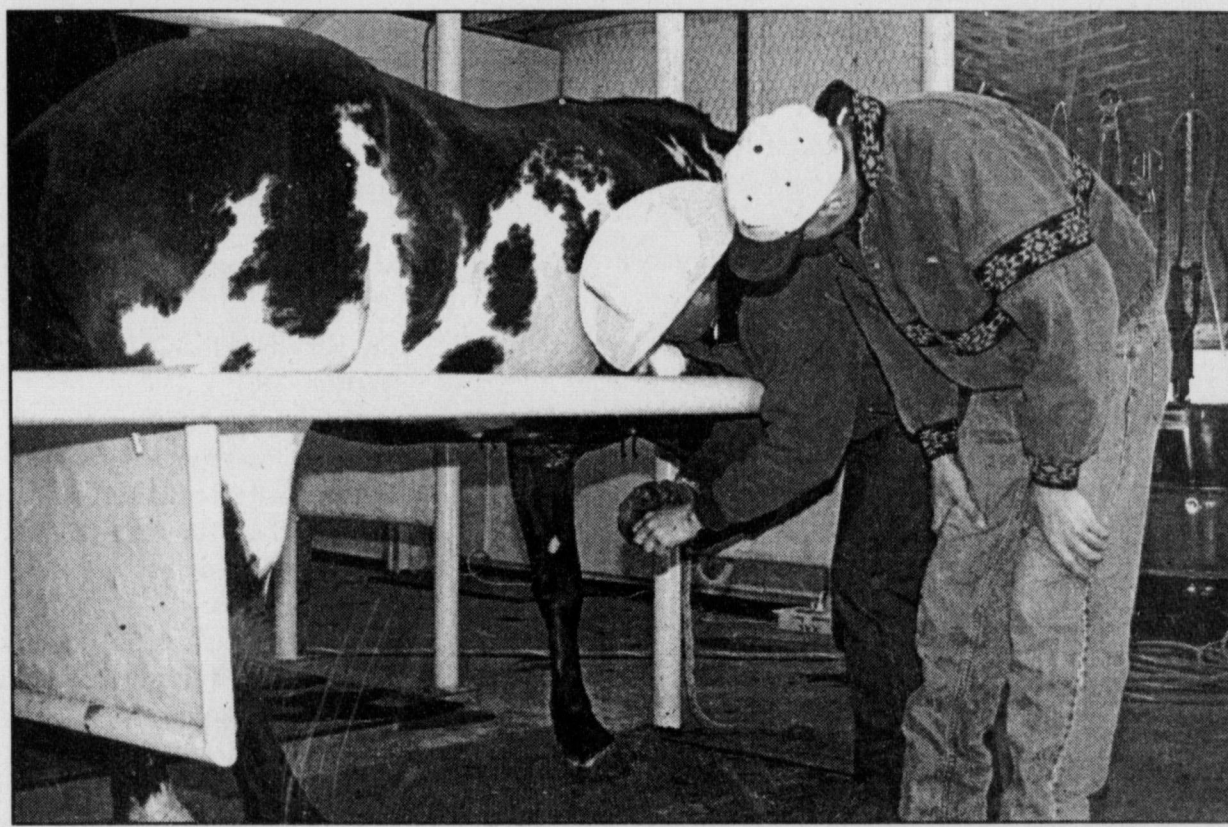
He also testified that officers called both the Presidio County Sheriff's Office and the Bailey County Sheriff's Office before they allowed Reyes to continue across the bridge, but at that time Barraz had not been reported missing and the officers had no reason to hold Reyes.

Raul Baeza of Marfa, a security guard working at the Baeza port of entry that night, testified that Reyes freely acknowledged that keys in his pocket belonged to his girlfriend's car and that he asked if there would be much "hassle" in taking a car into Mexico with Texas license plates on it.

Weeks later when Reyes was captured in Portales, he still had Barraz's car keys in his pocket.

