The City Council approved Friday holidays for city employees on Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's weekends, voted a \$50 bonus to city employees for Christmas, took a new cemetery contract offer under consideration and voted to close the mayor's office at City Hall during a four-hour meeting Tuesday night.

Businesses Asked To Display Info For Emergencies

All downtown Cisco businesses have been requested to display their name, address and telephone number in the door or window of the business, so they may be reached in case of emergencies by the police department, it was announced by R.J. Turpin, city manager. This will also enable the police to notify them if they have left items out by mistake.

The police check the businesses periodically.



As approved by the council, City Hall will be closed Nov. 28-30, Dec. 24-26, and Dec. 31-Jan. 2. The Christmas weekend holiday will begin at noon on Dec. 23. The \$50 bonus checks will go to all full-time salaried employees. The city has some 40 workers on its staff.

With Mayor Roy Cartee presiding and all council members present except Mrs. Lucy Collier, the Council approved minutes of meetings on Nov. 3 and 11.

City Accountant Jean Gray submitted a financial report for the month of October, which was approved. The report showed receipts for the month, totaling \$56,369 including \$26,810 in current tax payments, \$2,256 in cabin rental and lake lot leases, \$6,394 for sanitation services, \$6,613 in sales tax receipts, \$3,013 franchise taxes and \$2,707 for park fund donations and leases.

Expenditures, totaling \$41,447, included \$21,413 in salaries plus \$1,462 overtime pay.

Water revenue amounted to \$29,758 with expenses totaling \$28,579.

The Council studied a proposed Blue Cross-Blue Shield insurance contract for the coming year. The new plan would provide a \$50 deductible clause on each hospital admission. Total cost to the city was expected to run about \$25,000 per year. The council approved the plan.

Anton White, president of the Cisco Cemetery Association, reviewed the organization's work at Oakwood Cemetery since taking over January 1, 1978. Under previous city operation, the city had been spending more than \$1,000 per month at the cemetery. Since turning it over to the association, the city has paid \$600 per month toward the cost. In June, 1978, the city began giving the association an additional \$25 from the sale of each cemetery lot. In July, 1979, the full \$100 per lot was turned over to the organization.

The association asked for a new five-year contract with the \$600 per month plus lot sales be continued. The city would continue to own the cemetery. The association would take over lot sales and record keeping, install a new cemetery water system, level and re-set monuments needing same, maintain roads and generally look after the cemetery.

Mr. White said the association hired four part-time employees during seven spring, summer and fall months and spends some \$900 monthly for labor during that period plus assorted other expenses. The association has \$73,000 in perpetual care account investment funds.

The Council took the matter under study and asked the association to submit a contract and to check on the price of cemetery lots in area cities. The proposition is due to be on the agenda for the Dec. 9th meeting.

The Council authorized City Attorney Bill Wright to advertise for bids for an oil and gas lease on some 240

acres of land the City of Cisco owns at Lake Cisco.

Joe Cooper, local CPA, was employed to audit city books and records for the 1979-80 and 1980-81 fiscal years.

Two engineering firms—Yates and Decker of Abilene and Barber, Traylor and Associates of Tyler—discuss the possibilities of representing the city in making applications for federal grants from HUD for improvements to streets, sewer and water lines and others here. The Council decided to study the matter and make a decision at the Dec. 9th meeting. It was pointed out by both firms that grants are available with little or no cost of sponsoring cities.

Councilman Wm. J. Eudy introduced a resolution that the office used by Mayor Cartee "be abandoned and the space be utilized in a more efficient manner." Mr. Eudy explained that this was the same resolution that he presented at the Nov. 11th meet and withdrew when it was suggested that the Abilene newspaper and television stations would make headlines of it.

Mr. Eudy told the council that he had been thinking about the matter and had decided that he would not be intimidated by the Abilene media. He added that he felt that the closing of the office would be in the interest of harmony at City Hall. The motion to adopt the resolution was seconded by Councilman Jerry Jeffcoat and approved with only Councilwoman Louise Allison casting a negative vote.

The office in question is located just outside the council meeting chamber or upstairs auditorium. It was assigned to the mayor by council resolution soon after he took office and telephone equipment costing some \$130 was installed there.

Mr. Eudy was on the meeting agenda to address the meeting but he tabled the item.

