

## CJC Wranglers Are Preparing For 'Toughest' Game

The CJC Wranglers, ranked No. 10 in the final National Junior College Athletic Association Top 20 poll are preparing for what may be their toughest game of the year.

CJC has accepted a bid to play Coffeyville Community College in the Kansas Jayhawk Bowl in Coffeyville, Kansas on Saturday, December 7.

The 3:00 p.m. kickoff will be at ISE Field and will have the Wranglers, who finished 6-3-1 this season, going against the 8-2 Red Ravens.

Coach Rick Frazier's squad finished second in the Texas Junior College Football Conference.

Sophomore running back David Smith finished the season as No. 3 in the Texas Junior College Football Con-

ference in rushing for the Wranglers. The Dallas native rushed for 879 yards on 141 carries for a 6.2 per-carry average, and was tied for 5th in the conference for scoring with seven touchdowns for 42 points.

Freshman running back James Dixon finished the season as No. 8 in the TJCF in rushing for the Wranglers. The Vernon native rushed for 443 yards on 67 carries for a 6.6 per-carry average. Dixon was ranked No. 1 in the conference for kickoff returns with 18 returns for 445 yards and 1 touchdown for a 24.7 average.

Miami, Florida native Mark Pilling, who finished 4th in the TJCF, led the Wranglers as first year quarterback, completing 79 of 204 passes with a 38.7 com-

pletion percentage. He threw for 1,187 yards and 11 touchdowns.

Leading the Wranglers in receiving and ranked No. 7 in the TJCF was freshman Daryl Grant who caught 19 passes for 240 yards and one touchdown. Sophomore Phillip Walton, ranked No. 9 in the TJCF, finished second with 18 catches for 480 yards and 4 touchdowns. Sophomore Melvin Patterson, ranked No. 13 in the TJCF, finished third with 15 catches for 205 yards and 5 touchdowns. Patterson also tied for 12th in scoring in the TJCF.

Sophomore Raymond Hernandez's 25 points after touchdowns and 9 field goals gave him the scoring crown for the Wranglers with 52 points and he finished No. 3 in the TJCF. Hernandez was ranked No. 3 in punting with 61 punts for 2463 yards with a 40.4 average per punt.

Freshman Diron Lintz led the conference in punt returns with 25 carries for 189 yards and a 7.6 average. Lintz is also tied for third in kickoff returns with 14 for 357 yards and a 25.5 average.

The Kansas team, ranked 15th, upset the nation's number one team, Butler County last week. Butler had scored to take the lead with less than a minute remaining before Coffeyville returned the ensuing kickoff for a 34-32 victory.

Also making the trip to the Kansas Jayhawk Bowl Classic will be seventy members of the Wrangler Band and Belles. They will march in the Christmas parade in Coffeyville on Saturday morning at 11 a.m. The Band and Belles will also participate with the Coffeyville Community College Red Raven Band and several high school bands at a pre-game mass performance presentation.

Since 1971, the Wrangler Band and Belles have represented the college five times at the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City; the last time being the fall of 1984. The Band and Belles were

featured in the Winchester, Virginia "Apple Blossom Festival" Parade in 1980 and 1983, and participated in the "Fiesta Flambeau" Night Parade in San Antonio, Texas, in the spring of 1979 and 1984.

These two groups will be featured at the Buccaneer Days Festival in Corpus Christi, Texas in May of 1986, and will return to Washington, D.C. and Winchester, Virginia in the spring of 1987.

The Wrangler Band director and coordinator of activities is Mr. Tim Jones,

and Belle director is Mrs. Nicki Harle. Mr. Wyley Peebles is chairman of the Fine Arts Department of Cisco Junior College.

The Kansas Jayhawk Bowl Classic was born at the NJCA Association Convention in March 1983, when sanction was granted. The first classic was held in 1983.

Tickets for the Bowl Classic are on sale at the CJC bookstore. Prices for

these are \$5.00 each, which is \$2.00 off the price that will be charged at the game.

Cisco Junior College students from Cisco who will be making the trip are, Karen Fisher and Paula Potter with the Wrangler Belles; Cheryl Casey, Janet Glenn, Laura Hutchens, David Luna, D.D. McGrew, Harold Roan, Debbie Tipton and Robert Vann with the

A bag containing a mink coat valued at \$10,000 that was apparently stolen from a parked car here was recovered around 6 p.m. Wednesday when Mrs. Janey Linebarger, employee at Truck Harbor Truck Stop, found the missing bag on the I-20 access road.

Mrs. Linebarger reported that she was driving on the north access road when she saw the bag where it had apparently been abandoned. It was near the Travel Trailer Park in South Cisco.

