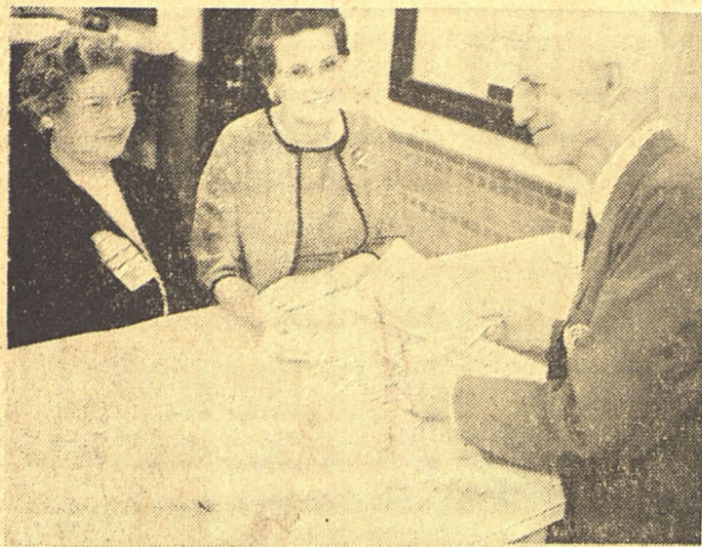

Oil Test Being Drilled On Fee Land Near Cisco

Ben Hobbs et al of Dallas were drilling at about 2,500 feet Tuesday in their No. 1 George P. Fee, wildcat oil test in the southeast quarter of Section 76, Block 4, H&TC Survey, Eastland County. The location is three miles north-east of Cisco.

The test is in an area that has yielded Lake Sand oil and gas production for many years.

The Hobbs company recently completed a gas well, their No. 1 Olan Smith, five miles southeast of Moran in Eastland County. Location was given as 330 feet from the north and 1,450 feet from the east lines of Section 2055, TE&L Survey.

The well was flowing gas at more than 15 million CFM from perforations at 3,719-28 feet. The hold was bottomed at 3,907 feet.

Elsewhere in the county, O. P. Leonard of Fort Worth has located his No. 5-A WIL Martin Unit in the regular field a mile west of Eastland as a 3,500-foot rotary test. Location was in the J. P. Douglas survey.

A total of 298 voters turned out in last Saturday's Cisco Independent School Board election to name three new trustees, decide a bond assumption proposition, and name two county school board members.

Results were tabulated as follows:

Trustee election — Louis (Jake) Morgan 289; Dr. E. E. Addy, Jr., 284; and Richard W. Moore, 280. All three were unopposed on first terms on the board.

Bond assumption — (1) For or Against assumption of indebtedness, For 240, Against 44; (2) For or Against a bonded debt maintenance tax, For 232, Against 49.

CITY ELECTION

A total of 384 ballots had been cast at 1 p. m. today in the annual city election in which a mayor and two commissioners will be chosen.

The polls will remain open at the city hall until 7 p. m.

County School election — J. D. Lauderdale of Cisco was re-elected in Precinct Four with 266 votes, and Melvin Adams of Ranger was re-elected trustee-at-large with 249 votes.

Leo Phagan, presiding judge for the election, had predicted light voting due to the fact that all candidates were unopposed.

School officials said that the assumption of the bond indebtedness and maintenance tax was merely a legal requirement for the Cisco and Scranton areas under their consolidation and would not affect present taxes in any way.

The new trustees will take offices Monday night, April 12, at the regular meeting of the school board, when it will be re-organized and officers elected.

Retiring president of the board is Oz Gerrard, and others whose terms expire are Gene Abbott and Sterling Drumwright.

Holdover members are W. E. Austin, Lloyd McGrew, J. V. Heyser, Jr., and W. L. Darr.

Poll tax or exemption holders were eligible to vote in the trustee elections Saturday, while the bond assumption proposition was limited to property owners with poll taxes.

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State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, TEX. — A goodly share of the 3,000 Texans who went to Washington for President Lyndon Johnson's inauguration went through the same sort of celebration — on a much smaller scale — in Austin Monday and Tuesday.
Following Monday's early-afternoon State Democratic Executive Meeting, the round of State Inaugural parties began. One of the best-attended was a reception in the Gondolier Hotel for House Speaker Ben Barnes of DeLeon and Dan Blocker (the "Hoss Cartwright" of Bonanza fame).
"Hoss" was a headliner, along with TV celebrity Edie Adams, at the \$25-per-plate Democratic Victory Dinner, honoring Gov. John Connally, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and other party winners.

Following the solemn ceremony of the swearing-in of Connally and Smith on Tuesday, another round of luncheons and receptions began. Gov. and Mrs. Connally received thousands of visitors at a reception in the Governor's Mansion, across the street from the Capitol.
Connally's kind of celebration, heavy of the folksy flavor, is a far cry from the former custom of a series of governor's bills on the eve of Inauguration.

Bill Filing Begins — First bill filed in the House of Representatives was one by Rep. Maud Isaacks of El Paso — only woman member in the House. It would allow youngsters 15-1/2 years old to obtain drivers licenses if they pass approved drivers education courses. It's designed also to abolish the special motor scooter and motor bike licenses.

A measure which sponsors say will raise \$10,000,000 in tax money for the State, during the next two years, has hit the legislative hopper. It is not a liquor by the drink bill. But it would make available to people dining in Texas restaurants tiny, 2-oz. (or less) bottles of distilled spirits.

Bill calls for an annual license fee of \$500 from each restaurant providing the service. Sponsors claim it will encourage tourism while at the same time will not permit open bars.