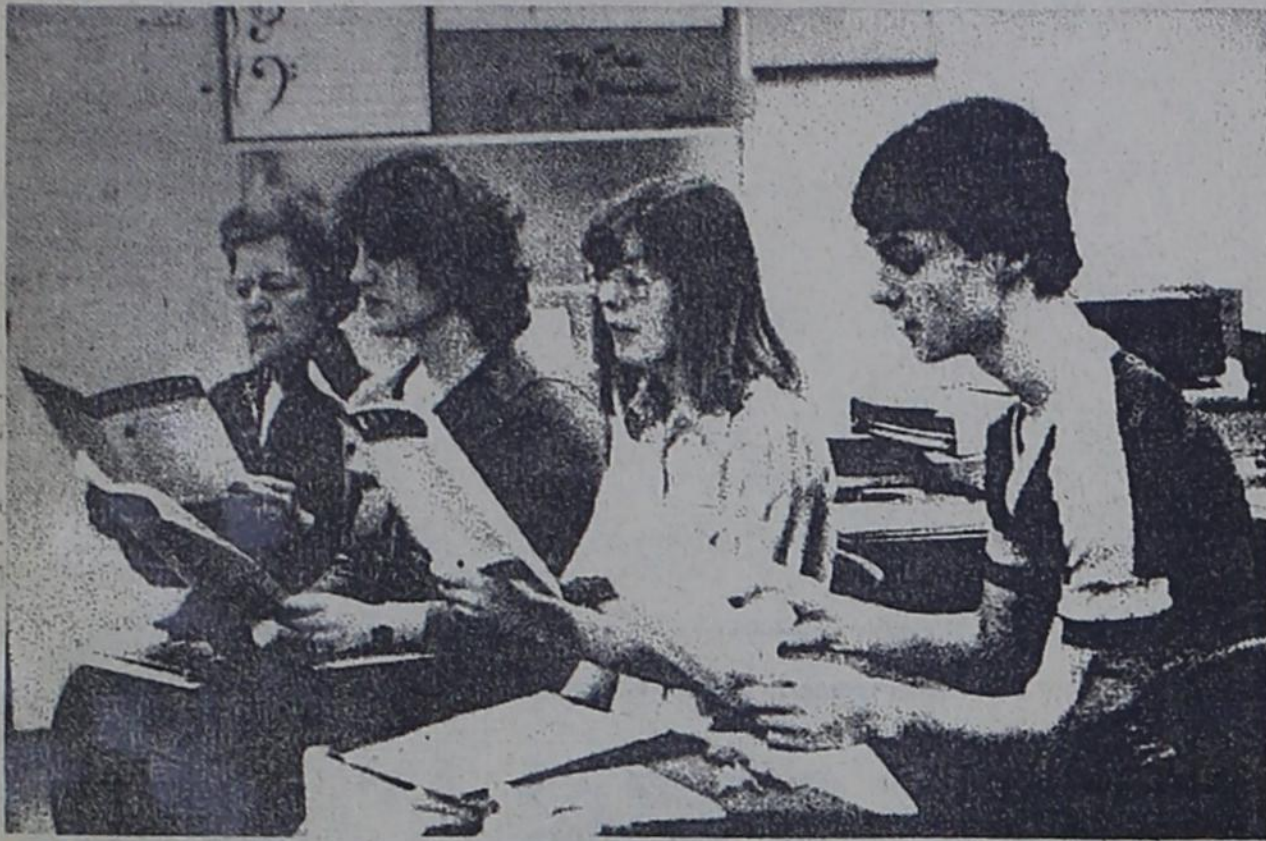
City Manager R.J. Turpin reported that the water department had collected the sum of \$3,500 in delinquent water bills during the past month, leaving some \$6,000 still to be paid.

Councilman Raymond Whitley told the city manager that he had been approached by citizens "who feel that you should move your household to Cisco as provided by the city charter." Mr. Whitley added that "it would look better." Mr. Turpin agreed.

The council decided that the regular meeting scheduled for December 23rd would not be held.

Madrigal Singers To Present Annual Dinner

The Cisco Junior College Madrigal Singers, directed by Wyley Peebles, will present the seventh annual Christmas Madrigal Dinner in the Roof Garden Theater, Thursday and Friday, December 4 and 5, at 7:00 p.m. The courses of the dinner and the events of the program will be announced with trumpet fanfares and the usual pomp and circumstance.