And finally, shoe prints leading from the car matched Barraz's shoes except for size. Her mother, Mary, had already testified that her daughter and Reyes had bought Adidas of the same style.

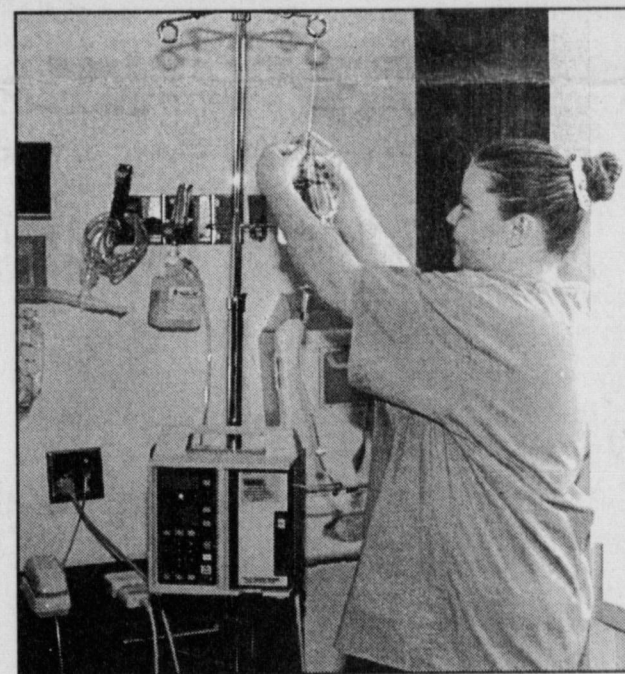
Defense attorney David Martínez was unable to produce witnesses to rebut any of these facts.

## Public hearing on prison is Monday

Census figures indicate that Bailey County has lost almost a quarter of its population since 1960, and county officials say they are determined to reverse that trend before it gets any worse.

To that end, they — along with city officials — are seeking to bring a detention center to the county.

A public hearing scheduled for 7 p.m. Monday in the high school auditorium is intended to give the public a chance to

learn about and ask questions about the proposed project.

In addition to city and county dignitaries, the meeting is expected to draw:

- Rep. Pete Laney, speaker of the Texas House of Representatives;
- Judge Giles W. Darby of Garza County, already the home of a detention facility;
- David Hutton, superintendent of Muleshoe schools;
- Muleshoe Area Hospital District administrator Jim Bone;
- J.C. Conner, regional di-

rector of Management Training Corp., which trains personnel for such projects; and James Parkey, CEO of Corplan, a company that operates prisons.

County Judge Marilyn Cox, who has spearheaded much of the effort on the project, will offer opening and closing remarks at the public hearing.

Figures show the county's 1960 population of 9,090 declined slowly to 8,168 by 1980, but has dropped sharply since then. The Texas Almanac lists the population at 6,769 now.

## School board to study offering more sports

# Lady Mules stretch district record to 6-2

The Lady Mules outscored the Lubbock Roosevelt Lady Eagles 36-18 in the second half en route to a 60-35 victory Tuesday.

Muleshoe broke open the game with a 15-4 third quarter, which saw Roosevelt worn out.

The Lady Eagles had 30 turnovers, which Muleshoe converted into 26 points.

"We got after them on defense, which helps our offense," said Muleshoe head coach Shana Simms. The defense took Roosevelt's bench out of the game, as only four Lady Eagles scored. Lindsey Field had seven of Muleshoe's 21 steals.

Field also led Muleshoe in scoring, going for 23 points on 7-of-13 shooting.

"She missed a couple of easy shots early, but she hung in there," Simms said of Field.

Aiding Field with the scoring was Britni Gartin, who added 19

points. Jessica Carpenter was held scoreless, but led the Lady Mules with five assists.

Field also went 9-of-13 from the free-throw line.

"The way she plays, she's going to get to the line," Simms said.

