El Paso Gets Parchman

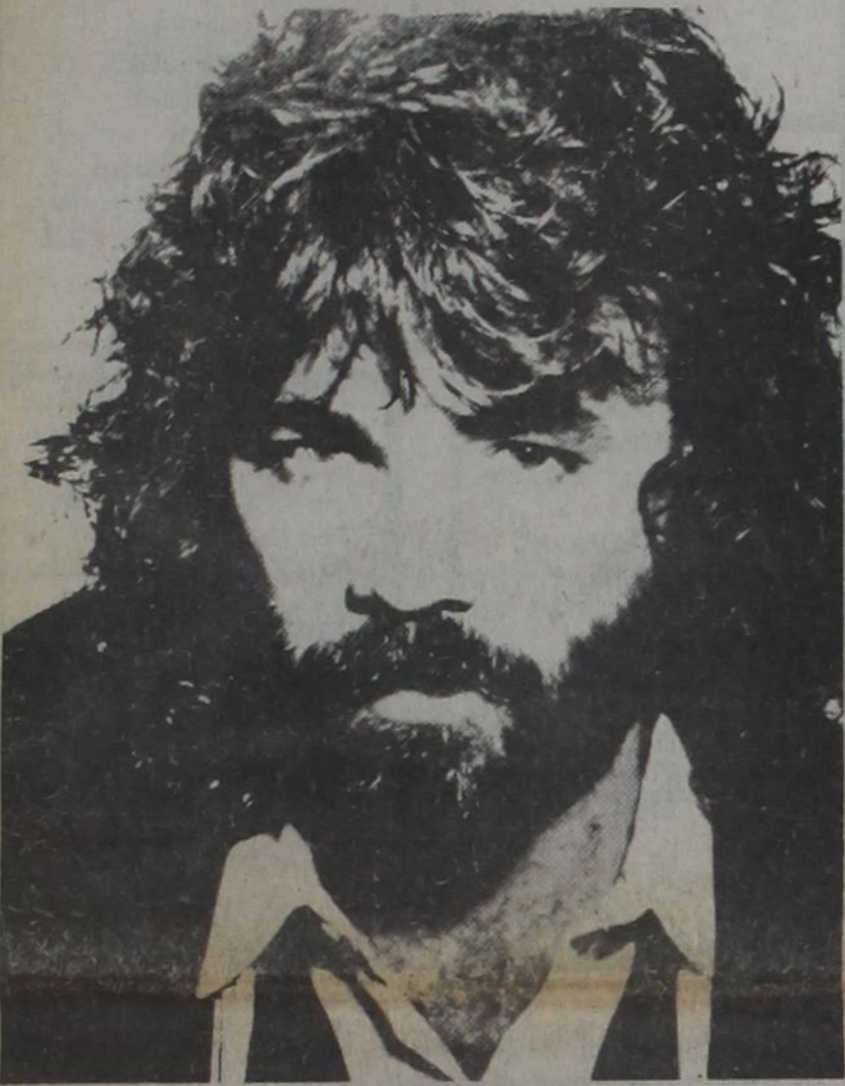

Gary Morris - He Sang At C.J.C.

The voice of Gary Morris is heard over most of the free world now. He has sung country music, popular music, crossover, and even opera. He has used about every medium - radio, television, records, concert halls, the stage.

News that he will appear at the DeLeon Peach and Melon Festival this summer is of particular interest to a number of area people. They remember that he sang at Cisco Junior College in the 1960s, when he was a Music

Major from Fort Worth. And this Music Major, it seems, also played football.

"The first time I ever heard Gary Morris sing," says Lela Lloyd of Cisco, retired CJC English teacher, "was when he was in one of my classes at the College."

"We had begun to study Tennyson's Camelot - the College was planning to do the musical version that year."

"We were playing some records from Camelot that day, and I realized that Gary Morris was singing right

along with the music. Not only that, but adding to the rendition.

"I stopped the record and said: 'Sing out, Gary.'"

"The students cheered. 'Right then I realized Gary had a really fine voice. But I had no way of knowing what he would ever do with it.'"

Morris, Mrs. Lloyd said, sang in a Trio while at the school. Other members were Dwain Fail of Hico and his wife Delena Fail, a Cisco native. The Trio was in great demand for various functions.

In Camelot Fail played the part of Lancelot, and Morris was another Knight.

As the pair worked day and night on Camelot they began to fall behind on English assignments, Mrs. Lloyd says.

One day she called them into her office and spent quite some time working with them, explaining what they would need to do on themes and research papers in order to get a passing grade.

Eighteen owners of old and unlicensed automobiles were mailed letters by Police Chief Billy Rains during the past week requesting that the vehicles be moved from city streets.

Mr. Rains said the owners of the vehicles have until July 1 to comply with the request. If the vehicles are not moved by the deadline, the city will take steps to move them, he added.

"We are seeking compliance with a city ordinance that prevents the long-time parking of junk vehicles," Mr. Rains said. "Cooperation by the owners will be appreciated."

Lloyd's home. It had this inscription: "To the Leading Lady of the Court," and was signed "Sir Lancelot and Sir Gary."