Those attending the Madrigal Dinners of past years will remember the wassail bowl, the roast pig, and the flaming pudding. "We have a new chef this year," Peebles said, "and we expect to make some changes in the menu."

The first fanfare will announce the procession of the singers, and they will march in singing "Masters In This Hall." Following the lighting of the candles, another fanfare will announce the serving of the hot drink from the wassail bowl. To highlight the serving of the meal, the singers will also perform "Here We Come A-Wassailing," "The Boar's Head Carol," and the "Flaming Pudding Carol."

The concert of madrigals and carols will begin with an arrangement of the familiar "Deck the Halls," which will be followed by four English madrigals. Two other English compositions—"Deo Gratias," by William Byrd, and "O Sing Joyfully," by Adrian Batten—are in the concert though they are not true madrigals. These pieces are written in the imitative style of madrigals and are quite appropriate for a Christmas Madrigal Dinner," according to Peebles. The Christmas music in the concert will consist primarily of German folk songs: "Three Mennonite Christmas Hymns" and "When Christmas Morn is Dawning." Mark Briles, a freshman real estate major from Arlington, will sing the traditional "What Child Is This?" accompanying himself with guitar. All of the madrigals and carols

sung by the Madrigal Singers will be a cappella.

Steven Zell, music instructor, will play a short harpsichord sonata during the lighting of the candles. He will also play "Two Noels," by Michel Corrette, and "La Petite-Rien," by Francois Couperin, as an instrumental interlude during the concert.

The program will end with a contemporary arrangement of the English folk song, "We Wish You a Merry Christmas."

Property Re-Appraisal Is Mandatory For Tax Entities

Pursuant to Senate Bill 621 enacted by the last regular session of the Texas Legislature, it is mandatory for all Taxing entities within the state to do a re-appraisal of the properties in each county by 1982 and Senate Bill 621 requires a review of the values in each entity in each county within the state every 5 years thereafter. Additionally, the law requires the Agricultural Value on agricultural lands be reviewed each and every year and the possibility exists that the agricultural value on farm and ranch lands could change yearly. The law also requires two values on all agricultural lands, the market value and the productivity value.

In view of the rising cost to do re-appraisals, due to the demand for experienced firms and the inflation factors relative to cost, the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Re-Appraisal District decided it would be a wise move and a savings to the taxpayer to proceed with the re-appraisal as required by Senate Bill 621, where the program would be implemented in early 1982. McMorries and Company has been employed and awarded a contract to do the re-appraisal of all of the properties in Eastland County for the tax year 1982. This county is also employed to do Foard County, King County, Dickens County, Crosby County, Briscoe County, Hall County, Floyd County, Lynn County, Cochran County, Hutchinson County, Cottle County, Castro County, Coke County, and Hockley County, and for 22 years has done from 85% to 90% of the re-appraisal work done in the West Texas area.

Mr. McMorries has assured us the values will be reasonable, that equity will be obtained in this re-appraisal program, and that the program will meet all of the requirements of the State.

The contract price is a turn-key total not a percentage of the value or a commission; in other words, McMorries and Company will be paid only the contract price and the company will provide all labor and materials to complete the job.

There will be many questions asked throughout the program: What is the company supposed to do in this re-appraisal program?

The company will inspect each and every parcel of property in the county, each improvement of value will be measured and graded, consideration being given for the type of construction, age,

condition, location etc., all rural lands will be inspected and graded by the use of an 8 grade classing system of the type used by the Soil Conservation Service, cultivated and pasture lands will be noted on soil maps on each tract of land, and irrigation will be a consideration in the final value.

Will the appraisers see all owners? The appraisers will attempt to talk to all owners, the appraisers will definitely inspect every parcel of property, however, "in our 22 years in the business, we find it impossible to see every owner when enumerating the properties," McMorries stated.

In case the appraiser does not get to talk to the owner when he comes by to measure and classify the property, what can the owner do to insure he is getting fair and equitable consideration? When the appraiser calls at home or business, he will have a business card showing the company name and the appraiser's name, the appraiser will present the business card to the person answering the door, this is for identification purposes, the appraiser will state his name and business, ask some questions about the improvements, land or irrigation, then ask permission to measure and inspect the improvements and property. In the event the owner is not at home, a card will be left in the door. In the event the owner wishes to talk to the appraiser, he may call the Tax Office, leaving his name and phone number, the appraiser will within a few days return the call; and if the owner desires, will make an appointment to come back and talk to the owner. "We recognize that this program belongs to the taxpayers," McMorries stated "and we want to be as accurate as possible. We definitely will work with the property owners to insure equal and uniform values, and attempt to answer all questions."