The Lady Mules had 10 more attempts than Roosevelt in the game, but only hit one more than the Lady Eagles. Roosevelt shot a blistering 89.6 percent from the line (17-of-19). Roosevelt's leading scorer, Lindsay Ward, hit all nine of her free throws on her way to 15 points.

A look at the statistics would point out a close game, with the exception of rebounds and points off turnovers, where the Lady Mules dominated.

The biggest victory the Lady Mules can take is that they did not let Roosevelt back into the game.

"Giving a team like that life will come back to haunt you,"

Simms said.

The Lady Mules, now second in the district, are in very good shape going into their match against Shallowater and even have a shot to win district, should they score another upset win over the Fillies.

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## Mules get tough lesson at hands of Littlefield

One thing that is always stressed for success in basketball is a patient offense. On Jan. 28, Littlefield showed Muleshoe how a patient defense also can lead to success.

The Wildcats kept playing defense while waiting for their offense to take form. A 46-35 victory indicates that it was worth the wait.

Littlefield's victory can be directly attributed to their performance in the second half, where they outscored the Mules 33-14.

Early signs indicated there would be a defensive battle. An E.T. Rosemond three gave the Wildcats a 4-2 lead with 5:14 left in the first quarter.

After that, the Wildcats were outscored 10-0, thanks in part to two threes by Clint Black. Clayton Shipley ended the run with a three-point play and the first quarter ended with a 12-7 Mules lead.

Shipley scored 11 seconds into the second. However, the Mule lead would be safe as nobody scored for a five-minute stretch.

James Barrett's three with 2:47 left in the half ended the drought and started a 9-2 run. Terry Allen scored for Littlefield with 52 seconds left, and the Wildcats went into halftime down

21-13.

Shipley opened the third with a layup, which was answered on the other end by Bret Clements. With 5:14 left, Jeff Bruns scored on a lob pass from Barrett.

The next five minutes showed why Littlefield's defense had been so patient.

Five different Wildcats scored during a 14-3 run. Muleshoe could manage only a free throw by Clements and a shot from Barrett. The Wildcats entered the fourth with something they hadn't had all game — the lead.

The first three minutes of the fourth saw the teams battle for the lead, with a putback by Barrett tying the score at 32 with 5:15 to go.

However, consecutive threes by Garcia and Allen gave Littlefield a 38-32 lead, one the Wildcats would never give up.

"Those threes really changed the momentum," Mule head coach Ralph Mason said.

A Barrett three cut the lead back to three, but Littlefield scored the final eight and sunk Muleshoe to 3-3 in district play.

"We'd like to go in thinking we're going to win all four (remaining district games)," Mason said. "But we'll have to keep taking them one at a time."

Shipley was big for the Wildcats with 11 points. Rosemond added eight points with three steals and two blocks.