When he graduated from Cisco Junior College Gary Morris was offered a Football Scholarship to Texas Tech University, but decided to go into full-time music instead.

Now full-time, professional music, as most musicians know, begins with a grueling apprenticeship. But Gary Morris jumped right into it and began singing everywhere a good natural baritone could get a job. He sang country music in clubs, at fairs, in Nashville, on tours, at rodeos, and began making records.

Finally he played for President Carter in the White House, and had a number of hit records. His version of "Wind Beneath My Wings" was named "Song of the Year" in 1984 by the Country Music Association.

Last winter he performed an English version of "La Boheme" in New York City with pop star Linda Ronstadt. He won the part of Puccini in the opera, after an audition which astonished critics.

"Few people believed a country music singer could perform a part like that," he commented.

He had to convince them during a formal tryout - and he hadn't auditioned for anything for many years.

As he sang he saw the faces of the selected audience change from contempt to enthusiasm. Three days later he was offered the part.

"La Boheme" closed in December, 1984 after a three-month run. Morris received good reviews, even though the production and Miss Ronstadt did not.

Morris indicates that he is not sorry he sang in the production. "It was an opportunity to broaden my horizons," he says. "It gave country music some credibility and opened doors for TV and motion picture opportunities."

Morris' role of Puccini apparently didn't hurt his rating one bit with the country music fans. His song, "Baby Bye Bye" was rated tops in the country music charts in February, 1985, not long after "La Boheme" closed.

And the other two singers in the Trio at CJC? Delena Fail, now Delena Knox, lives in Fort Worth. She has a family, but performs in the area with singing groups.

Dwain Fail, always talented in art and acting as well as music, became involved in theatrical productions after he left Cisco Junior College. At present he is director of a theatre in Dallas.

Fail has a number of illustrations on the works of Robert Browning in Lela Lloyd's book "Browning on the Brazos", which was published in 1984.

When she looks at these drawings or hears Gary Morris sing Lela Lloyd thinks of these talented young people who passed her way.

Patterson Ambulance Service Memberships Expire on July 31

Patterson Ambulance Service of Eastland and Cisco has announced that the 1984-85 Ambulance Memberships will expire on July 31, 1985.

In making this announcement, the Pattersons made the following statement...

Patterson Ambulance Service has provided ambulance service for Eastland, Cisco and surrounding areas for the past four years. During this time, we have acquired many friends and supporters of our service. We wish to thank

everyone for their trust, confidence, support, prayers, and love that has been demonstrated to us and our crews in Eastland and Cisco. We would like to be able to say "there is no charge for this ambulance call." However, due to circumstances beyond our control that statement is just a dream, a pleasing thought, and would be a very good comfort to all in time of a financial crisis and now we can help by offering you a membership.

1. Person with a membership:

A. Ambulance service for admission/discharge only to any hospital within a 60 mile radius of pick-up-point, and third party assignments are accepted for payment.

B. Freezes all charges at the current rates accepted by medicare/medicaid.

C. Helps to reduce overall operating costs.

D. Should an ambulance be needed for Doctor's office or clinic calls, or to the hospital emergency room for treatment only, there will be a small charge for these services.

E. You are helping your family, friends and the city of Eastland and Cisco to have an ambulance service. This year we are requesting less memberships (only 650 for each city). The memberships sold in surrounding area will reduce the number of memberships for each ci-

ty.

2. Person with a membership:

A. Required to pay for services at the time of transfer, the minimum charge will be \$101.70 (this does not apply to MVA or Workman's comp claims) a grace period will be in effect for extremely bonifide emergencies, however, the total bill will be due and payable as agreed.

B. As the cost for equipment, supplies, insurance, fuel, labor, and maintenance increase we have no alternative but to pass it on to the patient.

C. New laws are now in effect to protect ambulance services that are not under a contractual agreement and failure to respond to a call may be excused for the following reasons:

1. Non-payment for prior

services rendered.