Will a property owner have an opportunity to see his values before they become final? Yes. A letter will be mailed to each owner in about April 1982, stating a time and place where an owner can meet with the appraiser. At this time, he can review the values put on his property and also review the values placed on other properties. Then if an owner feels his property is not valued equitably and desires, he can ask for a recheck of the property. If the appraiser finds that an error has been made, he will correct the values; if the ap-

praiser feels the value is equal to other comparable properties, he will tell the owner. Then if the owner desires he may meet later with the local Board of Equalization comprised of local property owners.

Will taxes be increased as a result of re-appraisal? No, not necessarily. In fact, some properties may reduce in value. All will depend upon the facts found relative to value in the jurisdictions. The intent of the re-appraisal program is not to raise taxes, only to equalize taxes. McMorries stated, the Constitution and laws of the State require an equal and uniform tax base. It is unlawful and morally wrong to tax a property worth only \$10,000.00 the same as a property worth \$30,000.00. The only thing the reappraisal program will do is to provide the jurisdiction with an equal and uniform tax base and the total results will not be known until about October, 1981.

Will properties be valued at its cost when purchased or when built? No, the law requires that all properties be valued equal and uniform in accordance with the current market value of the property as of January 1st of the year. In this case, January 1, 1982. As an example: a home built in 1935 with 1000 square feet of living area cost \$3,500.00 when built in 1935; however, today it would sell on the market for the sum of \$12,000.00. Therefore, the property cannot be legally valued at its original cost. Take a home built today that cost \$30,000.00. It would be unfair to value this home at more than \$30,000.00 when it would only sell for \$30,000.00; and leave the home built in 1935 at the \$3,500.00, when it would sell for \$12,000.00 on the open market in Eastland County. The same percent of market

value must be built into the schedules of value to be used in the re-appraisal program to insure equal and uniform values as required by law.

Will 100% values be used as the tax base? Yes, the 100% appraised value will be used as the tax base. The new law requires all jurisdictions to use 100% assessment ratio by the year 1981.

Will the appraisers be qualified? Yes, no appraiser will work on this job that has not evidenced at least 5 years of experience in the mass appraisal business and will be no less than 30 years of age.

Will all property owners be given the same considerations? McMorries stated that it did not make him any difference who the property owner was, how much money he had or how much property he owned. Every owner will be given the same considerations. That is, being fair and reasonable in all considerations to obtain just and equal values regardless of the circumstance or pressures. "We have no axes to grind. Every taxpayer looks the same to us and no property owner will be given special consideration. We must take this position to insure that equity is the end result of the program."

The appraisers will begin the field work in early December 1980. When the appraiser calls at your home or business, he will ask some questions but unless the owner desires he will not need to enter the home. If the appraiser feels that there is a need to make an inside inspection of a home, he will then ask permission to look at the inside of the improvement. He will not need to go into every room of the residence; the living area and the kitchen will tell the appraiser what he needs to know about the residence,

under no circumstance will the appraiser enter a home unless an adult male is at home and permission is granted.

Will there be a permanent record card provided on every parcel of property? Yes, there will be a permanent record card provided the entities on each and every parcel of real estate in the district. The card will show a scaled drawing of all improvements that has any value and the dimensions of each building; it will show the type of construction, concrete foundation, brick exterior, etc.; it will provide the square footage of each building and the schedule cost and depreciation. The schedules will be prepared based on local information. The land values will be shown by either a front door or per acre value. These records are public records and each owner may see his appraisal card and also his neighbor's appraisal card.

The appraiser will not know what value will be finally placed on the property when he is making the inspection. The appraiser is only gathering information classifying the land, measuring the building and classifying them for use in calculating the final value of the property. McMorries stated that he and his employees welcome any and all information and suggestions from the owner and "our people will be cooperative and open minded at all times."

A Moment In History

by Michelle Lindsey

Lucy Stoker, a native of Eastland for the past thirty years, has been willing to share a little bit of history with us.

Ms Stoker is 84 years old and comes from a family blessed with longevity. She managed the Western Union Office for several years, while it was an independent office.