Opening the bag, Mrs. Linebarger found that it contained an expensive mink coat, two blouses, two skirts and two robes along with other items.

Mrs. Linebarger notified Cisco police and they took charge of the bag and clothing. A Dallas man had notified Cisco police earlier that he had left the bag on top of his car when he went into a restaurant here. He said he took two bags out of the car, took one with him and forgot to put the other back in the car when he and his wife got out.

The man told Officer Risa Livingston, who investigated the theft, that he would give a \$500 reward for the return of the bag and its contents. Police planned to report recovery of the bag to the man.

## Household Goods Are Scattered In I-20 Wreck

Miss LaWanda Albritton, 29, suffered painful cuts and bruises and her household goods and automobile were in shambles after a mail truck struck their U-Haul truck and trailer on I-20 near Cisco at 6 a.m. Thursday.

Miss Albritton, who was moving from Anaheim, Calif., to Dallas, was taken to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital here where she remained Friday. Her brother, Richard Albritton, 34 of Fort Smith, Ark., was with her and he was uninjured. Miss Albritton was expected to be released this weekend.

Ted and Rex's Wrecker Service of Cisco took two wreckers to the scene and Ted and Rex Fields and Glen Deitiker spent some four hours working with the wreckage. Bill Patton, Eastland U-Haul agent, and Ted Parrish, Cisco U-Haul representative, arranged for another U-Haul truck and trailer to be brought here and the Albritton belongings, including her 1979 model Volvo automobile, to be reloaded.

The mail truck, owned by a Dallas contractor, was pulled to the Cisco Post Office where Postmaster Wiley Cox and Assistant Postmaster Melvin Wende took charge of it. The tractor had extensive damage but the mail was still sealed in the truck. The contractor sent another tractor here from Dallas to pull the full load of mail, which originated in El Paso, on to the DFW mail center.

DPS Trooper Steve Foster,

assisted by Cisco Policeman Chris Key, investigated the mishap. Anthony Hope, 24, of Odessa, the truck driver, had minor injuries. The DPS trooper reported that his truck crossed the I-20 median after the mishap separating the interstate from the south service road, where the truck stopped.

Both lanes of I-20 were blocked for a time and the eastbound lane was blocked for some two hours. Joe Jarvis, Cisco fireman, assisted in directing traffic in the area.

Louis McHugh, 69, of Abilene, who was eastbound, swerved to miss furniture from the wrecked U-Haul truck and struck the trailer carrying the auto. He stopped his car without overturning. His wife, Veda, 72, complained of chest pains at the scene, police reported.

The mishap occurred some three miles west of Cisco.

At the hospital, Miss

Albritton told The Press that "I was driving along when I felt a bump and I lost control of the U-Haul truck. It turned over several times, and it was a horrifying experience that I will never forget. My neck seemed to snap when I felt the bump."

Officers believe that foggy conditions early Thursday may have contributed to the cause of the accident.

Miss Albritton reported that she was moving her household from California to Dallas and that her brother had gone to California to help her move. "All of my belongings were in that truck," she said. She added that they planned to visit their mother in Arkansas after arriving in Dallas.

"The people at Graham hospital and the community have been very nice to me," Miss Albritton told The Press. "They're one big happy family at the hospital." Dr. E.E. Addy was supervising her treatment.

-The Scout Law-the 12th point states "A Scout is reverent."

- \*Reverent towards God
- \*Faithful in religious duties
- \*Respects beliefs of others

The Scout Law is reaffirmed and remains unchanged.

-Scout Paul Trout of Shepherdstown, West Virginia, has agreed to subscribe to the Scout Oath and Law, has been reinstated and has been awarded his Life Badge.

-The phrase "Supreme Being" is being phased out of our literature. Example: "A boy has a duty to God or a Supreme Being". This statement tends to define God. This action was taken upon advise of our National Advisory Committees on religion which includes all major religious denominations...Catholic, Jewish and Protestant.

-Scouting has never intended to define what constitutes belief in God or what constitutes 'faithful in his religious duties'. This is a personal matter between the individual and his religious leaders.

Your help in correcting any misconception that God is no longer a part of our program would be greatly appreciated.