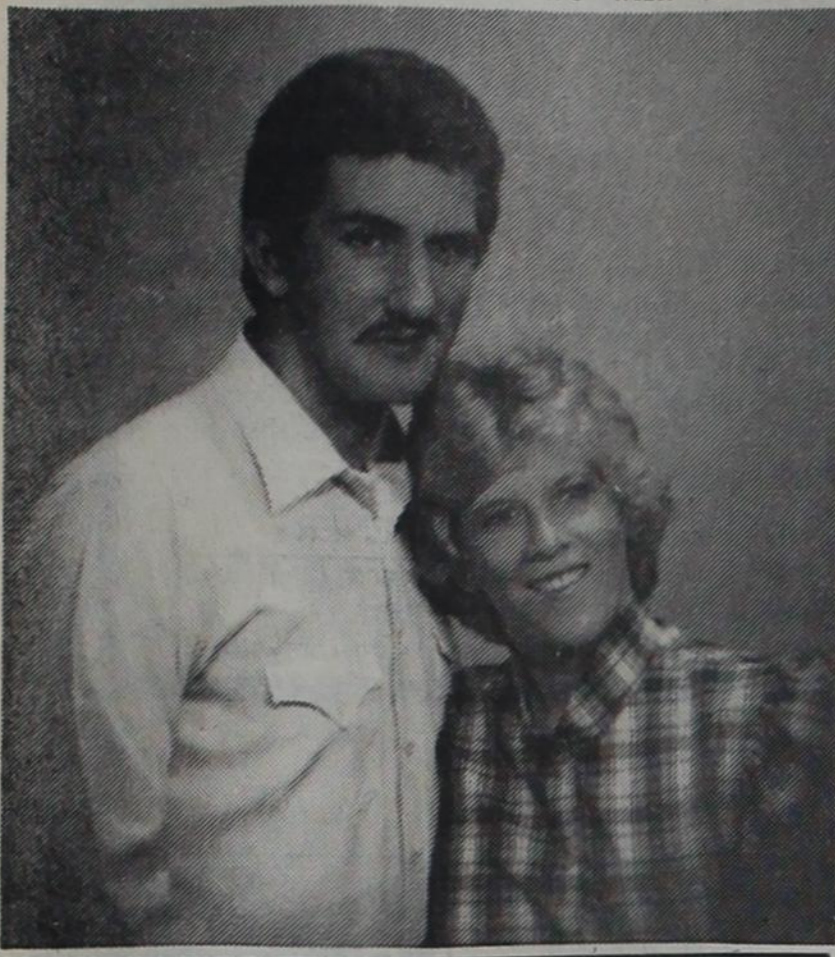
2. Private ambulance services not under contract by city or county, and persons not securing a membership, have and can exercise the right of refusal of all services due to non-payment of services.

3. Transfers from local hospitals to out-of-town facilities determining that the patient requires services that are beyond the scope and capabilities of the am-

balance service, may refuse transfer service.

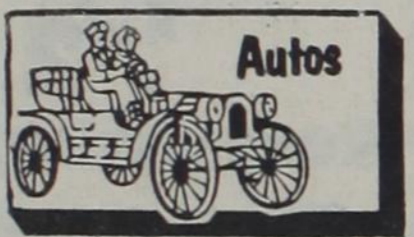

Outstanding Perennials For Texas Landscapes

When most people think of perennials, they automatically envision daffodils, tulips and chrysanthemums, which is understandable since those are among the most common perennials. There are many more perennials, though, that often are overlooked. Here are 10 lesser known varieties that will do well in most parts of Texas.

- Oxalis:** This plant has small bright green leaflets that look like a clump of clover and the flowers range in color from hot pink to white, red and yellow. Oxalis grows in shady or partly shady areas and will stay under 10 inches tall.
- Crinums:** Members of the lily family, crinums have long, strap-shaped leaves that are dark green in color. In the spring, large white flowers will open out.
- Purple Coneflower:** This beautiful flower bears large, light purple blooms on strong 15- to 24-inch

plants in late spring. It should be planted in sun or part shade.



- Gloriosa Daisy:** A relative of the native Black-eyed Susan, this daisy establishes into nice clumps of summer-blooming plants. Most are buttery-yellow with brown centers, though several types come in shades of rust and copper. They will grow to 1 to 3 feet in height and will do well in sun or part shade.
- Stachys:** Grown only for its foliage, stachys has a pleasing, soft texture. The leaves are gray-green and as soft as velvet. They will grow up to 10 inches tall in sunny or shady areas.
- Mallows:** A hardy hibiscus, the mallow displays dozens of dinner-

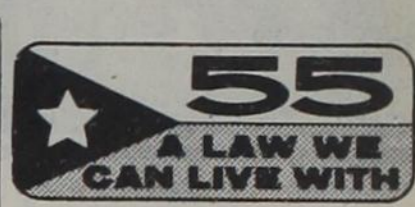
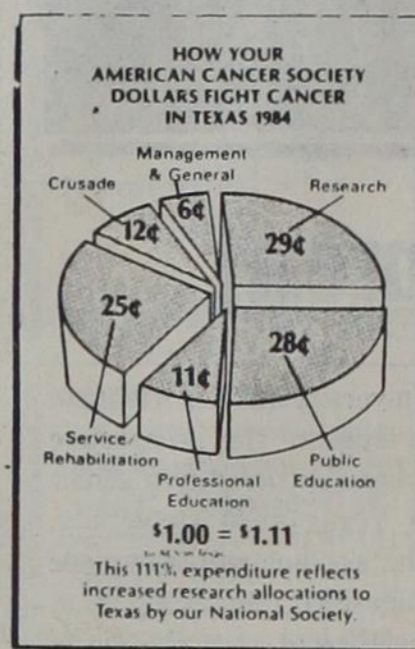
plate sized flowers each summer and comes in red, pink and white. They die back at first frost but will come back the next spring.

- Belladonna Lily:** This amaryllis blooms in the late summer and has trumpet-shaped blossoms in a soft pink shade. It will thrive for many years.
- Yellow Fall Crocus:** Sometimes called sternbergia, fall crocus blooms in the early fall and has spectacular color. Their mature height is under 3 inches. Plant in late summer.
- Michaelmas Daisy:** An adapted form of aster, this daisy grows 12 to 24 inches tall and literally covers itself with bright purplish-blue blooms.