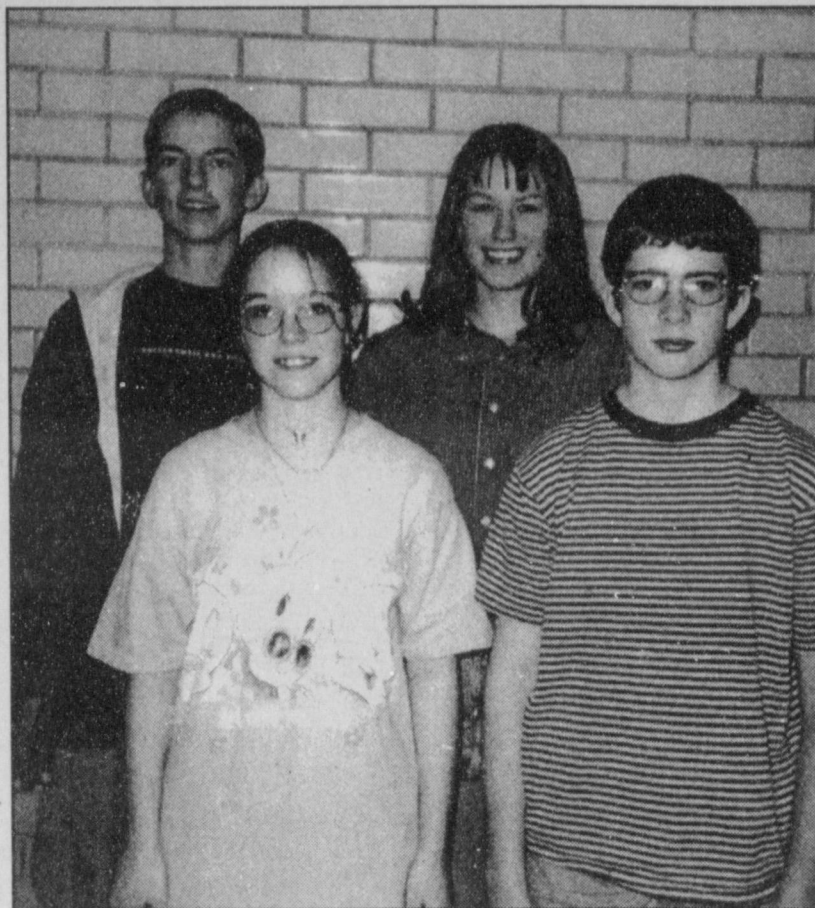

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

The sign over the church makes no difference at all in this regard: People know what they like in worship. They have different tastes, and that's fine. But it doesn't take much of a change to cause at least some occasional irritations in just about any group of Christians. A church has a problem if some folks are pretty sure that their tastes and God's tastes are identical. It's a fairly short step from that opinion to pitching a fit, demanding your own and was very upset. "I got both those comments after last week's rather unconventional service. Really we didn't do anything that different except break the sermon into four meditations scattered throughout the service with songs and scriptures all designed to focus around different aspects of the Lord's Supper. But it felt different, and people react in various ways to that. "How should we deal with these differing opinions? I suppose we could never do anything that deviated from a 'standard' order of worship. However, if we do that we would be denying the opportunity for enrichment to those people who really need and are enriched by creativity and variety. Perhaps we could do something creative and original every week. But if we did, we would disorient and offend those who need and are enriched by routine and deny them the ability to be built up. I suppose we could form two churches or have two services for two different kinds of people. But then we lose the unity that is so meaningful. "I think, rather, that we should do our best to make sure that nobody gets their way all the time. That way we all have opportunity to learn how to keep all those commands in scripture to 'bear with one another,' 'be patient with one another,' and to 'accept one another.' It is good to sacrifice our preferences at times for others with different needs. It shows love and it gives us opportunity to grow spiritually. "So next time you are in a service that seems designed for the 'other folks,' stop and thank God that he has given you the opportunity to exercise the spiritual discipline of patience. 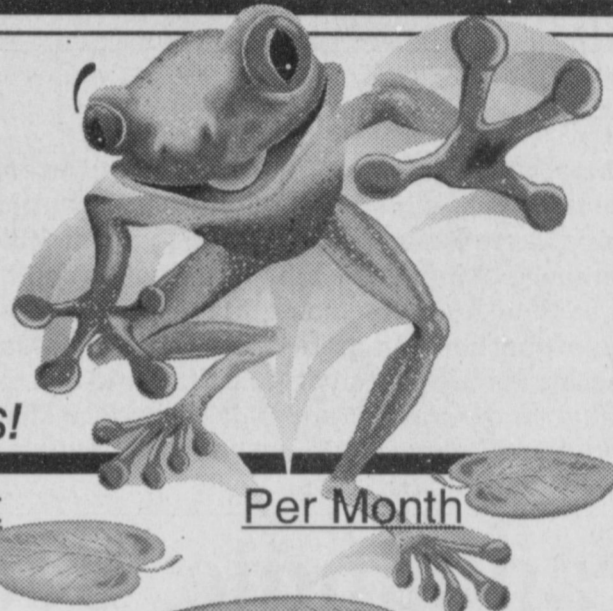

## Panhandle beef producers being plagued by cattle lice

**SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL COLLEGE STATION**—Producers are itching to control cattle lice infestations in the Panhandle, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Extension entomologist Dr. Carl Patrick of Amarillo said cattle lice problems are widespread across the Texas Panhandle, as lice populations typically peak in the late winter and early spring.