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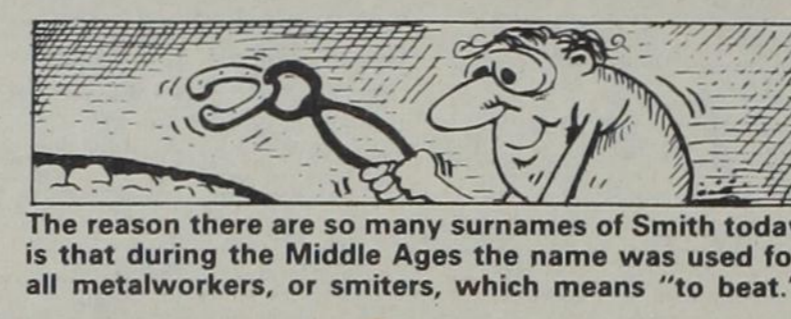
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FATE OR MATE?

# City Dedicates Park For Vietnam Era Veterans Here

The Cisco City Council approved a resolution dedicating a public park in "memory and honor of the

City's Vietnam War Era Veterans" at Tuesday night's regular meeting. The park, located on West 5th

behind the American Legion Hall, was also renamed "Veterans Park." The resolution also

authorizes Cisco veterans to develop and maintain the park as a public service to the benefit of the citizens of Cisco. City Manager Mike Moore stated the city acquired the park in a Sheriff's deed in 1947 and the city definitely has ownership of the land.

In other action, the council also approved a fire fighting contract with Eastland County for calls outside the city limits. In the contract, it states the county agrees to pay the city \$200 a month, during the term of the agreement.

Mr. Moore said the contract was approved by the County Commissioners Monday afternoon.

The first reading of an ordinance providing that several blocks and alleyways be closed was approved by the council. The ordinance was prepared as a result of a request from Ronnie Ledbetter.

The area affected is stated as "East 5th Street - from the west line of Avenue C to Railroad Right-of-Way, Avenue B - from north line of East 6th Street to Railroad Right-of-Way, Avenue C - from north line of East 6th Street to Railroad Right-of-Way. All alleyways within Blocks 9 and 10, Original Town."

A second reading of the ordinance will take place at the next regularly scheduled meeting. If it is approved on the second reading it will go into effect.

Council members were in agreement with city manager Moore to allow a current grading contract with United Energex to expire the end of December. Mr. Moore recommended not renewing the contract until next spring, since that is the time of year the city needs more help maintaining streets.

He said he has talked to officials of Energex and they had no objections to the idea. The city still has 46 1/2 hours of grading coming to it under the existing contract.

Council members heard the financial report for October, 1985, which was the first month of the new fiscal year of 1985-1986. Mr. Moore stated he hopes the October report is indicative of how the entire year will be, since expenditures were less than appropriations.

Mr. Moore also gave a city manager's report to the council in which he reviewed the number of blocks paved or seal coated during the past season. He stated the City spent over \$99,000 in equipment and supplies. However, considering the number of blocks handled, the cost breaks down to less than \$5.00 per linear foot.

He said this winter, city crews will be experimenting with an asphalt treatment of dirt streets to hopefully make them harder and settle dust. Crews will also be patching potholes and addressing drainage problems.

On Dec. 10, a public meeting is scheduled by the council to discuss the revenue sharing program. Mr. Moore said the city will be receiving some funds this

year from revenue sharing but, from all indications, it will definitely be the last year.

He also said he is not sure how much the city will receive. The present plans call for the funds to be paid in three installments in January, April, and July.

The Revenue Sharing funds will be cut this year, but the City will not know until the final payment how much they will be cut. The

first two payments will be as if full funding was in effect, and the cut will be taken from the final payment.

Mr. Moore said he is projecting the City's funding at \$55,500.00.

He also informed council members that he and City Judge Doug Fry are working on an experimental program to allow some persons to work out their fines with the City. He said the program, as proposed, would not be

open to "just anybody and will be purely discretionary."

Some more investigating must be done into the legality of the idea before a decision will be made on whether or not to implement it in city cases. Mr. Moore said it would be cheaper to place someone in jail who could not afford to pay a fine.

Mayor Pro-Tem Linton Batteas presided over the

meeting which was attended by council members Joe Besselaar, Bill Roberts, Roy Dennis, and Brad Kimbrough. Mayor Eric Ritchie and council member Bobby Ingram were absent from the meeting.