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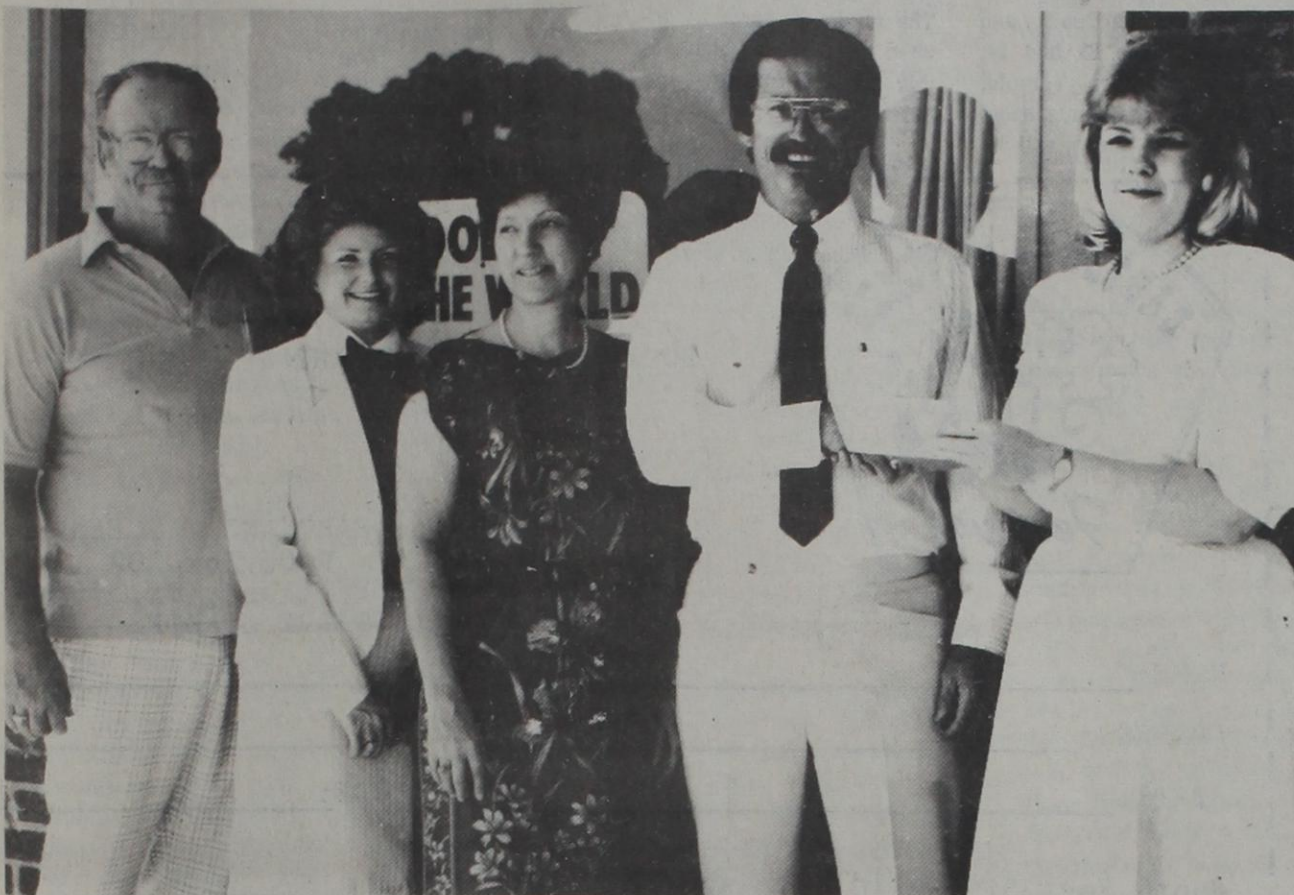

