Virtually opening the county interscholastic league at Eastland the Class A and B contests began Thursday. These are: Class B playground ball, Eastland high school auditorium, 1 p. m. Thursday, which was followed by Class A playground ball; ward school Class A and B volley ball this afternoon, and high school volley ball this evening at 7 o'clock, all taking place at the gymnasium, to be followed tomorrow by rural and Class B volley ball at 9 a. m. These contests will be continued with music memory, junior high building, 7:30 p. m., March 21; choral singing, high school auditorium, 7:30 p. m., March 22; one act play, high school auditorium, 1 p. m., March 22; tennis, contestants to meet in gymnasium 1 p. m., March 22. All the contests are to be held in Eastland.

The first day of the meet, essay writing, study hall 25, high school, 9 a. m.; declamation, all divisions assemble in high school auditorium at 9 a. m.; lunch in high school cafeteria 12 to 1 p. m.; declamations continued at 1 p. m.; track and field preliminaries, Connellee park, 1 p. m.; extemporaneous speaking, study hall 1120 in high school building, 1 p. m.; 3-R contest, room 21, high school building, 3 p. m.; debate finals, high school auditorium, 7:30 p. m.

On the final day of the meet the following are held: Arithmetic, study hall 25 in high school building, 9 a. m.; picture memory, study hall 20 in high school building, 9 a. m.; spelling, contestants meet in high school auditorium 10 a. m.; story telling, high school auditorium 1 p. m., and finals in track and field will be held at the Connellee part at 1 p. m.

Commission Takes No Action In Placing 3 Candidates On Ticket

At the commission meeting Tuesday night Mayor Berry read the petitions of about 50 voters, nominating W. P. Moore, L. F. Mendenhall and W. J. Donovan for places on the city ticket as candidates for city commissioners. City Attorney read the statute providing for the closing of the ticket, saying names must be submitted before the expiration of 20 days previous and ordered the tickets printed, and it seemed that the time had elapsed. HOUSE DARES VETO.

Two weeks ago the Citizen predicted that Democrats in congress would not supinely submit to the dictation of any boss always, not even such an ideal and patriotic leader as President Roosevelt, and advised "if the president was as wise as he should be that he would not attempt to move too far" in carrying out his plans of administration. And the Citizen predicted that the opposition of the veterans' bonus would be the entering wedge to that revolt of independent Democratic members of congress against the chief executive. That prediction is being verified in the passage of the lower house of the veterans bonus bill Monday, which the president has threatened to veto. It is predicted that the measure will fail in the house. However, administration friends hope that a satis factory measure will be agreed upon in conference that will be acceptable to the president. The bonus bill, as passed the \$2,200,000,000. Announcement of its passing immediately threw the administration leaders into a state of activity that resulted in an airon a compromise whereby it is hoped that the measure will be ironed out satisfactory to the friends of the veterans and the administration alike

But, for the first time, the administration confronts a crisis in the party which it has not seen since Roosevelt was inaugurated. And administration leaders must not fancy that the popularity of the president can stem the tide of reporting the opinion of one of fast enough to keep pace with volt that his opposition to the bonus bill has engendered. Democrats have no reputation for submitting to any boss very long. In fact, this independent attitude has been the reason why the Democrats have been a minority party practically ever since the civil war. If the president would hold his prestige, he must make some concessions to the representative of the people.