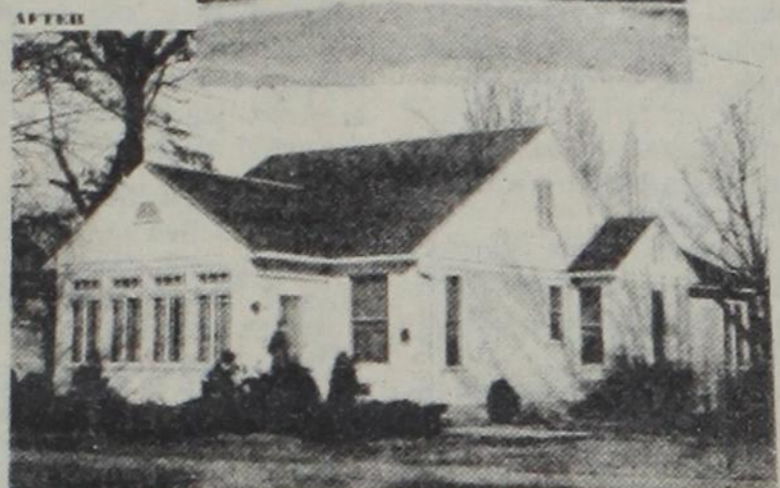

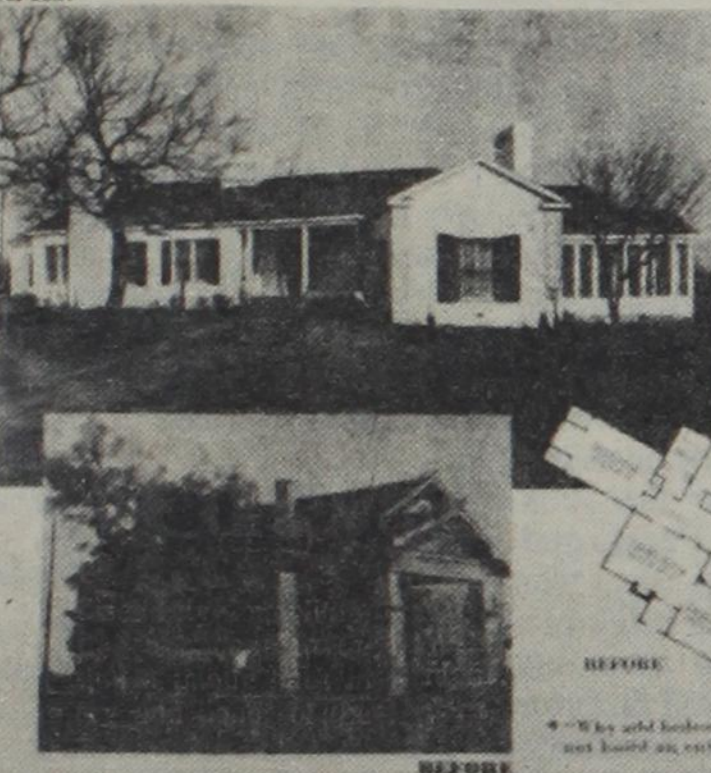

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# CJC News...

The CJC Wranglers, ranked No. 10 in the final National Junior College Athletic Association Top 20 poll are preparing for what may be their toughest game of the year.

CJC has accepted the bid to play Coffeyville Community College in the Kansas Jayhawk Bowl in Coffeyville, Kansas on Saturday, Dec. 7.

The 3:00 p.m. kickoff will be at ISE Field and will have the Wranglers, who finished 6-3-1 this season, going against the 8-2 Red Ravens.

Coach Rick Frazier's squad finished second in the Texas Junior College Football Conference.

Sophomore running back David Smith finished the season as No. 3 in the Texas Junior College Football Conference in rushing for the Wranglers. The Dallas native rushed for 879 yards on 141 carries for a 6.2 per-carry average, and was tied for 5th in the conference for scoring with seven touchdowns for 42 points.

Freshmen running back James Dixon finished the

season as No. 8 in the TJFCF in rushing for the Wranglers. The Vernon native rushed for 443 yards on 67 carries for a 6.6 per-carry average. Dixon was ranked No. 1 in the conference for kickoff returns with 18 returns for 445 yards and 1 touchdown for a 24.7 average.

Miami, Florida native Mark Pilling, who finished 4th in the TJFCF, led the Wranglers as first year quarterback, completing 79 of 204 passes with a 38.7 completion percentage. He threw for 1,187 yards and 11 touchdowns.

Leading the Wranglers in receiving and ranked No. 7 in the TJFCF was freshman Daryl Grant who caught 19 passes for 240 yards and one touchdown. Sophomore Philip Walton, ranked 9 in the TJFCF, finished second with 18 catches for 480 yards in 4 touchdowns. Sophomore Melvin Patterson, ranked No. 13 in the TJFCF, finished third with 15 catches for 205 yards and 5 touchdowns. Patterson also tied for 12th in scoring in the TJFCF.