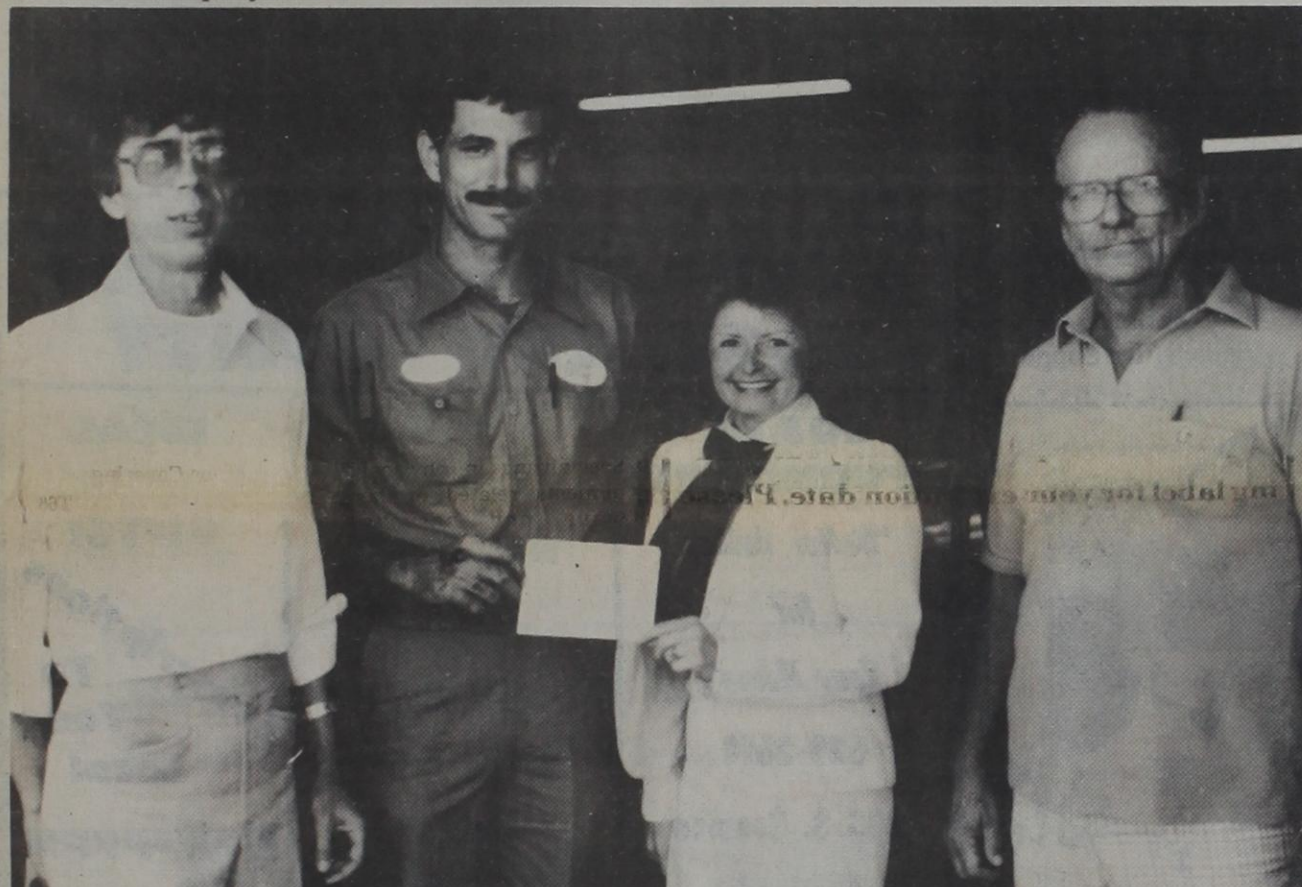

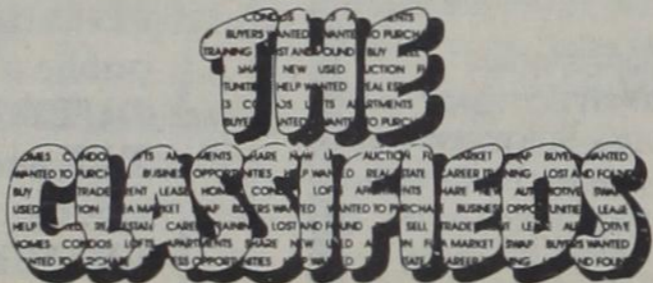

Dugas, a repair technician, revised estimating procedures for the installation of inside wiring so that customers will have more accurate estimates and service will be more satisfying. She also led a successful blood drive in Houston.

Nancy Lannon and Martha McKee of Dallas, Barney Sifuentes of Austin and David Walker of Tyler were other Texas finalists for the honor.

Lannon, a directory assistance operator, personally rescued a customer trapped alone inside a locked office.

Another directory assistance operator, McKee, developed a procedure that enables operators to be more aware of their voice projection to customers.

Sifuentes, a customer services representative, worked overtime to restore service to a customer with a heart condition.

Cable repairman Walker kept rain from interrupting phone service for almost 600 Tyler residents by lifting an exposed underground phone cable out of a work pit and holding it above his head until the waist-deep water in which he stood could be drained.

"All 35,000 of our Texas employees are devoted to service," said Jim Adams, president of the Texas Division of Southwestern Bell. "We're proud of each of the six Texans nominated for the Rider Award. As award recipients, Ron Bone and Dale Dugas have especially demonstrated the spirit of

meeting customer needs in an efficient, satisfactory way."

The Rider Award, which is being presented for the first year, is named after Charles Erwin Rider. In June 1923, the early-day Southwestern Bell employee crossed the blazing Cimarron River near Guthrie, Okla., and singlehandedly restored service to four states.

Fishing Outdoors

"A Better Bass. Yes or No."

The Eastland County Bass Club is proud to announce a drive presently underway to help improve and preserve the bass fishing on Lake Leon. Many of you have already been approached by members to place your name among many, who are concerned with this problem on Lake Leon.

You may ask what problem are we speaking of? Well a large number of very small fish are being removed in great numbers from Lake Leon. Many of these fish even fall below present state minimum length, which is now 10 fish 10 inches. Even a greater number between 10 inches and 12 inches are being taken by anglers.