Lucy Stoker's great great grandfather was Howell Parker. He was born in 1757 in Virginia but moved to North Carolina when he was ten years old. He married Elizabeth Loflen in 1780.

Mr. Stoker served with the Patriots during the Revolutionary War. During this time he had a furlough to come home upon the birth of his son, William, in October 1781.

On this furlough he made the history books. An incident that the family has told and retold proudly, and justly so, for many years.

Howell Parker was confronted on the main road near home by Col. Fanning and his band of Tories. They halted him at rifle point, asked his name and demanded his politics-whether he was for or against the king.

Parker squared his shoulders and announced, I

am a patriot, Sir! Whereupon, Fanning ordered that Parker turn his back, as they were going to shoot him as an enemy of the King.

Parker looked him squarely in the eye and told him, 'A Parker never turns his back on an enemy!'

Believing that Parker must have a band of Patriots hiding in nearby woods, the Tories turned and galloped away.

Howell an dElizabeth's granddaughter, Nancy Parker married Allen Stoker in 1835 in North Carolina. They both had been born an dreaired in North Carolina.

After their marriage, they hopped into their buggy (one of three in the whole country around them). They left their wedding and went to Georgia to make their home.

Later they moved to Alabama and then to Mississippi. It was in Mississippi that their thirteen children were born.

After the closing of the Civil War, the Allen Stoker family came to Texas but only stayed one year, due to the fact that the family contracted the fever.

The family couldn't stay away from Texas and was back in 1880, about six years

later. They bought a farm 4 1/2 miles S. W. of Breckenridge. This is where the couple lived until their deaths. They were buried in the Breckenridge Cemetery.

As stated before the Stoker family had the blessing of longevity. One son lived to the age of 103, and a daughter lived to the age of 100. They had three other children who lived past the age of 94.

One of these children, Robert Green Stoker, born in 1846 moved 5 miles N. of Crystal Falls. He set up his home there, raised his family, and died at the age of 96, in 1943.

One of his sons, Charles Edwin (Ed) Stoker, Lucy's father was born in 1867 and died in 1931 when he was 63. He is buried in the Stoker cemetery in land donated by his grandfather, Allen Stoker.

The family has since sold much of the original land that was owned but still owns the land and house which belonged to Allen Stoker. The original log room built before 1880 still stands but has been enlarged to make a bigger house.

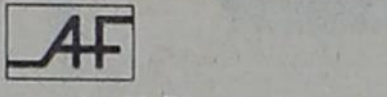

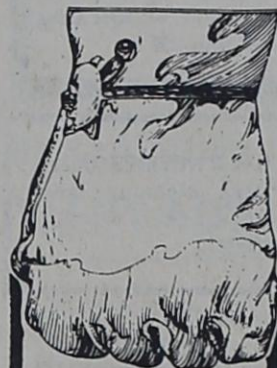

SENIOR CITIZEN'S CORNER TURN ON'S

HELPFUL IDEAS FOR SUCCESSFUL RETIREMENT

Veterans and Pensions
Veterans and their spouses are now eligible for numerous benefits. Senior citizens should investigate such benefits as compensation and pensions. Compensation is payment for any service-connected injury or illness.

Pensions, on the other hand, represent payments to needy wartime veterans for non-service injuries or illnesses, based on the individual's need.

The pension increase granted last year is a generous one. It raises the needy vet above federal "poverty guidelines." Beginning this year, the maximum yearly pension for a single veteran rose to \$3,550. A vet with one dependent and no other income will receive about \$4,600 annually, under the new plan.

Congress has also provided an automatic increase for pensioners each time there's a cost-of-living increase in social security benefits.

But VA officials have issued some warnings about the improvements. Vet pensioners with working wives would lose their pensions if they take the wrong option under the new law — and other pensioners could be jeopardized in other ways.

VA pensioners can be best informed and able to protect themselves by consulting with officials at one of the VA's 58 regional offices as listed in the phone book under U.S. Government. You have until October 1, 1979 to decide whether to abide by the new rules or stick to your old guidelines. Contact your VA representative before making that choice.

From Munich, Germany, Christian Prisoners Release reports that there are now 53 evangelical Christians who either have been sentenced or who await sentencing in the Soviet Union. —Herald of Holiness.

Catholics are growing and Protestants are slipping. Twenty-nine percent of the nation's adults are Roman Catholics, up from 20 percent in 1947. But Protestants fell from 69 to 59 percent during the same period, and Jews from 5 to 2 percent.