Sophomore Raymond Her-

nandez's 25 points after touchdowns and 9 field goals gave him the scoring crown for the Wranglers with 52 points and he finished No. 3 in the TJFCF. Hernandez was ranked No. 3 in punting the conference in punt returns with 25 carries for 189 yards and a 7.6 average. Lintz is also tied for third in kickoff returns with 14 for 357 yards and a 25.5 average.

The Kansas team, ranked 15th, upset the nation's number one team, Butler County last week. Butler has scored to take the lead with less than a minute remaining before Coffeyville returned the ensuing kickoff for a 34-32 victory.

Also making the trip to the Kansas Jayhawk Bowl Classic will be seventy members of the Wrangler Band and Belles. They will march in the Christmas parade in Coffeyville on Saturday morning at 11 a.m. The band and Belles will also participate with the Coffeyville Community College Red Raven Band and several high school bands at a pre-game mass performance presentation.

Since 1971, the Wrangler Band and Belles have represented the college five times at the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City; the last time being the fall of 1984. The band and Belles were featured in the Winchester, Virginia "Apple Blossom Festival" Parade in 1980 and 1983, and participated in the "Fiesta Flambeau" Night Parade in San Antonio, Texas, in the spring of 1979 and 1984.

These two groups will be featured in the Buccaneer Days Festival in Corpus Christi, Texas in May of 1986, and will return to Washington, D.C. and Win-

chester, Virginia in the spring of 1987.

The Wrangler Band director and coordinator of activities is Mr. Tim Jones, and Belle director is Mrs. Niki Harle. Mrs. Wyley Peebles is chairman of the Fine Arts Department of Cisco Junior College.

The Kansas Jayhawk Bowl Classic was born at the NJCA Association Convention in March 1983, when sanction was granted. The first classic was held in 1983.

Tickets for the Bowl Classic are on sale at the CJC bookstore. Prices for these are \$5. each, which is \$2.00 off the price that will be charged at the game.

Few realize yet how much Cisco and the Mobley really meant to Conrad Hilton. In his autobiography Hilton mentions the mobley twenty-six tiems and Cisco twenty-one times. He gives the Mobley credit for being the place where he learned the hotel business and he makes many fond remarks about eh Mobley throughout the entire autobiography. Hilton had his famous dream of Texas wearing a chain of Hilton hotels during his first night as the owner of the

Mobley. There are only two hotels pictured in the autobiography. One hotel is the Waldorf-Astoria in New York and the other is the Mobley In Cisco, Texas.

A lot of how Hilton obtained his success needs to rub off on us in Cisco today. The main ingredient is an expression of welcome and appreciation to his guests. We need to be ready to welcome the guests we are expecting to view the Mobley. Ironically another reason was that he bought old hotels and refurbished or restored them which attracted travelers

and tourists. (This same thing that is happenign in Cisco today).

Hilton's accomplishments were attained by applying the standard by which he was raised, which included prayer and persistent effort. He shared his endeavors with many investors and gave each his fair share of the profits. Many of the hotels he bought were sold to

him because of his high standard of management and good taste. Today, that standard still prevails as the Hilton hotels around the world are among the elite and ultimate in "away from home" comfort.

Hilton's name is recognized around the world with favor and is a favorite place for many famous people, as well as, people in general to

rest and to be entertained.

A general theme of nostalgic interests, including business, entertainments, and historic information are being considered by various individuals and groups to compliment the Mobley. It is possible and I believe very likely that the tourist traffic to view the Mobley will exceed most expectations. I only hope that we of Cisco will reflect a good image of being worthy of the honor of being the home of Hilton's first foundation.

Hilton did not always have it made. After having established a chain of eight hotels, Hilton lost them all during the depression, but he started over with the same vision and continued until he truly had fulfilled the "American Dream" as the world's foremost hosteler.

All of the hotels Hilton bought had his own personality and each was enhanced by Hilton's possession. Once he bought two hotels in Chicago and paid nearly 40 million for them. He bought many others involving many millions, including the Waldorf Astoria, and the Statler Hotel chain, but none of them matched the Mobley's ability to rent her rooms in 8 hour shifts to people standing in line at her doors. It was during this great demand that Hilton learned one of his most valuable lessons; that of utilizing unused or wasted space. He turned many dead corners into market places.

We all need to know more about this great American who helped establish our town as an important and interesting part of history. The new history that is happening now, like the restoration of the Mobley, meets the old history, established in the past with great excitement. That excitement exists, partly because of the fine character of Hilton. That

character is revered by generations around the world and is demonstrated by a prayer he wrote which was printed and reprinted many times over.