After careful consideration and some individual surveys by members, we are wishing to help improve fishing for years to come. Therefore we are asking the Texas Parks and Wildlife to change present 10 inch minimum lengths on black bass to 12 inches.

Lets face it folks 12 inches is a pretty small fish. Plus this range are better raisers of spawns and also have a good weight gain in a short period of time.

To enhance this request as well as fishing on Lake Leon. We have also requested that Lake Leon be included in the proposed stocking program of the Florida strain bass. This program shall begin 1986 and run until 1991.

As many of you know the Florida strain black bass since introduced into Texas waters has rewritten the record book for Texas. There are numerous 14 pound to 11 pound fish being taken from around the state.

We would like to ask each and everyone of you to join us in our efforts to ensure Lake Leons future for bass fishing. Anyone wishing to join our efforts, please contact your local club member. Lets don't wait until hindsight is all that will be available. NOW IS THE TIME FOR ACTION.

Our leader in this months big bass is Eddie Green with an excellent fish weighing 6 pounds 1 ounce. As you may remember this fish was taken during our monthly June tournament. This fish also places Eddie leading our big bass of the year; which have been taken during our tournaments. This category will be awarded a lovely trophy and is considered to be our second highest award within our organization.

Area reports are as follows: Oak Creek: Bass good to 3 pounds on worms and topwater; crappie good, catfish good. Graham, Bass good, hybrid strippers excellent at day break, crappie fair. Daniels bass good to 4 pounds on jigs and crankbaits, crappie fair, catfish excellent. Leon bass slow, hybrid strippers slow, crappie fair, catfish good to 46 pounds.

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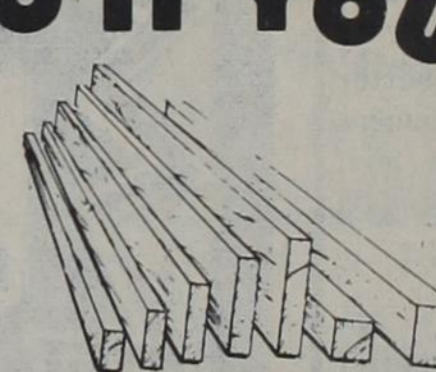
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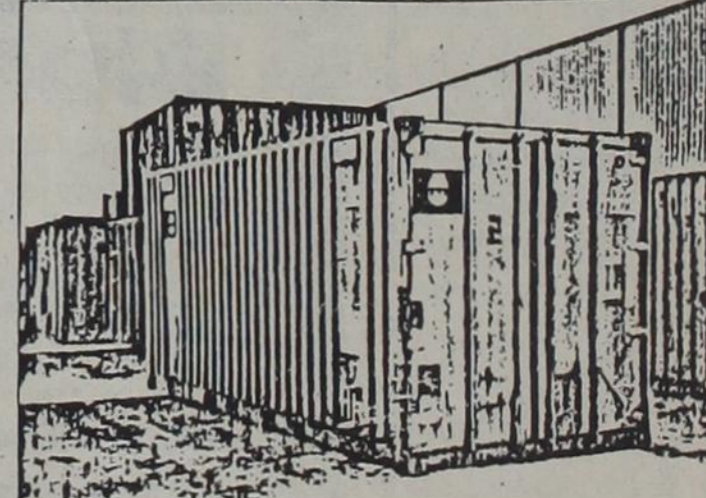
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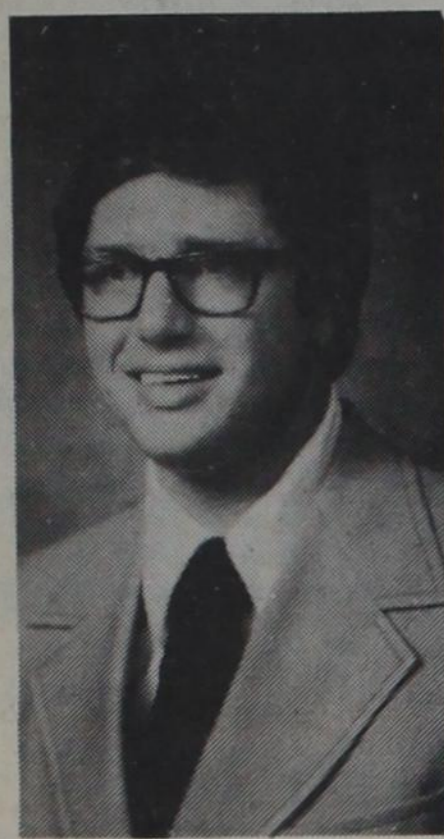
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Texas Legislature Increasing Fees



RANDY HOLLUMS

The 1985 session of the Texas Legislature increased fees by some \$145 million and voted to sell land owned by the prison system for another \$100 million dollars rather than increase taxes, according to John R. (Randy) Hollums of Floydada in a talk last Thursday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Rotary Club.

Mr. Hollums, district attorney of the 110th Judicial District of four counties and president of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association, was the guest speaker on invitation of Rotarian Clois Purvis.