He said most producers are recognizing the symptoms early and effectively treating the cattle.

"This is a typical problem for this time of year," he said. "There are definitely some years when it is a greater problem than others, but as far as whether this is going to be one of those years, it's too soon to tell."

Extension entomologist Dr. Cliff Hoelscher of Bryan said recognizing the symptoms early is the best method for preventing economic loss from the damage done by lice.

"Lice reduce the thrift and vigor of cattle," he said. "They cause skin irritation and leave cattle rubbing against trees and posts."

Hoelscher said cattle often rub off large patches of hair, sometimes until their skin is raw and bleeding.

He said Panhandle producers are dealing with two types of lice: biting lice and sucking lice.

Hoelscher said sucking lice are especially harmful because they take blood and energy directly from the cattle.

Patrick added that sucking lice can cause anemia.

"Cattle need all their energy to make it through the winter," he said.

"Lice are an added stress that makes it even more difficult," he added.

Patrick said other effects of lice include weight loss, reduced performance and reduced milk production.

"Cattle can even die from anemia," he said. "Or the lice can weaken the cattle so much that they are more susceptible to dying from other ailments."

Patrick said many producers are using spot-on insecticides to treat their cattle.

"Pour-on and spot-on insecticide treatments are suggested and being used most often," he said. "You can use small amounts in problem areas pretty easily."

Patrick said injections and whole-body sprays are other methods used by Panhandle producers, but they cause more stress.

"If you do treat animals, don't introduce new animals to the herd that haven't been treated," he said.

"If some animals tend to carry lice in greater numbers and experience more problems, remove those

animals, known as carriers."

District Extension director Charles Neeb of Fort Stockton said drought continues to plague far West Texas.

"Pastures are burning up, and livestock continues to be sold to reduce the stocking rates," he said.

Neeb said heavy supplemental feeding continues in the district.

"The pastures are in need of more moisture," he said. "There is low quality and quantity of feed for cattle. However, more moisture is needed to prepare the land in most parts of the district."

District Extension director Scott Durham of San Angelo said agriculture in his region continues to show signs of drought stress.

"Most of the wheat fields have been planted," he said. "Some have died and others will have very stunted growth until they receive some form of irrigation."

Durham said cattle conditions remain fair despite declining range and pasture conditions.

"Supplemental feeding and herd reduction continues," he said.

Generally, South Plains soil moisture is short, weather is warm and dry, and pastures are in poor to fair condition.

Supplemental feeding of cattle continues, as does farmland preparation. Wheat is poor to fair. Irrigated wheat is being grazed; dryland wheat needs rain.

The Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB) will conduct elections in five of its eight voting regions for the purpose of electing five new TCPB board members whose current members' seats have expired. There are a total of fifteen TCPB voting board members. These elections, to be conducted in 227 Texas counties, are being held pursuant to the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, Texas Agriculture Code, Title 3, Chapter 41, Subchapter A, Section 41.032. Voting Region Two consists of the counties of **Hartley, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Parmer and Bailey**, and there is One Seat open for election of TCPB board members in Voting Region Two. In 1990, Texas Corn Producers voted to expand the research and promotion program for corn, funded by uniform corn checkoff, to every county in the State of Texas. This election is the biennial election required by the Texas Commodity Referendum Law. A person eligible to vote in the board election if he or she is, or for at least one production period during the three years preceding the date of the board election has been, a producer of, or caused to be produced, corn for commercial purposes.