Our Father in Heaven; We pray that You save us from ourselves. The world that You have made for us, to live in peace we have made into an armed camp. We live in fear of war to come. We are afraid of "the terror that flies by night and the arrow that flies by day, the pestilence that walks in darkness and the destruction that wastes at noon-day". We have turned from You to go our selfish way. We have broken Your commandments and denied Your truth. We have left Your altars to serve the false gods of money and pleasure and power. Forgive us and help us. Now, darkness gathers around us and we are confused in all our counsels. Losing faith in you, we lose faith in our selves. Inspire us with wisdom, all of us, of every color, race and creed, to use our wealth, our strength, to help our brother, instead of destroying him. Help us to do Your will as it is done in Heaven and to be worthy of Your promise of peace on earth. Fill us with new faith, new strength, and new courage, that we may win the battle for peace. Be swift to save us, dear God, before the darkness falls.

As we learn more about Hilton, our positive attitudes will gain assurance of the absolute opportunity our town has to prosper through the wake of tourism destined to view not only the Mobley, but whatever else we provide for them to see, enjoy, remember and spread news about. I hope you will make time to read Hilton's autobiography, "Be My Guest". The Chamber of Commerce can help you obtain a copy.

Rex and Trudi Long.

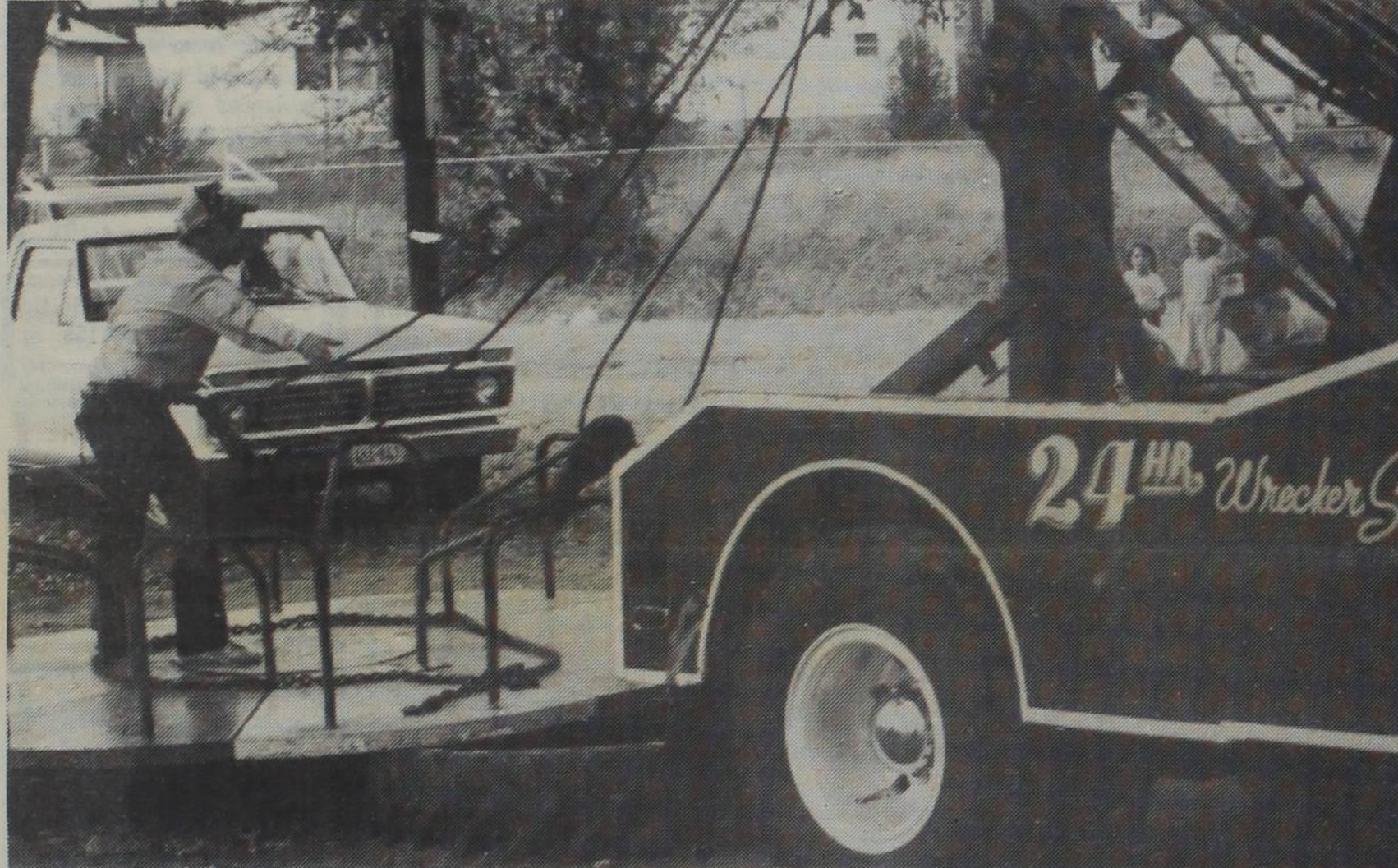

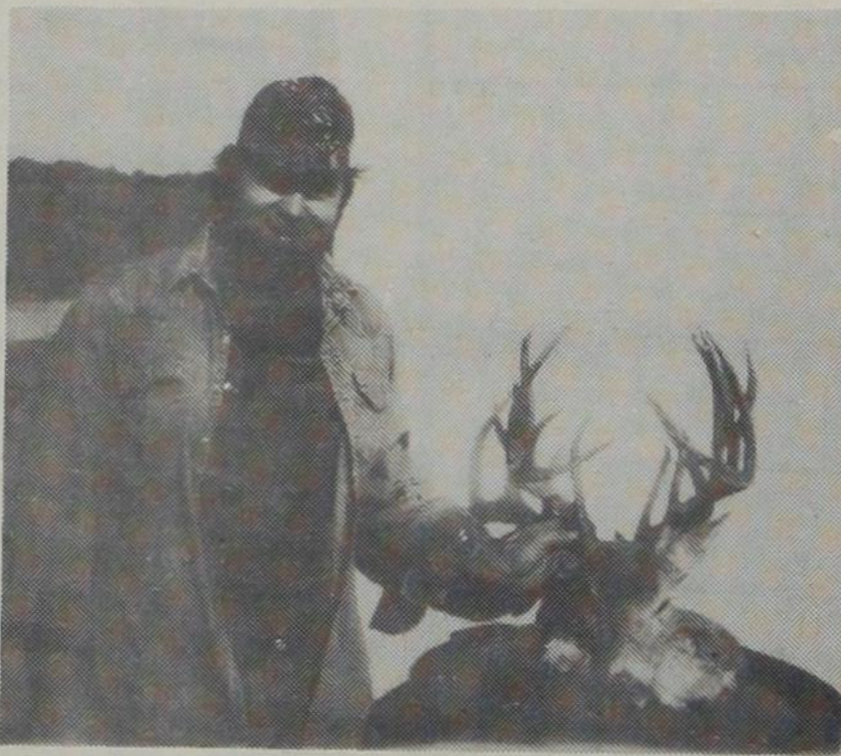
is now retired and lives in Austin. Dr. Newberry is a gifted speaker and appears frequently over the state.

## Getting Ready For Winter

Though the first freeze of winter may be only a few days off or several weeks off it is time to get ready for it.

We have already had temperatures in the forties and many records have been broken this year with temperatures getting so low so early in the year. You can learn a lot from old Mother Nature about weather conditions.