The increased fees were seen by the speaker as a legislative move to raise money at the county level. The fee increases include

raising driver's licenses from \$10 to \$16 to raise \$50 million per year. Auto inspection fees will go up along with probation fees and others. State school tuition fees were boosted.

The seat belt law, which requires front seat drivers to buckle up after Sept. 1, was also passed into law. The state's blue law was abolished for all except auto agencies, but the controversial HB-72 (the public school law) was virtually intact.

Texans will vote next November on a statewide water plan which, the speaker said, provides something for everyone. Medical and health relief for the needy was provided in a special session following the regular meeting.

Legal alcoholic drinking age was raised from 19 to 21 years but there was no change in the open container regulations, Mr. Hollums noted. A new law permits capital murder charges to be filed in cases of multiple deaths.

Mr. Hollums pointed out that under another new law the victims of crime now have rights, may file impact statements in court trials and have new safeguards.

Mr. Hollums, graduate of West Texas State University and the Texas Tech Law School, has been prominent in Floydada community affairs and is a veteran of U.S. Air Force duty. He is a brother of Mrs. Clois Purvis of Cisco.

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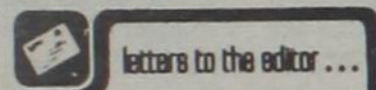


Local Delta Kappa Gamma Members Go To 56th Convention

Former residents from California to Virginia have submitted family histories - one family submitted their history and ordered eight books. Hicks Turner, our editor, is receiving as many as twenty family histories a day, but the deadline for submitting the histories is rapidly approaching; once it is reached, Hick's staff will have no choice but to reject those sent in late. If you want to be included in our book, please take time to write your history, get it typed, and send it to Hicks.

Some people have committed, "I don't have anything interesting to write," or "I haven't lived here but five years." Others say "I'm not interested in history." To those of you who may feel this way, let me say this: We don't want to force this undertaking on anyone, or attempt to make someone feel bad about not getting involved - our purpose is to "capture," so to speak, the people of Callahan County, now and past, for future generations to have available for their study. Your history might not be particularly interesting to you or your friends - but what about a great grandchild in the 21st Century? He or she might find fascinating what you consider unimportant.

Another point to remember about our book is that it will be printed on a one time basis only, and it is available solely on a pre-sale basis. I bring this up because I've heard some people plan to wait until the book is published, so they can inspect it and decide if they want to buy one. Please understand that this will not be possible, because no "extra" books will be published. The Historical Commission does not have the funds to order extra copies. In keeping with the nautical theme, members enjoyed a dinner cruise on Corpus Christi Bay to highlight activities of the first day. Corpus Christi area members serving as hostesses wore special silk-screened skirts in keeping with the convention theme.

Mary J. Putnam, international first vice president, of Virginia, served as the official representative to the convention. A series of workshops chaired by various state chairmen took place concurrently with the executive board meeting, during which time chapter presidents voted on recommendations and elected a slate of officers for the biennium 1985-1987 to preside over the Texas membership of over 17,000 former and active key women teachers.

A special formal presentation, using as its theme "An Evening on Lympus: Alpha State on Parade," presented each of the 291 chapter presidents, individually introduced by the 16 area coordinators from each part of the state. Ruby Lee Pirtle was presented in the place of our local president, Louise Taylor, who was unable to attend the convention.

Award certificates were presented to 19 representatives of newspapers throughout Texas for giving consistently and comprehensive coverage to general education news or to local chapter news during the past year. This is the first year such awards have been presented.

The necrology chairman planned a memorial service honoring members who died since the last convention. Among those honored included Ina West Stamey, a long time member of our local Beta Upsilon Chapter.

The late Dr. Annie Webb Blanton of Austin and the other eleven founders of the Society received a special memorial tribute during the presidents and founders banquet the final night of the convention. Delta Kappa Gamma represents the largest group of women educators in the world united in their efforts to assist women who want to pursue advanced education and improve their professional status. Their 167,000 members work toward goals even though members in its 3,000 chapters come from a dozen countries.

From 1960 to 1984 Society members contributed more than three-quarters of a million dollars to assist 188 different women from 40 countries in Africa, Asia, Europe, Central and South America with study in the United States and Canada, attending 63 different universities.

Members have also invested well over a million dollars in scholarships for those members who wish to pursue advanced education. Each year both international and state organizations award scholarships for women seeking to upgrade their education. Two-week leadership/management seminars have taken place for the past five summers with 150 qualified women completing the seminar.

Delta Kappa Gamma has members in each of the United States, as well as in the seven provinces of Canada, three states of Mexico, Guatemala, Great Britain, The Netherlands, Iceland, Finland, Sweden, Norway, El Salvador, Costa Rica and Puerto Rico.

Local members also heard of plans for the Southwest Regional Conference scheduled for Tulsa in late June.

effective on September 1. Outstanding among those new regulations are these: (1) the home must be relicensed each time there is a supervisory change; (2) most inspections will occur between supper and breakfast hours; (3) all complaints will be classified and

then computerized; (4) LVNs and aids may report irregularities to higher authorities without fear of penalty; (5) all employees must be checked for criminal background before they are hired; (6) bed sores may be reported by telephone or picture to Austin headquarters; (7) Austin will give reports of complaints and corrections to inspectors.