The American Bible Society has announced the completion of the Bible in Braille for the blind. The 18 volumes cost \$235.00.

Dr. George Hunter, assistant general secretary of the evangelism section of the Board of Discipleship of the United Methodist Church, said, "In the average church, less than one percent of the members have become Christians in crusades or revivals. You've heard that the chemicals that make up the human body are worth only 97 cents. It seems Harold Morowitz, a professor of molecular biophysics and biochemistry, has

He went through a catalogue of supplies from a biochemical supply company and calculated what the human body would cost constructed from supplies bought on the open market. Jo Gwyn Baldwin to Speak '81 To Be Good Year For Livestock Producers to Cisco Writer's Club

Jo Gwyn Baldwin, Abilene journalist, will be the featured speaker for the Dec. 2nd meeting of the Cisco Writer's Club. The program will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the meeting room of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce Bldg. Bill Roberts of Cisco, president of the group, will preside over the meeting.

Mrs. Baldwin's discussion will center around the topic: "Positive Thinking in a Writing Career." She will offer suggestions for article, feature writing and other forms of journalism.

Her own writing experiences began in the 1960's in El Paso, when she began writing for magazines and feature writing for the Herald Post and El Paso Times. Her "Southwestern in Focus" series on local personalities was a notable part of the area newspapers. In 1970 her editing of a book called "Southwestern

Mosaics" won first place in the state in a contest sponsored by The Texas Press Women.

After moving to Abilene in 1975 Jo Baldwin joined the Abilene Writer's Guild and resumed writing articles and stories for various publications. She has had material published recently in "Woman's Day", "Air Force Times", "Home Life", "Texas Woman" and "Prevention" magazines. Her stories are also featured by the Abilene Reporter News, which recently published: "Joe T. Smith - From Frijole to Hawley."

A book of Mrs. Baldwin's "Let's Make Ice Cream" was published by J.W. Sitton's Longhorn Press. It has been acclaimed as an excellent volume on the preparation of that popular food.

The public is invited to come out and enjoy this meeting.

While 1980 will go down in the record books as a tough year for most agricultural producers, 1981 offers hope, especially for those in the livestock industry.

"Livestock prices should show solid increases next year due to lower total meat production and improved consumer demand," believes Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Cash receipts from livestock and livestock products totaled \$69 billion last year in the U.S., 52 percent of all farm and ranch income, notes Uvacek. In Texas 1979 cash receipts from livestock and livestock products surpassed \$4.3 billion, or more than 55 percent of all agricultural income in the state.

Livestock cash receipts for 1980 will be down some from the 1979 level due primarily to reduced cattle feedlot ac-

tivity.

"Retail demand for all meat products should be much improved in 1981," contends Uvacek. "Economic recovery in the business segment should help considerably.

Somewhat reduced inflation will also be helpful although that may focus attention on the inevitable higher meat prices. That, in itself, could stimulate consumer resistance or, even worse, might lead to government price controls."

While the new year should be a boon for some segments of the livestock industry, not all will share equally in the prosperity. Cow-calf operators should fare well in 1981, but meat packers, stocker operators and feedlots may find the going a

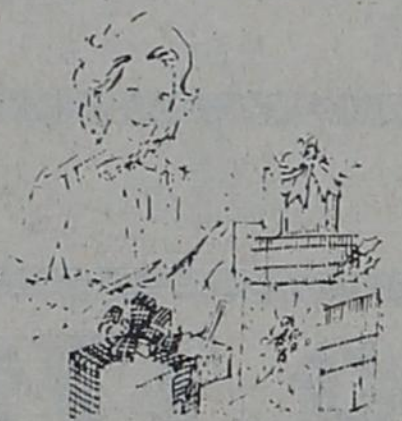
RECIPE FOR THE WEEK
I was recently reading through the T.D.A. Quarterly magazine. Now if you are not familiar with this

magazine, let me explain. The T.D.A. Quarterly is published by the Texas Department of Agriculture four times a year.

I was interested in the section on 'Recipes from our Readers'. A recipe for Apple Brownies is included from Mrs. Dewey (Frances) Cox of Ranger. Those of you who know Frances, know her wonderful reputation for cooking delicious goodies.