Measure was introduced in the upper house by Sen. Jim Bates of Edinburg and in the lower house by Rep. Willis Watley of Houston.

A bill raising the salary of school teachers \$45 a month for each month of the school year was assured of passing in the House. Rep. George Hinson of Mineola, who is sponsoring the measure, invited other House members to sign the bill as co-sponsors. He quickly got more than 80 signatures, a majority of the House members.

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Bill probably will have easy sailing in the Senate, where it was introduced by Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr. of Paris, joined by Sens. J. P. Word of Meridian, Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur and Jim Bates of Edinburg.
Another bill asked by the teachers, one providing for five days sick leave a year cumulative to 30 days, was introduced by Rep. Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge. Both bills are being sponsored by the Texas State Teachers Association.

A plan to discourage the purchase of imported beef by Texans was laid out by Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo.

His proposal would make it illegal — subject to fines up to \$500 and a jail sentence — to sell imported meat, unless the grocer displays a sign six by 12 inches large, with the words, "Imported Meat Sold Here," and labels packaged meat, "Product of . . ." stating country of origin.

Bills which would put poll tax repeal on the Nov., 1966, ballot — via constitutional amendments — have been introduced in both houses of the Legislature.

A proposal by Sen. Franklin Spears of San Antonio also would try to extend the vote to all military personnel who qualified under residency requirements presently applicable to other Texas voters. House measure, co-sponsored by Dallas Representatives James W. Stroud and Cooper Blankenship, specifies that military personnel could vote only in the county in which they resided at the time they entered the service.

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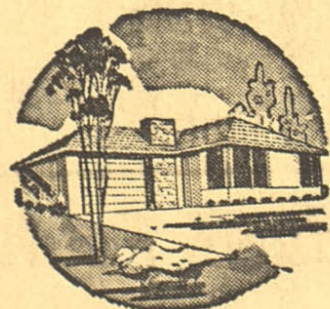
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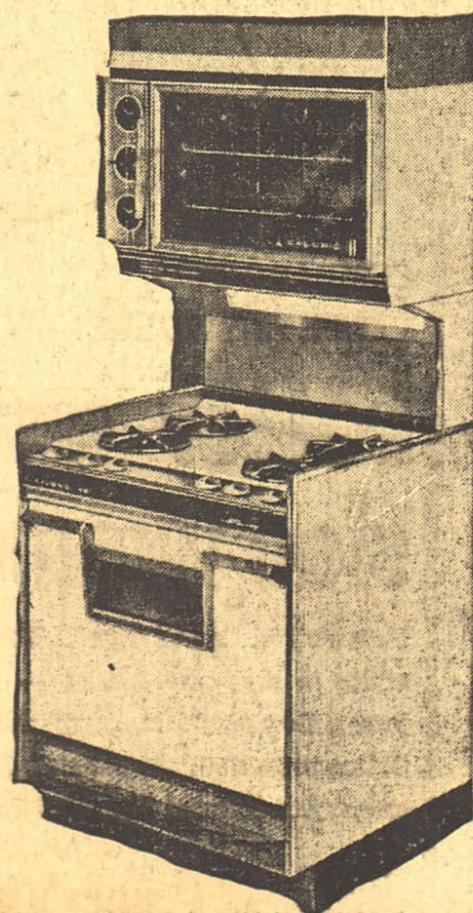
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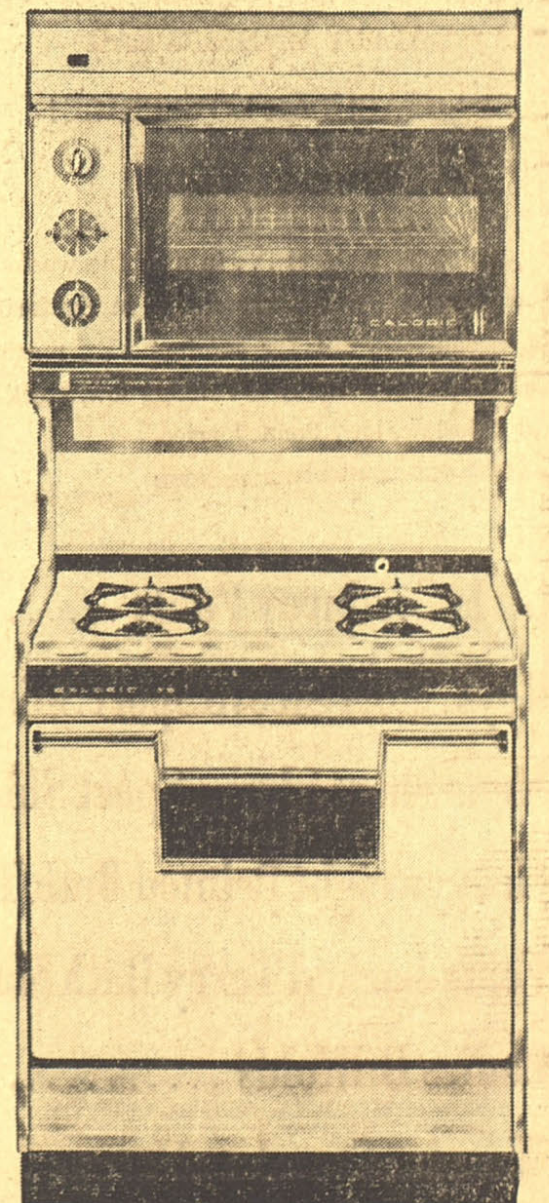


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The Late Raymond Gray Honored by Democrats