In observing the squirrels you will note that they are extremely busy gathering their winter food supply. This is quite natural but this is the first year in a long time that the squirrels have not been chattering among themselves as they gather their food. They are busy working very quietly and fast.

Does this tell us that we are going to have an early winter or a hard winter? I have already seen flocks of geese going South. Another factor to consider is that the trees have changed colors about three weeks ahead of schedule this year. I feel sure that we will have an early winter or a hard winter if not both.

Plant material freezes at different temperatures. Some plants freeze at 38 degrees while other plants will not freeze until 28 degrees or lower. Still there

are tropical plants that can not take temperatures below 60 degrees. For plants in your yard, a good application (2 inches deep or better) of mulch should protect your root system against a freeze. Stop all fertilizing now. This will prevent new tender growth that could be nipped by a freeze. When a freeze is predicted, you should water your plants heavy the night before. This will help to protect them if it does freeze as predicted. However, some plants will need additional protection. A simple framework can be constructed to cover the particular plant(s) that need this additional protection. You can stretch either cloth or plastic over this framework. Remember that hanging baskets are very easy to freeze and are also very easy to protect from possible freeze damage. After thoroughly watering your hanging baskets pull a plastic leaf bag over the basket and tie the top of the hanging wire. Leave your basket protected this way until it warms up. This should give you ample protection from the freeze.

If you have a green house at home you may want to take your plants in for the winter. You can also move any large patio or tropical plants inside the green house for protection. If you do not

have a home green house you can move your large patio or tropical plants inside your house or into your garage.

When you move plants inside try to give them the same amount of light they had been getting outside. If you plan to keep your plants in all winter try to give them same amount of light they had been getting outside, and be sure and keep them out of drafts.