APPLE BROWNIES

2 sticks (1 cup) butter
2 beaten eggs
4 medium apples
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup chopped pecans
2 cups all-purpose flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. cinnamon
Preheat oven to 350 degree F. Cream butter and sugar together until fluffy and beat in eggs. Stir in pecans. Peel, core and dice apples, and stir into mixture. Add rest of ingredients, stirring with spoon, but do not overbeat. Turn into greased 13X9 inch cake pan and bake for 40 minutes at 350 degrees F. Makes 48 squares.

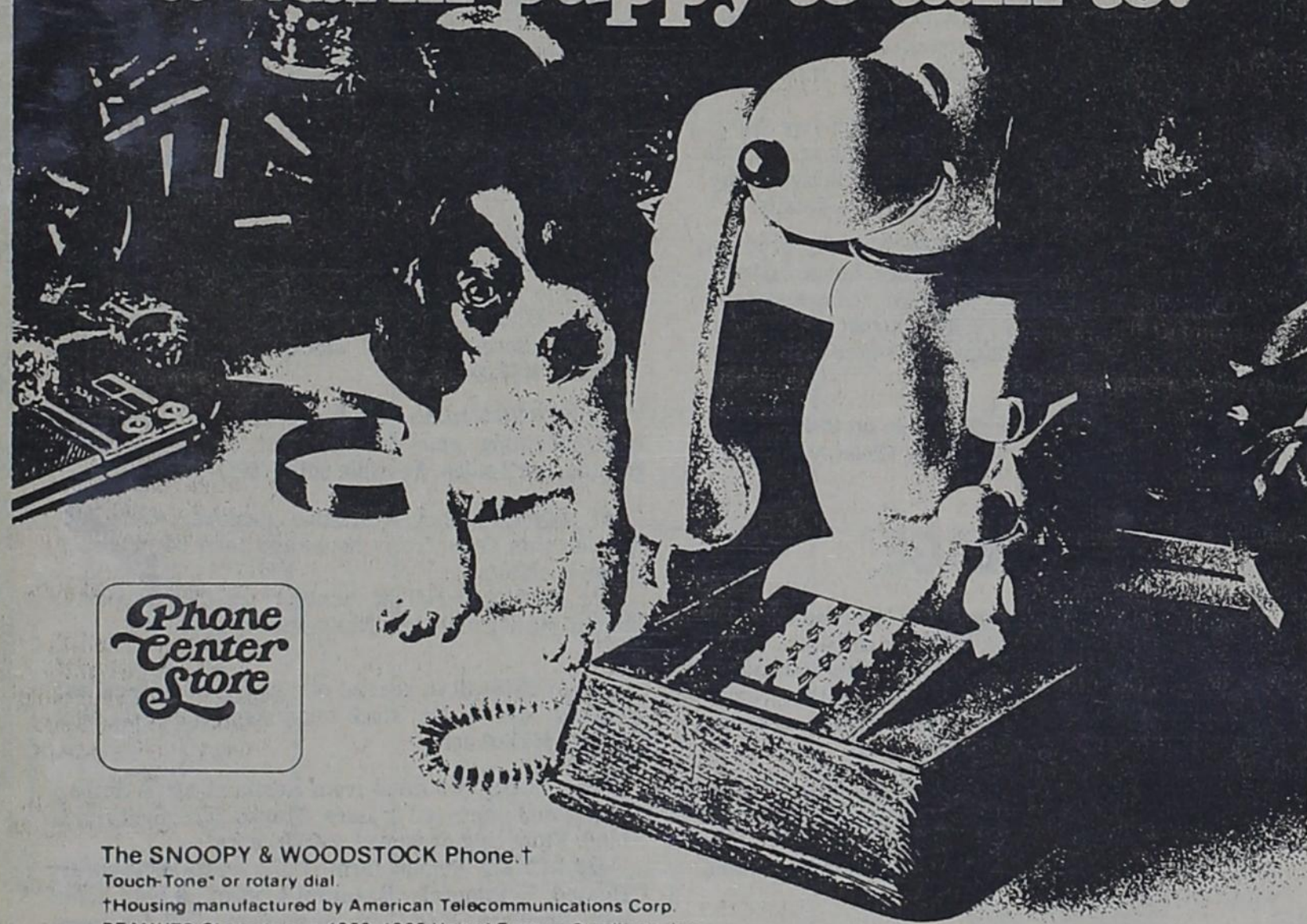