Cartee also reported that the nursing homes in Texas are now only 82% full but the "Sunset Law" was not passed requiring all vacancies to be filled before additional nursing home construction.

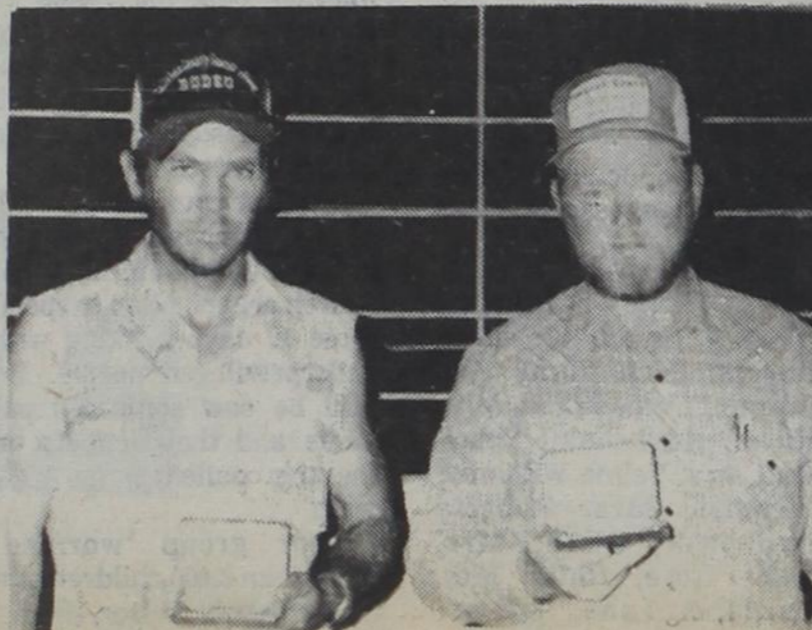
The decoration committee, chaired by Mabel Thetford, carried out the Fathers' Day theme with ties and boots on the wall and stage and ceramic horses on the table.

Drilling Bits

A new gas producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's Hanvey Field, with Don Hanvey Oil Investments as the operator. Located six miles north-northwest of Cisco, the well is in the SPRR Survey, A-457. It is designated as the No. 2 Kupp.

On a 18/64 choke, it flowed 809,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 1,290,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

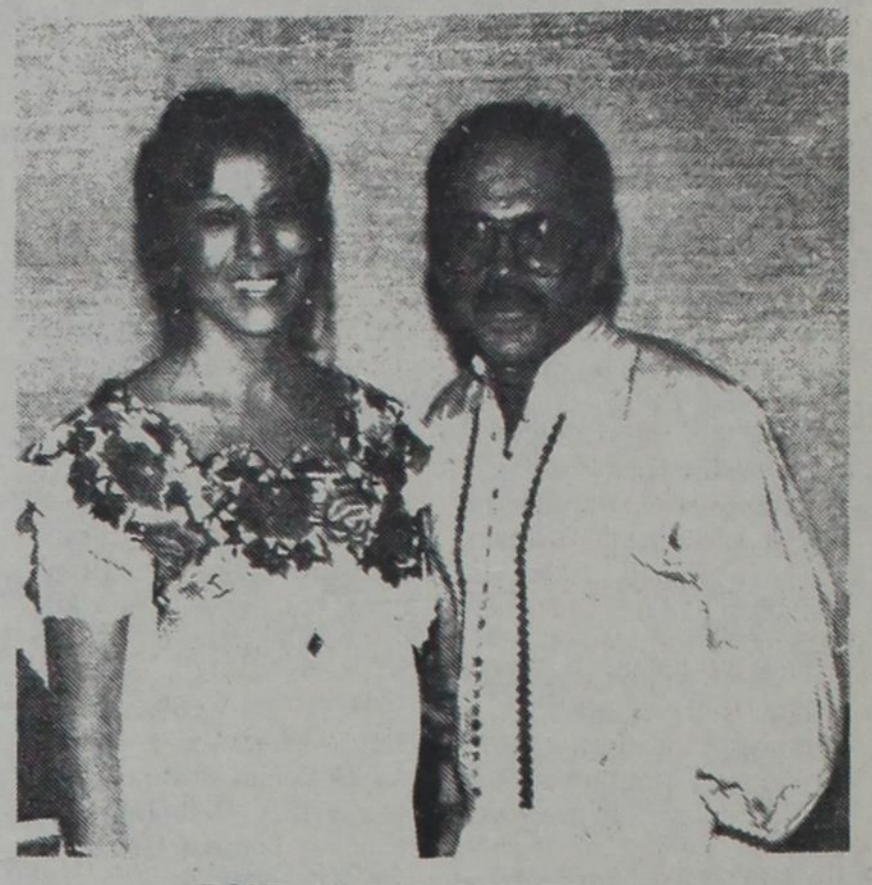