Don't put them around

windows and doors. They can get too much light and heat coming through the window glass very easily. With the proper light and atmospheric conditions a plant can continue to grow inside during the winter. Grow-lux types of lights are good to simulate outside conditions.

If you have to do any pruning or removing of any damage limbs at this time of the year, it is extremely important that you seal over the open area with pruning

paint. It is advisable not to do any pruning or limb removal now unless absolutely necessary.

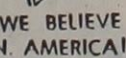

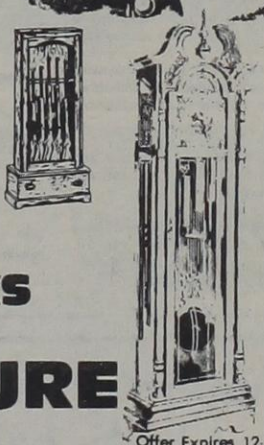

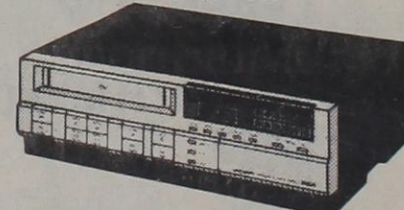

# Fishing Outdoors

A recent open tournament on Lake Leon drew few anglers, but did produce a number of fish. 7 fish were brought to the scales weighing a total of 8 pounds 11 ounces.

First place and big bass was won by Ira Pennington. Ira had 4 fish weighing 4 pounds 15 ounces. These fish fell prey to a spinnerbait in 4 feet of water.

The small turnout shows how often anglers lay their rods aside for deer rifles just when fishing begins picking up. Water temperatures fall and fish become more active than perhaps at anytime of the year. During this time bass may actually begin the processes of spawn on many lakes. But eggs end up being absorbed or the fish complete the lay cycle only to be left unfertilized.

Recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department surveys on Lake Welsh near Mount Pleasant indicate largemouth bass populations are in excellent shape.

Biologist Mike Ryan of Marshall said almost 70 pounds of bass per acre were found during September survey. The largest bass collected weighed 6.3 pounds.

Legal-sized bass 10 inches and longer comprised a whopping 62.9 pounds per acre, or 90 percent of the bass collected.

Welsh is one of the East Texas reservoirs known for producing trophy sized largemouths, including a 15 pound, 3<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> ounce monster which is the largest ever documented from a public reservoir in Texas. Bill

Ockerhausen of Mount Pleasant caught the trophy bass in December 1983.

Lake Welsh is located 10 miles southwest of Mount Pleasant, and the only public access point is at Swauano Marina just off FM 1735.

Area lake reports are as follows: Brownwood, water clear 3 feet low; black bass to 7 pounds 13 ounces on four inch black ringworms with yellowtail; strippers fair to five pounds, crappie slow, yellow cats good to 51 pounds on live bait.

Gibbons Creek, water murky, black bass good but

mostly in slot limit, crappie good, catfish excellent to 11 pounds. Lake Fork: water clear, 58 degrees, black bass good in slot to 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> pounds, crappie good in numbers but small size, catfish slow. Murvaul: water clear, 65 degrees, black bass good to four pounds on crankbaits, catfish good to 5 pounds. Lake Welsh, water dingy, 74 degrees, black bass good to seven pounds, crappie fair to 12 fish per string, catfish fair. Lake Sam Rayburn: water clear, black bass fair to 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> pounds on spinners, crappie slow, catfish slow.

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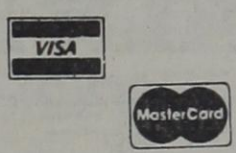
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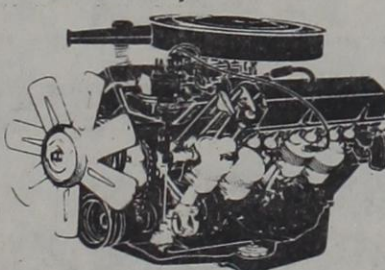
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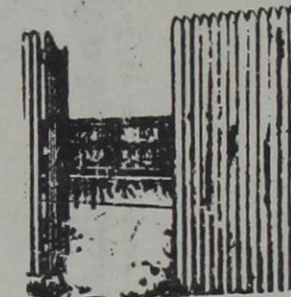

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# Drilling Bits

At a location five miles northwest of Eastland, Larb Oil has finished a new oil producer in Eastland County's AB Field.

The well is designated as the No. 3 Paul Hodge, pumping at the rate of 87 barrels per day.
